THE YULE LOG

Widow of Famous Confederate General Tells Beautiful Story of its Origin.

The origin of the Yule log in Virginia is told in Pictorial Review for December by the widow of the famous Confederate general George E. Pickett.

One time an old black man was sitting in his little cabin on the mountainside on Christmas Eve listening to the cold wind howl over a world of snow and wishing that he had a fire to warm him, when he heard the cry of a little child away out in the cold. The old man hobbled to the door and looked out across the snow and the wind came rushing in and made him shiver so that his "loneliest two teeth" chattered with cold. Again the cry came across the snow and he wished with all his power of longing that he could go out and find the unfortunate little one; for the plaintive cry of a little child always goes straight to the heart. A third time the cry came and a miraculous power seemed to fill the old man's veins. His muscles became tense and strong and he stepped from the threshold into the snow, the crunch falling back into the cabin.

In an instant he was walking over the expanse of frozen snow with an activity his old not possessed since he used to "go ter camp meetin'." By and by he came to a little child caught in a snow bank. He lifted the child and as its little form touched him a new strength came into him and the small burden seemed to give him wings to speed back to the little cabin. He put the child on the bed, drew the ragged quilt around it and looked about to see if there might be a piece of furniture of which he could make a fire to warm his small guest.

At that instant he saw a great log roll across the threshold and into the fireplace. The little child was looking at it with eyes like stars and they sent gleams of light that kindled the log with the most brilliant fire the old man had ever seen, and the dingy little room was filled with radiance and warmth that brought a glow to the soul as well as to the body and seemed to flood the world with light.

As the light wrapped the child in a shining glory he laughed a laugh that was like a song of the heart and floated up and away. The old man turned his eyes to where the fire burned and watched the flames leap in and out of the log over the forming the shape of a cross in fire.

At this point in the narrative "Brer Sam" usually became greatly excited and his eyes glistened as he went on in his rich dialect.

"Dar flames en der cross spread en chase after one er nudder, a crawlin' on a creepin' in en out en around en abou', a skadlin' hyer en a skadlin' dar a lippin' up higher and higher; firs' a fl blue blaze would come, den a yaller one, den a bright red one would flare up, en den a blaze would fl-mingulate dar se's tergeter—red en blue en yaller en white would all mix up wid de kindleation colors en de rainbow en crackle en crackle an lip higher en bigger en bigger, den a crackle en bigger en bigger en louder, en de blaze attien bigger en bigger."

As the old man watched all this display suddenly and magically appeared a table covered with a Christmas feast such as

had never been spread before his eyes. And never again was he hungry or cold and never was there a Christmas in old Virginia after that without the Yule log and the Christmas Child to give it light and warmth.

That is the story of the Yule log as it is told in Virginia and as we told it that Christmas Eve of '63. When the recital had ended the hands of the clock had traveled past the midnight hour and our party speedily broke up, its members going to their separate quarters to rest and to dream of other Christmases when the phantom of our annular war had not dimmed the glory of the celebration.

READY CASH

State Treasurer Rhea to Prevent Discount of the Old Soldiers' Pension Claims.

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 21.—Confederate pensioners will hereafter get cash for their warrants. The following statement was issued from the treasury department today in regard to the November pensions aggregating \$148,953.34.

To prevent the Confederate soldiers of Kentucky from falling into the hands of the claim shavers with their pension warrants, which are now due to be sent out and without any money in the State Treasury with which to pay them, State Treasurer Tom Rhea has, after considerable effort completed arrangements with a Louisville financial institution to take up every one of the interest-bearing warrants, totaling \$148,953.34 at their face value.

The warrants to be thus cared for are those due Nov. 5, last, and more than 1,000 old soldiers will be benefited by what the State Treasurer has accomplished in the face of many difficulties. For months past holders of State Treasury warrants have had to discount them from 1 to 3 per cent to get the cash on them notwithstanding the fact that they bear 5 per cent interest from the date and are non-taxable. Only this week the board of one of the public institutions was unable to secure in Louisville or elsewhere in the state money on warrants even with such a discount.

Secures Ready Money.

