## Fulton's First Fire Truck: A Rare Photo Comes To Light

A rare photo of Fulton's first fire truck, together with the men who comprised the Fulton fire department at that time, has been loaned to The News for publication and will be found elsewhere in this issue.

The picture is interesting for many reasons besides the identity of the men involved. It was taken in 1919.

For instance, it will be noted that the fire department used the identical station at that time that it does today, in the City Hall that was built in 1904, was 15 years old at the time the picture was taken, and today, 66 years later, retains its identical features.

At that time Fulton had dirt streets, which will be noted in the picture. The truck was a right-hand drive model, with wooden-spoke wheels, and electric headlights but used a kerosene lantern for a rear light. It was not a "pumper" truck, but it contained a chemical tank under the driver's seat.

The truck, incidentally, replaced horse-drawn equipment originally located at the City Hall.

Bob Craven, Fulton City Commissioner who has long been identified with local Fire Department activities, loaned us the picture and provided us with identity of the firemen.

## Two Men Hurt As Auto Hits Bus Tuesday

A school bus carrying seven Hickman Elementary school pupils and five Cayce Elementary pupils was struck near Liberty Baptist Church on the Middle Road, Tuesday morning, December 1, by a westbound automobile.

No injuries were reported among the children or their driver, Rev. J. E. Green, pastor of the Pleasant Hill Missionary Baptist Church in Hickman. The children were examined by Dr. Richard H. White as a precautionary measure, and released.

The driver of the car, Mike Cherry, and his passenger, Tommy Lawson, both of Fulton, were taken to Hillview Hospital. Their injuries were not believed to be serious.

Harold Garrison, Fulton County superintendent of schools, said the bus was traveling south on Dalton Perry Road, a gravel road just below the church. The bus was struck on its right side and knocked into a ditch at the Middle Road-Dalton Perry Road intersection. Apparently Cherry tried to stop before reaching the bus, since the car skidded sideways and its left side struck the bus. The windshield of the bus was broken in the collision. The right side of the bus was also badly damaged.

Garrison noted that the Fulton County schools have had an excellent safety record. "We're just happy that no lives were lost," he said. "We can replace buses, but not human lives."

Cherry, 20, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Cherry of 203 Forrestdale, Fulton. Lawson, 33, lives at 404 Collins, also in Fulton.

## Pilots Beat Bulldogs In First Game

HICKMAN, Ky. — Fulton County's Pilots opened their 1970-71 cage season on a winning note here Tuesday night by trouncing arch-rival Fulton City 83-68.

The winning Pilots jumped into an early lead and never looked back. The closest the losers got was within 11 points in the final period.

Doug Goodman, the Pilot's 6-3 1/2 pivot, netted 33 points to lead all scorers in the contest. Johnny Campbell, a 6-2 guard, paced the losing Bulldogs with a 24-point performance.

The Pilots dominated the boards throughout the night, pulling down 52 rebounds to 34 for the visitors. Ron Caldwell grabbed 20 while Goodman captured 18. Fulton County also won the B team game-by a score of 46-26.

## South Fulton Annexation Plan Would Double Area

A public hearing on the proposed annexation of certain areas around South Fulton was held last Saturday morning at the South Fulton City Hall. It was a spirited and sometimes hostile meeting, although the annexation will almost double the city limits of South Fulton and bring about significant growth and development of the Tennessee city.

Chief complaints came from residents who fear commercialization of the proposed area, and from residents who are reluctant to give up their "country" atmosphere of their home sites.

A lone voice of approval came from Parks Weeks, whose lovely country estate will be affected by the annexation program.

Said Mr. Weeks: "We will not be the first or the last property-owners to be annexed into growing communities. I will not stand in the way of progress," he added.

On the other hand, volatile a huge motel and restaurant protests were heard from re-

tired Colonel Robert Whitesell who moved his family here after long service in the Marines so that he could rear his family in a farm atmosphere. He said that the annexation would eventually obliterate this atmosphere.

According to South Fulton City Manager Mike Blake the proposed annexation will take in about a mile of property that extends south to the old Blackwell's Shoe Store on the Martin Highway, to within 500 feet of the proposed by-pass on the Union City Highway.

It has been speculated that chain is vitally interested in a

site along the by-pass, which would bring thousands of overnight tourists into the twin-city vicinity. Options have already been taken on the property.

According to Tennessee law the public hearing was held to hear the views of the affected residents. The next legal step is to read an ordinance of annexation three times and then the legal machinery will be put into motion for annexation proceedings.

In pointing out the annexation plan, Mr. Blake said that he believed some residents, who normally would approve of the annexation, have been misinformed. "I have double checked the increase in city taxes against the decrease in property insurance, and I find that the increase is almost wiped out by the decrease in fire insurance," Mr. Blake said.

