## COURT SCRAP.

### Former Murray Attorney Engages Witness in Lively Tilt in Paducah Police Court.

Pandemonium reigned in County Judge James Lang's court Monday afternoon, when, on two different occasions, a witness, who was the plaintiff in the case on trial, and an attorney for the defendant called each other deceptions of Ananias and were prevented from smashing each other only by the timely interference of persons nearby.

The case on trial was J. D. O'Bryan against John May for \$12.25, the amount of a garnishee. George C. Diuguid, attorney for the defendant, asked O'Bryan a question about the statement he was alleged to have made at a previous time. O'Bryan answered that he did not make such a statement and Diuguid is said to have called him a liar, which brought the quick retort from O'Bryan that Diuguid was a d-m liar. Diuguid made a lunge for the witness, but attorney M. E. Gilbert counsel for the plaintiff, and others interposed and kept down a fist fight or worse.

Judge Lang told the mad men that "this is a big court" and should not be mistaken for a prize ring. After the principals were made quiet the trial proceeded and the witnesses and the attorney got into another argument that would have caused them to test strength had not prompt interference prevented. The court again admonished the principals that a battle was not on his docket and commanded the bell ringers to keep cool and sit steady in the saddle.

When the case was concluded Attorney Diuguid was escorted from the court room and to a distance of safety by the sheriff while friends guarded O'Bryan. The case was decided in favor of the plaintiff. Paducah News Democrat.

## PULLING OUT

### Insurance Companies Started Withdrawing Saturday Owing to Green-Glen Bill.

Paducah, Ky., March 7. — As expected more fire insurance companies withdrew from Paducah and the state Monday and such action doubtless will continue until every agency in the state has left it, with the exception of the two that are chartered in this state. Agents generally admit that the situation is slowly approaching a crisis, as when policies terminate the holder will not be able to obtain any more insurance, which will leave his risk absolutely unprotected. But in the meantime there is a possibility that the status may be compromised by agreement of state officials not to enforce the Green-Glen bill, pronounced the most drastic measure of its kind ever promulgated in any state, and if accepted here will be followed by other states. It was reported Monday that one large company had withdrawn from the state with the intention of never returning regardless of what was done.

Announcement received from Louisville was that twenty-seven fire insurance companies of a total of 409 doing business in Kentucky had already withdrawn the authority of the Actuarial bureau to represent them in the state. While this did not mean that these companies had yet withdrawn from the state it was regarded as a preliminary step. In fact messages received in Paducah by agents have been very authentic and commanded the agents to discontinue business.

Murray agents have also been notified of the withdrawal of a number of companies doing business in this city, and one local representative stated to the Ledger that it was his opinion that unless some agreement could be reached at once that every company would quit this place within the next week or ten days.

## A Former Kentuckian Writes.

Roswell, N. M., March 9. Ed. Ledger, Murray, Ky. I thought of my old Kentucky home this beautiful Sabbath and thought it might be some pleasure to my old Kentucky friends to hear from me and this section of the country.

We have not had but one very light snow this winter. Willow trees are green, the Cottonwood is budding and the early spring flowers are blooming. My yard is a solid mass of blue grass and is about two inches high.

As to the farming in this section will say it is devoted principally to growing alfalfa. About

all necessary here to grow this crop is to turn on the water in the spring after cold weather is passed. From four to five cuttings are harvested each year and only irrigation required for each cutting. The yield ranges from one to two tons per cutting per acre and is worth from \$10 to \$16 per ton. This is also a fine fruit country and we nearly always have a half crop in spite of the cold weather. We use snugg pots to save the fruit. The pots are placed all over the orchard and filled ready for lighting and when the temperature gets to 32 degrees the alarm is given by fire whistle and telephone messages, and it requires but very few minutes to light the pots in an orchard from 10 to 40 acres. Prospects are good so far for a full crop of apples.

