## Crispy American Chop Suey

2 tablespoons shortening 1 egg, beaten  
1/2 cup diced onion 1 cup grated American cheese  
1/2 cup diced celery 1 cup milk  
1 10 1/2-oz. can tomato puree 2 tablespoons minced parsley  
1 8-oz. can spaghetti sauce 1 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to 325° F. (moderate). Brown beef in shortening, breaking it with a spoon into small bits. Add onion, celery, tomato puree and spaghetti sauce. Cook, uncovered, over low heat for 20 minutes. Combine crushed cracker crumbs, beaten egg, grated cheese, milk, parsley and salt. Stir cracker crumb mixture into tomato mixture. Pour into a greased 1 1/2-quart baking dish. Bake, uncovered, at 325° F. for 40 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 generous servings.

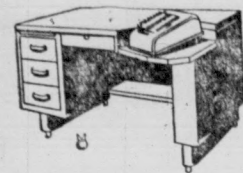

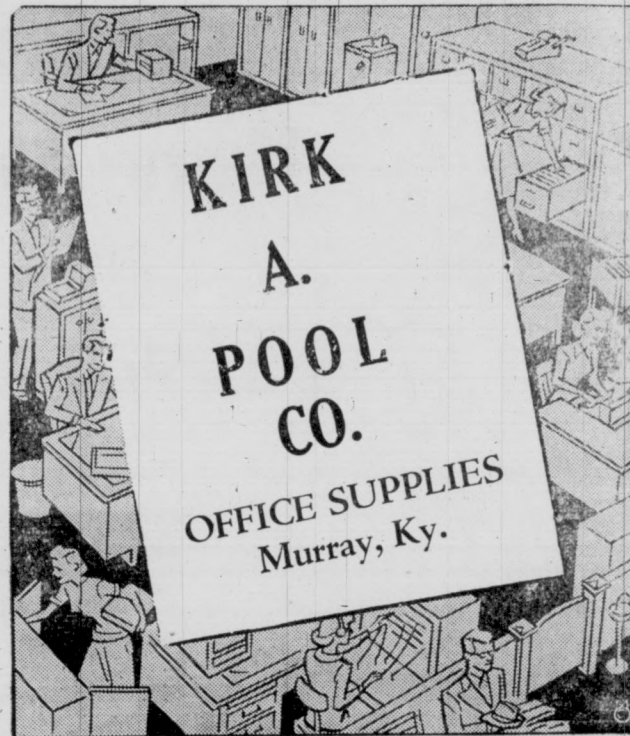

Drug For Female "Tension State" Also Prevents Acne

Acne and other skin ailments which flare up periodically in women may be prevented by treatment with a drug developed originally to counteract pre-menstrual tension.

The effectiveness of the drug, called Pre-mens, in the prevention of acne was described in a report by two Canadian physicians in a recent issue of the Archives of Dermatology, published by the American Medical Association. The Canadian specialists, Drs. Frederick Kalz and Allene Scott of McGill University and Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, based their study on sixty patients. Fifty patients were women who complained of one or more of the recurring symptoms of pre-menstrual tension — depression, anxiety, backache, bloating — and who suffered from characteristic monthly skin problems. The ten patients who served as controls included five postmenopausal women, normal in every respect, and five men, two of whom had acne.

Pre-mens, the study showed, prevented the premenstrual flare-up of acne and other skin ailments in forty of the fifty patients in whom this phenomenon had been previously observed. The ten patients who derived no benefit from Pre-mens included the five men and five women who apparently were irregular in their hormone cycle.

In the course of the study, the investigators observed that an average weight gain of 5.4 lb. was noted in fifty premenopausal patients just prior to the onset of the menses. However, when



Pre-mens was given in the treatment, the average weight gain was reduced to 0.6 lb.

The investigators concluded that the greater effectiveness of Pre-mens, which was developed by the research scientists of The Purdue Frederick Company of New York, may be attributed to the fact that the drug contains significant amounts of various vitamins, as well as a mild relaxant. These vitamins, the report notes, generally help to achieve an increased feeling of well-being, with the relief of irritability.

# Farm and Home Week Will Open on Jan. 2

What's new in farming, home-making, and the national and worldwide situation as it affects farm people gets a special four-day treatment this month at the University of Kentucky in Lexington.

It is the 45th annual Farm and Home Week for state farm folks. It opens Tuesday, Jan. 29 and concludes Friday afternoon, Feb. 1.

