## \$2,000,000 MORTGAGE IS FILED IN CLERK'S OFFICE

**Interurban Promoters Give Substantial Evidence That Proposed Road Will be Built From Paducah to Murray at an Early Date.**

President H. C. Rhodes of the Kentucky Southwestern Electric Light, Railway and Power Co., was in Murray the first of the week and filed a two million dollar mortgage with County Clerk Broach for record. Similar instruments have been filed in Graves and McCracken counties, and in noticing the matter the Paducah Sun, of the 14th, says:

The filing of record today in the office of County Clerk Gus G. Singleton of a first mortgage deed of trust for two million dollars (\$2,000,000) by the Kentucky Southwestern Electric Railway, Light & Power company to secure the company's forty year five per cent bonds for a like amount was the first public move assuring the construction of the proposed interurban railway linking Paducah with a score of towns in Western Kentucky and eventually leading to Henderson as a connecting link to the larger cities north of the Ohio river.

The deed which has been withheld for some time was filed in accordance with the contract entered into with the underwriters who have accepted the terms. The general construction contract has been let and permits will follow at an early date, as was announced by officials of the company.

While the company has not disclosed the successful bidders and the dates set for the beginning of the work the move today indicates the authenticity of the interurban, and allays all doubt of a failure to perfect the arrangements for the construction work.

General satisfaction accompanied the announcement today as the interurban will mean probably the biggest asset to Paducah than any one movement.

While there has been no official announcement it is said that the Paducah-Murray division of the road will first be undertaken. The beginning of the construction will be anxiously awaited and the work will probably be under way early in the summer.

President Rhodes in commenting on this move of the company today stated that while this document has been in existence for several months, and its terms accepted long ago by the underwriters of the bonds, there was no need of placing it on record until this time, as the time for requisition to be made for the bonds by the underwriters had not required it. This action at this time, however, is in accordance with the contracts entered into with the underwriters, and permits of the construction work following at an early date.

With the contract for construction already closed the company's affairs are in a most satisfactory condition. Already the information has reached the channels of railway supply and

contracting trade and to these it has been assured, that while the general construction contract has been closed a considerable amount of the work will be sublet.

"We have pulled hard and long," said Mr. Rhodes, "to accomplish what we have, but since the year 1912, we have been advised by, and had the assurance from such reliable sources, regarding the value of what we have, that the objections, criticism and doubts expressed by the people who neither knew nor were in a position to know, has had little effect except to be annoying; as it should have been everybody's interest to encourage such an undertaking. Our advisers have been from among the largest and more successful public utility operators.

### ADVANCING

**Murray Now City of Fourth Class by Act of the Legislature Passed Last Saturday.**

You can't keep a good town down. Murray is changing clothes, getting away from the swaddling garments and "puttin' on" youngster garments. By an act of the legislature, introduced by Representative Jones, of this county, Murray last Saturday passed from a city of the fifth class to a city of the fourth class. This information was received here by Mayor Henry Holton, who received a telegram from Mr. Jones stating that the bill had passed both branches of the legislature and only awaited the signature of the governor before becoming a law.

Just what effect this bill will have upon the present city government, if any, is not clear, but the advancement from the one class to the other will enlarge the scope of the governing authority and permit Murray to increase its bonded indebtedness from three to five per cent should an occasion arise.

Cities and towns are classified under the constitution according to population and when it is established that a sufficient increase is made transfer from one class to another is made.

## Dancing Frocks for Sweet Sixteen



"SWEET SIXTEEN" must be construed these days to mean, in reality, sweet sixteen to twenty-four; for sweet sixteen of these days is a little too young to prove interesting outside her own circle of relatives or schoolmates. The two pretty frocks for a young girl, pictured here, are suitable designs for any of the festive occasions.

It will be seen that they allow plenty of freedom for the frolicsome dances to which youth is just now so devoted. The materials are simple, and the skirts are beautifully full.

