### Four New Names Added This Week to List of Candidates for County Office

## WHAT IT COSTS

### Expert Says Four Acres of Tobacco in the "Black Patch" Sum up a Total of \$155.

The following figures, showing how much it costs to raise tobacco in the "Black Patch," were compiled by a prominent Tennessee farmer recently, who is conceded to be one of the most expert tobacco raisers in the entire Dark Tobacco District. He says:

"Assuming that one man can cultivate four acres of tobacco and market it under the ordinary system prevailing in the Dark District, and also taking as a basis that four acres of land that will make reasonable tobacco is worth \$25 an acre, you have an investment of \$100 in land to start with. 20 per cent for interest, barn, other buildings and deterioration of land, etc. \$20.00  
Breaking the land ..... 6.00  
Discing twice, three mules and man 2 days ..... 3.00  
Cheeking ..... 3.00  
Fertilizer, 400 pounds ..... 6.00  
Making hills, one man four days ..... 4.00  
Preparing and sowing 100 yards for plants ..... 6.00  
Canvass for bed ..... 4.00  
Drawing and setting plants ..... 6.00  
Planting, etc., five times ..... 12.00  
Hoing one time ..... 4.00  
Topping, paris green, spraying ..... 5.00  
Thirty-two days labor, worming, suckering etc. .... 32.00  
Cutting and housing, 8 days ..... 12.00  
Wood, cutting same, hauling and firing ..... 12.00  
Stripping and ordering, etc. .... 14.00  
Delivering to factory ..... 3.00  
Total ..... \$155.00

Thus it will be seen that nothing is included in this for interest on money invested in mules, harness, implements, breakage and repair of tools, feeding stock, feeding self, lost days from weather conditions, or risk of loss by hail, drought, floods fire, etc.

The average per acre in this district, as per the government report, is 700 pounds, thus he has 2,800 pounds of tobacco. At 51 cents a pound, it nets him \$155, or \$155 less than it costs to produce it. If, perchance, he makes only 500 pounds an acre, as many do, his cost has been more than 74 cents a pound. So the farmer who does not get more than 6 cents for his tobacco is just barely making wages to support himself and family, to say nothing of the many risks he is taking in losing even this by fire, storm or drought."

## SKIPS THE TOWN

### Margaret Brown, Who it is Thought Was Brought to Paducah, Has Disappeared.

Paducah, Ky., March 18. Margaret Brown, who the police and government inspectors here believe was brought to Paducah from Metropolis, Ill., for immoral purposes, probably never will return to Paducah. She left Sunday morning over the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railroad for Murray, Calloway county, which place she said was her home. She told the "white slave" inspector stationed in Paducah that she would return to Paducah the following day, which was Monday. However, Thursday came and has gone and the Brown girl has not put in an appearance.

A Marshall county man who was arrested on a petty larceny charge last week, was suspected of having accompanied the girl to this city, has secured his freedom by the payment of a fine. The government inspectors believe they would have no trouble in locating him, but without the prosecuting witness there would be no case against him.

The brown girl told the white slave officer just before leaving, that she had not been enticed or persuaded to come to Paducah by the suspect, and that she came to Paducah alone.

The girl, who is only 18 years of age, applied to the keeper of a Caldwell street house last Thursday night for admittance and was an inmate of that resort when located by the police.

Every merchant in the county ought to give something as a prize to enliven this permanent method of building up the soil. Any merchant who deals in fertilizer can order either the lime or phosphate rock in either sacks or car lots. Try a small patch of clover if only one fourth of an acre and get a prize and then you will know what you can do.—L. Y. Woodruff.

List of Week's News Stripped of Un-  
necessary Verbiage and Prepared  
for Quick Consumption by  
Busy People.

## Domestic

Princeton university received a be-  
quest valued at nearly \$100,000, un-  
der the will of Peris S. Thompson, a  
member of the class of 1883, who died  
in Paris on February 18.

Believing that Rear Admiral Joseph  
G. Eaton, U. S. A., retired, who died  
at his home, at Norwell, Mass., was  
murdered, the state police began an  
investigation just before his funeral.

The subdistrict inquest convention,  
in annual meeting, donated \$500 to  
Charles S. Daxson, the socialist at-  
torney who has been on trial in Los  
Angeles for bribery. The barrow jury  
disagreed and he will serve a new trial.

Thirteen persons are reported to

Rear Admiral Joseph G. Eaton, U.  
S. N., retired, who as commander of  
the transport Resolute in the Span-  
ish-American war, informed Admiral  
Ransome that the enemy's fleet was  
leaving Santiago Bay, and suddenly  
at his home at Norwell, Mass.

While taking a bath in a large in-  
stallation at her home at Champlain,  
Ill., Miss Julia Hubert, 70 years old,  
was electrocuted.

With the help of a cooperative  
store to sell produce at cost to urban

## Washington

The interstate commerce commis-  
sion charged George D. McGuffey an ac-  
cused to the commission, vice John  
H. Marble, confirmed as a commis-  
sioner.

Secretary of War Garrison an-  
nounced that Gen. Robert Shaw Oil  
refugee secretary of the war, and  
the entire personnel of the war de-  
partment employees would be retained  
indefinitely.

James Wilson, former secretary of  
agriculture, was the guest of honor at  
a "welcome home" reception at Amer-  
ica, President Pearson of Ames, Gov.  
Clarke and state officials were par-  
ticipants in the program, which in-  
cluded an address by Mr. Wilson.