Mr. Rhea was prompted in his endeavors to secure the ready money for the old soldiers by the information which came to him several months ago, following the first distribution of pension money by the state. At that time the old soldiers who were needy, found themselves forced to discount their warrants to local claim shavers in their communities, in some instances at a rate of fifteen dollars on the \$100 claim. He immediately set to work to prevent such condition when the November warrants should be issued.

When pension day, Nov. 5, rolled around, he had not perfected his plans for handling the warrants, which are the largest yet issued under the Confederate pension act. He directed that the interest-bearing warrants be held up several days, and renewed his endeavors to get the money to pay them. This he accomplished today, and the warrant will be mailed out to the old soldiers from the Treasurer's office on Monday next.

Treasurer Rhea was not ready today to announce the institution to which the soldiers are to send the warrants for payment, but each warrant will be accompanied by a letter advising the recipient just what steps to take to secure the face value of his warrant. He will be enabled to deposit in his bank for collection at its face value without discount of any kind whatever.

Former Trigg Citizen Dead.

Mr. John W. Russell, a former honored citizen of this county, died at the home of his son, Rev. Ira Russell, of Jonesboro, Ark., on the 17th of November. His death was caused by paralysis, which he had suffered two strokes during the past few years, and other intimacies due to old age. Mr. Russell was born in Trigg county and was eighty-three

years of age the 17th day of last March. He had spent most of his life here and for many years had lived on the pike at the top of the hill a mile west of Cadiz. About six years ago he left Cadiz, and most of that time he had spent with his youngest son in Arkansas.

Early in life Mr. Russell was married to Miss Lucy Wallis, and to this union ten children were born, five of whom are now living as follows: William Russell and William Phillips, of this city; J. T. Russell and Mrs. James Wallis, of Graves county, and Rev. Ira Russell of Jonesboro. He is also survived by four brothers, as follows: Scott and Reese Russell, of Mayfield; Bob Russell, of Paducah, and Charlie Russell, of Missouri. One sister, Mrs. Belle Nourse, who resides at Columbus, Ky., also survives. Mr. Russell had long been a Methodist and a Mason, and still has a large number of friends, living in Trigg county who will much regret to learn of his death.

The burial took place at Jonesboro the day after his death. Cadiz Record.

Mr. Russell was an uncle of Judge Thos. W. Patterson of this city.

Liquor Laws Hard Hit.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 25.—Chancellor Allison held an unconstitutional the provisions of the recently enacted Tennessee liquor shipping law which limited interstate shipment for personal or family use to one gallon and required the carrier to give information of the consignment to the county clerk.

Judge Allison held that citizens of Tennessee may order intoxicating liquors from without the state for personal use without limit.

ON TRIAL

Would-be Bank Robber Before Court and Hundreds Are Attending the Trial.

Dover, Tenn., Nov.—Few larger crowds have witnessed trials in the Stewart county courthouse than the one which attended the trial today of the case of Con Barnes, charged with the holding up of the Cumberland City bank on June 13 this year and shooting Cashier Pickard in an attempt to loot that institution.

Barnes was brought in the court room at 9 o'clock this morning heavily shackled, and not once during the trial were the handcuffs removed from his wrists. Unshaven and dirty he looked the part of a bandit of the palmy days of the stage coach.

Barnes entered a plea of not guilty on the grounds of insanity.

The testimony brought out the fact that on June 13 Barnes walked into the Cumberland City bank armed with a 38 caliber Winchester rifle and a 32 caliber Colt's automatic pistol and 300 rounds of cartridges, ordered Cashier Pickard to give the money to him, and that upon Mr. Pickard's refusal to do so he opened fire with his pistol and shot Pickard through his right arm and body.

Becoming alarmed by the shots, Barnes fled and had gone only a short distance when he discovered that he had left his pistol in the bank, whereupon he coolly walked back and picked up the gun and walked out again. He was captured in a short time by a posse of Cumberland City citizens.

Talk of mob law was rife for a short time, Mr. Pickard being very popular in that place, but Barnes was hurried to jail here and had awaited trial since that time.