For these fascinating dresses soft sheer fabrics are to be chosen. There are plenty of them. Voiles (plain or flowered), chiffon, silk or cotton crepes, wool or cotton challies, nets, chiffon taffetas and other light silks, crepe de chine, flowered mull, besides numbers of novelties that have been brought out. Probably the two most satisfactory materials are chiffon taffeta and voile.

The frock with the accordion-pleated skirt is worthy of some study. It is of cream-colored voile with girde of rose-colored moire ribbon and long ends crossed at the front. They are fastened there and brought to the back where they tie in a bow with short loops under a narrow-scarf flounce of the material. This flounce is double, having the effect of a hanging puff.

Added to the girde at the back is

a ruffle of the ribbon, giving the effect of a short basque finish. There is an apron of lace at the front, with bands extending upward to the bodice, over the shoulders and around the low neck. The sleeves are short puffs finished with double ruffles and lace.

Very small flowers of narrow ribbon, make a slender wreath which outlines the apron and bodice and follows the line of the flounce at the back.

Chiffon taffeta and lace are used, with a little plain chiffon for the second dress. The picture shows so plainly the composition that it hardly needs description.


The skirt of chiffon taffeta is narrow and extends to the calf of the leg. It is finished with a wide flounce of lace and is caught up in front with two ribbon roses. There is a tunic, girde and tiny eon jacket of the silk, with underbodice and sleeves of chiffon in the same color as the silk.

The tunic is finished with a pattern of light embroidery about the bottom, and the bodice is embellished with a bow butterfly bow of the silk mounted above the waist line at the front.

Each of the youthful wearers is provided with a strand of pearl beads for her neck and black satin slippers for her feet. These are simple and tasteful dresses, not at all expensive and entirely appropriate to young girls. Nothing more elaborate is to be considered for them.

## Petticoats With Hand Embroidery



HERE are two beautiful new designs in petticoats to which a little hand embroidery gives a touch of real elegance. The designs are simple and the work not of the kind which proves trying to the eyes. Now that Lent is here and our time is not too fully occupied it is a real pleasure to sit down to a little old-fashioned sewing.

One of these petticoats is of white muslin with a ruffle of batiste machine stitched to the bottom. The ruffle is scalloped and buttonholes stitched along the lower edge. It may be purchased with the edge ready finished. The buttonhole stitching is extended to form small panels.

In each of the panels a spray of flowers, very simple and easily done, is embroidered. The sprays are not all alike; two, or even three, patterns are used, or only one, according to the choice of the individual.

The top of the ruffle is cut into short dashes, the edges carefully finished with the buttonhole stitch, and a satin ribbon threaded through these dashes, by way of a dainty finish. These pink lavender or a soft gold color are shown in satin ribbons to be used for this purpose.

A practical petticoat to be worn with street suits is made of un-

bleached linen of chambray. Plain gingham also provides a suitable material. The petticoat is plain and narrow, about a yard and three-quarters wide. It is slit up at one side along a seam. The bottom is finished with a shallow scallop button hole stitched with a coarse box.

Two sprays of embroidery, placed at the sides of the slash in the skirt, finish its decoration. The embroidery is done in white. Stitches are long and easily done.

Skirts of this kind are made up in blue, pink, lavender, tan, linen color and white. They are easily laundered. Worn with a fancy corset cover they provide a foundation for other wear.

The quadrangular simplicity of white dresses in the new crepe-like fabrics which are not sheer but still allow a color to show through them, these durable and attractive petticoats are to be worn with utility dresses and are not made for those of airy fabrics, which will be used for other wear.

There is a certain satisfaction in hand-wrought undergarments, and a certain pride in one's own work which more than pays for the time spent upon such simple and practical garments.

## MUST BENEFIT ALL

National Banks See Wisdom of New Currency Law.

Practically All the Big Financial Institutions of the Country Have Accepted It as a Worthy Reform Measure.

Ninety-nine per cent of the national banks of the United States, representing 99 1/2 per cent of the national banking capital of the country, have accepted President Wilson's currency and reserve law.

