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# POWERS HELD OVER

WITHOUT BAIL.

"I Think He Was Engaged In A Conspiracy  
To Assassinate Goebel."

SAID JUDGE MOORE.

Taylor's "Pardon" Was  
Promptly Turned Down.

TRIAL OF CULTON.

(SPECIAL TO NEW ERA)  
FRANKFORT, Ky., March 27.—  
JAMES POWERS WILL STAY IN  
PRISON UNTIL THE GRAND JURY  
INVESTIGATES HIS CASE.

That is the decision of  
JUDGE DAN MOORE.

The trial session in the examining  
hall of Powers began this morning at  
nine o'clock in the county court.

The defense moved that the case  
against the prisoner be dismissed.

Judge Moore overruled the motion.

The defense then presented the "par-  
don," signed by W. S. Taylor, which  
was found on Powers' person when he  
was captured while trying to escape.

The court refused to recognize the  
"pardon."

Judge Moore, when the attorneys for  
the defense submitted the case, at 10:00  
o'clock, held Powers over to await the  
action of the April grand jury, without  
bail, on the charge of being an access-  
ory to the murder of Gov. William Goebel.

In announcing his decision in the case  
Judge Moore said:

"I do not believe that  
Powers fired the shot that  
killed Goebel, but I think  
he was engaged in a con-  
spiracy to assassinate  
Goebel."

The trial of W. H. Culton was set for  
two o'clock this afternoon.

The court then adjourned until that  
hour.

WHAT WITNESSES  
HAVE PROVED.

(SPECIAL TO NEW ERA)  
FRANKFORT, March 27.—The case  
against Caleb Powers, as established by  
the prosecution, is as follows:

By Witness Eph Lillard, Sr., it was  
shown that Goebel fired the bullet  
from a revolver, as established by  
the testimony of the executive building.

Witnesses testified that to his best  
knowledge and belief the report of two  
shots came from the Secretary of State's  
office. Jones says he was in the ex-  
ecutive building near that room at the time  
the shots were fired.

W. B. Anderson said Caleb and John  
Powers met near the hotel at  
Bartonsville prior to the shooting of  
Goebel.

F. Wharton Golden, friend and life-  
long associate of the Powers boys, gave  
the following details under oath:

1. That Caleb Powers was a leader  
in bringing "mountain feudists" to the  
city of Frankfort.

2. That John Powers, the day before  
Goebel was shot, gave the key to the  
Secretary of State's private office to a  
man with a black mustache, black hair  
and black eyes.

3. That John Powers remarked the  
morning of Jan. 27, "Goebel is going to  
be killed today."

4. That John Powers said "they had  
two negroes here to kill Goebel—Combs  
and Hooker."

5. That the then Acting Governor  
Taylor remarked to E. J. Howard, of  
Hartsville, Ky.: "My God, you fellows  
want to kill the man who is the most  
popular man in the state; you all  
ought to be hanged."

6. That John Powers said: "I can  
get the militia quick enough after you  
all act."

The defense did not in cross-examina-  
tion weaken the evidence of the prosecu-  
tion.

The examining court held Caleb Pow-  
ers over without bail to await the action  
of the April grand jury.

18. What is your occupation, trade or  
profession? (This question applies to  
persons ten years of age or older.)  
19. How many months during the  
year are you employed?  
20. How many months have you at-  
tended school?  
21. Can you read?  
22. Can you write?  
23. Give the main facts concerning  
your education.  
24. Do you own the house in which  
you live?  
25. Do you rent the house in which  
you live?  
26. If you own the house, is it free or  
mortgaged? (The same question applies  
to farms.)  
27. All the occupants and employee of  
a hotel, if they regularly sleep there,  
make up, for census purposes, a family.  
28. One person dwelling alone is returned  
as a family.

## Warrants For Prominent Republicans.

(Special to New Era.)  
FRANKFORT, Ky., March 28.—Detective Armstrong left last night on a train for Eastern Kentucky, and it is reported that he has warrants for more prominent Republican State officers and others equally as prominent. It is stated that these warrants are based on information furnished by W. H. Culliton to the prosecutor. Culliton is a deputy under Auditor of State Sweeney and served three years previously under Auditor of State Stone. Culliton was in the executive building previous to the execution of Sweeney and at the time of the latter's execution, and it is said he has held confidential conferences and conversations with the State building during January, Oct. 2, O. Campbell and Arthur Coughlin went to Cincinnati yesterday.

## COURTS MUST DECIDE.

The Louisville & Nashville, Illinois Central, Southern and Chesapeake & Ohio railroad companies have deposited in a Frankfort bank to the credit of the "State Treasurer of Kentucky" the sum of \$200,000, the amount of taxes due to the State from the companies named, and have filed in the Frankfort Circuit Court suits to determine whether the money is properly payable to the Democratic State officials or to the Republican claimants.

## Kansas Exposition.

TOPEKA, Kan., March 28.—Preparations are being made for the big exposition to be held here in 1904. In celebration of the fifth anniversary of the organization of the territory of Kansas. A committee composed of one member from each county has been appointed to promote the enterprise.

## SUN'S TOTAL ECLIPSE.

The total eclipse of the sun, which the astronomers assure is due on May 28, is the first one visible in the eastern half of the United States for many years, and it will not be repeated.