Fruits and vegetables, beef cattle raising, bee-keeping, dairy goats, marketing, poultry, swine, sheep, forage crops, to bacco, rural activities 'health' church work and many other activities will be covered.

Experiment Station researchers will discuss their findings of the last year. Extension Service specialists will talk of their work and many nationally known persons from agriculture and allied fields will be on the four-day program.

Here's a partial rundown day-by-day for the program.

TUESDAY, JAN. 29. forage crops, fruits, vegetable, credit and business' meat animals, seed improvement.

WEDNESDAY JAN. 30. farm-family health, insect control leadership, the Soil Bank, dairying beefwork, rural education, rural church fellowship.

THURSDAY, JAN. 31. watershed development, marketing.

FRIDAY, FEB. 1. all tobacco production, breeding and handling, Kentucky Federation of makers.

Visitors will get information in housing arrangements at the session.

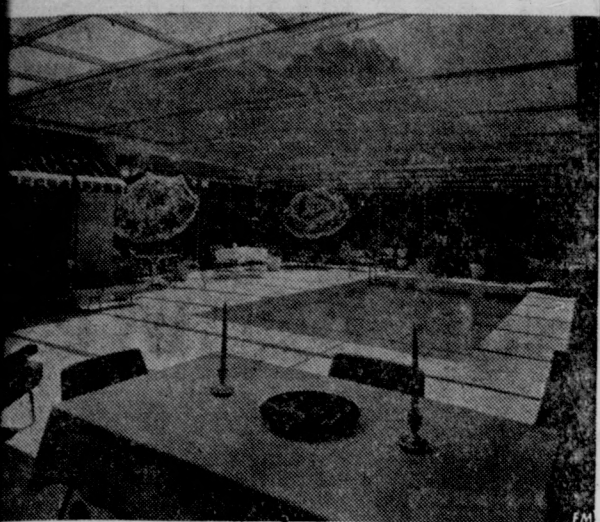

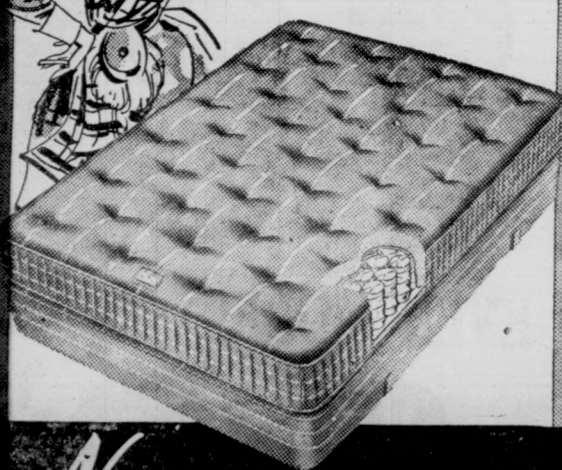

## County Soil Notes

I met with the Hardin and Brewster adult farmer classes on last Monday and Tuesday nights. Glen Warren, vocational agriculture teacher at South Marshall High School, is conducting the classes.

I explained the Soil Conservation District program. Assistance of the Soil Conservation Service is available to farmers who are cooperators of the district. Eight farmers signed cooperative agreements at the close of the meetings. They can now get help in planning their farm conservation program, applying the work to the land, and on needed maintenance.

Attending the meetings were: James P. Pritchard, Lawrence York, Joe L. Filbeck, Howard York, Corbett Tucker, David Henderson, Clatus Copeland, Joe Young, James G. Byers, Elwood Brown, A. C. Palmer, Olice Mason and Emil Mohler.

The classes invited me to meet with them again on Feb. 4 and 5 to explain the watershed approach to planning and applying soil and water conservation. The people of Clarks River Watershed are trying to get a watershed project approved. To help speed the work along and finally to carry out the necessary legal procedures, the people are trying to form a Clarks River Watershed Conservancy District. This is possible under the Kentucky Watershed Conservancy District Law.

## Kentucky Dam In Second Place As A Tourist Attraction

Kentucky Dam has moved into second place among all Tennessee Valley Authority dams as a tourist attraction.

Only Norris Dam, the first dam built by TVA, has attracted more visitors than Kentucky Dam, said the weekly TVA newsletter.