It is the biggest triumph ever scored by a reform measure in America. What makes it greater is the fact that these banks came in voluntarily; they were not clubbed. No one swung a big stick over their heads. No one denounced the banker who hesitated about renewing his national charter as a malefactor of great wealth.

The states stood ready to license any worthy institution which did not like the new law, and in this connection it should be borne in mind that a majority of the banking capital of this country is held by state banks. Yet without any legal, moral or financial compulsion, with all easy and profitable alternative open to them, practically all the national banks of the land have accepted the law which many of them were wildly denouncing a few months ago.

The explanation of this change of front is simple—but not very flattering to high financiers.

The Wilson currency law, war-drawn for the benefit of the entire nation. Therefore, it benefits bankers, too, but for a time they could not see this. The big financial powers have grown so used to seeing their will written into law at Washington that they resented the idea of having laws imposed on them by a mere president and congress. They wanted a measure which took care of high finance first and of the country afterward, and it traveled them beyond measure to find themselves rated more as also present in the list of interests to be served by the new law.

Closer study has convinced them that the financial liberty and security guaranteed by the federal reserve law is the best possible basis for sound and profitable banking—and they have acted accordingly. Perhaps next time they will not be so hard to convince.

### Making Excuses.

There may be some relaxation of the civil service regulations where sufficient reason can be shown for exceptional treatment, but the president's position on the general question of the reform of civil service, in connection with the spoils system, is too well defined to admit any possibility that he will allow the bars to be thrown down in the interest of the patronage mongers.

The trouble with the Republican criticisms of Democratic administration displaces a Democrat it is solely for the good of the service. But when a Democratic administration displaces a Republican it is a wild raid of the patronage brokers. —Philadelphia Record.

### Democratic Opportunity.

This is the situation confronting the Democratic party. We have captured the presidency, retained the house and won the senate. We have relegated to private life the chief dispensers of the leaves and fishes of privilege. We have placed at the head of the government a man who commands universal respect both for character and capacity. We are squarely on trial. We accept the ordeal. All true Democrats make haste to acknowledge that the exact measure of the value of the Democracy to our national life is about to be determined by the kind of test from which there is no appeal. We rejoice in the fact that the party has come to this juncture for such a time as this.

### President Leads United Party.

If the president continues to hold his party together, which seems likely to be the case, it will go before the country next fall with a united front. This is a fact of no small importance. It means that the Democratic party has learned a lesson from the bitter experience of the past, and that it does not propose to jeopardize its position by an exhibition of lack of solidarity. In fact, the remarkable outcome of the year has been the demonstration that the Democratic party is a disciplined and cohesive organization.

### Collecting the Income Tax.

No more than the present system of collecting tariff revenue, much less than local personal taxation, does the proposed income tax offer a premium on perjury. The great majority of those liable to it will be unable to swear falsely about it if they would. Collection will be automatic.

### Must Yield to Circumstances.

The quadrangular simplicity of political parties do not offer a sufficiently elastic rule to control the activities of the government. Even an intense partisan might deny that an affirmation in convention was a final pronouncement upon a question of policy that might reach an acute stage one, two or three years later. It is only when the government is committed to resolutions to a little more verbal and the government would have its hands tied in all its diplomatic operations.

The exile of Dantzig, Crown Prince Frederick William, is back in Berlin after two years at the head of his Death's Head Hussars. Preparations for increasing the army under the terms of last year's armament bills are well under way, and the staff is loaded with work of a highly practical executive nature.

The crown prince will probably not stay at Berlin long. He will be instructed by past masters in strategy, the mobilization of troops, in all that can be taught from maps at a desk. Then he will be sent to some other regiment to take up again the practical work of soldiering. By inclination as well as training, young Frederick William appears to be a thorough soldier. ### RECEIVER OF THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Mr. Walker W. Vick of New Jersey, general receiver of the Dominican customs for Uncle Sam, has just rendered the sixth annual report of the receivership. A summary of the report shows that big business at the Dominican capital showed some trepidation when President Wilson brought about a change of administration of custom affairs in Santo Domingo. They feared the new broom might sweep too clean.