We have about eight or nine thousand population in our town and quite a few of them are Spaniards. We have a pretty town and the people are going to start paving the streets soon. Mrs. R. H. Gunter.

### Well Known Citizens of the County Answer the Final Summons During the Past Week.

Wm. Purdom, one of the most widely known citizens of the county, and for many years a resident of this city, died at his home in the east part of town last Sunday night about 11:00 o'clock after a lingering illness of the infirmities of age. He was 76 years of age and one of the most splendid citizens of the town. He always took an active interest in the affairs of the county and made scores of friends. He was a Confederate soldier and served with distinction and credit as a soldier. He is survived by his wife and one son, Edgar Purdom. The burial took place Monday at the Miller grave yard east of the city.

H. H. Phillips, a resident of the county south of Murray, died last Friday night after a long illness of stomach and bowel trouble. He was about 75 years of age and was well known as one of the good men of Calloway county. The burial took place Saturday at South Pleasant Grove after funeral services by Rev. J. C. Rudd.

Ewing Broach, who resided north of Penny, and about 70 years of age, died the past week after illness of considerable duration of a complication of diseases. He was one of that section's best known citizens and has many relatives throughout the county.

Kelsie Curd, aged about twenty-six years, and a son of Lonnie Curd and wife, of Penny, died at the hospital in this city Thursday morning at about 2:30 o'clock. He had been in failing health for some time and was suffering of a bladder and kidney trouble. He underwent an operation Tuesday and until late Wednesday night his condition was thought to be improved, when a decided change for the worse developed and he passed away at the above stated hour. His death comes as a great shock to the family and many friends in the city and county. Kelsie Curd was a boy possessed of a fine sense of honor, true as steel and easily made friends. Always jolly, richly endowed with keen sense of humor and will be missed among those who knew him intimately and admired him for the excellent qualities he possessed. The body was removed Thursday morning to the home of his sister, Mrs. John Melugin, where funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon by Eld. Etheridge, after which the body was buried in the City Cemetery.

Hudie Alexander, son of Mack Alexander, and who lived near Kirksey, died last Saturday morning after a several months' illness of consumption. He was about 25 years of age and is survived by a wife. The burial was in the Mt. Carmel grave yard.

#### Total Church Membership.

The total membership of all churches in the United States, as given by Dr. Carroll, is 37,280,370. This is an increase in membership over 1912 of 655,908. The Methodist bodies had the largest gain of the year, the various Methodist denomination having increased their membership 220,000. The Methodist Episcopal church, North, alone showed a gain of 122,242. This church is the largest Protestant denomination in the country, having 3,415,768.

The Roman Catholic church showed the next largest gain for the year, 212,500. The Baptist bodies were next to the Catholic in growth, their increase having been 64,608. The Presbyterian bodies (twelve in number) gained 45,649. The Lutherans were fifth, with a gain of 36,120. The Disciples of Christ, or Christian church, were sixth, with an increase of 21,824.

The net gain of the whole number for the year was, on the average, one and eight-tenths per cent.

With respect to size of membership the denominations, according to Dr. Carroll, occupy the following order:

First, Roman Catholic, church with a membership of 13,572,961. Second, the sixteen Methodist bodies of the country, with a membership of 7,125,069. The third, fifteen Baptist bodies numbering 5,924,662. Fourth, the twenty one Lutheran bodies, with a membership of 2,388,721. The fifth, the twelve Presbyterian bodies, numbering 2,027,598.

The membership figures of the other large bodies of Christians in the United States are as follows: The Disciples of Christ, 1,519,369; the Episcopalians, 997,407; the Latter Day Saints, or Mormons, 356,000; the United Brethren, 328,000; Evangelical bodies, 187,045; the Brethren, or Dunkards, 119,460; six bodies of Adventists, 98,822; two branches of the Salvation Army, 27,474.

## Lingerie Ribbons Embellish Undermuslins



**N**ARROW satin ribbons plain or dotted, and wide weaves of the same kind, are pictured here made up into ribbon ornaments to be pinned or tacked to petticoats, nightdresses, corset covers, etc.