Texas "Turkey Trot"

Cuero, Texas, Nov. 19.—Gov. O. B. Colquitt of Texas headed the annual "turkey trot" parade here today participated in by 5,000 live turkeys which stalked through the streets in droves of a few hundred each behind trained leaders.

One giant bronze turkey gobbler drew a baby carriage with a small child passenger, never seeming to mind the load. Allegorical and industrial floats also appeared in the parade.

Ab McClain Acquitted.

Mayfield, Ky., Nov. 24.—Ab McClain was set free when the jury returned a verdict declaring him not guilty of the charge of murder. He shot Ed Workman four times, resulting in almost instant death, at Bozelle Bennett's "shack" in the southern part of the county in July, 1911. A former trial resulted in a hung jury. The jury deliberated on the case for 20 hours before reaching a verdict.

Last War With Mexico.

War against Mexico was formally declared by the United States May 13, 1846, the House voting 174 to 17; the Senate 40 to 2. Ten days later Mexico formally declared war against the United States. The whole number of Americans engaged in the war—regulars and volunteers—was 101,282. One thousand and forty-nine were killed and 2,429 died of wounds, and 2,429 were wounded. Before the formal declaration of war, there were several conflicts, the most

notable Rensselaire de la Palmar, May 9. The battle of Monterey was fought September 21-23, Gen. Taylor commanding 6,000 men against an army of 10,000 Mexicans. February 22 and 23, 1847, Taylor fought the battle of Buena Vista, with 4,700 men, defeating Santa Anna with 17,000 men. March 25-29 Scott captured Vera Cruz, commanding an army of 12,000. April 17 he fought the battle of Cerro Gordo with 8,500 troops against Santa Anna and 12,000 troops. Worth, August 20, fought the battle of Churubusco with 8,000 men against Santa Anna with 25,000 men, defeating the Mexican General. September 8, Gen. Worth fought the battle of El Molino del Rey, with 3,500 men, beating Santa Anna with 14,000 men. September 13, Gen. Scott at Chapultepec, with 7,200 men beat Santa Anna with 25,000 men, and on September 14, he captured the city of Mexico. The treaty of peace was signed February 2, 1848. The Mexicans are good soldiers and brave men but misgovernment demoralizes a whole nation and develops a lack of soldiers and commanders as well as a lack of statesmen. Said Marlborough to some captured French soldiers: "If your master had many like you I could not defeat him." The response came from one of the soldiers: "What our master needs is not more soldiers like us, but more Generals like you."

HUERTA DETERMINED NOT TO RESIGN

MEXICAN CONGRESS MEETS, BUT NO QUORUM.

ARE SPARRING FOR TIME

The High-Handed Parliamentary Practice in Mexico Causes Considerable Speculation—Huerta Said to Be Tempering.

Mexico City.—The bulk of evidence at hand continues to indicate that Victoriano Huerta is unalterably determined not to accede to the demands of the United States government for his resignation as president of Mexico, but there is some basis for the belief that he may at last give in, but in such a manner as to leave the impression that he acted of his own free will, defying Washington to the last.

The high-handed parliamentary practice in the chamber of deputies gave rise to considerable speculation. The roll of members was called and it was quite evident that the number necessary for a quorum was present, but, Col. Victoriano Corral, presiding in the absence of Huerta, the speaker, who was said to be ill, looked the deputies straight in the eye and declared there was no quorum.

It was suggested that this action might be a part of a plan to bring about the death of congress and thus split Huerta with the Washington government, which, through John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative, had insisted that this new legislative body should not come into existence.

Under the law should there be no quorum three times in succession the house would be automatically dissolved. One prominent Mexican, speculating upon the motive for adjournment, suggested that it was merely a time-saving device, adding "Time for Huerta is fine-spun gold." It became known that Manuel Garza Aldape, prior to his expulsion from the cabinet, submitted for the consideration of the United States a proposition signed by President Huerta that congress should meet merely for the transaction of three or four measures, namely, ratification of the decree of October 11, dissolving congress; declaring the elections of president and vice-president null, calling for new elections; and, because there might arise the question as to the legality of the new chamber and senate, calling an election for deputies and senators as well.