As the new receivership administration gradually unfolded its purpose, however, there was a natural subsidence of concern within business circles, and now the conclusion is in all realistic of Dominican financial and commercial circles, that the right kind of sweeping has a salutary effect on the financial, as it does on the domestic household, and that cobwebs of debatable precedents are not always conducive to successful achievement. When what is known as the "American-Dominican convention of 1907" was created, the United States assumed the responsibility of receiving all the customs duties; to pay a definite proportion of the same each month to the Republic, and to apply all proceeds in payment of interest on a \$20,000,000 bonded debt and into a sinking fund for the discharge of the principal.

During the six years of this Dominican receivership great progress has been made towards the payment of the principal of the \$20,000,000 loan, the customs receipts climbing from about \$2,000,000 a year to an annual total of \$4,250,000 for the calendar year 1913 of over \$4,000,000, or to be exact \$4,250,000.

### AWARDED RED CROSS GOLD MEDAL



A woman with white hair and with the spirit of perennial youthfulness and enthusiasm shining from her face has been awarded the Red Cross gold medal of merit by the central board of that organization. The woman thus honored is Miss Jane A. Delano, president of the American Red Cross society. In presenting Miss Delano to the president, Miss Mabel T. Boardman, the active head of the American Red Cross society, said of her:

"It is due to Miss Delano's devoted and efficient labors that a splendid corps of over 4,000 of the best trained nurses in the country have been enrolled in the Red Cross for active service in time of war or disaster. The people of the United States may well be grateful for the unremunerated and efficient work of this devoted woman."

The practicability of the remarkable organization effected by Miss Delano, whose official title is chairman of the national committee on Red Cross nursing service, has many times been tested. Last spring, for instance, during the Ohio flood, Miss Delano and her coworkers were able to mobilize within a few hours' time an efficient corps of trained nurses to assist in the relief work, and the Red Cross can at all times secure through its 110 local committees on nursing service the number of nurses required in disaster or war.

The entire corps of Red Cross nurses represents a high professional standard, and has been made a nursing reserve for the army and navy.

### OFFERED POST AT PRINCETON

Alfred Noyes, the English poet, who is in this country lecturing in the case of world peace, has been asked to join the faculty of Princeton university, and it is understood that he has agreed to accept. His election, it is said, will be sanctioned by the trustees at their meeting in April.

The position which Mr. Noyes is to fill, it is said, is a visiting professorship, with lectures on modern English literature. It will begin about the middle of next February and extend through the second term of the university, and it is understood will continue in this way for several years, from February to June.

Mr. Noyes is thirty-three years old, and has been writing poetry for more than 20 years. At the age of fourteen, he wrote his first epic, a production in rhymed verse of several thousand lines, describing allegorically the voyage through life as on a ship. This poem was first published, 1870 years ago, and has since been the property of the London publisher, The Seixholms, and printed in the weekly supplement of the London paper, The Spectator, which, achieving a reputation for more through his prowess as an athlete, and especially on the chess board, than as a poet.

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

## CALUMET STRIKE STILL ON

Northern Michigan Copper Miners Will Not Vote on Returning to Work at Present.

Calumet, Mich.—The strike has not been called off and will not be, now at any rate, declared President William Richard of the Calumet local of the Western Federation of Miners. This statement was made following report that the men might return to work, regardless of the Western Federation of Miners, but none of the imported strike breakers will be discharged in order to make vacancies for former employees desiring to return to work.

Richard said the matter of declaring off the strike will not be put to a vote before the men now, at least, and probably "not until further orders are received from President Meyer."

General Manager Denton of the Copper Range Consolidated declared that the companies had all along urged the men to turn in their federation cards and return to work.