Wash ribbons of excellent quality, from one-half inch to two and a half inches wide, are used for these handsome ornaments. They are furbelows, pure and simple, serving no purpose of utility. But they are a feature of lingerie styles present and to come.

The narrowest ribbons are made up in rosettes like those shown in the picture. Pendant ends are tied in tiny butterfly bows, or knotted loops are knotted at the center. At the back these little rosettes are to be sewed to very small safety pins, and with them pinned to the petticoat or nightdress or combination. Flower forms are simulated in the rosettes and pendants in bows of this kind, or a bolt of ribbon is made up to two plain rosettes joined by a short length of ribbon, as shown in the picture.

For lace-trimmed petticoats the rosette of dotted ribbon an inch and a half wide, shown at the left, is the favorite design. The satin surface, when the ribbon is of good quality, which stands much wear without be-

coming soiled. The decorative ribbons need not be laundered, but may be cleaned with gasoline.

A very handsome garniture is made of about four yards of ribbon two inches wide in plain satin, and is shown at the right of the picture. This is to be worn with one of those lace nightdresses in which the deep yokes are all of lace or net. Many of them have over a petticoat make attractive negligees, and the adjustable ribbon decoration comes in very handy for embellishing them.

A large blanket-bow of wide, dotted satin ribbon, made for the baby's carriage blanket, is shown at the center of the picture. It requires at least four yards of ribbon about five inches wide to make it full enough, and five yards is not too much, for there is a cluster of four small, knotted loops at the center and two knotted ends at the back.

Made in the same way, of narrow ribbon, is a single rosette. This is one of those separate, small pieces which may be used where she will, on a cap or gown or petticoat—wherever a little touch of color will add something to the scheme of lace-trimmed and dainty garments.

## Girdles for Dancing Frocks



**T**HE liking for broad girdles that swathe the waist and extend them selves below and above the normal waist line is fostered by the new dancing steps. These require so much freedom of the whole figure that the successful management of the waist becomes a matter of great importance. Two-piece gowns, especially, must be provided with girdles which more than cover the waist line. Then, if the various dips and whirlings and glides which have captivated the dancing world cause the waist and skirt to part company the broad girdle hides this disarray.

Two new designs, among those known as "Tango girdles," are pictured here. One of them is made of velvet ribbon in a delightful reddish yellow nautarium color, combined with a cream-colored gauze ribbon with small pink roses and green foliage embroidered on it. The combination is a thing of beauty in colors.

In making this girdle an edge of the gauze ribbon is basted to the underside of the velvet ribbon for that portion that extends above the waist. The short standing loop is made of the two ribbons also basted together. Stitches are carefully put in and invisible, on the right side of the velvet ribbon.

There is a hanging end of velvet ribbon with a tassel of the gauze ribbon basted along one side. This end is finished with a small bow tied in the

velvet ribbon. There is a second shorter end of the velvet ribbon alone. The knot at the base of the loop is of half ribbons.

It happens that the colors combined in this girdle will harmonize with almost any light-colored gown and are particularly good with cream color or gold. Just now there is a craze for pale yellow and soft gold colored gowns made up with plenty of fine laces. A girdle like the one just described is lovely with such a gown.

The second girdle is made of satin ribbon in three pale colors—light blue, light pink, and heliotrope or lavender. The ribbons are gathered over a cord along the edges and where they are joined. Each ribbon is about four inches wide. The standing loop is short with a knot of the three colors at its base. There are three short ends graduated in length, one of each color.

As an exquisite finishing touch, small half-blown roses, made of the three colors, are set primly across the bow below the knot.

The Tango girdle provides a simple gown with all the embellishment it needs. A fine gown of white or cream voile made up with lace and having a variety of girdles with corresponding accessories, will prove a valuable possession for the girl who loves to dance. If there are any girls who do not, they must be lovelorn.