Annexation will provide property owners with street lights, sewage, streets, fire protection, and police protection, and all other municipal services available to residents now living within the city limits.

## P. L. Nichols Honored For His Great Contributions To School

P. L. Nichols, retiring principal of Hickman Elementary School No. 2, was honored Friday night, November 27, with a banquet and program at the school gymnasium.

Among the 130 to 140 well-wishers present were teachers and staff members from the school, former students, members of Nichols' family, education, civic and business leaders, and members of the Freeborn Chapel CME Church in Hopkinsville, of which Nichols is pastor.

The program opened with singing of "America the Beautiful" and "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." After the dinner, Maurice Tucker, who teaches fifth grade at the school, introduced the featured speaker, Rufus L. Barfield.

Now principal of Hoffman Elementary School in Cincinnati, Barfield attended Phillips Elementary and Riverview Junior High when Nichols was principal there. He recalled that Nichols taught his students prayers, songs and games, sometimes even joining them on the playground. He said Nichols arranged for school-bus service in the Lower Bottom.

After Barfield's address, Bobby Alston of Union City sang "How Great Thou Art" and Tucker followed with "He."

Nichols was presented with several gifts, including a suit from his wife, a silver tray from his church, and a diamond ring from teachers, aides, administrators, and cafeteria workers at the school.

Nichols' first teaching position was in Carlisle County from 1928 to 1931. He was prin-

cipal at Phillips Elementary from 1931 to 1964, at River-view Junior High from 1964 to 1968, and for the last two years at Hickman Elementary No. 2.

## "Railpax" Terminals Announced But Routes Are Yet To Be Selected

The Nixon administration outlined yesterday its proposed basic network of passenger train routes that would be kept running when a new quasi-governmental corporation takes over the troubled intercity service next spring.

It is a system primarily of short-haul "corridor" routes, yet it would preserve three long-distance lines out of Chicago, to Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Under the plan, six routes would operate out of New York. They would go to Boston, Buf-

falo, Chicago, New Orleans, Washington and Miami, with intermediate stops.

Over-all, the new network represents another sharp contraction in rail passenger service, trimming the national total of passenger trains in daily operation to about 150.

The Interstate Commerce Commission said there are 366 such trains in operation today, compared with nearly 500 at the end of last year and to 20,000 at the peak of rail passenger service in the late 1920's.

### Chance to stabilize service

Despite the further reduction, Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe described the new network as an opportunity to stabilize services, to put the passenger business back on a profit-making basis and to begin rebuilding public demand for train service through major improvements in performance.

"We have set out here a preliminary, economically viable basic rail passenger system to provide high-quality service," Volpe said. "Frankly, I wish that the system could be bigger, more all-encompassing. We have made what I think are rational reductions in the existing and unintegrated passenger train service. But we have done this with a view toward organizing it into a cohesive system and making it a financial success."

The network that Volpe revealed consists essentially of 16 city pairs, which, with intermediate stops, would reach most of the nation's metropolitan areas at least once a day. From Chicago, ten train routes would run to Detroit, Cincinnati, Miami, New Orleans, Houston, St. Louis, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and New York. The only route that would not touch either Chicago or New York would be the link between St. Louis

and Washington.

Louisville is an intermediate stop

Among the intermediate stops are Louisville, Memphis, Cincinnati and Indianapolis. Volpe said the law does not require the new corporation to serve the intermediate cities. Under the legislation, the transpor-

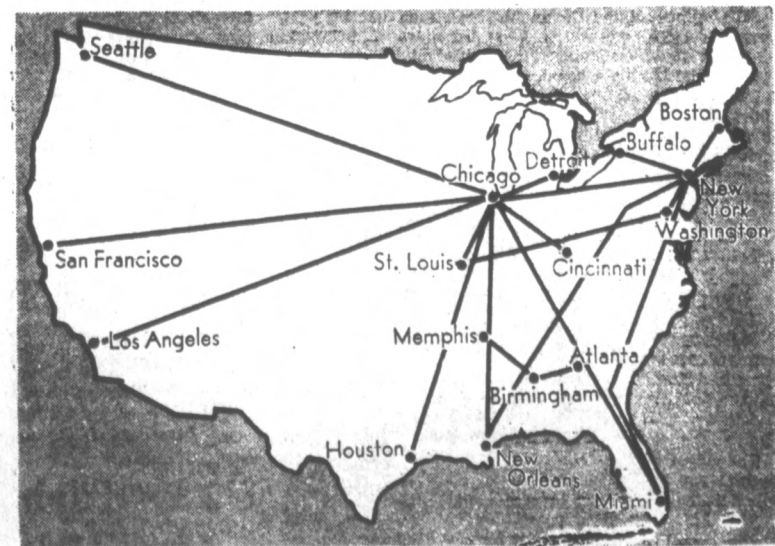
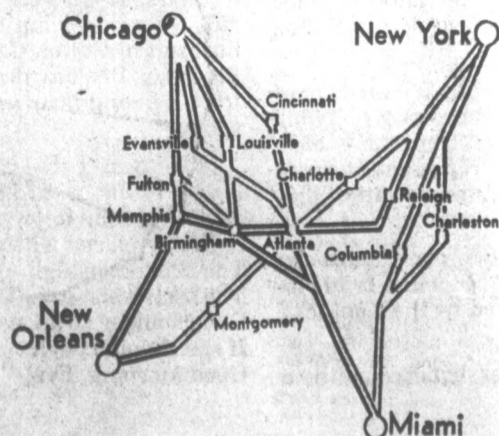