The federation has ceased paying salaries here to strikers. Two thousand men are still out in the district. It is claimed here that the companies are willing to take back to work the strikers who have not engaged in violence, but none of the imported strike breakers will be discharged in order to make vacancies for former employees desiring to return to work.

## GRADING OF COTTON ASKED

Bills Before Congress Give Agricultural Control of Investigation and Interstate Shipments.

Washington.—Bills to authorize the secretary of agriculture to investigate handling, grading and transportation of grain and cotton and to establish standards of grade, quality and condition have been introduced by Chairman Lever of the house agriculture committee.

They would prohibit interstate shipment of grain or cotton unless its grade is fixed by the secretary of agriculture and conforms to standards he prescribes, but variations from official standards may be permitted under his rules.

The bills would forbid shipment of grain or cotton under misleading descriptions, would make subject to agricultural department's inspection any grain entering into interstate commerce which has been represented to conform to a given standard and would authorize the secretary to set the way disputes as to proper grading of shipments. Violations would be punishable by fines of from \$200 to \$1,000.

**Bubonic Plague at Havana.**—Washington.—A second case of bubonic plague in Havana has been reported to Surgeon-General Blue of the public health service, and inoculations have confirmed its nature. The first victim has died.

**Helen Keller Hears Sound.**—Los Angeles, Cal.—Helen Keller, deaf and blind young woman, announced that she believes she had at last heard a sound—the high note of a singer, Minnie Stevens, who sang for her several times.

**Posse Kills Insane Slayer.**—Belleville, Mo.—Samuel Godwin, 60, insane man, was shot and killed by a posse after he had shot and probably fatally wounded Sheriff Robert Cook of Logan county and barricaded himself in his shanty in a woods near the scene.

**Philanthropist Dies in Poverty.**—St. Thomas, N. H.—John W. Hill, 81, who spent a lifetime and \$250,000 in charity work on the Philippine coast, died here penniless and a victim of tuberculosis.

## MISS WILSON AND M'ADOO ARE TO WED

ENGAGEMENT OF PRESIDENT'S DAUGHTER AND TREASURY HEAD ANNOUNCED.

## MARRIAGE DATE IS NOT SET

Briefness of Announcement Causes Comment—McAdoo Is a Grandfather and Twenty-Six Years Older Than His Fiancee.

Washington.—Just as society was departing of an official announcement from the white house about the reported engagement of Miss Eleanor Wilson to William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, a statement was given out by the president's secretary, Mr. Tumulty, to this effect:

"The president and Mrs. Wilson announce the engagement of their youngest daughter, Eleanor Randolph, to William Gibbs McAdoo."

Those few words made certain that the wedding bells will again chime in the white house for the second time in the Wilson administration within the space of six months, and that Miss Eleanor Wilson will be the fourteenth white house bride.

The briefness of the announcement was much commented on. When the engagement of Miss Jessie Wilson to Mr. Sayre was announced it was with a wealth of detail and circumstance. It is understood that the wedding day has not been fixed. Rumor has it, however, that it will occur at a very early date.

The old adage that "love laughs at age, race and creed," is borne out in this engagement, as Secretary McAdoo is twenty-six years older than Miss Wilson, the father of six children and the grandfather of two. He has been a widower for several years and devoted to business pursuits.

## U. S. EXPRESS CO. WILL QUIT

Success of Parcel Post and Recent Express Rate Reductions Said to Have Caused Retirement.

New York.—Directors of the United States Express company voted unanimously to liquidate its affairs and dissolve it in the shortest possible time. The precise plan for realizing on the company's assets was not disclosed, but it is thought a syndicate will be formed to take them over so that they may be disposed of to the best advantage.

Persons familiar with the company's affairs declare that the return to the shareholders will be between \$20 and \$100 a share. There is considerable real estate as well as costly equipment and outstanding contracts with railroads, which, it is expected, will be transferred to other express companies.

The success of the parcel post and the recent express rate reduction by the interstate commerce commission are held directly responsible for the company's retirement from business.

