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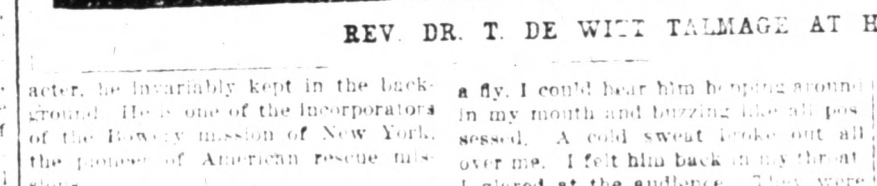

to him was presented to Queen Victoria in 1847, and the king and queen, in recognition of his services to his country, conferred on him the honor of knighthood. His literary labors were not confined to his own country. He was a most fascinating conversationalist. His language was marked by color and vigor, and he was never tired of talking with the originality, never being afraid to show his feelings. When in the city of New York, at the opening of the great festival he exclaimed that he felt "like a morning star." It was not that his taste induced him to do so, but that he was so full of himself, so self-satisfied, that, acting on the impulse of the moment, he seized upon a popular expression of the day. From the time of Mr. Talmage's profanity and starved dignity would not have done such a thing. With him it was the impulsive expression of a free, self-satisfied, untrammelled, over with the loss of humor and the "milk of human kindness." Whether it was a free, self-satisfied, untrammelled store of rich, exuberant animal spirits, he was certainly more real and true to genuine humanity than the so-called "superior" and "high" ministerial contemporaries.

Dr. Talmage was three times married. His first wife, from the city of Albany, was of Brooklyn. A son, Thomas, who died in his nineteenth year, and a daughter, Jessie, were the fruits of this union. His second wife, who lived the last of his life when Mrs. Talmage was evidently drowned in the Shay rail accident, was a native of New York, and marriage was with Miss Susie Whittemore, and five children were born to them, the eldest, Frank, being the only one who survived his father. Again bereaved by death of his matrimonial companion, he married, in 1870, a daughter of the city of Allegheny, who survives him.

## WORK FOR THE CLUB

### TENNESSEE CENTRAL TO JOIN I. C.

Route Should Be Surveyed From New Providence To Hopkinsville.

Here's work for the Commercial Club. The Tennessee Central railway has been surveyed to New Providence, Tenn. It is known that a connection with the Illinois Central is desired. Arrangements have been made by the engineering corps to run a preliminary line to Gracery. A survey and in every way to better route would have Hopkinsville as its objective point.

The Clarksville Leaf-Chronicle says:

"Chief Engineer F. M. Blaboe, of the Tennessee Central railway is in the city on an inspection tour of the work done in this county by the engineering corps. In company with Engineer Blanchard, he drove over the different lines that have been surveyed. They went over Ridge and River line. They also went over the line surveyed through New Providence and before Mr. Blaboe returns to Nashville the camp, which was recently removed from New Providence to Kennedy, Ky., will be visited."

"The surveyors are now engaged in running a line to Gracery, Ky., where a connection with the Illinois Central might be made. This preliminary line will be completed next week and the camp will be removed to a point a few miles on the other side of New Providence."

"It is understood that as soon as the survey to Gracery has been completed the corps will begin a new line down the river to Cairo, Ill."

**ASSESSMENT**

**IN CHRISTIAN IS INCREASED.**

FRANKFORT, Ky., April 16.—The state board of equalization has passed finally on the assessment of property in the counties of Carlisle, Hickman, Henderson and Christian. The work of the local assessors was raised as follows: In Hickman, 10 percent on farm lands; in Carlisle 10 percent on farm lands and 5 percent on town lots; in Henderson, 3 percent on farm lands; in CHRISTIAN, 3 percent on farm lands and 5 percent on town lots.

## CROP OUTLOOK.

### Reports Regarding Fruit Are Still Conflicting.

The latest Kentucky crop report is summarized as follows by the weather bureau:

Wheat improved greatly, but is very poor in many localities in the east and central portions.

Tobacco beds were sown, but are generally late.

The reports on fruit are very conflicting; some saying that peaches are all killed, and others claiming that while certain varieties are badly injured or killed in certain localities, there is a chance for a fair crop in many places. Other fruits appear to be in fairly good condition.

Oats sowing and garden planting progressed fairly well during the latter part of March, but farm work is somewhat backward. Many lambs were killed by the severe weather during the early part of March, but stock are generally in fair condition.

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## MASS CONVENTION

In Each County For Appellate Race.

District Meeting To Name Judge at Paducah July 22.

Pursuant to the call of Chairman Mott Ayres, the Democratic committee of the First District met at Paducah Tuesday for the purpose of naming a time and manner of nominating a Democratic candidate for judge of the court of appeals of this district to succeed Judge J. D. White of Bardwell.

The committee was in session most of the day, convening at 10 o'clock. It was decided to hold mass county conventions in each county of the First appellate district to name delegates to attend the convention. Paducah was selected as the place of the big convention.

The Democratic committee is composed of the chairman of each county committee and most all were present in person or by proxy. Judge G. H. Bush, of Christian county, was represented by proxy.

The First appellate district is composed of parts of the First and Second congressional district and the candidates to succeed Judge White are:

Judge Cook, of Calloway, county. Judge Robbins, of Graves, Judge Nunn, of Hopkins and Judge Dorsey of Henderson. Judge White of Carlisle is also a candidate for reelection.

Judge Thomas P. Cook, who was in Paducah expressed himself as highly pleased with the decision of the committee.