## Editorial On Thanksgiving Day "Must" Reading If We Want To See Ourselves

In the course of the vast amount of reading we do to keep informed on what's going on in the world around us, we come across a bit of writing that is sheer beauty.

Many times these gems are serious, sometimes hilarious, sometimes just plain rhetoric.

Such is the editorial that appeared last week in the Louisville Courier-Journal that comments on the observance of Thanksgiving. Please take time to read it. It is so true to life. It is serious, hilarious, and rhetorical.

Frankly, to us, it just about equals the famous "Dear Virginia," letter at Christmastime, but in a different light of course.

Here's the editorial:

ALL RIGHT, here's the scene: It's the Norman Rockwell bit, the family gathered around the groaning board with its lace tablecloth and greasy turkey, eyes closed as father leads in a prayer of thanks. Junior is stealing a hungry glance at the turkey, sister has braids and a few freckles. Father is work-worn and humble; Mama quivers with fat and piety.

A touching scene, if caloric sentiment is your bag, but hardly typical, if it ever was. Today the average American father will stagger to the table, his eyes popped and glazed from too much football and beer, thankful only that electric knives have eased the labors of the turkey-carver. Mother will struggle to maintain the holiday mood despite the looks of the kids who face the traditional goodies with curled lip while visions of pizza and double-deck hamburgers dance through their heads. Only the dog rejoices, knowing that at worst he will wind up with the candied sweet potatoes.

### Pilgrims Came In Late

But if Thanksgiving isn't what it was, there is little evidence that it ever was. It's supposed to be a

religious thing, started by the Pilgrims, but it was actually first observed in Virginia and was something of a bash. The Pilgrims didn't get into the act until two years later—1621—and then as a celebration for good crops. Even that didn't turn out too well. A few friendly Indians had been invited, but over 100 turned up, knocking the community budget into a peaked hat. With tight little smiles, the Pilgrims served tough, stringy wild turkey, which probably accounted for the subsequent deterioration of relations, and the Indians retaliated by introducing them to popcorn, which has haunted the white man's movies to this day.

The day has caused trouble ever since. It was observed lackadaisically, here and there, until 1862, when Honest Abe Lincoln declared a November Sunday as an official day of "thanksgiving and prayer." Later he made it the last Thursday in November, for reasons never explained or properly defended, thereby upsetting business schedules, breaking perfectly good weeks in two and forcing people to play football on an un-natural day.

### A Bow to Commerce

Possibly because it was a Republican holiday, Franklin Roosevelt changed it in 1939 from November 30 to November 23, and from the howl that ensued you would have thought he had changed God's time or defiled the memory of Miles Standish. Actually, he was only trying to help out the country's merchants, whose holiday shopping season didn't begin until after Thanksgiving. Today it begins so early that half the happy families are bankrupt by the time Thanksgiving rolls around.

Perhaps such a chain of events has taken the edge off your holiday mood. If so, be thankful anyhow, remembering always that things could be worse. You could, for example, be a Pilgrim. Or an Indian. Or a turkey.

## Fulton's Chances Seem Good For Inclusion On The New "Railpax" Passenger Routing

Readers of this page will note that we have closely followed the path of passenger train service in recent months. We have felt, and still feel, that its future determination can be an important factor in Fulton's future. We feel that up-to-date passenger train service is the sleeping giant of the future, and we want Fulton on the system.

With the preliminary announcement Monday of the "terminal" points and the proposed "intermediate" stops, it would seem that Fulton has a better-than-fair chance of being on the new system, assuming the Illinois Central participates in the new National Rail Passenger Corporation. The Memphis Commercial Appeal, reviewing the proposed system Tuesday, indicated that Memphis would be on both a Chi-

cago-New Orleans route and on a Chicago - Memphis - Birmingham - Miami route, which would more than likely run through Fulton. The Commercial-Appeal even listed Fulton on its map as a continuing junction point.

