## 40,000 DOLLARS

### Young Calloway County Man, Who Made a Snug Fortune in Five Years.

Mr. Charles H. Wells, of Paducah, Ky., the young man who has been keeping his money locked up in his safe and transacting his business on the secret plan, at Marion and Carbondale, Illinois the past five years, has now opened his business on Oct. 10th, showing him to be worth over \$43,000 in real estate, notes, mortgages, bank stock and cash.

He possesses money and property in different states as follows:

Illinois 80 acres near Anna, for which he paid \$2,800. City lots at Carbondale, \$1,600.

Kentucky 40 acres near Gilbertsville, for which he paid \$1,200.

Tennessee 40 acres near Lexington, for which he paid \$1,500. House and lot, also one-half interest in drugstore, at Huntingdon, which cost \$4,000.

Arkansas 200 acres near Indian, cost \$2,500. 80 acres, near Jonesboro, cost \$1,600.

Texas 400 acres near Texas, which cost \$3,500.

Bank stock, 45 shares, cost \$6,000. Notes and mortgages worth \$4,500. One saw mill valued at \$1,000.

Cash money on deposit in all the states previously enumerated, and elsewhere, \$15,400.

Charlie, as he is familiarly known in this section, has bought and sold property the past five years in all of the above mentioned localities. However, Attorney R. L. Smith, of Illinois, Robt. L. Ray, of Memphis, and W. S. White, of Jonesboro, Ark., have assisted Mr. Wells in his business for the past four years, as cashier and president when needed.

During all these years Mr. Wells has transacted this gigantic business, has bought and sold property, deposited money and transacted his business under a different name instead of his own. This has been done until Charlie could educate himself and learn of the people in Western Kentucky, so that they could not beat or cheat him out of his money and property.

Mr. Wells is a young man, 31 years of age, and is a son of Columbus Wells, of near Murray, Ky. He also has numerous other relatives in Calloway, Graves and Fulton counties. Mr. Wells left his native county of Calloway, eight years ago. He first resided at Fulton one year, at Mayfield two and the remainder of his time he has made Paducah his home and is residing there at present.

Wells has knocked about with very common clothes on all this time and has worked, made and saved every dime and dollar he could get in every place. He has also left off sporting around, style and other things along the line, devoting his energies exclusively to business with the results afore mentioned.

Mr. Wells has traveled over a goodly portion of Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri, Arkansas and some portions of Texas in the past six years. He has followed different kinds of employment and business until he possessed good judgment about any and all kinds of work or business.

After Charlie made his discovery of the pot of gold, in Ballard county a few years ago, he tried to buy property in Mayfield and Fulton, Ky., but soon found out he could not make anything, as everyone thought that

Wells was a young man, who had no business qualifications, and they would ask him double the value for their property, thereby beating him out of his money at once. There be a few however, who have found differently, and those who have not, will in the course of time.

Mr. Wells thinks he is now up on his business enough to hold what he has made in Western Kentucky, or any where else, on the wide open plan after January 1, 1914.

### Reduce Tobacco Insurance.

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 10.—Drastic reductions were made today by the state insurance board in the fire insurance rates on the buildings used for the tobacco industry. The new schedule will become effective December 1.

The basis rates were reduced as follows: Storage houses and loose leaf warehouses from \$1.00 to 75 cents; prizing and rehandling houses and stemmeries from \$1.75 to \$1.50; drying houses from \$2.00 to \$1.75.

For frame constructed buildings there will be added forty cents instead of fifty cents and on ironclad constructed houses over wood skeletons will be added 15 cents instead of twenty-five cents.

## TAMMANY AND MURPHY DEFEATED

JOHN PURROY MITCHEL MAYOR OF NEW YORK, BY 100,000.

### SULZER TO THE LEGISLATURE

McCabe and Entire Ticket in New York County (Manhattan Island) Beaten. Fusionists Win in Kings County (Brooklyn) and the Bronx.

New York. Tammany Hall was completely snowed under in the city election, fusion carrying all before it.