Norris Dam has attracted an estimated 15,619,000 visitors since it started. Kentucky Dam is now in second place with 11,213,900 visitors since it was opened.

Estimates are based on registrations and conservative estimates of the TVA Safety Service.

In 1956 Kentucky Dam led all other installations as a tourist attraction. It drew 1,485,000 visitors for the year. Fontana Dam attracted the second largest number with 1,314,000.

All TVA dams and steam plants during 1956 attracted an estimated 9,635,700 visitors. Since 1933 the estimated number of visits is 77,501,400. Visits in 1956 were approximately 964,000 more than in 1955 and about 2,100,000 more than in 1954.

### Hannibal Still is Selling Mark Twain

Beside the Mississippi River, in Northeastern Missouri, is a main-street home town that attracted more American visitors last year than Hawaii, and a fourth as many as saw Europe.

The town is Hannibal, Mark Twain's boyhood home and scene of the adventures of Tom Sawyer, Huckleberry Finn, and other youngsters of fiction who are better known to millions today than many real-life persons in their daily newspapers.

Jerry Allen, author of a recent biography on the writer-humorist who is seldom remembered by his actual name, Samuel Clemens, tells in the National Geographic Magazine how Hannibal lives its literary legend.

Many of the buildings Mark Twain knew are still in use, Miss Allen points out. The city shows its pride in its famous citizen of a century ago by restorations, monuments, and landmarks. His name is everywhere, in shop signs for Mark Twain printers, jewelers, cleaning company, confectionery; at hotel, taxi office, movie house, and rest home.

Hannibal's best-known address is 208 Hill Street. Out of his upstairs bedroom window, young Sam Clemens climbed to join his friend, Tom Blankenship (Huck Finn), for the moonlight deeds he later immortalized in the "Adventures of Tom Sawyer."

Against the Clemens' modest clapboard house leans a high, white board fence, copy of the one Tom graciously permitted his pals to whitewash for him.

Next door to the old home-stand is the Mark Twain Museum. Opened in 1937, it exhibits the author's early typewriter, the old cherry desk at which he wrote, and a huge pilot's wheel from a Mississippi steamboat.

Behind such a wheel Mark Twain learned to steer his craft so as to "shave steamships as close as you'd peel an apple." His pen name came from the river term "mark twain" for a safe depth of 2 fathoms (12 feet).

Hannibal treasures the law office of Mark Twain's father, and the home of his first girl, Laura Hawkins, immortalized as Tom Sawyer's Becky Thatcher.

At the foot of Cardiff Hill the City has set up a bronze monument showing young Tom and Huck marching along barefoot and carefree. In a riverside park stands a giant statue of Mark Twain in late years, looking out on his beloved Mississippi. Farther along is the white Mark Twain Memorial Lighthouse, and nearby the Mark Twain Memorial Bridge.

So closely is Hannibal linked with the author, says Miss Allen, that its history is usually ignored before 1839, when a 4-year-old red-headed boy came there to live and stayed until he was 17.

Actually the town, older than the Oregon Trail, was settled in 1819. When the Clemenses lived there, it was an important steamboat center of some 1,000 people.

Today, Hannibal has more than 21,000 residents. Watching the Mississippi traffic flow by, it looks for livelihood to factories, business, and trade with a prosperous farming countryside.

Yet the river is still a living force in the community and a mold of young. Fishing is an industry as well as pastime for every man and boy. On hot summer days Jackson's Island (where Huck and Jim set out on their famous raft) is a happy haunt for children to camp, fish, and swim.

With a mile-wide river for a back yard, growing up is still as much fun in Hannibal as in the days of its famous pair of boys.