These omens are all good news, just as major highway improvements around us are continuing good news. Fulton is an overland traffic hub, and we would hope that it will always be one. A lot of people living here depend on this traffic for jobs, and modern traffic patterns bring more industrial attention to this area.

A final report will be issued Jan. 28. Within 30 days after it is approved by President Nixon, it must be submitted to Congress, the Interstate Commerce Commission and the various state public service commissions. These agencies have 30 days in which to review and comment. The secretary of transportation then has 30 days in which to consider the comments and to finally determine the system.

All railroads will be invited to participate in the system. Those agreeing to participate will be permitted to discontinue all other passenger service over their lines as of May 1, 1971. Nonparticipating carriers will be required to continue their passenger trains until Jan. 1, 1975.

## Library Corner

KINDS OF LOVE, by May Sarton. This story is about Willard, a small town lost in the rocky hills of New Hampshire. Willard's being is a wide diversity of people able to be themselves because of the quality of life they have found in a place where the natural world is never absent from any hour or day, where wild animals, wild flowers and birds, as well as brooks, ragged woods, dirt roads, and mountains are all woven into the ethos it represents.

CLEAR FOR ACTION, by Noel B. Gerson. He joined the navy at the incredible age of ten. He was given his first temporary command at 13—on a ship that sank or captured more than fifty times its own tonnage in the War of 1812. Half a century later, he committed his entire fleet to a daring Flank-speed attack on mine-filled Mobile Bay to take the city and destroy the entire Confederate fleet, this ensuring the outcome of the Civil War. Guess who? David Farragut!

RACING CARS, by Richard Hough. Here is all the thrill, speed, color, excitement and danger that has had millions of enthusiasts leaping from their seats to catch a glimpse of the battle of the giants. In the comparatively short period of 70 years racing car speeds have leapt from a hesitant 15 m.p.h., with a man with a red flag in front, to nearly 200 m.p.h., and the chattering finishing flag. The acknowledged expert, Richard Hough, tells the story of these years.

PASSENGER TO FRANKFURT, by Agatha Christie.

There were two passengers in the transit lounge at Frankfurt Airport whose lives were to depend on what took place in the next thirty minutes. Sir Stafford Nye was a diplomat returning to London after attending a commission in Mayla. Fox had caused his plane to be diverted to Frankfurt. He would arrive in London two hours late at least. He sat down to wait. A young woman sat down beside him. She seemed vaguely familiar. Then she spoke to him, "May I speak to you?" This casual encounter was to lead to strange and unexpected places, and encounters with unknown people.

GUNS, by Dudley Pope. The invention of the gun has had lasting consequences upon world history and it is the story of the development of his weapon through six centuries which the author has made the center of an engrossing book. He describes and illustrates the technical changes—the modifications, evolutions and revolutions—which lie between the primitive vase-like guns of the fourteenth century and the sophisticated armory of a twentieth-century bomber. In fact it is everyman's gun book for it will both complement the specialist's library and stimulate the layman's interest.

THE HOMECOMING, by Earl Hamner, Jr. When Clay Spencer failed to arrive home at the expected hour that Christmas Eve, his family grew concerned. While his seven red-headed brothers and sisters and his mother kept Virgil, the oldest son, Clay-Boy, went to search for his father. On his

journey through snowbound Virginia hills the boy's adventures were frequently dangerous, often touching, and more often hilarious.

DO NOT FOLD SPINDLE OR MUTILATE, by Doris Miles Disney. At 58, Sophie Tate Curtis was a clown. At 58, she was also a corpse. Playing games with a computer can be a risky business as this Alexandra spinstress learned after she and her bridge club invented "Rebecca Meade"—and mailed a date form to Scientific Associates. It started as a joke but it took a deadly turn.

A PLAGUE OF VIOLENCE, by Hugh Pentecost. Officials of a fund-raising drive for a foundation devoted to the creative arts persuaded John Jericho along with other famous personalities in the theatre, films, ballet and music to act as auctioneers of art treasures. The dawn before the auction an unknown sniper nearly ended Jericho's career forever. The red-bearded painter was one of several guests staying at Alex Bowman's Connecticut estate. Musings From

## The Philosopher

For many years I have enjoyed listening in on the conversation of people who are not supposed to be ignorant but who have rarely taken and opportunity to check on such obvious things as plants and animals and history and geography. Somehow I can tolerate traditional things in people who have had no chance at what used to be called a liberal education; it would be very unbecoming in me, or in you, to waste too much effort in trying to break up beliefs that have lasted a long time, unless those beliefs were doing humanity some harm.