## SLAIN BY FREIGHT THIEVES

Bandits Shoot Down Engineer Near Peoria, Ill., When Surprised By Train Crew.

Peoria, Ill.—Arthur Fisher, a Chicago & Northwestern railroad freight engineer, was shot and killed in the cab of his engine near Manlius, Ill., forty-five miles north of Peoria, by bandits who were surprised while stealing merchandise from the freight train. A deputy sheriff, in pursuit of the band, was shot through the head and may die. The station agent at Langley, Ill., was shot in the arm and the fireman on the freight train was shot through the leg. Three robbers were captured.

Near Sheffield, Ill., the posse came up with the robbers, who opened fire. Bert Skoglund, deputy sheriff of De Kalb county, was shot through the face, shoulder and throat. He is believed to be fatally wounded. Leslie Beyer, son of the sheriff of Bureau county, was shot in the leg.

**Made 23 Suicide Attempts.**—New York.—Herman E. Atkins of Brooklyn has begun suit for separation against his wife on the ground that his nerves were shattered by her repeated attempts to commit suicide. Twenty-three times, alleged Atkins, Mrs. Atkins vainly attempted to take her life.

**Tenement Fire Kills Four.**—Bridgeport, Conn.—Three men are dead and a fourth is dying from having been overcome by smoke in a tenement fire here.

**Creates Coast Guard Service.**—Washington.—The senate passed a bill to create a coast guard service by consolidating the revenue cutter service and the life saving service. The house is expected to pass the bill without opposition.

**Mob Lynches Negro Assault.**—Harrisburg, Pa.—After he had shot and killed a white man, a negro was lynched by a mob of citizens. Robertson will recover.

## SENATOR W. J. STONE



Senator William Joel Stone of Missouri has been named chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations, succeeding the late Senator Bacon. For some time he has been outspoken in favor of intervention in Mexico, but it is expected he will modify his views.

## ADMITS EXEMPTION LOBBY

Washington Lawyer Testifies He Was Employed to Work on Panama Canal Bill.

Washington.—Renewal of the senate lobby investigating committee's inquiry has turned toward reports that there is organized opposition in Washington, backed by influential forces, against the proposed repeal of the Panama tolls exemption. The committee examined Clarence W. De Knight, a Washington lawyer, who admitted activity on behalf of concerns in favor of toll exemption when the bill was passed, but flatly denied knowledge of any lobbying efforts to prevent the repeal.

The lawyer admitted having entered into a contract with the Panama Canal Ship Building company, through former Admiral P. T. Bowles, its president, to work for free tolls for coastwise shipping. For this service he received \$1,000, he said, but a continuing fee of \$4,000 additional depending on the passage of the tolls bill in that form had not been paid. De Knight agreed to produce this contract.

De Knight told also of urging through congress various bills providing for increase in pay and higher rank for men of the army and navy. He estimated that contracts he made for this work with individuals and associations of enlisted men had brought him \$40,000.

## LARGEST WARSHIP AFLOAT

Giant Superdreadnought Texas Turned Over to the United States Government by Builders.

Newport News, Va.—All ready for "fight or frolic," the giant superdreadnought Texas, most powerful battleship afloat in the world, left the yards of her builders here, the Newport News Shipbuilding company, for the Norfolk navy yard, distant only a few miles, there to be turned over to Rear Admiral Usher, commander of the Norfolk station.

In length the higher is 572 feet with a beam of 95 feet 2 1/2 inches, so that in passing through the Panama canal locks she would have almost fifteen feet to spare.

**\$1,000,000 Portland Fire.**—Portland, Ore.—Fire swept all that section of the Portland waterfront on the east side from the upper to the lower Albion ferries, destroying Columbia dock No. 2 and Montgomery dock No. 1, the steamships Oregon and Gleason, and much other property, including a large estimated at \$1,000,000. The fire burned covered six blocks.

**Convicts Make Up Reward.**—Dallas, Tex.—A reward of \$35 for the return of two of their number, who broke parole and escaped, has been offered by forty-six convicts, members of a party which recently began working roads without guards or shackles, under an experimental plan of the state.

