KILLS FATHER

Christian County Girl Slays Parent in Defense of Her Own Life—Wounds Brother.

Hopkinsville, Ky., March 4. The coroner's jury in the case of Miss Olive Cayce, 20 years old, who shot and killed her father, Irving Cayce, yesterday when he threatened to strike her with a chair, today returned a verdict of self-defense. Miss Cayce's brother was accidentally wounded when he attempted to protect his sister.

The tragedy occurred at the home, five miles from this city. It is said that for some time Mr. Cayce had been given to fits of temper, and that an altercation arose in the dining room between Mr. Cayce and his wife and daughter.

The girl, according to the report, ran to her room, her father pursuing her. In the girl's room Mr. Cayce seized a chair and declared he would kill her, and Irving Cayce, Jr., aged 18, attempted to prevent Mr. Cayce from carrying out his purpose.

In the meantime the girl had secured a pistol, and as her father continued to advance, she fired two shots. The first bullet passed through her brother's wrist, as he was attempting to hold his father, and into Mr. Cayce's body. The next ball struck a vital spot, and Mr. Cayce fell to the floor and expired almost immediately.

DELIVERED

City Water Works Bonds Amounting to \$23,000 Delivered the Past Week to the Paducah Purchasers.

H. B. Gilbert, the chairman of the water and light committee of the city council, was in Paducah Friday afternoon of last week and delivered the \$23,000 worth of city bonds to W. E. Covington, the purchaser, and the money received from the sale of the bonds is now on deposit with the three banks of the city.

As soon as a survey of the city is made and contract for the construction of the plant can be closed work will be commenced on the plant and rushed to completion. It is now believed that the work can be commenced not later than April and within five months from the date the plant is expected to be completed and ready for use.

In conversation with a member of the committee the Ledger learns that a municipal lighting plant will possibly be installed at the same time the water works plant is constructed.

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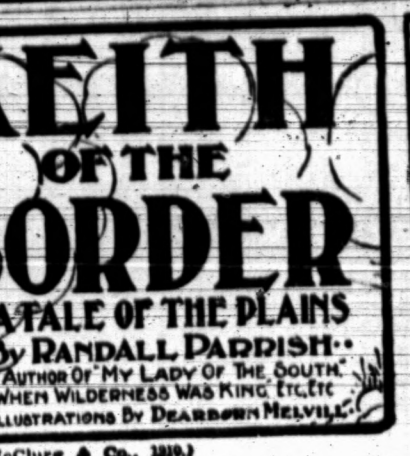