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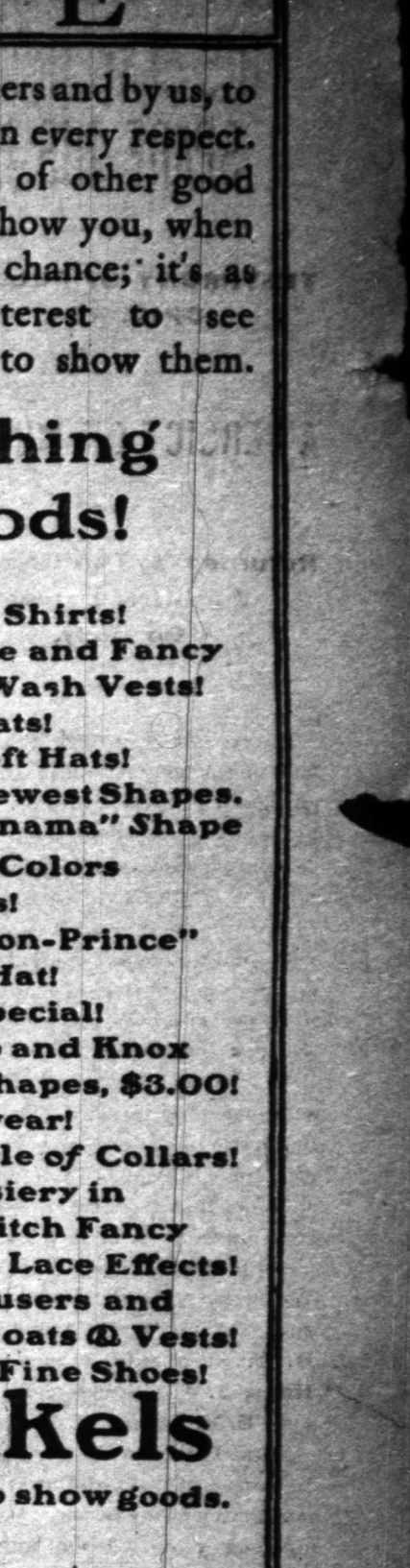
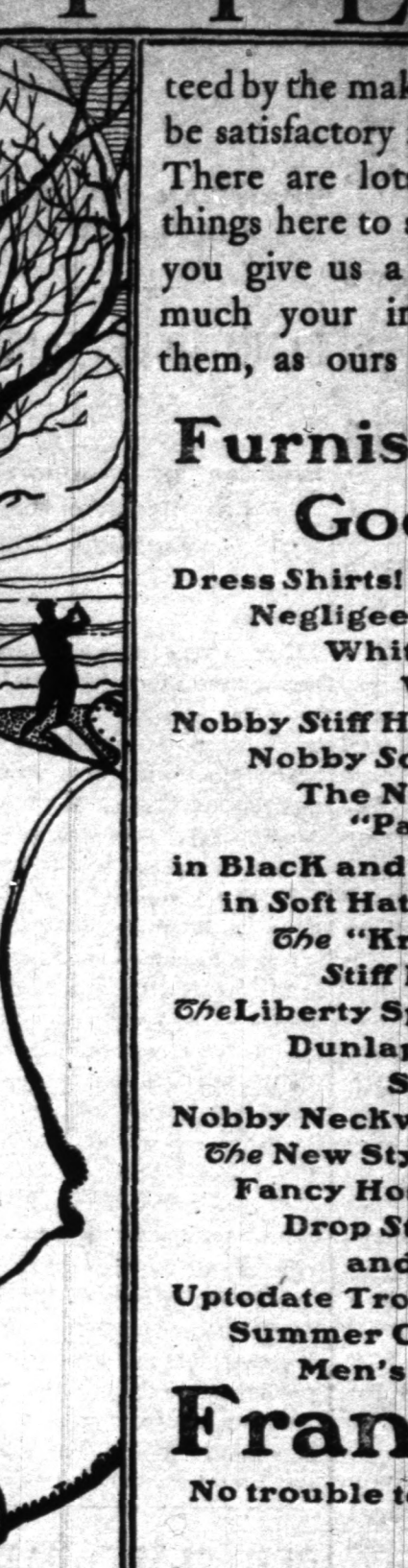

## GATES' SUPREMACY

IS NOW NO LONGER IN DOUBT.

But The Southern Is Not Interested In The L. & N. Deal.

NEW YORK, April 16.—The Louisville & Nashville situation, which had hung menacingly over Wall street for a week or more, is cleared by the undisputed statement that John W. Gates and his associates have wrested control of the property from the Belmont party and are in absolute possession.

The following statement was given out by the J. Pierpont Morgan banking house:

"At the request of Messrs. Harris, Gates & Co., who on their own independent account have recently made large purchases of Louisville & Nashville railroad stock, Messrs. J. P. Morgan & Co., as bankers, have consented to take control of the stock so purchased and to receive the same on deposit."

"They have so consented solely to relieve the general financial condition and not for the benefit of any railway company. The Southern Railway has no interest, direct or indirect, present or prospective, in this stock, or in its purchase or deposit. Messrs. J. P. Morgan & Co. are acting with the cordial assent of Messrs. August Belmont & Co."

On this statement being shown to August Belmont at his residence he read it over carefully and then gave out the following typewritten statement:

"I have been aware of the negotiations by which J. P. Morgan & Co. have consented to take control and deposit of the stock of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company, purchased by Harris, Gates & Co. The statement by Messrs. J. P. Morgan & Co. just made public has my unqualified approval and there will be no contest for the control of the Louisville & Nashville railroad."