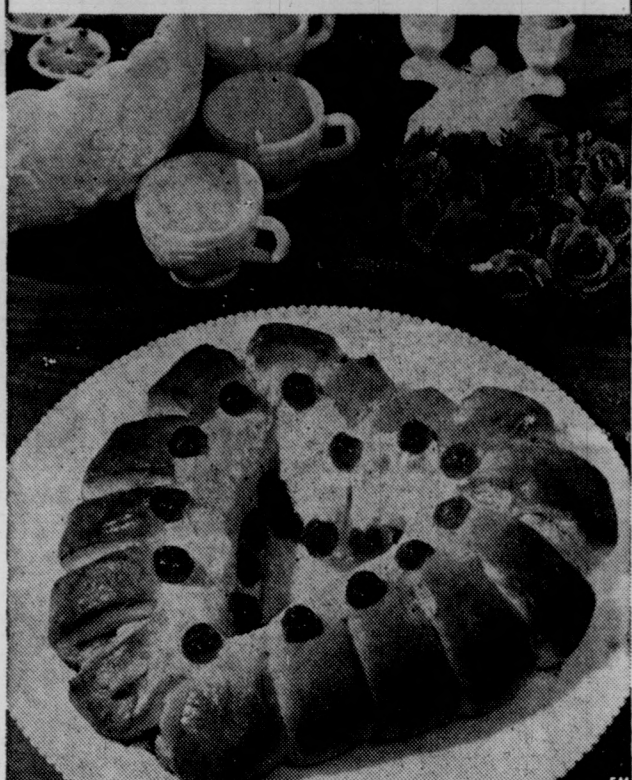

#### VALENTINE'S TEA CAKE

1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed

1/2 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)  
2 eggs, beaten  
5 cups sifted enriched flour  
1/2 cup melted margarine or butter  
1/2 cup cherry jam

Scald milk and stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle or crumble yeast into water (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm water for compressed yeast). Stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture. Add eggs and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour or enough to make a dough. Turn dough out on a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic. Put dough into a greased bowl and brush top lightly with soft shortening. Cover with a cloth; let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about one hour. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Cut dough in half. Roll out each half into an oblong 14 by 12 inches. Brush lightly with melted margarine or butter. Spread with a thin layer of jam. Roll up lengthwise as for a jelly roll. Place on greased baking sheet. Form into a heart shape and seal ends together firmly. Cut one inch slices almost through with scissors. Cover with a cloth. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft until doubled in bulk. Bake at 350°F. about 1/2 hour. Decorate with plain icing and candied cherries.

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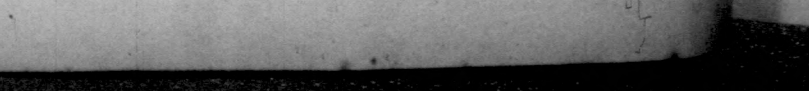
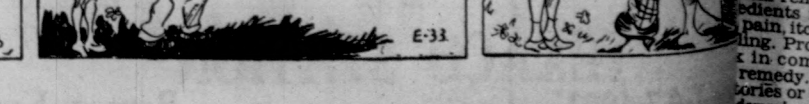
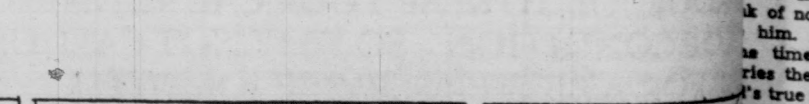
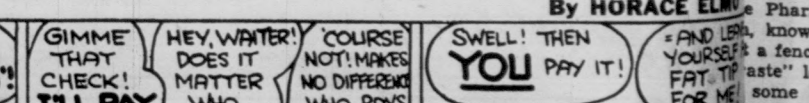
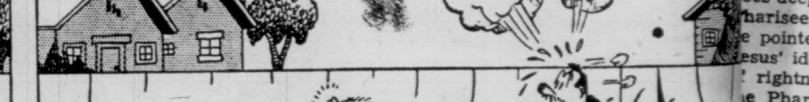
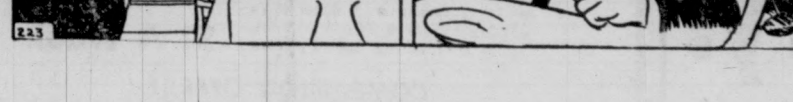
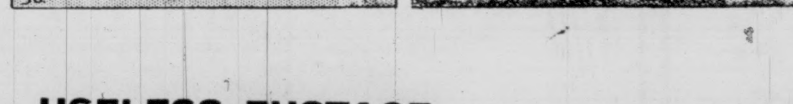
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**THE BIBLE SPEAKS**  
International Union  
Sunday School Lessons  
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN  
Background Scripture: Matthew 5:7  
Devotional Reading: Matthew 6:25-33  
**Righteousness**  
Lesson for January 20, 1957

**RIGHTEOUSNESS** is an old-fashioned word. You almost never see it outside the Bible. But the thing itself is not old-fashioned, you can see it outside the Bible, nearly everybody wants it for himself and everybody wants it for his neighbors. Even criminals count on it—in other people! The word originally came (in the Bible) from the Hebrew word meaning "straight." To this day everybody knows what the difference is between a straight man and a crooked one. We mean the same thing sometimes when we use only the first part of the word, "right." We like to be right, we like to have the right people around us. "He's just not right!" is one of the worst things that can be said about a man. A righteous person is one that is all that he should be. He comes up to standard, there is nothing shoddy or make believe about him. To be sure, some people don't care about this; but then some people don't care whether they are healthy or clean.