It was understood that after these measures had been voted upon the new congress would adjourn and the nation again would await the results of elections. For this reason it is not believed that the no quorum rule will be carried out indefinitely and that it was used merely as a matter of sparring for time.

TELEPHONES 4,000 MILES

Wireless Message From Germany Received in New Jersey.

Berlin.—The transmission of nearly 4,000 miles of a wireless telephone communication from Neustadt-am-Rueben, Hesse, Hanover, to New Jersey, was accomplished on October 27 by a German wireless company, according to a report submitted by Admiral George Augustus Emsmann to the German Shipbuilding Society. The message was sent and received in the middle of the afternoon, a time considered unfavorable for wireless communication. The two stations are over 300 feet high. Earlier attempts had proved that clearly emitted tones were audible, and finally a spoken message was transmitted and distinctly received.

TOLL RATES FOR THE CANAL

President Prescribes Method of Assessing Tolls on Ships.

Washington.—Rules prescribing the method of measurement for the basis of assessing tolls on ships in the Panama canal, were issued by a proclamation signed by President Wilson. They clearly define the cargo capacity of various types of shipping and in general are framed on the same lines as rules of the Suez canal. In some respects they are more stringent than the Suez rules, but in others are more liberal. The rules do not affect the \$125 toll rate previously prescribed in a presidential proclamation.

Prosecutor Arrests Thief.

Holidayburg, Pa.—Whitey, District Attorney William D. Patterson of Blair county, was today shaved in a barber shop here, he saw by the reflection in the mirror, a "chief" rifling the cash register. Patterson pounced upon the man and apprehended him.

After Cold Storage.

Washington.—Attorney General McReynolds is considering an investigation of an alleged cold storage combination which he believes may be responsible for the high price of eggs and poultry.

Minnesota Bankers Guilty.

Fergus Falls, Minn.—Al J. Kohn, a banker of Oregon, Minn., and J. R. Pappas, were convicted of conspiracy in attempting to induce government officials to issue fraudulent patents to Indian lands. They will be sentenced.

No Passes for Legislators.

Chicago.—A joker in the public utility bill passed by the last state legislature will deprive Illinois legislators of their railroad pass privileges in that state on and after Jan. 1.

EXPLOSION KILLS 16

NINE OF DEAD RECOVERED AT ACTON, ALABAMA—FORTY MINERS ENTOMBED.

Acton, Ala.—Sixteen miners are known to have been killed and at least a dozen others were still missing, as the result of an explosion in the Alabama Fuel and Iron Company's mine No. 2, near here, six were rescued alive. The rescuers found seven dead when they reached the sixth entry.

Estimates of miners employed near the scene of the disaster place the total number who entered the mine at 40. The names of the dead brought to the surface included: L. L. PATTERSON, E. BRIDGE, JOHN KANSTON, HENRY CHILDELS, BURNS KITTRELL, boss driver, WILL CLEVELAND, JOHN PORTON, TWO NEGROES.

All except Bright were married. Kittrell went into the mine fully five minutes before the explosion to do some cleaning. Three of the rescued are Greeks and a number of dead in the mine are thought to be Greeks.

Twenty-three miners reported for work and it is not known at this time just how many other workmen entered. The explosion's force is shown by the fact that two men standing on the surface near the opening were blown several feet in the air, but neither was seriously hurt.

The explosion is believed to have been the result of ignition of a mass of collected dust, set off by a mine's shot. The mine was comparatively new, and was said by officials to have been provided with modern equipment throughout.

The mine employed both white and negro labor and the bodies taken out represent both races. Some parties who first entered the mine in search of those who might be alive reported on their return that they had found a number of dead bodies along the slope.

PINCHOT VICTORIOUS AT LAST

Proponents of Federal Control of Water Power Wins.

Washington.—Proponents of federal control of water power rights, led by Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester, Henry L. Stimson, former secretary of war, and Walter L. Reuther and James H. Easton, former secretaries of the interior, won a victory in the National Conservation Congress held in the first test of strength on the paramount issue of the assembly. By a vote of 433 to 174 a motion to refer to the committee on waterways, which was unanimous, was voted down and the report subsequently was adopted without a roll call.

General Wegler Resigns.

