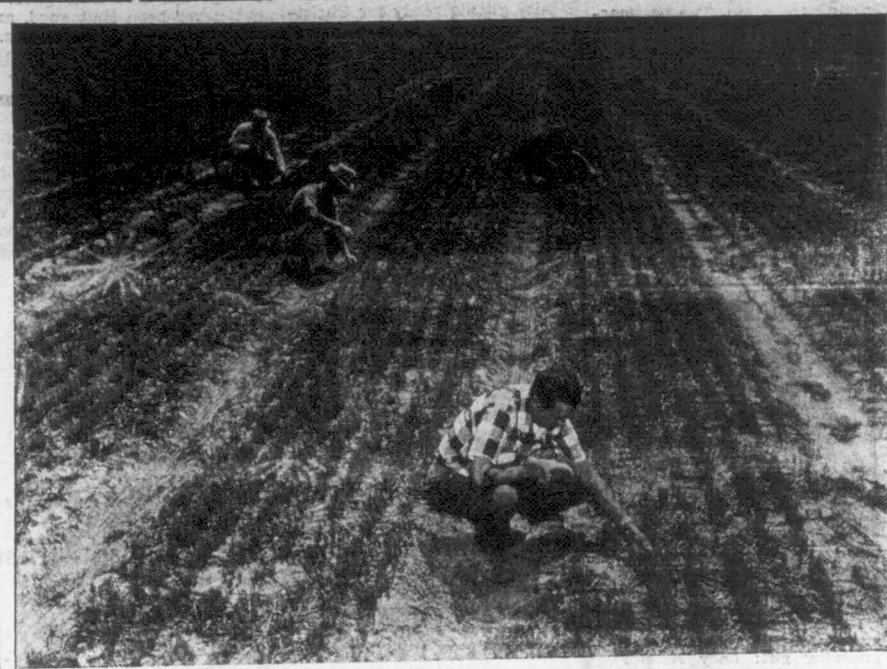

If, for example, you are making ballet costumes for that favorite, "The Nutcracker Suite," plan to flameproof the cotton leotards and ballet skirt a day or so before readying the decorative touches. To make the fire-retarding mixture, dissolve three ounces

of boric acid and seven ounces of borax in two quarts of hot water. Dip clean, dry leotards, tights and ballet skirt into the mixture, then damp dry. You can count on the mercerized cotton leotards to hold their shape and the ballet skirt can be pressed with the iron at low heat.

After this solution is applied materials may car but will not burst into flash flames. This method works only with natural fibers which are absorbent. The flameproofing must be renewed after each washing.

Sugar plum fairy wings are easy to make and fit into many

Christmas plays. Cut two wing shapes from lightweight cardboard and two from silver paper. Bend a wire coathanger into a V-shape and snip off the hook. Tape one cardboard wing shape to each side of wire with long strips of masking tape. Then cover this with the silver paper wings.

Outline edge of wings with glue and sprinkle with silver glitter. Wrap exposed wire between wings with wide ribbon. Then pin to back of leotard.

Mr. and Mrs. William Myers are now at home at Gilbertsville Route 1.

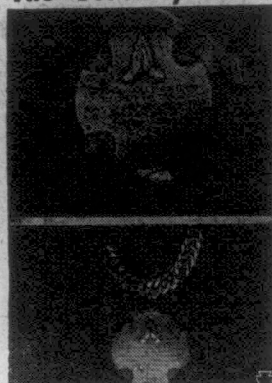

Veterinarians serve the nation by:

- Increasing livestock production efficiency through combatting diseases of farm animals and poultry;
- Controlling diseases of animals which are transmissible to man;
- Safeguarding the health and comfort of pets;
- Assuring wholesome meat and poultry products through inspection at food processing plants;
- Inspecting quality control in processing plants of the dairy industry;
- Safeguarding the food supply of troops in the armed forces while developing defenses against possible attack directed at our livestock and dairy food sources;
- Preventing animal diseases from foreign lands entering and attacking our meat, dairy, and poultry industries;
- Maintaining healthy stock to produce quality pelts for the fur industry;
- Maintaining attractive animals for public enjoyment at zoos, and reducing upkeep and animal replacement costs to zoo operators;
- Improving methods and attitudes for the humane treatment of animals.

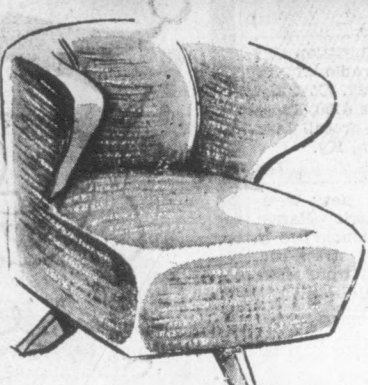

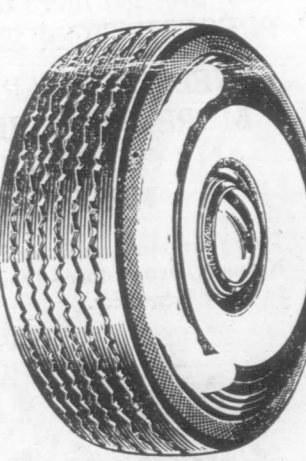