Elderly ladies who have imagined themselves great history buffs have sometimes said, casually, that thirteen states seceded. Once, before I learned better, I asked which ones they were; I got eleven in fair order and was told that Kentucky and Missouri also seceded. You should have seen the lofty look on the dear old lady's face when I questioned her inclusion of Kentucky in the C.S.A. She reminded me of the fact that my own town was the Confederate capital of Kentucky; I tried to show that this was purely a local, provisional government. We never got to Missouri; she knew, I didn't, and, her looks implied, I was a Yankee.

Some twenty years ago, after my TIDBITS had already been running for nearly fifteen years, I attended a meeting of several folklore societies in my original county. A widely-known folklorist from New York asked me what had ever happened to Fidelity. Before I could say a word, a wealthy woman who had spent her entire life within a dozen miles of the place told the gentleman that the village had entirely disappeared, years ago. I felt like a bad-mannered brat when I had to say that it was still there the day before, as I had visited some of my family near there. Did the lady change her statement and say she had confused Fidelity with another village of our native county that had disappeared? Not she; genuine ladies of knowledge and social standing do not admit defeat; let history and geography go hang.

As an outdoor hobbyist I often get put into my place by even well-educated people. One rather good observer questioned my statement that an apple core had five seed chambers; he said it might have as many as six or as few as five. In a long life of devouring apples I have yet to find one with other than five chambers. Maybe I eat the wrong sort. Or maybe observation, backed by books on botany, just doesn't count.

Many times in this column I have laughed at the persistence in the belief that the Bluebird and the Robin are signs of spring. I must have received a hundred telephone calls from people who are interested in birds and usually keep a feeder for them: "The Robin (or Bluebird) is back." "Where has it been?" "Where has it been?" has become my standard reply, but I am sure that I rarely convince even the most intelligent. Anyway, the people are becoming conscious of birds and may learn for themselves some facts that they now ignore.

It has not been many years since a middle-aged, well-educated woman spoke of how artificial ice is made: you put the water into big cans, add ammonia to it, directly, and the ammonia does its work of freezing the solid block of ice and evaporating, all at the same time. What brought up the subject was a queer taste in some ice that the lady had bought from the ice man; she said that some of the ammonia had failed to evaporate. A half mile down the street was, and is, a place that has made ice for many years, run by some courteous men who would show, between calls for the finished product, just how it is all done. We expect superstitions to grow up around things long known; somehow it seems funny when they appear in explanation of common modern inventions.

And then there is the weather, which belongs to everybody but which is often shaped more by Grand pap's pronouncements than by any sensible observations. Aren't we primitive, sometimes?

Most villages and towns are approximately 1,200 years old, with some even older. Grape culture was brought into the district, because of its moderate climate, by the Romans.

In Nierstein is the Fronhof, the old courtyard in the center of town where an annual wine festival is held. It is ringed on one side by the old Roman boundary wall.

Nearby Oppenheim, which began developing as a business center back in 774, has the ruins of the Landskron Castle, built in the 12th Century and last destroyed in 1689. Also here is the Katherine church, built in the years from 1280 and the most famous example of Gothic architecture in the Middle Rhine district.

## Governor Nunn Appoints Ford As March Of Dimes Chairman

Governor Louie B. Nunn announced today the appointment of Lt. Gov. Wendell H. Ford and Kentucky Jaycee President Bob Cobb, Louisville, as Honorary Co-Chairmen for the 1971 March of Dimes. The appointments were made by Mr. Basil O'Connor, President of the National March of Dimes Foundation. The Governor made the announcement at a Kick-Off Luncheon held at the Seelbach Hotel, Louisville.

Governor Nunn said that he is extremely interested in the March of Dimes because of their studies of the relationship of drug abuse to causes of birth defects. "In its studies, the National Foundation has discovered that women who use or have used drugs run a high risk of giving birth to children with serious birth defects," Nunn said. "This should be of great concern to all Kentuckians. When young women buy drugs they apparently do not realize what tragic results can occur to their children as a result of drug usage. The chromosome damage resulting from drug abuse will be passed along to the infant as a congenital defect. It seems to me that even though some young women apparently cast aside all personal regard for their own health, they should closely examine the results drug usage will have on their future children. They are depriving defenseless infants of their birthright: a whole mind in a whole body."

Governor Nunn has initiated a statewide campaign against drug abuse. He conducted a two-day tour of nine Kentucky cities to address community leaders on the problems of drug abuse. The Governor was in Louisville today for the statewide "special session" which he sponsored in order to educate Kentuckians to the dangers of drug abuse and to its extent in the Commonwealth.

Governor Nunn also announced that Keith Hanley of Louisville's Durrett High School would be State Teen-age Chairman of the 1971 Kentucky March of Dimes. "Goody" Dempsey, age 17, of Russellville, will be poster child for the second consecutive year.