Madrid, Spain.—General Valeriano Wegler, of Valencia, resigned the governorship of the province of Catalonia, on the ground that he was a liberal in politics and disagreed with the policy of the present conservative Spanish government.

Neck Broken for Two Years.

New Rochelle, N. Y.—While in a fair way to make good his promise to "find the surgeons," Wade more than two years ago when his neck was broken, Waldorf Miller died from stomach trouble.

Big Cotton Cargo.

Wilmington, N. C.—The British steamship Holtye, sailing from this port with a cargo of 20,243 bales of cotton, carried what is said to be the largest cargo of cotton ever sent from an American port. The cargo is valued at \$1,222,700.

Galveston, Texas.—Gov. O. B. Colquitt, of Texas, headed the annual "turkey trot" parade here, consisting of 2,000, five tubbys, which stalked through the streets. Members of a few hundred pack band trained leaders, the 2000 bronze turkey trotters, drew a baby carriage with a small child passenger.

AROUND THE WORLD

ITEMS OF CURRENT INTEREST GATHERED FROM EARTH'S FOUR CORNERS.

ALL THAT IS GOING ON

Gist of Week's News Stripped of Unnecessary Verbiage and Prepared for Quick Consumption by Busy People.

A general answer and denial in the \$50,000 damage suit of Mrs. Minnie E. Bond of Oklahoma City against United States Senator T. P. Gore was filed in district court at Oklahoma City.

Continued rain for 24 hours has rendered the position of the recalcitrant Navajo Indians encamped on Beautiful mountain, near the Shiprock agency, very trying, and has cooled materially the ardor of their sympathizers.

Mrs. Helen Struelens, a divorcee, who says she received alimony of \$7,000 a year, was arraigned in Judge Mahoney's court, Chicago, on a charge of operating a confidence game. The case was continued until Dec. 3.

Several bishops have addressed questions to the Vatican as to whether confessors should give absolution to Roman Catholics who dance the tango. The reply of the Vatican was that the tango must be considered as an immoral dance and consequently was prohibited by Catholics.

President Wilson promised to deliver an address to 600 persons over long-distance telephone to Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 10. He will sit in the White House and speak to the guests at a dinner of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

Gov. Tener of Pennsylvania announced he had agreed to accept the presidency of the National League of Baseball Clubs for a term of four years.

Receipts of \$117,000 and expenditures of \$112,000 were shown in the election expense statement of the New York Republican state committee at Albany.

"I expect to be doing my regular duty as a police officer when I am 100 years old," declared Petermann, Oliver Houghton to Westmouth Mass, friends who congratulated him on his ninety-third birthday.

Ira Von Claussen, who once sued ex-President Roosevelt for \$1,000 and damages for not having her introduced to the king of Sweden, was declared insane in a report submitted to a New York court.

Voices, but not actual words, have been transmitted by wireless telephone across the Atlantic ocean from Kildare, Ireland, to Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, according to a statement made by William Marconi.

Evidence of an alleged clock forgery by Sidney Moulthrop, former stenographer to Senator Lewis of Illinois, was presented to a grand jury at Washington.

Mordecai Brown, the famous, three-fingered pitcher of the Chicago National and the Cincinnati club, may take the management of the Chicago Federal League team. It was said in Chicago.

Frank Glass, editor of the Birmingham News and president of the Mountain States association, was appointed United States senator by Gov. O'Neal of Alabama to succeed the late Senator Joseph E. Johnston. His term expires March 3, 1916.

Why not study the case and give more serious attention to the study and prevention of this disease that invades the home of hundreds of our people? The governor says in his proclamation: "To the People of Kentucky: "By request of intelligent citizens deeply interested in the immediate reduction and final eradication of tuberculosis in this state, I now designate Sunday, December 7th, as Tuberculosis Sunday, in order that our people may on that day give special and earnest thought to the dreadful disease which we have too long allowed to bring misery and death into many homes. Any one who wishes full information and useful literature about the holy crusade against this disease need only apply to the secretary of the Kentucky Board of Tuberculosis Commissioners, Mr. Roy L. French, of Frankfort, Kentucky. It is hoped that many good clergymen of all churches will preach a sermon on this vital topic on that day."

