Horses Were Burned To Death.

STABLE DESTROYED.

Fire Last Night On the Farm of John Gray, Jr.,—Incendiarism Suspected.

From Friday's daily.

A large combination barn and stable belonging to Mr. John Gray, Jr., the well-known farmer and stock dealer who resides four miles east of the city on the Fairview road, was totally destroyed by fire last night.

About 9:30 o'clock, Mr. Gray's brother was awakened by the odor of smoke and the cracking of timbers. Looking from his bedroom window he saw that the stable was ablaze.

Waking the other members of the household they hurried to the burning building. The flames had made such headway that any effort to save the stable would have been useless.

Forcing open a door in the only side of the structure that the flames had not reached, the men, at the risk of their lives, rescued six horses.

Eight horses, all valuable animals, were incinerated.

Eight tons of hay, ten barrels of corn and a ton of bran were burned up.

Several sets of harness, a number of saddles and some farming implements were destroyed.

The losses aggregate several thousand dollars.

The stock was insured for \$1,000, the horses for \$100 and the building for \$150.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. Incendiarism is suspected.

PIONEER

Citizen Goes To His Final
Reward.

MR. LARKIN HARNED

An Honored Man Dies At
A Ripe Old Age—A
Picturesque Character.

From Friday's daily.

Mr. Larkin Harned, a pioneer citizen
and one of the most widely known men
in this county, died last night at his
home five miles east of the city on the
Russellville road, of his incident to ex-
treme age. His health had been rapidly
failing for several months, and the end
was expected.

The deceased was eighty-nine years
of age. Two daughters and a son sur-
vive him. The funeral services, which
will be held at the late residence at 6 o'clock
this afternoon and the burial will be at
the family grave yard.

Mr. Harned was a picturesque charac-
ter. In his youth and early manhood

he was noted for his great physical
strength and marvelous athletic feats.
A man of great courage and strong con-
victions, he was quick to resent an af-
front, and ever ready to maintain
his views. Withal he was a kind
and generous man. Blended with a com-
mon sense, he was ever glad to share the
hospitality of his home with stranger
or friend, and his charity was broad
and unostentatious.

During the war between the States
Mr. Harned was an ardent Southern man.
He was in the service of the Con-
federate government in the capacity of
a spy, and made many trips through the
Federal lines. He frequently carried let-
ters and messages to the war worn boys
in gray, by whom he was remembered
with affection long after "grim vis-
aged" war had smoothed his wrinkled
front.

Mr. Harned was one of the few mem-
bers of the Primitive Baptist church in
this county, and the scattered adher-
ents of this faith often met
around his fire in worship.

He will be sorely missed in his com-
munity, where, as a neighbor and friend,
his charity was prompt and his counsel
wise.

SMALL POX NOTICE.

For the purpose of preventing a fur-
ther spread of small pox in Christian
county, Ky., the authorities hereby call
all persons' attention to the following

laws of this Commonwealth, which will
be strictly enforced by the courts.

1st. Any person who having reason
at the time to believe himself infected
with the disease of small pox, shall vol-
untarily go upon any public highway or
street, or to any place at which people
are accustomed to collect by assembly, or
who shall enter or go on board any
steamboat, railroad car or other public
conveyance, and all persons who shall
knowingly aid or assist any one thus to
travel, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor,
and upon conviction, shall BE FINED,
NOT LESS THAN \$100.00 NOR MORE
THAN \$1,000.00.

2d. If any person who has never
had small pox, shall go into a house
where small pox is, or associate with a
person who is afflicted therewith, may
be conveyed to some house or place in
the county where the disease will not
spread, there to remain until he shall
have gone through the disease or until
a physician shall certify that he will not
take the same.

3d. All adults must be vaccinated
at once, if not already successfully va-
cinated, and all parents and other per-
sons having charge of any child or child-
ren must have said children vaccinated
if not already successfully done.

See Kentucky Statutes Sections 4608
and 4609.

4th. Any person who refuses to be
vaccinated upon demand of Board of
Health, shall BE FINED NOT LESS
THAN \$10.00 NOR MORE THAN
\$100.00.

ROBERT G. INGERSOLL, THE

GREAT AMERICAN LAWYER AND

NOTED AGNOSTIC, DIED SUDDEN-
LY THIS AFTERNOON AT HIS

HOME AT DOBBS FERRY.

APOPLECTIC CAUSED HIS DEATH.

Robert Green Ingersoll was born in
Greenwich, Yates county, New York,
August 11, 1833.

He began the practice of law in
Hawthorne, Illinois, but in 1857 re-
moved to Peoria.

In 1859 he became Colonel of the
Seventh Illinois Cavalry. In 1866 he
was appointed Attorney-General for
Illinois, and in 1877 he refused the post
of Minister to Germany.

He first attracted notice by his eulogy
of James G. Birney, in the National
Republican Convention in Cincinnati in
1856, and also by his Decoration-Day
oration in New York in 1862.

But he was known principally on ac-
count of his lectures and books, which
ridiculed the Bible and the Christian re-
ligion.

He wrote "The Gods, and Other Lec-
tures" (1879); "Some Mistakes of
History" (1879); "What Shall I Do to-
morrow?" "Prose Poems" and other
works.

He took up his residence in New
York in 1889.
