In addition to caring for her dairy herd and helping her father on his farm, she has managed to win two county grand championships for her clothing projects.


Miss LeGrand's project has been to raise registered Polled

Closest test points to this area include Bowling Green, Ky. at the main post office; Memphis, room 306, post office building, or Nashville, room 704, 1717 West End building.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

UK Students "Create" Own Final Exam

Hope Is Seen For Fulton Libraries

FULTON, Ky., Jan. 11—Proponents of Fulton County's library system were a little more hopeful of retaining the libraries following a public meeting held here tonight.

The meeting, held at the library, attracted a crowd estimated at 250 persons—both proponents and opponents of the library tax which is necessary to keep the libraries in operation.

At the suggestion of Joe Davis and Paul Westpheling, Fulton businessmen, a committee composed of persons opposing the

tax was named to meet with the library board.

Those named to the committee included Harold Hewitt, Bobby Caldwell and Scott DeMyer. Julius Falkoff, representing the Hickman Chamber of Commerce, was also named to the committee.

The library board is composed of Mrs. Robert Rudolph, chairman, Mrs. Ernest Fall, secretary, Mrs. Kent Hamby, treasurer, Richard Wilkerson and Mrs. J. W. Ammons.

The advisory board is composed of Mrs. Arch Huddleston, Dr. J. L. Jones, Jeff Lester, and Joe Barnett.

It was pointed out that the county stands to lose \$131,020.80 in books, supplies and services if the libraries are closed.

Mayor R. Gardner of Hickman and Mayor Gilbert DeMyer of Fulton indicated their willingness to personally go to Frankfort in an effort to seek aid and advice.

Gardner pointed out "there is no end of petitions" that could be circulated for and against the library project.

A spokesman for those opposing the 6c per \$100 evaluation tax said the opposition stems from the amount of the tax and the method it was enacted.

The Fulton County Fiscal Court recently accepted a petition seeking removal of the special library tax, applied for the first time in 1967. Previously, the court had accepted a petition requesting the tax for support of the county library system.

The special committee appointed tonight is expected to meet with the library board soon—and prior to the next public meeting scheduled for the second Thursday in February.

First Class By Air

WASHINGTON — The Post Office Department plans to eliminate air mail as a separate service and send all first class letters by air at the new six-cent rate, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien announced today.

O'Brien said that for all pur-

poses the Post Office already is sending nearly all first class mail by air.

"Very, very little of this is being handled by the railroad. We have what closely approximates a total airlift service now," he told a news conference.

Within the last year the Post Office has connected more than

500 cities in a nationwide airlift network.

"As a result, 75 per cent of all first class mail deposited before 5 p.m. is now being delivered the day after mailing, and 90 per cent is being delivered within two days," he said.

O'Brien emphasized, however, that under the present system use of a 10-cent airmail stamp

still guarantees air transportation until a new single class priority mail service is formally established.

He said that in 1969 the Post

Office will ask Congress to eliminate the air postage rate and to merge airmail and first class into the new single class of priority service.

2 whole eggs	2 egg whites
2 egg yolks	1 Florida orange, sectioned

Combine 1/4 cup of the sugar, flour and 1/4 teaspoon of the salt in a saucepan. Combine eggs and egg yolks, beat slightly with fork, then add to dry ingredients. Add milk and mix until well blended. Stir in orange juice and rind. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cool. Pour into serving dish and chill. Meanwhile, add remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt to egg whites and beat until stiff, but not dry. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar and beat until very stiff. Drop meringue by spoonfuls into shallow baking pan with bottom just covered with hot water. Bake in 350° F. oven about 10 minutes. Serve on chilled pudding, garnishing each meringue with orange sections.

YIELD: 5 to 6 servings.

Says Almanac Forecasts Best

Atlanta, too." Geiger said Farmer's Almanac forecasts, prepared by astronomer Harry Bule of Inverness, Fla., are 90 per cent accurate.

"He (Bule) uses sun spots, tidal action and astronomical information, plus a secret formula," Geiger said. "Then, if he's still wrong, we blame it on the Lord."


