In the Sheriff's race Waymon Smith drew first; Ed Clark-second; N. D. Hill-third; Henry Callison-fourth; "Shonk" Graves-fifth; and Paul Roberts-sixth.

In the Judge's race-"Friday" Cagle drew first; John E. Cruce, the incumbent-second; Roy McNeill third; "Buck" Meneses-fourth; and George F. Somerfield-fifth.

James Amberg, the incumbent drew first in the Attorney's race and Joe W. Johnson-second.

Don Henry drew first in the County Court Clerk's race and the incumbent, Dee Langford drew second.

Walter Voelpel drew first in the Coroner's race and the incumbent, Don Chaney-second.

Incumbent Baker Minton drew first in the Jailer's race, Ancil Mansfield-second and Frank Mooney-third.

Ruth Johnson is unopposed in her bid for re-election as Circuit Clerk and Elmer Murchison has no opposition for Tax Commissioner.

Governor Nunn Is Supporting Henry Maddox---

Is This A Deal For Henry's Support To Keep 5% Sales Tax?

IT'S NO LIE, MR. MADDUX

As a candidate for State Representative in the Democratic Primary, I have noticed there is an unusual interest being shown in the outcome of my race by Republican Governor Louie B. Nunn. Nunn administration workers are becoming increasingly active on behalf of my opponent, Henry Maddox of Fulton County.

One wonders what the Nunn administration owes Mr. Maddox—or what Mr. Maddox had to do or promise to do in order to gain support from the opposition party. Those of us who have known Mr. Maddox for several years have come to wonder if perhaps he has not filed under the wrong party name.

State workers across Kentucky are being told to contribute to a campaign fund, I am informed, to help Governor Nunn elect to the State Legislature people he can control. It becomes apparent that Gov. Nunn believes Mr. Maddox will look with favor on the administration's program of higher taxes.

In an advertisement last week Mr. Maddox implied that I am a liar because I have suggested that voters should find out for themselves how he voted on the 5 cents Sales Tax issue. He claims to have opposed the tax, when in fact he failed to vote (on March 5, 1968) when an amendment was offered to amend the original 5 cent proposal to only 4 cents. Mr. Maddox failed to vote on the same issue (on March 6, 1968) when given a second opportunity to express himself as a member of the House of Representatives. He failed to vote on two more occasions when amendments were offered to exempt food, clothing and medicine from the tax. When an amendment was offered to exempt only food and medicine, Mr. Maddox again failed to voice an opinion and did not vote. Finally, on a fourth attempt to gain exemptions, an amendment was offered that would have left food items off the list to be taxed; but Mr. Maddox did not vote on the question. During the days of March 5 and March 6, 1968, when the Sales Tax issue was being thoroughly discussed on the floor of the House of Representatives, Mr. Maddox failed to register either his objection or approval on six important questions. Now he says the tax should be kept at 5 cents (even while he boasts of opposing it only 14 months ago).

We would ask Mr. Maddox why he finds it necessary (if he is the good Democrat he claims to be) to court the Nunn administration workers. To be more specific, we ask Mr. Maddox what possible business, while campaigning for a Democratic Primary, would cause him to visit the state highway maintenance garage in Bardwell? All of the employees there—even the one-time Democrats—are registered as Republicans and can not vote in a Democratic Primary. Could Mr. Maddox have been discussing Gov. Nunn's demand for financial support from the workers? Or was it, perhaps, the administration's order to highway workers to help beat Ralph Graves?

While Mr. Maddox is explaining his connection to the Nunn administration, perhaps we shall learn why he was "allowed" to announce the possibility of a couple of road blacktopping jobs in Hickman and Carlisle counties. Not in our memory has a State Representative ever been so endowed. That is a privilege governors and highway commissioners always reserve for themselves. Yet, just before this election, Mr. Maddox released to one newspaper a story that revealed he had been "informed" that one road is to be blacktopped and another road "is under consideration".

Mr. Maddox also announced publicly at Wickliffe last week that he had reminded the Commissioner of Agriculture (a Republican) that being "up for reelection" he would like to have a mosquito spray plane brought into the area. Is one to assume that mosquitoes bite only before elections?

And, too, we would like to know what has happened to the Rural Secondary road money budgeted for our district? One county has not had spent one dime of the RS funds budgeted under the Nunn administration. Is it because neither Gov. Nunn nor Mr. Maddox believe in a fair and equitable distribution of road fund taxes as called for by state law?

I am told the Governor has indicated he will not commit state support to one of the district's biggest promotional activities until he reads the election returns in one of the four counties. Governor Nunn and Mr. Maddox would be well advised to remember that the American way of life has no place for that sort of assault on the voter's intelligence.

We all are aware that as a campaigner, Nunn said in November 1967 that he could run the state on far less money than had his Democratic predecessors because he was honest and would kick out the deadbeats. By January 1968, as Governor, he demanded and got the biggest tax hike in the history of the state. What that kind of turn-about makes him, you can decide.