"All well-informed persons now know that this disease is not inherited, though one afflicted may communicate the disease to another; that it is a curable and preventable disease if treated rightly and in proper time; that, in every case, reputable physicians should be consulted when the first symptoms are discovered; that bad housing, lack of good ventilation and sunlight in sleeping rooms, lack of nourishing, well-cooked food, dust and dirt, overwork, worry, alcoholism, sexual immorality and other vicious habits prepare the soil for the seed of disease which one sufferer transmits to another."

"Tuberculosis destroys one person out of every six dying in Kentucky. We should use every effort to stop that terrible result. The education of the people on this subject is of vital importance. We must try to save our selves, our kindred and our neighbors from this terrible affliction. Almost every home has at some time been in sorrow and gloom by the agony and death of some loved one that was an unnecessary victim of this dreadful disease. Let us all, by the love we bear our beloved and in the spirit of charity to our neighbor, make a zealous, united effort to free our state from this awful scourge."

"In testimony whereof, I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the commonwealth to be hereunto affixed. In McCracken county the field has been almost denuded of game before the legitimate hunters took gun in hand and fared forth. That lowest of all petty crimes, out of season shooting, has been practiced in red-handed fashion during the last closed season and we face the discouraging result now.

The present game laws in Kentucky are good laws, they could be strengthened in places, but the real need is for enforcement not for more laws and unless this enforcement is forthcoming we will be in vernacular, strictly up against it.

When John Rothrock and Jim Wilkins, a fireman at Central station, drove down the street this morning displaying a big assortment of game, they attracted envious eyes. There was no malicious intent on their part however, but they couldn't stand back and not show their friends the result of their four days hunt near Hampton, Ky.

They returned this morning with 56 quail, two squirrels and 18 rabbits. These were the fruit of their labors yesterday. Up until yesterday they consumed what they killed and didn't come home hungry.

The above items were clipped from the same issue of the Paducah Sun, the first appearing as an editorial and the latter as news item. The wanton destruction of game is easily explained by the last article, and until the city sportsman (?) can learn to govern his lust for killing the conservation of small game in Kentucky will never be accomplished. The country lad, a true sportsman, only kills sufficient for home consumption and the slaughterer of game is generally done by the city man. The law of conscience must be self imposed if the game is to be preserved.

"Newly weds" have become so numerous on the Southern Railway's Memphis Special that orders have been placed for a steel constructed compartment car exclusively for their use. The car will be made of compartments entirely. Each room will be decorated differently. One will be finished in baby blue, one in pink, one in old rose, one in white, one in gray, one in green and others in different colors. The furniture, it is understood, will be in mahogany and bird's-eye maple. News Item.

The State is to be stocked with birds and game from these pens, twenty deer and some elk are to be purchased and placed in a reserve in Bell county, game wardens are doing excellent work and everything possible is to be done to have game worth hunting next year.

Mrs. Lillie Mulliken Abrams, wife of W. J. Abrams, of Louisville, who died recently, left an estate of \$250,000. After special bequests amounting to \$20,000, she left her property to her husband, Mrs. A. O. Stanley, and Davis Armstrong, the last two her cousins, one-third each. Mrs. Abrams was a daughter of the late Oscar Turner and she left \$5,000 to erect a monument to her father in Paducah. Paducah Sun.

Mrs. Abrams should have had this monument erected in Murray. Calloway was strictly an "Oscar Turner county" in the days of "rings and cliques—salt and trace chains," and long after Oscar Turner died he received votes for Congress each election in old Calloway.

The fire insurance underwriters in Kentucky have had a great shake-up during the past week. Forty-four companies who have been doing business in this state have withdrawn their business already and others are expected to do the same thing in a few days. The chaos was brought by the rating board fixing new rates on dwellings and barns, which did not meet with the approval of the companies.

In Secretary Houston's estimate just submitted to Congress it has been recommended that the distribution of ordinary vegetable and flower seeds be discontinued and that part of the \$300,000 heretofore devoted to this purpose be used to procure, propagate and distribute among the people, new and valuable seeds and plants.