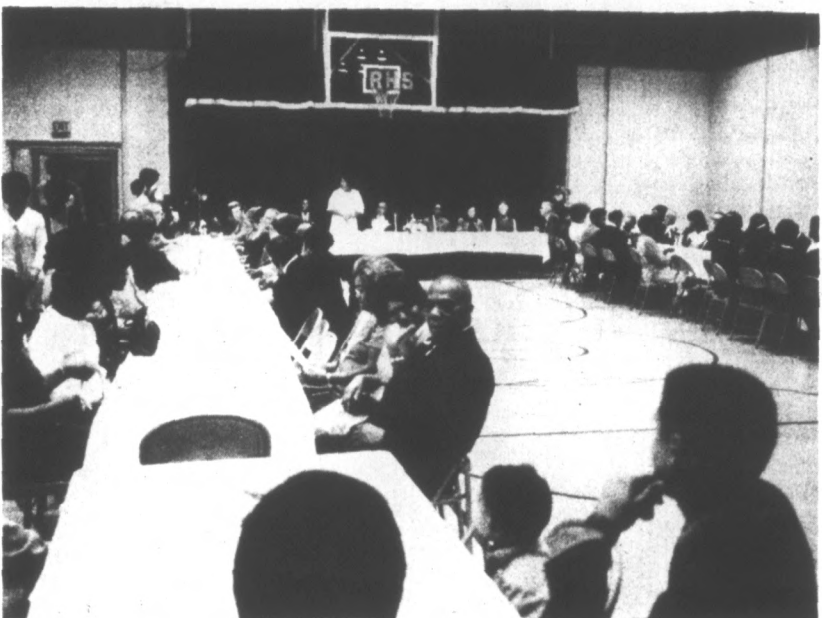

yesterday is along the West  
Coast, where there is no pro-  
vision for service connecting  
Seattle, Portland, San Fran-  
cisco, Los Angeles and San  
Diego.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson,  
D-Wash., and chairman of the  
commerce Committee that  
helped to create the new rail  
corporation, said he is particu-  
larly disappointed that the  
route between Seattle and Port-  
land has been designated for  
high-speed corridor service.

Example of the dilemma  
At a news conference yester-  
day afternoon, Volpe spoke  
of those coastal routes along  
the Pacific as an example of  
the dilemma that confronted  
him repeatedly in building the  
network.

The line between Seattle and  
Los Angeles represents, in  
fact, a heavy traffic corridor,  
he said. Yet demand for train  
service has declined, the par-  
tially mountainous roadbed has

deteriorated, and the railroads  
currently servicing those  
routes (primarily the Southern  
Pacific) are losing \$3 million  
a year on them.

"To have loaded that service  
onto the network would have  
prevented the corporation from  
continuing on a break-even ba-  
sis," Volpe said. "We're not  
going to be able to go back to  
Congress next year and say:  
We couldn't quite make it, we  
need \$50 million more."

Other existing routes that  
would no longer be served in-  
clude those between New York  
and Montreal, Boston and Al-  
bany, and the famed "Sunset"  
route between New Orleans and  
San Francisco.

The network that Volpe un-  
veiled was understood to have  
been trimmed last weekend by  
the Office of Management and  
Budget. It will now be circu-  
lated for comment by the rail-  
roads, the railroad unions, the  
ICC and state regulatory bodies.

The Transportation Depart-  
ment is required to consider  
outside suggestions, but not  
necessarily to adopt them.

## SOUTH FULTON UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

The church building which is pictured above represents the fulfillment of a long-awaited dream. The South Fulton United Methodist Church would like to take this opportunity to share with you the history of this dream.

In the months of 1965 a group of courageous persons met to consider the possibility and potential of a new United Methodist Church to be located in South Fulton, Tennessee. On January 16, 1966 our Christian community first met for worship in a building on Broadway Street adjacent to the South Fulton Cleaners. On that January morning twenty-seven persons presented themselves for charter membership, and the Church of Jesus Christ manifested itself in a new form!

From this inspiring beginning our congregation grew to its present size of one hundred and twenty-eight members. For over three years the members of our Church have attended Sunday school and worship services at their Broadway Street address. Sometimes the roof leaked, and the concrete floor was noisy - but the dream of constructing a new church building never died.

In 1967 the site of the new building was determined, and three and one half acres of land were bought at 205 Orchard Drive. And finally, on February 9, 1969 the South Fulton United Methodist Church held a ground-breaking service at the Orchard Drive site. Time passed quickly, and on August 31, 1969 the first services of worship were held in the new sanctuary. The dream of a courageous group of Christians had become a reality.

At a recent open house many persons of the Twin-City area saw our new sanctuary and educational building. In the future we hope that other persons will visit our new facility and share the fellowship of this Christian community.

