Full Insurance Coverage Offered To All Car Drivers

Kentucky motorists who have a hard time getting auto insurance—including many forced to apply for minimum coverage through the "assigned risk" plan—may qualify for full coverage protection under a new plan being introduced by the State Farm insurance group.

Single male drivers under 25, men and women drivers over 65, and drivers of all ages with minor driving infractions on their records are targets of State Farm's new "standard risk" program.

In addition to making full coverage available to these groups, State Farm will offer comprehensive and collision insurance to many motorists now in the assigned risk plan.

J. Homer Solomon, local agent for State Farm, said the plan "will enable us to provide a far greater portion of the state's drivers with adequate protection on a voluntary basis."

The insurance may cost more than the amount most drivers pay, but there's a provision for lowering the cost through accident-free driving.

Mr. Solomon said he knew of no other way for many drivers to get full insurance protection. Only limited amounts of bodily injury and property damage liability insurance are now available to assigned risks. Those who have records of traffic convictions and accidents pay surcharges for their insurance.

Mr. Solomon said the State Farm plan "does not include the irresponsible few who should not be licensed to drive."

Medical Care for Ky. Aged Being Planned

FRANKFORT — The Advisory Council of Medical Assistance has set the eligibility requirements for persons over 65 who need medical care but who are not drawing State welfare payments.

An estimated 87,000 Kentuckians will be eligible.

The major limitation is that an individual may not have an income over \$1,000 a year, and a couple not more than \$1,500 a year.

The council acted on the nation's medical-care program for the needy after receiving recommendations from the department of Economic Security and Health.

These two departments will administer the program for medical aid to those over 65 and a companion program of medical assistance to Kentuckians on public-assistance rolls. Both programs go into effect Jan. 1.

In addition to the income limitations, eligibility will be determined on a recipient's liquid assets, such as stocks and bonds. An individual may not have more than \$500 and a couple more than \$750 in such assets. Real property is not counted.

They also may not be covered by private medical plans and receive state aid.

The council recommended the \$2,148,993 available in State and federal funds for the year beginning Jan. 1 be allotted this way:

Hospitalization — \$1,148,400 with an initial limit of the first three days of hospitalization paid for by the State.

Physician's services — \$826,400, with \$2.60 as the cost per physician's visit and visited limited to an initial two a month.

Nursing-home care — either \$174,193 or \$71,866, depending on what will be needed for adminis-

FARMING AROUND

By Mark Welsh

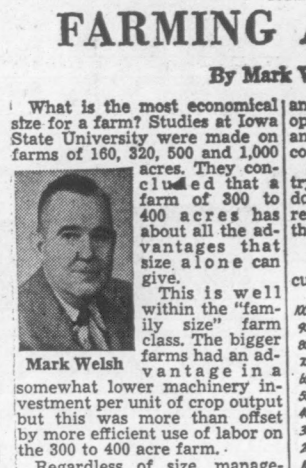
What is the most economical size for a farm? Studies at Iowa State University were made on farms of 160, 320, 640 and 1,280 acres. They concluded that a farm of 300 to 400 acres has about all the advantages that size alone can give.

This is well within the "family size" farm class. The bigger farms had an advantage in a somewhat lower machinery investment per unit of crop output but this was more than offset by more efficient use of labor on the 300 to 400 acre farm.

Regardless of size, management is undoubtedly the most important factor in profitable operation. Good management includes many little things as well as proper seed selection, fertilization and crop and livestock handling. It includes shade and cool water for animals on hot days; vaccinating calves, pigs and chickens against numerous diseases; spraying with Malathion to control flies, mosquitoes and other pests of plants and animals and perhaps borrowing operating cash from the bank and discounting bills as they come due.

Success on the farm, in industry or in the home comes from doing a few big things well and remembering to do many little things on time and well too.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture says that since the 1947-



40 period taxes have gone up 84%, real estate 73% and wages 51%. Machinery has jumped 58%, motor vehicles 47%, motor supplies 24%, fencing materials 33%; but other farm supplies have gone up only 11% and fertilizer 6%. That's a big tribute to the efficiency of the chemical industry.

