Hopkinsville is the largest Fourth-class city in the state, and her interests will be looked after at the meeting by City Attorney J. T. Hanberry. A special meeting of the city council was held last night, and Mr. Hanberry was appointed to represent Hopkinsville at the conference. Mayor Joseph Henry will also attend.

A preliminary meeting was held Monday in Frankfort. Following is a list of the Fourth-class cities of the state:

Ashland, Bellevue, Castletown, Cynthiana, Danville, Dayton, Georgetown, Harrodsburg, Hopkinsville, Lebanon, Ludlow, Mayfield, Mayville, Middlesboro, Mt. Sterling, Madisonville, Nicholasville, Paris, Richmond, Shelbyville, Somerset, Versailles, Winchester.

Important results are expected to follow the conference.

Noted Burnt Cork Attraction Comes February 28.

He will introduce a bill in a few days providing that all bachelors over thirty-five years of age shall pay an annual poll tax of \$10 and every odd lot of that age, who have declined three offers of marriage shall also pay \$100 a year poll tax. Colonel Brown says he has enough pledges from members of the house to pass the bill notwithstanding the violent opposition of the bachelor members including Col. Dave Colson and Col. Webb Wright."

TIME NOT SET.

Dr. Pentecost May Return Here at Conclusion of Henderson Revival.

Rev. Dr. Geo. F. Pentecost has not yet announced definitely when he will return to Hopkinsville. It may be possible for him to come here immediately after concluding the revival he is conducting at Henderson, but this is not certain. An effort will be made, when he returns, to obtain his consent to deliver his celebrated lecture on India.

He gave the address last Saturday in Henderson in response to a petition from great many citizens, and the Gleason said of it:

"The lecture last evening at the First Presbyterian church on 'India' by the Rev. George F. Pentecost may be pronounced the richest intellectual treat ever enjoyed by a Henderson audience. This statement we make without the fear of successful contradiction from any source. For two hours the learned man held his audience—which was an unusually large one—spellbound by his matchless logic and incomparable power of impressing his thoughts upon his hearers. The hundreds who heard the lecture bear testimony to the wondrous power of the great preacher in making himself so easily and acceptably understood. In all he had to say of a country at which he had prior to hearing him comparatively so little information."