**Italian Cabinet Resigns.**—Rome.—The resignation of the Italian cabinet is officially announced by Premier Giovanni Giolitti.

**Pupils March From Flames.**—Baltimore, Md.—One thousand pupils of a public school here were marched from the building in road order after a fire, which threatened the school, was smothered by firemen through the structure. The building was destroyed.

**Muncie, Ind., Goes Dry.**—Muncie, Ind.—The city of Muncie, Ind., has voted to become a local option election. A number of women worked at the polls, serving lunch to the temperance advocates.

Committee of Three, Each Receiving \$10,000 a Year, Would Be Vested With Power—Action by Congress Expected Soon.

Washington.—The Covington letter state trade commission bill, bearing the approval of President Wilson and Attorney-General McKeeney, was made public, following many conferences among the members of the house interstate commerce committee. Democrats expect this measure to command substantial republican support, and an effort probably will be made soon to bring about concerted action between the senate and house on this phase of the administration program of commerce regulation and anti-trust legislation.

The bill would transfer all the powers and duties of the bureau of corporations and the commissioner of corporations to the proposed commission of three members, presidential appointees, subject to confirmation, whose salaries would be \$10,000 annually each. Only two of the commissioners could be from the same political party.

The Covington bill defines as a corporation all bodies incorporated under the laws and joint stock associations having shares of capital or other capital stock or organized to carry on business for profit. One section of the bill provides that corporations furnish annual reports to the commission, giving all information the commission requires. Violations of this provision would be penalized at \$100 a day.

## SENATE RAPS AMBASSADOR

Resolution Calls on Walter H. Page to Explain Panama Canal Speech Delivered in London.

Washington.—A resolution calling upon Walter H. Page, United States ambassador to Great Britain, for an explanation of a Panama canal speech which he is reported to have delivered recently before the Associated Chambers of Commerce in London, has been adopted by the senate. The resolution was introduced by Senator Chamberlain, democrat, of Oregon, an opponent of the repeal of the free tolls provision.

The resolution then calls on the secretary of state to "furnish to the senate without delay a copy of the speech made by the American ambassador, and particularly that part thereof which is in violation of the Monroe doctrine and that portion thereof in which he is alleged to have stated that the British would profit most by the use of the Panama canal."

The definition attributed to the ambassador was that the Monroe doctrine simply meant this: "That the United States would prefer that no European government should gain more land in the new world."

## TIDAL WAVE DROWNS 1,000

Violent Hurricane Drives Waters of the Sea of Azov Overboard—Russian Towns.

Ekaterinodar, Russia.—More than 1,000 persons perished in the inundation of the towns of Staniza and Achtyrsk by a tidal wave from the Sea of Azov. The wave struck the towns during a violent hurricane which swept the province of Kuban. More than 150 persons were drowned in the floods in Yassenskaja.

A dam collapsed in the town of Temryuk on the Taman peninsula, 35 miles northwest of this city, flooding the greater part of the city and drowning many persons. The sea washed away 250 buildings in Aktyrskaja. Temryuk is a historic town with a population of 15,000. It once was the seat of the Turkish fortress Adass.

**State Will Get \$100,000.**—Raleigh, N. C.—It is stated that North Carolina will collect \$100,000 from the estate of George W. Vagabond. The estate in North Carolina is valued at \$7,500,000, and the inheritance tax on this will amount to a round \$100,000.

**Bishop Scarborough Dies.**—Trenton, N. J.—The Rt. Rev. John Scarborough, D.D., Protestant Episcopal bishop of New Jersey, died here after a short illness. He was in his eighty-third year.

**Oldest Elk Dies.**—Owosso, Mich.—Daniel O'Connell, known as the oldest living member of the fraternal organization of Elks, died at his home near here. He was 100 years old. He was a member of the Owosso lodge of Elks.