On Sunday, church school is held at 10:00 a. m., and worship begins at 11:00 a. m. and 6:30 p. m. Youth groups meet at 5:30 p. m. on Sunday evening. On Wednesday, Bible study is held at 7:00 p. m.

The members of this Church are very proud of their new sanctuary and educational building. But regardless of the joy and pleasure which it brings to our lives, this structure which has been erected at 205 Orchard Drive should not be confused with the "Church."

For the Church is the people, and not the building. The building is only the facility which assists the Church (the people) in fulfilling the mission of love. The church building is the place where Christian people gather to be re-empowered for service in the world. And if a Church limits its influence merely to those activities which take place within its own walls, surely such a Church has missed the calling of its Founder.

The South Fulton United Methodist Church is an enthusiastic and growing community of Christians which gathers for Christian study and worship at 205 Orchard Drive. But it is our prayer that this Church does not exist merely for the preservation of its own agenda of study and worship, for the mission of the Church also includes a program of outreach. Wherever men cry out for mental or physical freedom, wherever there is hunger and despair, wherever life offers no meaning, wherever tears go unnoticed, wherever hate, unconcern and apathy reigns - in all of these places and in a thousand more, the Church must minister.

It is the prayer of the South Fulton United Methodist Church that we, along with the other Churches in the community, be given the inspiration and courage to fulfill the high and holy ministry which Christ has entrusted to His Church.

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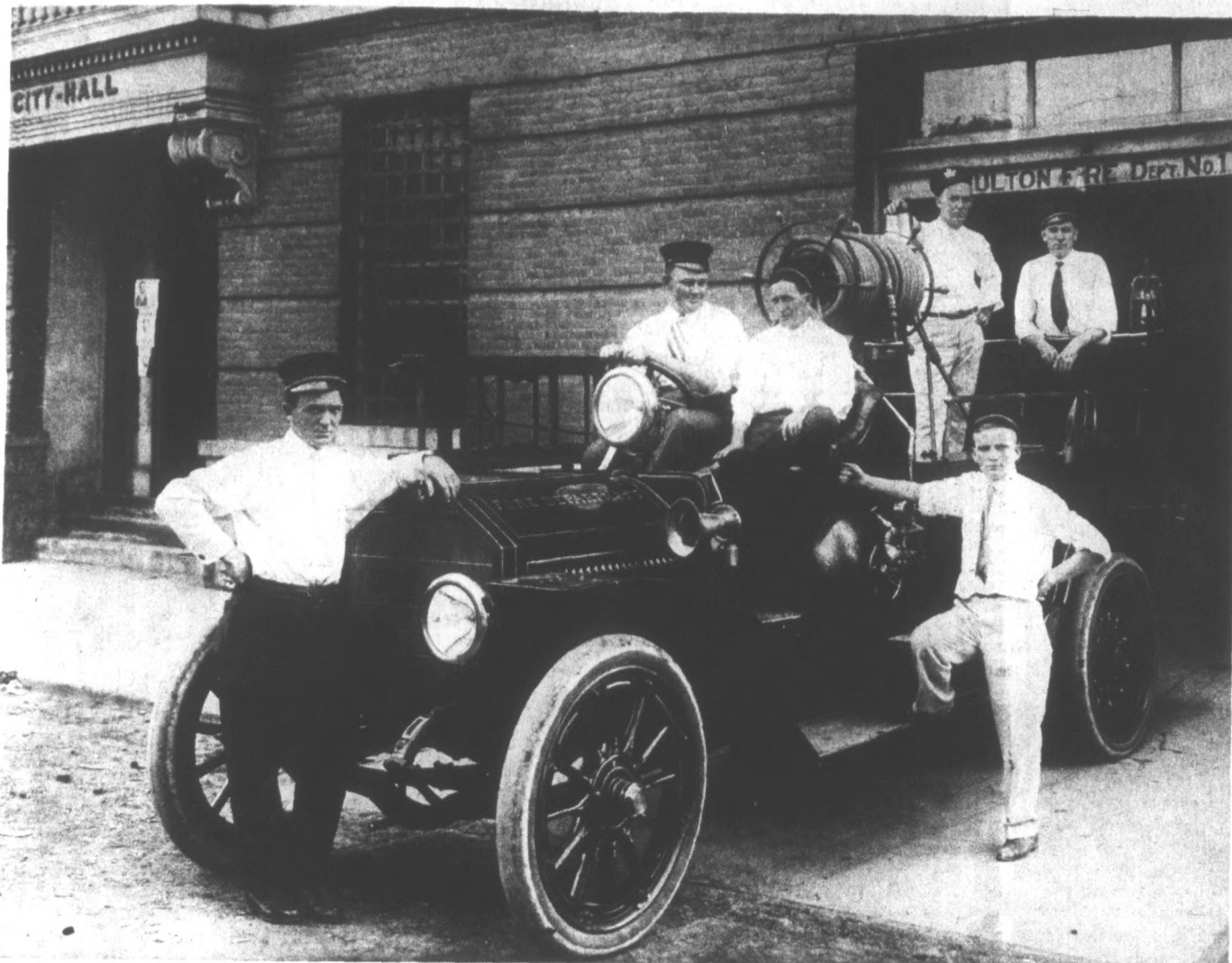

## Hall-Moody Building At UTM Is Destroyed

The once fine Hall-Moody College administration building, which was vacated on the UTM campus this year after 70 years of service, was gutted by an early Thursday morning fire which brought both Martin and Union City firemen scrambling to the scene.

