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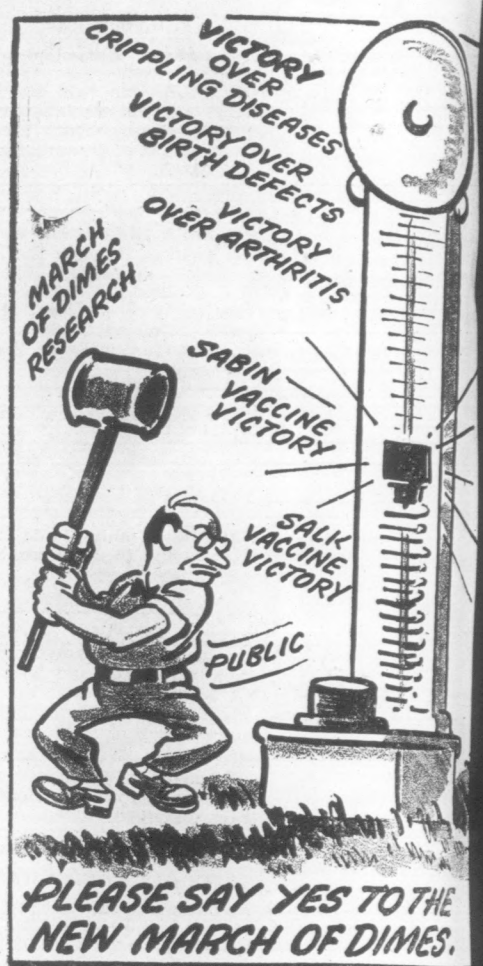

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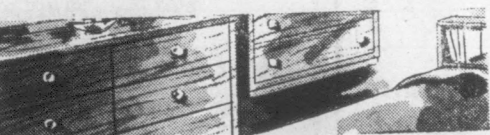

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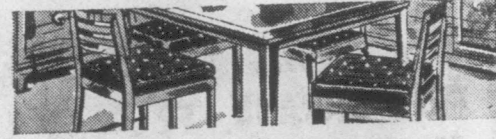

God Down Here

Lesson for January 1, 1961

WHEN a man writes a new book on a well-known subject he should have a good reason for breaking into print. The Gospel of John, which is going to be the object of study in the church and in this column for 14 weeks now, was such a late-coming book. By the time it was written, not only had our three Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke been circulating for some time, but as we learn from Luke, there were others besides these three. Now a new book is justified if it brings out new facts, it is also justified if it brings out a new point of view... provided, of course, that the author can show some solid reasons for his special point of view. John has both reasons. He has stories about Jesus to tell which had never been told—that is, told in a book, before; and he has a viewpoint which does not contradict the first three Gospels yet is strikingly different from theirs.

## The Word Became Flesh

Readers of the other Gospels may surmise that more is here than meets the eye. They read the story of a great man, a teacher, a prophet, one endowed with strange powers. Strangest of all was his power over death. Not only could he wrestle death to a fall when at death visitor came to others, he threw off death's chains when he had been wrapped about his own life. You might say that the first three Gospels give us wonderous but very little explanation. John's Gospel flashes the explanation in the reader's eye with his very first page. Mark gives no background for Jesus at all. Matthew really begins his story of Jesus with Abraham. Luke begins his story with the first man in the world. But John—He goes back before there was a human race, before this world began, before all worlds, back to THE BEGINNING, the beginning of which we hear in the Bible's first line—out of time into Eternity's far shores. And there he finds—not a Carpenter waiting to be born, but one whom he mysteriously calls the Word of God, the Word that "was with God and was God." What explains Jesus? His Jewish race, his family, you might think from reading Matthew. His membership in the human race, you might think from reading Luke. No, these are part of the story but not yet the heart and the height of it. What explains Jesus? "The Word became flesh," John writes. Is there a more important sentence in the Bible? This is God-with-us. This is God on two feet. This is the heavenly Glory walking the streets of earth.

## Stories and Signs

"Flesh is a Bible expression for 'man.' 'The Word became flesh' means, at the least of it, the Divine became human. John does not say that the Word looked like flesh, or the Word dressed up in flesh, but that the word 'became' flesh. He says here 'We have beheld his glory.' Now all religions know something about the glory of God. But what would the glory of God be like if it came to earth as a human being? John's whole gospel is devoted to answering that question. He just proceeds to tell stories about Jesus—just a few, only seven before the story of his death. The amazing thing about those stories is how simple they are. You (if you were inventing the stories) would surely have thought up something spectacular; but these were not made-up stories. When God comes down to earth, he comes all the way down, to where we live.

## That You May Believe

Every book in the Bible was with some purpose in mind, but John's Gospel is one of the few that tell exactly what the writer intended his book to do. "These things are written," he says at the end, "that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in his name." With that short sentence John brings out some of the great truths that become more clear to those who give themselves to study of this book.

### All Aliens Must Report Addresses During January

Thomas M. Pederson, district director of the Cleveland, Ohio, Immigration and Naturalization Service, has again reminded all aliens to report their addresses during January.

Cards with which to make the reports are available at post-offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service throughout the country. The reports must be submitted to one of those offices.

Parents or guardians submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Mr. Pederson urges all aliens to report before the end of January, as wilful failure to do so may lead to serious penalties.

### Economic Activity May Slow Down In 1961, Report Says

LEXINGTON — The UK Co-operative Extension Service's agricultural economics department reports that U. S. economic activity is expected to move upward in 1961.

The report noted that consumer income has continued to increase "despite the slowdown of economic activity in recent months;" and that consumer income likely will gain in 1961.

However, says Wilmer Browning, economist, economic growth as a whole in the U. S. in 1961 probably will be at a slightly lower rate than in 1960.

Browning had this to say about other spheres of activity in 1961:

1—Government expenditures state and federal, probably will increase further in 1961. Such spending will be in the national defense field and state spending for facilities and services.

2—Private investment outlook in 1961 probably will be improved. Residential construction probably will swing upward, for instance, because of improved credit conditions.

3—Industrial production currently is under capacity in some major areas. For this and other reasons new plant and equipment investments probably will decline some in 1961. Inventory declines, however, probably will not be as severe as in the 1957-1958 case.

4—Consumer buying in 1961 probably will be a strengthening factor.

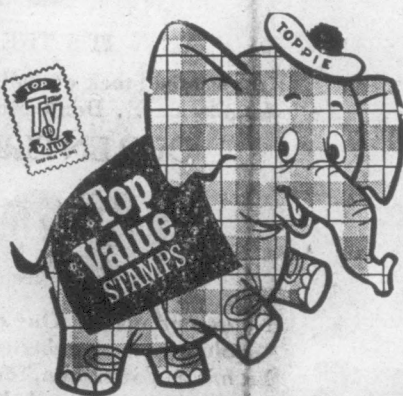