**Slayer, Ellis Aspects Sentence.**—Chicago.—William Greasy Ellis, convicted murderer, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for the slaying of a woman, is making an effort to get a new trial.

## News of Kentucky —Tersely Told—

Paducah Expects Larger Shops. Paducah.—The Illinois Central Railroad company is expected to divulge its plans for larger shops at Memphis, Tenn., and Paducah in a short time, facts about which have been learned here. From a reliable source it was learned that all of the company's repairs on locomotives and steel cars will be done here and that repainting will be done at Memphis. All of the repair work for southern lines of the company will be done at these two cities. The force in the local shops, it is reported, will be increased from 1,000 to 5,000. Plans for new shops have been seen. They will extend to Broadway and cover all of the company's property behind the present shops. All of the power will be electric. The car repairing shops at Memphis will work, it is said, about 3,000 employees. The work on the new shops is scheduled to begin about June 1.

**Will Stop Water Pollution.** Paducah.—Dr. Wade Hampton Frost of the United States public health service has arranged for headquarters here for a branch of the service. The experts to come here will be in charge of Dr. P. Thompson, and besides having a fine laboratory will be equipped with a gasoline launch for making trips on the Ohio, Tennessee, Cumberland, Wabash, Mississippi and other rivers to make investigations of drinking water in various cities and stop efforts from polluting the national streams by emptying their sewage into them. What action will be taken here is not known, but City Engineer L. A. Washington stated that if the city is required to purify its sewage and fifth the expense for a contact field and filtering plant would be large. The experts will be here several months.

**Kentucky Racing Dates.** Lexington.—All four tracks in Kentucky will hold meetings this spring. This became known at a conference of officials when the following dates were decided on to be asked at the meeting of the state racing commission here: Kentucky association, Lexington, 11 days, Saturday, April 25, and including Thursday, May 7; New Louisville Jockey club, Churchill Downs, Louisville, 12 days, Saturday, May 9, and including Friday, May 24; Douglas Park Jockey club, Douglas Park, Louisville, 13 days, Saturday, June 6; Latonia Jockey club, Covington, 24 days, Monday, June 8, to and including Saturday, July 4.

**Free of Murder Charge.** Mayfield.—Trial of J. D. Flora, an aged man, charged with the murder of Cope Pentecost, a young man of this city, last November, came to an end when the jury returned a verdict of acquittal. Flora claimed self-defense. Pentecost was drunk and came to Flora's house to see his daughter, and on being refused admission forced his way in the hall two times and rushed to Flora's room. When Flora thought Pentecost was preparing to strike his wife while the latter two were in the yard, Flora from his porch fired one shot that produced death.

**Insurance Law Opposed.** Paducah.—A meeting of the business men of the city has been called for the purpose of taking action on the fire insurance bill recently passed by the legislature. But few fire companies are left in Paducah and the business men realize that not only would they soon be without fire insurance, but money borrowing would become seriously affected. The meeting probably will ask the state officials to not enforce the new law.

**Fatal Shooting at Franklin.** Franklin.—William Cook, electrician at the Franklin Electric Light & Ice plant, shot and killed Chester Clark of this place. Clark, on his way home, entered the engine room at the light plant and the negro fireman fled, knowing that the two men were on bad terms. Upon returning later Clark was found dead with two bullet holes in his breast and side. Cook was slightly wounded.

**Glasgow Lawyer Drops Dead.** Glasgow.—Allen Sandifer, 42, one of the most widely known lawyers in southern Kentucky, dropped dead in his office of heart failure. He has just returned from supper and ran up a stairway to his office, and fell dead shortly after leaving.

**Scottsville Infirmary Burns.** Scottsville.—The Methodist infirmary here burned. Mrs. H. M. Meredith was overcome by smoke, but will recover. A roomer had to climb down a column in his night clothes. The property loss is about \$15,000. The cause of the fire is unknown.

**Doctor Accepts Fine.** Hopkinsville.—Among the final batch of indictments returned by the grand jury was one against W. D.