John Purroy Mitchel was elected Mayor by a plurality in excess of 100,000, and which may reach 125,000. When all the votes are counted, Edward F. McCabe, the Tammany opponent, early gave up the fight, sent a telegram of congratulation to Mr. Mitchel and went to bed.

Fusion elected William A. Prendergast comptroller by nearly a vote of 250,000. It carried George McAneny into the presidency of the board of aldermen by about 50,000.

The election of these three men over their Tammany opponents gave the fusionists 9 votes out of the 16 in the board of aldermen, which controls the purse strings of the municipality.

In addition, fusion candidates were chosen to the borough presidencies of Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx, adding 5 to the total and giving fusion 14 votes to Tammany's 2.

Tammany's only salvage from the rout consisted of the borough presidencies of Queens and Richmond, minor officials in these boroughs and a few scattering assemblymen.

The entire Tammany ticket in New York county (Manhattan Island) was beaten. The fusionists captured the county offices in Kings county (Brooklyn) and the Bronx.

The board of aldermen of the greater city will be controlled by fusion voters by a majority, as yet only estimated at 15.

### GLYNN IS NOT AFTER OFFICE

New York's Governor Will Not Seek Re-election.

New York. Martin Glynn, governor of New York, issued a statement here, saying that under no circumstances would he be a candidate for re-election. He assumed the governor's chair after William Sulzer's impeachment.

Washington. An announcement was made at the White House that Miss Margaret Wilson, eldest daughter of the president, would be maid of honor at the wedding of her sister, Miss Jessie Woodrow Wilson, to Francis H. Sayre on Nov. 25, at the White House.

Roland B. Moliniaux Marries. New York. Roland B. Moliniaux, twice tried 12 years ago for the murder of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams and acquitted, and Miss Margaret Connel of New York, were married here.

Concord, N. H. The final brief for Harry K. Thaw in connection with his efforts to resist extradition from New Hampshire to New York was filed with Gov. Fisher.

### Lincoln's Sister-in-Law Votes

Engene, Ill. Mrs. Sarah Todd, aged 103, a sister-in-law of Abraham Lincoln, voted for the first time in the election here.

## RUMOR IS HUERTA IS WAITING ON HUERTA'S REPLY

REPORT FROM APPARENTLY RELIABLE SOURCES. LAST COMMUNICATION HAS NOT BEEN DIVULGED.

### CONFIRMATION IS LACKING A CRUISER TO VERA CRUZ

Moheno, Minister of Foreign Relations, Refuses to Discuss Cabinet Meeting Beyond Saying Mexican Financial Situation Discussed.

Mexico City. From sources apparently the most reliable it was learned that the cabinet at a meeting, decided Gen. Huerta to resign, the way to be paved by the new Congress declaring the recent elections void on account of a lack of sufficient votes.

The minister of foreign relations, Mr. Moheno, refused to discuss the cabinet meeting beyond saying the financial situation of the country was discussed. He supports certain that Mexico's case. At date is not in accord with several other cabinet members, and cabinet changes may result from this.

Mexico City. Huerta has decided to resign and turn the government over to Provisional President Huerta—this was the attitude of official Washington in the Mexican situation.

This statement was made by Emilio Rabasa, who was appointed minister to Washington by Huerta, but who has had no opportunity to occupy the post because of the non-recognition of the Huerta government by the United States.

The government is picking up all the men for the army and workingmen have to show passes proving they are employed, otherwise they are forced into the ranks. At least a thousand a day are being discharged from the army.

Many wealthy Mexican families are hastening out of the country and the exodus of Americans and other foreigners continues.

The scout-earlier Chester, at the Philadelphia Navy Yard was ordered to prepare to sail for Vera Cruz immediately. The Chester is not a heavy fighting ship, but swift and valuable for dispatch and scout duty. Of lighter draft than the big warships now at Vera Cruz, she will be able to join the smaller craft.

The Chester has the highest power wireless apparatus of any ship in the navy. With the apparatus Washington and Vera Cruz will be in direct touch constantly by medium of the great wireless towers at Arlington. The unofficial view is that the Chester is being sent to Vera Cruz principally as a means of instant and official communication.