## YOUTSEY TALK-ED TOO MUCH.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 28.—The Courier-Journal says this morning: The latest development in the Goebel assassination is that H. E. Youtsey owned the rifle from which the assassin fired the fatal shot. Youtsey is said to have purchased the steel bullet cartridge and to have exhibited with the tragedy an empty shell with the remark: "The bullet that was in this shell killed Goebel." Directly after the shooting Youtsey is said to have fled with the rifle in his pocket to the basement and then to Taylor's office. After the tragedy Taylor is said to have urged Youtsey to leave Frankfort. Other startling evidence has also been adduced as a result of the confessions. The military which had been secretly assembled in the arsenal was provided with overcoats and cartridges an hour before the shooting, and was in full marching order.

Capt. John Davis and Holland Whitaker were the messengers who rushed from Taylor's office to that of the Adjutant General as soon as Youtsey arrived and reported what had been done.

Davis has been unable to give bond and is still in confinement.

W. S. Taylor has left Frankfort for Butler county, owing to the death of his sister. He spent the night in Louisville.

## WANTS WOMEN.

Director Merriam, of the census office, has sent a circular letter to representatives who have not already made their full quota of appointments, requesting them to furnish women instead of men as far as possible. It is said that women work the tabulating machines much more rapidly and accurately than men.

## PNEUMONIA

Causes Death Of George W. Shaw.

Former Well-Known Citizen Of Hopkinsville Passed Away Wednesday Near Fairview.

Mr. George W. Shaw, whose critical illness was noted in the last issue of the New Era, died yesterday afternoon at five o'clock at his home near Fairview. Pneumonia, from which he had been suffering only five days, caused his death.

Many friends of Mr. Shaw in Hopkinsville, where he formerly lived, will learn of his death with deep sorrow. He was a gentleman of high intelligence and refinement and his death is mourned by all who knew him. He was a life-long and constant member of the Methodist church. Politically he was an ardent Democrat.

Mr. Shaw was born in Christian county in 1834. He was a son of the late William Shaw, a pioneer citizen, who was of Scotch Irish descent.

Mr. Shaw was twice married. Three children, Mrs. S. P. Egan, Walter M. Shaw, and Edna E. Shaw survive him. He was successfully engaged in the business of raising and breeding horses for many years, and at one time was a member of the Western Kentucky Association for the Incurable. Mr. Shaw moved from Hopkinsville to Todd county in the Fairview vicinity about six years ago.

Funeral services were held at 12 o'clock today at the Fairview Methodist church. Rev. D. S. Bowles conducted the service. The interment took place in the Shaw family burying ground near Yagham's Chapel.

## NOTHING TALKED OF

In Frankfort But Culliton's Confession.

WHAT HE DIVULGED

ri. E. Youtsey Brought Into Court.

TAYLOR INTERVIEWED

(Special to New Era.)

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 28.—H. E. Youtsey was brought into court this afternoon. The date of his trial has not yet been set.

W. S. Taylor's sister died last night at Morgantown while he was en route to attend his bedside.

Taylor says that he recalls the Supreme Court of the United States as the final arbiter in the governorship case.

Nothing is talked of here today but the alleged confession of W. H. Culliton. One of the men who was present when Culliton made his statement says of the revelation of Culliton:

"He evaded the man who, he says, fired the fatal shot, and he has not given the names of all who were in the room. With this man, these names are not now given out to the public, as there are detectives on their trail, whose lives might be in danger were it known in the regions where they are seeking the men implicated by W. H. Culliton."

Culliton's statement implicates Republican Governor Taylor, Republican State Treasurer W. H. Day, Republican State Auditor Sweeney, Republican Secretary of State Caleb Powers, H. E. Youtsey, Culliton himself, and other persons whose names must not be made public just yet.

"Of these men, Caleb Powers, Youtsey and Culliton are the only ones under arrest. Warrants have not yet been issued for the others."

Culliton declared that the plot which culminated in the assassination of Goebel was hatched at several conferences between Taylor, Powers, Sweeney, Day, Barker and himself. He said that Taylor was present at one or two conferences.

"The confessions, Culliton said, were made in Frankfort, in the office of Republican Governor Taylor and Republican Secretary of State Caleb Powers."

"Taylor was not present at any of the conferences, Culliton said, and these were held in Powers' office. Those confabulations at which Taylor was present, he said, were held in the Governor's office."

Culliton further said that ex-Gov. W. O. Bradley had been asked to join the conspiracy, but had refused, and had advised against the plot, with which he refused to have anything to do.

Culliton also declared that Republican Adjutant General Culliton had nothing to do with the conspiracy he detailed to the attorneys.

"Culliton disclosed everything that was told by Goebel, and much more, he said. He went into the very heart of the great conspiracy. He said there were two distinct plans—one to shoot down democratic Legislators to give the Republicans a majority in both branches, and the other to assassinate Goebel. He declared that Goebel was shot with a steel bullet from a 30-caliber Remington-Union cartridge, fired from a Krup-Jorgensen rifle."

## DEATH OF GEN. JOUBERT.

(Special to New Era.)  
FAIRFORD, March 28.—Gen. Joubert, commander of the Boer forces, who died here Tuesday night of pneumonia, will be buried today.

His successor in the chief command will probably be Gen. Louis Botha, now commanding in Natal.
