KENTUCKY RAILROADS.

Commission Ends The Work Of Assessing Their Property.

The Kentucky Railroad Commission has completed the work of assessing the property of the railroad companies appearing in the state for taxation for the present year. The total valuation on all kinds of property is \$93,433,000, an increase of \$24,771. The companies to be assessed at the highest figure will be the Louisville & Nashville at \$10,000,000 for the main system. This is no increase over 1900.

Hopkinsville People Celebrated Thanksgiving.

Impressive Union Religious Services Held at Baptist Church.

From Thursday's daily.

Thanksgiving Day is being universally observed. The schools and colleges, banks and postoffice are closed.

The day is a national and state holiday in accordance with proclamations issued by President Roosevelt and Gov. Beckham. The first presidential recognition of a day of thanksgiving was when President Washington named January 1, 1795. The custom of giving thanks in the autumn of the year for the year for the blessing of the harvest goes far back into the early history of mankind.

The first Thanksgiving proclamation issued in America was by the Pilgrims at Plymouth, Mass., in 1623, on which Nov. 29 was named, the same being Thursday.

The celebration of Thanksgiving Day in this section of the country may be called an evolution. The custom of observing a special day was brought from the New England states, and it had grown into popularity when a proclamation issued by the president of the United States set apart the last Thursday in November as a legal holiday and a day of thanksgiving. Now our whole nation observes this day. Services are held in churches all over the land, religious exercises are carried out in the various institutions in our cities and the American spirit of patriotism and reverence for God are typified in the happy circle of family and friends which gather together.

When our pilgrim forefathers drove their boats upon the New England shores, and stepped upon free soil they knelt down and offered up thanks for their deliverance from a land of tyranny and religious persecution. Since that time a day of thank-offering was observed once a year by the colonists and this custom continued as the colonies grew. This day was originally devoted to strict religious observances.

At the Baptist church this morning, impressive union services were held, and the program as published in the New Era was carried out.

The sermon delivered by the Rev. E. L. Southgate, pastor of the Methodist church, was heard with earnest attention by a large congregation. It was in every respect an excellent discourse. The music was beautiful, and the thank-offering was generous.

Many of the business houses were closed during the hours of service and for dinner.

Last night at Madisonville, where he was arrested by Police Officers Holmes and Thomas. He is one of the intimates of the person who held up the Holston miners at the point of a pistol some time ago, and is under indictment from all that can be learned tonight very important arrests will be made during the next forty-eight hours. The leaders will be taken as rapidly as officers can lay hands on them.

There were sixty or seventy-five men at the scene of the Nortonville camp at 6 o'clock last night, though they are not in tents. There is not a piece of canvas

in sight. The miners propose to await the construction of their hotel, which is now going up. The men are at work on the structure.

The county judge has taken no action regarding the re-establishment of the camp, but is perhaps waiting for the construction of the new hotel.

The funeral of Bert Williams, found dead, occurred yesterday afternoon. Many of the unionists are worked over the death and are doing a great deal of talking about Nortonville. An explicit order has been issued that no outsiders shall enter or approach the camp. This is aimed at newspapermen and others who may venture there in quest of information.

Yesterday afternoon Representative-elect Robert Bradley surprised Madisonville by professing religion. After the prisoners were released from the court, he went to a revival in progress at the Baptist church. He listened to a sermon by Rev. Gailin, after which he went forward, saying he wished to make a statement. He said: "I believe that the Lord died to save me, and for Christ's sake has forgiven me my sins. I love God and want to be united to the church and will do as much good for Christ and his cause as I have ever done for Satan and his cause. I have done more mischief than anybody and am sorry for it and want to be united with the church and live in obedience to all of its rules and obligations."

He was received in the church in the presence of two or three hundred people. Dr. Gailin said this was Bradley's first visit to the revival.

Ex-Policeman J. W. Hancock, who shot William Bradley in this city, was released on \$500 bond. He will be tried about Monday. Bradley is able to sit up

and walk.

It looks like it will take a larger military force than now is here to move the strikers this time.
It is feared that serious trouble is ahead.
The union—The United Mine Workers of America—has let the contract for a frame house, 30x100 feet, at Nortonville, for a permanent "camp."
There has been trouble and bloodshed

at Nortonville and are armed to the teeth. Some carry shotguns and pistols while others are content with a Winchester. The St. Bernard Mining Company, of Nortonville, yesterday was incorporated at Dover, Del., with a capital stock of \$100,000. The objects are to mine for coal and make coke, also deal in real estate. The incorporators are George O. Atkinson and James R. Bask, Bowling, Ky., and E. G. Sebree, Henderson, Ky.
This action is in accord with the announced purpose of the St. Bernard people to surrender their Kentucky charter for the alleged reason that the Kentucky authorities will give no protection.