## IS WITH THE PEOPLE

Reason for Popularity of Democratic Administration.

President Wilson Has Disregarded the Unscrupulous Men of Wealth and Power Who Ruled the Republican Party.

President Wilson is the champion of the coming man, rather than of the one who has arrived at wealth and power. He is champion of those who work with their hands to produce wealth, not of those who scheme and plot with cunning brains to steal wealth which others have created. He is spokesman and attorney for the man next to the ground, the quiet, patient, ill-rewarded worker, on whom at last the prosperity of the nation and the world must rest. To quote his own words:

"The treasures of America do not lie in the brains of the small body of men now in control of great enterprises. . . . It depends upon the inventions of unknown men, upon the obligations of unknown men, upon the ambitions of unknown men. Every country is renewed out of the ranks of the unknown, not out of the ranks of the already famous and powerful in control."

President Wilson is the first occupant of the White House since Lincoln to take such a stand, and, like Lincoln, he has made himself the apostle of fair play. He does not ask that the "unknown man" on whom so much depends shall be coddled with government favors, but he does insist that the unknown shall have a fair chance.

This thought runs through all the bills he has backed. The new tariff law lifted a staggering burden from the backs of the unknown poor. The currency law will release the money of unknown depositors from Wall street speculation, and apply it to useful industry. The antitrust legislation the president is now laboring to secure will open doors of opportunity to hosts of unknown but ambitious youngsters, who otherwise would spend their lives doing some one else's bidding at so much per week.

### Again the Sugar Trust.

The sugar trust has cheated the United States treasury of import duties by "fixed" scales, thus emulating the trade secrets of rag buyers and irresponsible fish peddlers.

It has bribed government employees, and fed weak clerks in the federal service into practices which have sent them to prison.

The secretary and treasurer of this trust, Charles R. Heike, was convicted of conspiracy to defraud, and would have served a prison sentence but for the misplaced leniency of former President Taft. It is good to note that signs of a similar clemency are lacking in the present administration.

The sugar trust had planned a nice little riddle game, like the one which which Standard Oil worked on the federal courts—with the valued assistance of Taft's attorney general, Wickersham. When the present attorney general, McReynolds, refused to sanction this bunko game, the trust declared that it would fight dissolution. May it get all the fighting it wants.

### Law Is in Safe Hands.

It is generally taken for granted that the income tax law is going to be enforced. The taxes will be collected and there will be precious little successful dodging.

All that is because the law is a federal law and its administration is in United States government hands.

If a law as complicated and involved as this income statute is, were a state statute, think what trouble there would be in enforcing it. Consider how little real tax money would find its way into the state treasuries as the result of it.

The federal government has a way of doing what it sets out to do. The politicians don't dare "monkey" with it. The state court cannot interfere and the federal courts are usually discreetly disposed to keep hands off.

### The Way to Achieve.

When President Wilson addressed congress on the need of currency legislation before the tariff bill was out of the senate, wise politicians said: "Too bad to confuse the situation that way; now he won't get either measure."

He got both, and he is going to get a lot more.

The fellow who doesn't recognize obstacles is the one who gets things done.

### Democratic Party Triumphs.

For twenty or thirty years the Republican party shirked its duty in the revision of the banking and currency system. The Democratic party has performed that task in the first year of its power, and it has done it in a way that meets the objections the most "eminent" financial authorities have made to the present system.

### No Issue But the Tariff.

Mr. Taft's declaration that unless a panic or business depression comes the Democrats are likely to win again, is merely a repetition of a fact repeatedly stated in this discussion of the political situation. The Republican party, while it has not asked every thing upon the tariff, has relied largely upon the protection issue as its stock in trade. If it shall happen that the distress predicted to occur under a Democratic tariff law does not materialize, the Republican position will be hard to maintain.

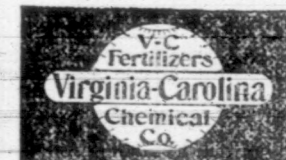