The cause of the blaze was still being investigated.

According to Martin Fire Chief Buster Williams, the security force on the UTM campus discovered the fire in the stairwell shortly before 1:40 Thursday morning.

He said, however, that when the two Martin pumers arrived on the scene the two-story brick structure was 60 per cent involved in flames.

The structure built in 1900, was first used as the Hall-Moody College administration building. More recently, however, it had been used by the UTM Music and Drama Departments.

This fall the Music and Drama Departments were moved into the new Fine Arts Building and the Hall-Moody structure was emptied and offered for sale. It was the hope of the university that someone would remove the 16,349 square-foot structure for the materials. It is estimated that 300,000 hand made brick were used in its construction.

According to Chief Williams, a 15-mile southern breeze fanned the flames and spread sparks over the campus, starting many grass fires.

He said students who live in small wooden houses near the football field were awakened to help fight grass fires threatening their area.

"We had grass fires a half-mile away and one tree even caught fire. I tell you, it looked like this entire end of town was going for a while," Chief Williams said.

In response to the Martin call for assistance, Union City sent one pumper and the aerial ladder truck. These trucks returned at 3:57 while the Martin vehicles stayed on the scene until 5:30.

In addition to battling the numerous grass fires, the fire fighters concentrated on protecting Browning Hall, which stands only 25 feet to the west, and Reed Hall, which is 75 feet to the east and is connected by a wooden walkway.

There was no damage to either of these structures.

The proud old Hall-Moody administration building, along with two dormitories, a frame book store and a dining hall were sold to Martin and Weakley County back in the 1920s. A short time later Weakley County political leaders persuaded the State

Legislature to take over the buildings and grounds and have the institution operated under the University of Tennessee System. For years the institution was known as the University of Tennessee Junior College (UTJC), a name it held until it became a four-year institution.



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# Involvement By Public Is Needed Throughout Country

GILBERTSVILLE, Ky.—Kentucky House Majority Leader W. Terry McBrayer of Greenup Saturday night chided both the violent minority and the silent majority in a speech before the presidential conference of the Kentucky Young Democrats.

Speaking at the dinner meeting of the group at Ken-Bar Inn, McBrayer said "there is nothing wrong with America that getting the public committed

won't cure." The house leader said becoming concerned with government actually means getting concerned with the welfare of the nation and all of its citizens.

He noted the American way of life is subjected to "daily assaults by the vocal minority who are bent on destroying America and everything it stands for and we accept it. We see vio-

lence on our college campuses and depredations on our public buildings, and the perpetrators of these acts are paraded on TV and in the press as saviors of America, not as the destroyers they really are," he added.

McBrayer, who currently is in his third term in the Kentucky House of Representatives, noted that the minority says the American "establishment" is the cause of poverty in the nation.

"Do they realize that Americans on welfare have a higher income than most of the people in China, and India and Italy," he asked?

"They (the vocal minority) say the establishment represses individual freedom. Where else can they get as much personal freedom of speech, thought, behavior and more of every good quality than they can in the United States," he said.

On the war in Vietnam, he said "I realize that we have made some mistakes in the conduct of that war, but Americans have no reason to feel guilty for our honoring our commitments to help this country fight Communist aggression."

## Clinton Youth Will Attend 4-H Congress

CLINTON, Ky.—Gordon Samples, Hickman County 4-H Club member, has been selected as one of fifteen boys from Kentucky to attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Friday through Dec. 4.

He is representing the state in the leadership project which is being sponsored by a major business foundation.

Samples has been active in 4-H for several years. He has participated in the TV Science class by taking the lesson and

teaching it to fifth grade students at Central Elementary School. He also conducted an electricity workshop for younger 4-H members in Hickman County. He has extended his leadership project outside of Hickman County by being president of the Purchase Area 4-H Junior Council, State 4-H ambassador, and governor of Boys State.

Samples also has been nominated as one of Kentucky's candidates to serve on the 1971 Report to the Nation.

The Public Works Committee provision, coming on the heels of a request made by Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., also will allow the Corps to seek jail sentences of up to six months for littering violators.