The fact remains, tax collections in Kentucky set a new record for the 10-month period ending April 30, 1969. State fiscal authorities reported on May 15 that total revenue rose 38.6 per cent over receipts in the same period last fiscal year. The total included increases of 75.4 per cent for the sales tax; 25.1 per cent for road fund taxes; 24.6 per cent for individual income taxes; 19.2 per cent for licenses and services, and 74.2 per cent in sales and use taxes on motor vehicles. While all of this was happening, whiskey production and import taxes fell more than 28 per cent.

If you believe, as I do, that we have been taxed far too much, and that our four-county district can prosper only when we send to Frankfort a State Representative who will work for the district rather than for some political machine, vote in Tuesday's Democratic Primary for the candidate who won't sell your rights down the river for personal gain.

Vote for Ralph Graves and send to Frankfort a Representative willing to work and capable of getting your voice heard.

Everett Fund Is Tax Exempt

James O'Hara, district director of the Internal Revenue service, has notified Randall Burcham, attorney for the Robert A. 'Fats' Everett Memorial Foundation, that the foundation itself will be exempt from federal taxes and that all donations to the foundation also may be deducted for income tax purposes.

The announcement was made today by Union City Mayor Charles 'Red' Adams, foundation president.

"We were quite sure that, under federal law, this foundation would be exempt and that folks who donate to the campaign to honor the late Congressman Robert A. 'Fats' Everett would be able to deduct such contributions for income tax purposes," Mayor Adams said. "But it's nice to have it official."

Mayor Adams also announced that a number of additional donations, including several from the Humboldt and Gadsden areas, have been received, raising the total to date to \$13,448.75.

Mayor Adams also mentioned that four congressmen also have made donations to the campaign to erect a statue of the congressman on the lawn of the Obion County Courthouse and to establish memorial nursing scholarships at the University of Tennessee at Martin and general scholarships at Murray State University, where the late Congressman Everett received his degree.

New Plastics Stand Heat Around Range

OLUSTEE, Fla. — Plastic utensils that won't melt when used around the kitchen range may be the result of research at the Naval Stores Laboratory, Olustee, where a plastic has been developed from pine gum that tolerates temperature up to 750 degrees Fahrenheit. Called polyimide-amides, several formulations of the new plastics are now under preliminary evaluation by industry. Uses for wire insulation are another possibility.

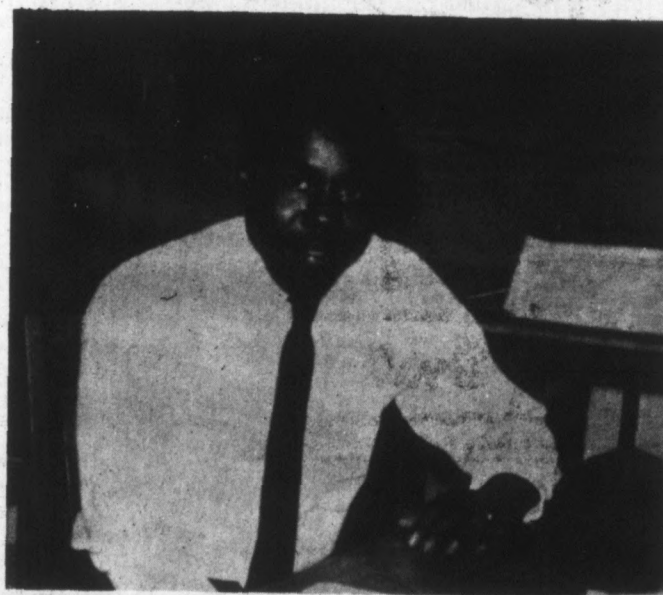

Doctor in the Kitchen®

UNIDENTIFIED FOOD SUBSTANCES

As exciting as "who dunnit" are — and as completely interesting as some television "private eye" series may be — it's my opinion that just as much glamour is present in the detective work now occurring daily in the world's nutrition research laboratories.

We are, in fact, very probably on the threshold of some of the most exciting findings in the history of modern nutrition research. Earlier in this century we began identifying, and realizing the essentiality of, vitamins. Now we are on the verge of determining possible "hidden deficiencies" and minimal needs for so-called "trace" minerals. By this I mean our needs for minute amounts of minerals such as zinc, copper, nickel, aluminum, vanadium, and others. Plant life and other lower forms of life are known to need these minerals for normal functioning. We are beginning to learn that humans need them, too. And human needs for iron in the diet are, of course, well known.

More to be Identified
Equally, we are on the track of uncovering unidentified substances in food that we know are there but researchers must identify and catalogue with respect to human needs. These factors represent the most exciting nutrition research questions facing us today.

How do we know that unidentified factors exist? The device that research "detectives" use is similar to that employed by the scientists who discovered vitamins many years ago. You start with a so-called "purified" diet that contains all the known nutrients in sufficient amounts. This calls for a mix of pure proteins, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals. Fed to experimental animals, and keeping a record of the results in terms of growths and reproductive abilities yields information to the scientist. If he can get better results by adding any natural foods to this diet he can be fairly cer-

tain that natural food contains some unidentified factor — something we don't know about — that is responsible for the better health of the experimental animals.