### FATHER APPENDICITIS DIES

Stockbridge, Mass. Dr. Charles McBurney, eminent New York surgeon, died suddenly of heart disease at the home of his sister in Brookline, Mass. He was 68 years old.

When President McKinley was shot in 1901 Dr. McBurney was called from Stockbridge and took charge of the case on his arrival in Buffalo.

New York. Dr. McBurney had acquired a considerable reputation as a surgeon when in 1889 he published an essay on "Experience With Operative Interference in Cases of Disease of the Vermiform Appendix." The essay brought him recognition from the whole world and for many years his colleagues have called him the "father of appendicitis."

## PINDELL NOT TO BE AN AMBASSADOR

ILLINOIS EDITOR'S NAME WILL BE WITHHELD.

### SENATORIAL PROBE IS LIKELY

No Story of the Administration Created Such a Sensation as That Following Disclosure of Conditional Appointment of Peoria.

Washington. President Wilson made the definite statement that he would send to the senate the nomination of Henry M. Pindell of Peoria, Ill., to be ambassador to Russia.

It was learned through an official of the White House that the president probably will not send an Illinois senator to the senate the nomination of the conditional appointment that was to be made. Mr. Pindell agreeing to resign after he had served a year.

If, however, the president should send in the name at some future date, or

even if an indignant public opinion aroused by these disclosures compels him to repudiate the bargain entirely, there is every probability that a senatorial investigation will be ordered. There are a number of senators who want to know whether there is the traffic in public office under this administration that is suggested by the terms of the letter of Senator Lewis to Mr. Pindell relative to this appointment. The only way can be disclosed is through an investigation. Secretary Bryan would be the chief witness.

Should Mr. Pindell ever be appointed, senators say he would not be confirmed unless every statement in the letter from Senator Lewis was disproved. As Senator Lewis admits the letter is authentic, it would be very difficult to disprove it. Mr. Pindell, therefore, never will go as ambassador to Russia.

The appointment of Pindell was to be made solely because he was an original Wilson man and "must be taken care of," as Senator Lewis wrote to him in his confidential letter. It was to be an appointment to office with an agreed upon resignation in advance at the end of one year's service. During his term Mr. Pindell was to have no troublesome questions to negotiate. The administration, he was told, "would look out for that."

No story since the advent of this administration has created the sensation that followed these startling disclosures regarding the conditional appointment of Mr. Pindell, through the influence of Senator Lewis, backed by the secretary of state, and supposedly with full knowledge of all the facts on the part of President Wilson.

Chicago. The worst storm of the season swept down from the north, striking the Middle West and South and prevails over an extensive territory, extending to the Atlantic seaboard. The blizzard extends as far south as Tennessee.

The case is referred to as "the most tragic occurrence in Jewish life for many years."

## RAN INTO A BIG SCHOOL OF SHARKS

In 1908, when he captained the colon, he brought the ship and her 200 passengers safely through a terrific tropical storm, simply by sailing into the geographical center of the storm. ## Bumper Corn Crop.

Washington, Nov. 10.—This year's corn crop promises to be the most valuable this or any other nation ever has produced, although the department of agriculture's preliminary estimate of production, issued today, indicates that it will be more than half a billion bushels less in size than the record crop of last year and the smallest since 1902. Based on the department's figures of 70.7 cents per bushel the average farm value on Nov. 1, the crop, as now estimated, is worth \$1,741,353,019, while the value of the 1912 record crop was \$1,529,454,000. The previous most valuable crop was that of 1909 when it was worth \$1,652,822,000.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 10.—From reports received here indications are that the crop of turkeys in Central Kentucky, which ships large quantities of these fowls to Eastern markets will be larger than that of last year. The market opens here and in all the Central Kentucky towns this week for the Thanksgiving supply and already buyers are active offering from twelve to fifteen cents a pound on foot. It is estimated that the crop this year will be approximately 100,000 birds, which means nearly a quarter of a million dollars in cash to the Kentucky housewives.

Mr. Kirk was carrying the child when the horse ran into him throwing him to the ground and the child's head came in contact with the edge of a concrete walk, inflicting a dangerous scalp wound. Her condition is much improved at this time.

## HELPS FOR FARMER'S WIFE

Little Expedients by Which Work Around the House Can Be Made Easy.