**Better Than the Best**  
One of the things Jesus said that must have sounded surprising at the time he said it, was that the righteousness of those who followed him must "exceed that of the Pharisees." Now the Pharisees made a specialty of righteousness. They were super-good, or aimed to be. They had money, and leisure, and they spent their time thinking up ways to be better than anybody. They were, so to speak, the athletes of morality. They held all the records for high jumps and pole vaults to the top levels of righteousness. Nobody else even tried to be as good as they were. So it must have astonished everybody, not to mention shocking the Pharisees, when Jesus as good as said they were not up to the standards of the kingdom of heaven. If we look into what Jesus said by way of explaining this astonishing remark, however, we can see three ways in which the Pharisees' idea of what it is to be right—right in the sight of God, that is—comes short of the true ideal. First of all, the Pharisees were interested in action only. Now acts are very important. But as Jesus explained it, actions come from inner attitudes, and where the attitude is wrong, acts are likely to be wrong too. True righteousness, or rightness, begins and has its roots in "the heart," the inner life, where thoughts begin. The truly right person will not be content with making a good showing, he wants to be right even if it never shows.

**No Fences for Love**  
So the rightness Jesus demands goes deeper than what satisfied the Pharisees, ancient or modern. But he pointed out another difference. Jesus' ideal (which is God's ideal) of rightness is also broader than the Pharisees' brand. They loved their friends, they would do a great deal for those who did a lot for them. Jesus pointed out that anybody not a complete fool will do as much. "You scratch my back and I'll scratch yours" is a philosophy almost anybody can understand. Loving people who love you—and no other—is like exchanging presents at Christmas time. Some people "give" a great many presents, at least they wrap them up and distribute them; but they don't give a thing unless they expect to get a present in return. The Pharisees, ancient and modern, know what love is; but they put a fence around it. They do not "waste" love on those who do not "some way" pay them for it. Jesus went all the way—so far that to this day few of us dare to follow him. Love your enemies, he said. Love is good; the Pharisees were on the right track. But love must have no horizons.

**Why Be Good?**  
The kind of rightness God wants is another sure mark: It has the right motive. The Pharisees wanted to be right so as to be admired by other men. But true rightness has just one motive: To be like our Father in heaven. To be like God—to "play God," is what it is. But it is not wicked, it is the very heart of the truly good man, to love God so much, and know him so well (and never so well as in Christ) that one can think of nothing better than to be like him. All other motives fail, some time; but this one motive carries the secret of the power of God's true saints.

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## Valley Test Event Held

**Left from Last Week**  
Sixteen board members of the Valley Test Demonstration Association, representing seven states voted in a recent meeting at Chattanooga to make awards to its most outstanding members or to outstanding professional workers who have been connected with the test demonstration program during its twenty-one year period.

The unique farm test demonstration work began back in 1935 in the seven states of the Tennessee Valley—Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. Since that time the Extension Services of these states and the TVA have cooperated in working with test demonstration farm families on soil improvement through proper liming and fertilization, and on complete farm and home improvement procedures.

The association's board also appointed a committee to work with land-grant college representatives of the Valley states toward developing another 4-H Resource Development Conference. The first conference was held last June.

Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, was chosen for the scene of the fourth annual association meeting and election of officers in 1956. Previous meetings have been held at Wilson Dam, where about 500 delegates represented 30,000 past and present test demonstration farm families in the 125 county Tennessee Valley area.

Those attending the meeting from this area included U. A. Roberts of Graves County, Malory Edwards of Paducah; and C. O. Bondurant, University of Kentucky extension area agent in farm management with offices at Murray. Kentucky's two directors on the board are Mr. Roberts and R. O. Wilson of Smithland.

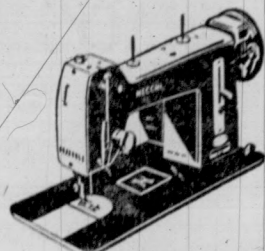