Many Clues

The next job is to identify exactly what it is that makes the difference. The challenging character of today's research is the fact that many clues are coming to the fore. So are new research techniques for finding answers. Heretofore unknown vitamins, trace minerals, the interactions between various nutrients and their presence in foods in certain balanced amounts, and antitoxic factors are among the unidentified food substances I am talking about.

Research techniques and new systems for analyzing data are reported with increasing regularity.

Until we know exactly what it is that we do not know, nutritionists are anxious that people protect themselves from undernourishment. In other words, because we do know that unidentified substances in our foods of animal and plant origin do exist, it is obviously wise for you to eat a wide variety of food from the four food groups — the milk group, the meat group, vegetables and fruits, and enriched or whole grain breads and cereals.

Adopt Routine

If you do this routinely, you'll be providing for your good health

now. Later scientists can tell you why it was such a good idea. You'll be snug, snug, and secure in the knowledge that you won't be missing needed health-giving food elements.

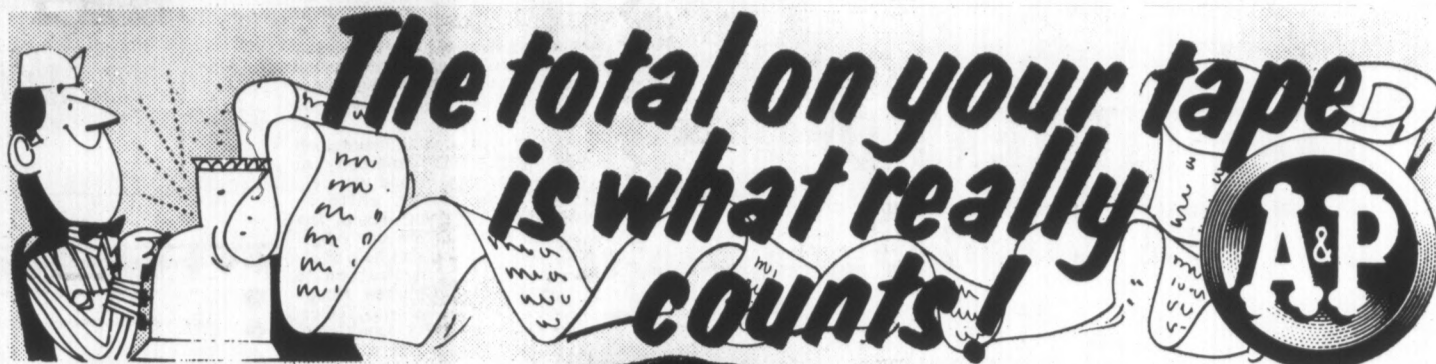

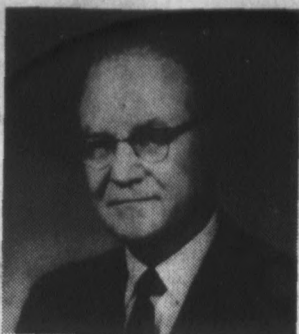

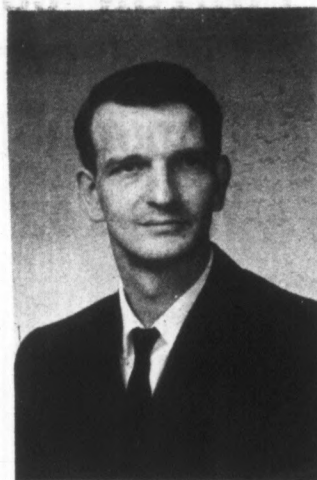

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Lending Your Car

It is common courtesy, when you lend your car to a friend, to fill it up first with gas. But what about checking the brakes or inspecting the tires? If the car is defective and there is an accident, are you legally liable for the consequences? You may be indeed. Take this case:

A man allowed the woman next door—an inexperienced driver—to borrow his car. Although he knew it had a "grabby" clutch, he didn't tell her so. During the ride she lost control of the car, crashed into a tree, and suffered painful injuries.

She later sued him for damages, and the court decided he must pay for his negligence. The

judge said that, under the circumstances, this was the kind of accident he could reasonably have foreseen and prevented.

What if there is an injury not to the borrower but to some third party whom you don't even know? Even then, you might incur liability.

Thus, a man who loaned a car with faulty brakes, without giving fair warning to the borrower, was held responsible for the resulting death of a schoolboy. The fatal accident occurred when, at a crucial moment, the brakes gave way.

That does not mean you have to make a thorough examination of your car before lending it, to discover defects you would not ordinarily know about. Accordingly, a car owner was held not to blame when the steering gear—seemingly all right until then—suddenly jammed while a friend was using the car.

Nor must you warn a borrower about things he can and should see for himself. A man who loaned a car with a dirty windshield was held not responsible for a later collision. The court said he had a right to assume that the borrower

would have enough sense to clean the windshield on his own. All the law demands is that you show, along with your generosity

in lending the car, a decent concern for the safety of other people. As one court said: "When a person lends, he ought

to confer a benefit and not do a mischief. An American Bar Association public service feature by Will Bernard.