Free lumber, sugar and farm im-  
plements and implements are tariff re-  
vision certainties, according to in-  
formation from members of the house  
ways and means committee.

President Wilson will be asked to  
"O. K." or disapprove the recent re-  
commendations of former President  
Taft for establishment of a national  
budget system, to regulate appropri-  
ations.

Speaker Champ Clark, 67 years  
old, was admitted to practice be-  
fore the United States supreme  
court. He had previously obtained ad-  
mission to the bar of the highest court  
during many years of congressional  
service.

Equal distribution of postoffice pa-  
tronage to all factions of the Demo-  
cratic party was agreed upon in a con-  
ference between William F. McCombs  
and Postmaster General Burleson. Mc-  
Combs conferred with President Wil-  
son, who agreed to the plan.

Postmaster General Burleson an-  
nounced that he is planning to place  
all fourth-class postmasters on a civil  
service basis, and that all second and  
third class postmasters and possibly  
also first-class postmasters will be in  
the classified service before he has  
finished.

Because the tariff framers think  
they cannot be ready April 1, the  
original date set for the extra session  
of congress, President Wilson, it is  
understood, probably will move the  
date up one week.

John K. Newton, an appointed pri-  
vate secretary to Secretary of War  
McAdoo, Newton is a former  
newspaper man of New York  
who has been associated with McAdoo  
in a confidential capacity.

Assistant Secretary of State Hunt-  
ington Wilson will continue in his  
place for an indefinite time. On Fry-  
day, a solicitation, Wilson abandoned  
his projected trip abroad.

The treasury department announced  
the acceptance of \$100,000 from John  
Wanamaker, the Philadelphia mer-  
chant, as an indemnity and in com-  
pensation of civil liability for customs  
irregularities charged against him  
during the years from 1898 to  
1913.

## Foreign

Two companies of the French army  
evacuated from the border, injured in  
a collision between two machines. The  
accident occurred in the  
course of maneuvers by a flotilla of  
five aeroplanes at Rheims.

Constitutionalists withdrew the  
federal session at Nogales, Sonora,  
and now are in possession of the bor-  
der town, after a fight, which cost  
the federal forces the loss of 12 horses  
and 100 men, many wounded on both  
sides.

Degenerate fighting in an attack on  
Paris, Calabrian, entailing a huge  
loss of life in a 24-hour battle, was  
reported in Italian advices reaching  
Rome, Italy.

Germany developing a bad case  
of influenza, fever, cough and symp-  
toms are present and are seen deep-  
ly affecting the international vi-  
sualization and suspense and uncertainty  
felt in the future.

WASHINGTON POLICE DEPART-  
MENT INVESTIGATING CHARGES.

THIRTY WITNESSES HEARD

Witness Declares That They Made Phil-  
pant Remarks and Describes Them  
as "Course" Committee Will  
Resume its Investigation.

Washington, A mass of small defan-  
as to the disorder that interfered with  
the suffrage parade here on March 3  
was given by the senate subcommittee

to the examination of witnesses, who  
occupied the stand but a few minutes  
each.

Several men and women who partici-  
pated in the parade told the committee of  
the trouble and embarrassment caused them  
by the crowd and criticized the conduct  
of the police along the line of march.  
Among them was Miss Mary Mulhall,  
an evangelist, who, in addition to describing  
her experience in the parade, declared  
that she had been roughly handled by a  
Washington police captain while watch-  
ing the parade.

Charges against Capt. Mulhall in con-  
nection with the incident are being in-  
vestigated by the Police Department.  
The committee will resume its investi-  
gation of the affair.

REBELS TAKE AGUA PRIETA  
Gen. Ojeda and 500 Soldiers Evacuate  
City.

Douglas, Ariz. Agua Prieta fell to  
the constitutionalist sympathizers who  
crossed the border from Douglas. Not  
a shot was fired. Gen. Ojeda, command-  
ing the federal garrison, with about  
500 men, evacuated the town, leaving  
200 regular police to guard federal in-  
terests. After the surrender of the border  
town, 600 state troops under Col. Gales  
arrived and a provisional municipal gov-  
ernment was set up. Twenty-four of  
the guards left by Gen. Ojeda deserted  
to the rebel standard and the rest re-  
fused to join the constitutionalists.

While some of the town, Unarmed men  
from Douglas crossed the border and re-  
turned to their homes. The new mu-  
nicipal government is now in operation.

Omaha, Neb. That he sold harvesting  
machinery made by the International  
Harvester Company almost exclusively,  
but bought freely of their competitors  
in other lines, was testified by State  
Senator Joseph Matteas of Iowa, when  
the second week of the defense of the  
International Harvester Company to the  
government suit charging violation of  
the Sherman anti-trust law began.

The International Harvester Company  
at no time, Mr. Matteas said, had at-  
tempted to force him to give up the  
sale of competitors' goods.

Five dealers and two farmers testified  
during the afternoon. These witnesses,  
called by the defense, testified to con-  
ditions of the trade from retailers and  
consumers' standpoint. The defense  
agreed that harvester implements had  
advanced less than other kinds in re-  
cent years.

The dealers testified generally that  
no coercion had been practiced by the  
International Harvester Company, but  
admitted that 95 to 100 per cent of the  
business was done by that company.

During the examination of all these  
witnesses the defense made its point of  
increasing efficiency and lack of co-  
ercion, while government attorneys cross-  
examined witnesses with a view to  
showing practically complete monopoly by  
the defendant in the harvester business.
