Victim of Heart Disease. He Leaves a Large Estate.

GUTHRIE, Ky., Aug. 7.—William F. Taylor died yesterday after a short illness from heart failure. The deceased was 76 years old on the day of his death and passed away in the house in which he was born.

He was a man beloved because of his upright character and many charities. He leaves a very large estate, having had business interests in Clarksville and Hopkinsville as well as in this place.

His nephew, Milan Flack, of Hopkinsville, was made administrator without bond.

ANOTHER ARREST

MADE IN THE COFFEY MURDER CASE.

Five Men Now in Jail and Two are Out on Bond.

James Merrick, one of the men recently indicted for complicity in the assassination of Sheriff R. H. Coffey, chief of the Empire guards, was captured at Grand Rivers by Detective Fred Porter and lodged in jail here. This is the seventh man arrested in connection with this murder. Five of them are in jail here and two, Jim Will Anderson and Barrett Wiley, are out on bond. The cases will be called at the September term of circuit court.

The men who are in jail besides Merrick are Francis Drake, John Woodruff, Guy Reynolds and Charles Blackburn.

FURTHER DETAILS

OF THE TERRIBLE DAWSON ACCIDENT.

Run Down by Freight Train --Sad End to Day's Festivities.

From Thursday's daily.
The New Era's exclusive story of the terrible accident at Dawson Springs yesterday covered the principal details of the shocking occurrence. Mrs. Johnnie Smith, of Paducah, and Mrs. Lucy Stevenson, of Hickory Grove, were killed, and Miss Fredonia Flint, of Paducah, Miss Edith Stevenson, of Hickory Grove, and Mrs. Nichols, of Lewis, who jumped from the bridge, were seriously injured, and Miss Nichols will probably die. All were members of the I. C. employed excursion party of over 2,000 people. They were out walking and were run down by a freight train.

The trestle is at the end of a sharp curve. It is about a 150 feet long and the women had reached the center of it when a long freight train, bound for Louisville, rounded the curve. Before it began, the engineer could stop the train it was upon full speed, and the entire train of cars passed over the women's bodies before it could be brought to a standstill.

F. D. Flint, father of Miss Fredonia Flint, was near when the accident occurred and saved a younger daughter by swinging from a pier with the girl in his arms.
