GOEBEL IS ELECTED
Democrats Jubilant Over Late Returns.
A SAFE MAJORITY.
Blackburn Says It Is Over 4,000 Votes.
GOEBEL SAYS 5,000.

At Headquarters.
FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 9.—At the Democratic State headquarters it is announced this afternoon that Goebel's majority is over 3,000 votes, not including two or three counties which will double his majority.

Courier Journal's Figures.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 9.—The Courier-Journal says this morning: Returns to the Courier-Journal from 1,791 voting precincts in Kentucky, out of a total of 1,850, give Goebel a plurality of 3,070. Of the 73 precincts that have not yet been heard from, 30 are in the Tenth and Eleventh districts—twenty in the Tenth district, seven are in a Republican county and 31 in Democratic counties.