New tin should be set over the fire, with boiling water in them, for several hours, before food is put into them.

Mix stove polish with turpentine. This, they say, will prevent rust, and the polish is blacker, more glossy and durable than if mixed with any other liquid. The odor soon passes off.

Clothes should never be shut up in a closet or wardrobe directly after they have been worn. Let clothing be hung over a chair for a half hour or such a matter before it is put away. Clothes can be kept fresh and odorless if treated in the above manner.

To make soap jelly always use a white soap that contains no rosin. Cut it finely and pour upon it boiling water and set on the back of the stove until all the soap is well dissolved. It should be freshly made just before washing day. A good proportion is a quart of a pound of soap to one quart of water.

Old pieces of velvet make excellent polishing cloth and can be used instead of chamois skin. When soiled wash in soapy water and dry without rinsing.

## HANDY TOOLS IN THE HOME

Simple Implements That Will Be Found Useful in Great Variety of Ways.

A tack in time is sometimes as necessary as the proverbial stitch.

Tools are necessary to make the small repairs about the house, and a box of them should be ever ready at the housekeeper's hand.

A hammer, gimlet, small hand saw, screw driver, and pliers are usually sufficient.

Other tools may be added as required.

Tacks, nails and screws of assorted sizes should have a place in the box.

Sandpaper, a tube of furniture glue and a can of oil will also be needed.

A large pair of shears will be found useful in many cases.

With these tools at hand a woman may attempt some simple upholstering.

Chairs and sofas that have become shabby may be recovered with fresh cretonne.

With a little practice satisfactory work may be accomplished.

Pretty materials for upholstering may be purchased for a small sum.

## Boiled Rice, Southern Method.

Boil a cupful of well-washed rice and mix it with double the quantity of cold water; add salt to taste and let the rice boil fast for twenty minutes, when the liquid will have disappeared. Then set the vessel, tightly covered, on the back of the stove for the rice to "soak" or finish the cooking with the steam. Care must be taken to protect the pot from too much heat, as rice cooked in this dry manner will soon burn. Together with the first boiling, it takes about 40 minutes, or an hour, to cook rice in this way. It must never be stirred, as this makes a soggy mess; but many good cooks often turn the edges up with a fork, so that the steam can get to the rice. A proper accompaniment, but it goes splendidly with curried chicken.

## Molded Rice With Dates.

Grind one pint of dates and cook them for ten minutes in a slup made with one cupful of sugar. Add a teaspoonful of vanilla and two tablespoonfuls sherry, cover and set aside until cold. In the meantime wash thoroughly a cupful of rice; drain and drop in a bowl of boiling salted water and boil hard for five minutes. Drain and turn the rice into a double boiler, add a pint of milk, cover and cook until tender and dry, adding more milk if necessary. When done add a tablespoonful of vanilla and one tablespoonful of sugar and pack the rice in a mold. When cold turn it out on a platter, taste well with the syrup and arrange the dates over and around it. Serve plain or with cream.

## For the Tea Table.

Oriental sweetmeats are very popular for afternoon tea tables. Among the first favorites are candied Chinese oranges, dates, plums and other stone fruit crystallized by foreign process and stuffed with nut mixtures. Turkish paste and East India articles of all kinds must be used. Ginger bonbons are easily made at home by taking oblong pieces of preserved ginger and inserting these in the heart of five large dates, which have been stoned. Draw the date together and roll in powdered sugar.

## Calla Lilies.

Two eggs, one cup sugar, six tablespoonfuls milk, two tablespoonfuls cream tartar, one soda, pinch salt, one teaspoonful flavoring. Beat well. Bake in a quick oven in covers or coffee cans or any small round dishes. When done, take from tins, fold white hot using toothpick to keep in place. Fill with whipped cream when ready to serve.

## A Salmon Delicacy.

One can salmon, three eggs beaten lightly, two tablespoonfuls melted butter, one-half cup fried bread crumbs, one tablespoonful cornstarch. Chop fish fine, heat in bowl with silver spoon, add pepper and salt to taste. Put in buttered mold and steam one and one-half hours.