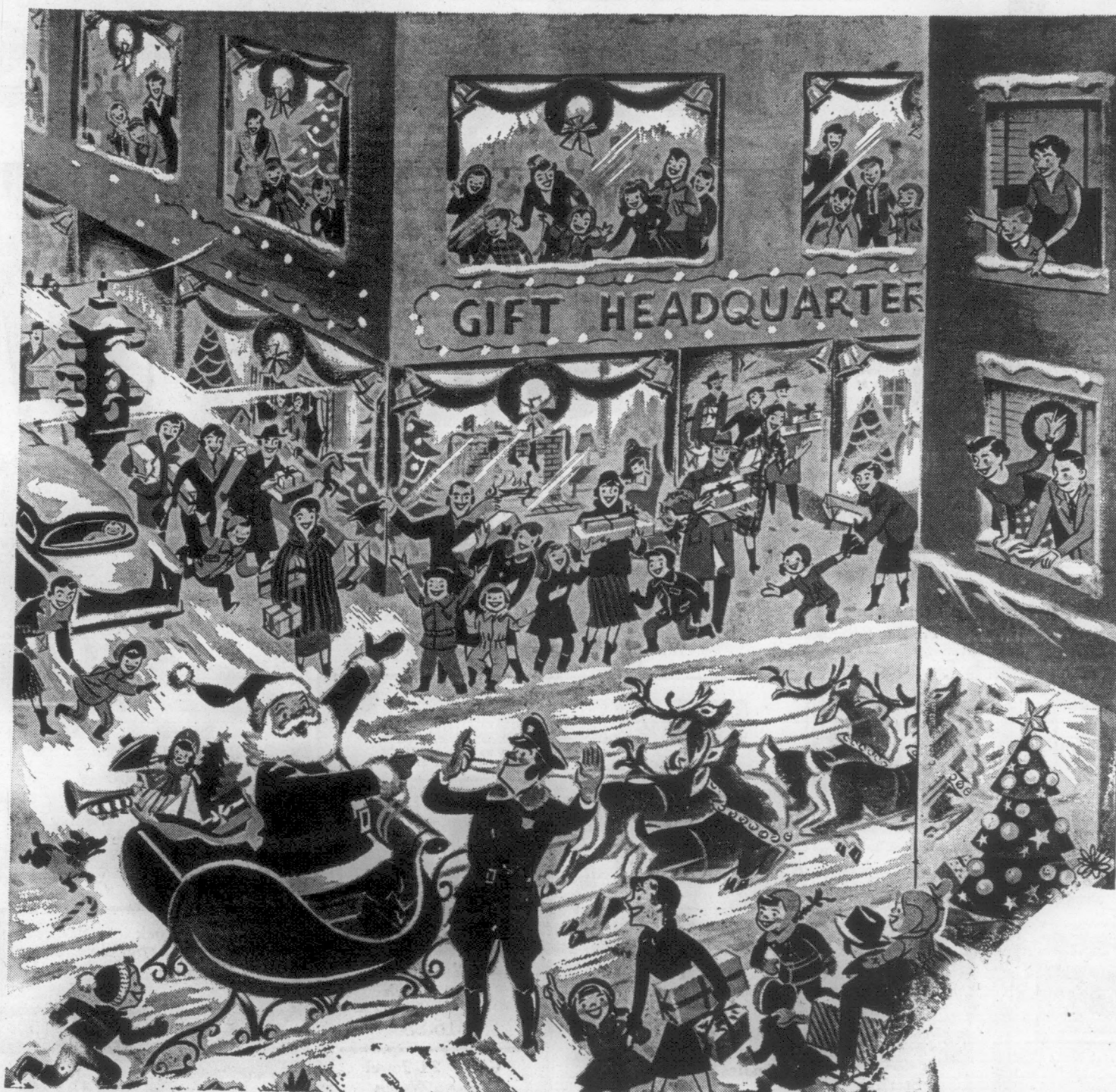

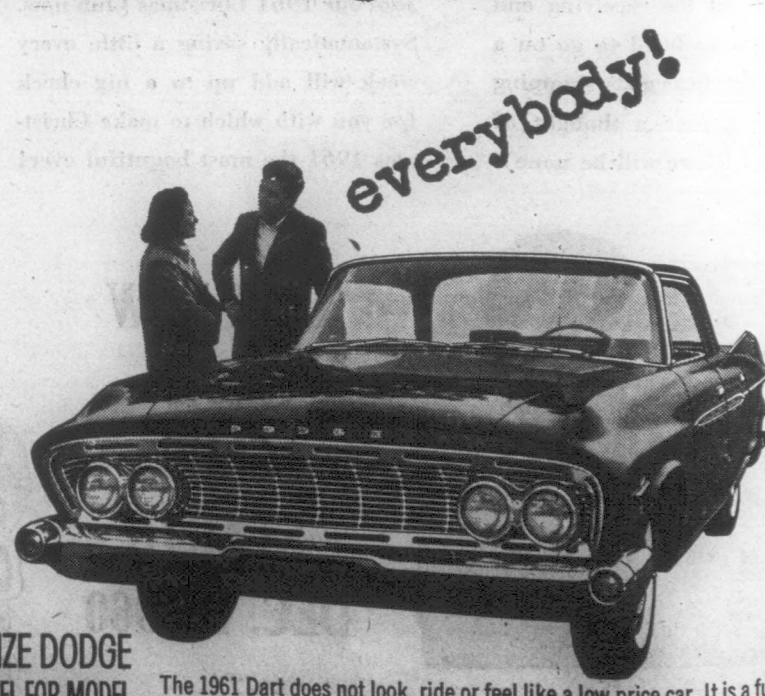
