## What Is Education For?

Advocates of Universal Military Training believe the best way to avoid war is to train young men to fight.

It sounds like teaching boys to become engineers so they will not build roads and bridges, or to train men to become printers so they won't set type.

"We are born with an urge to kill," we are told. Well, granting that is true, will it destroy that urge to teach us how best to use it?

That question reminds us of a story in the newspapers about the illegal traffic in horsemeat in Chicago.

The purveyors of horsemeat have been killing old horses and mules by shooting them in the heat with .22 rifles and they allow teen-age boys to do the shooting for the thrill.

Their idea is that everybody wants to kill some living thing and that it satisfies this urge to kill horses and mules.

"It may keep them from wanting to kill other things," the horsemeat merchants argue.

Which makes us wonder what education is for. Is it to teach us how to do something so we can do it regularly and permanently? Or is it to teach us how to avoid doing the thing they teach us how to do?

Of course some folks study law to learn how to evade laws and obstruct justice. Most law students study so they may contribute to the majesty of the law.

Untrained American boys won two of the bloodiest wars in history after professional soldiers and sailors of the world's greatest military powers had fought to a no-decision draw which could have lasted for generations.

It is estimated that we have upwards of twenty million men and women who are trained in the arts of war.

And, incidentally, we have a state war as a permanent way of life for the first time in history.

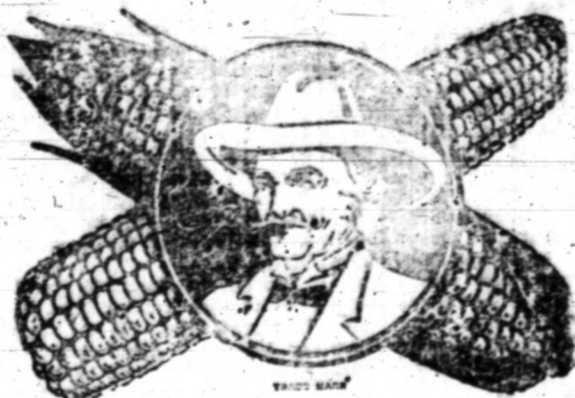
Instead of teaching 18-year-old boys how to use a rifle, or throw hand grenades, why not force them to attend a school of diplomacy?

Some day a Christian nation is going to study how to wage peace instead of war. How to build homes, schools, hospitals, churches, playgrounds, and parks instead of atomic bombs, battle-ships and jet planes.

The world is hungry for that type of education. Why can't we satisfy that hunger?

## SPORTS LINEUP

 Local rivalries should give basketball fans an evening of solid excitement tonight on the college court at St. Bonaventure, one of the seven teams already in the National Invitation Tournament, meets Niagara in one of the top games. In others, Harvard tackles Boston University, Rice meets Texas, and North Carolina State goes against Wake Forest in major inter-state action. Pennsylvania plays Notre Dame and Yale goes against Columbia. In last night's games, Kansas beat Missouri, 83-54; Iowa rolled over Michigan State, 64-32; Indiana downed Ohio State, 93-50; Wisconsin stopped Michigan, 69-53; Holy Cross defeated St. John's 75-76; Bowling Green downed Marquette, 66-67; Tulsa beat Detroit, 62-44; and underdog Notre Dame ripped New York University, 75-71, in overtime.

The Rochester Royals have a chance to fatten their lead in the western division of the National Basketball Association tonight. The Royals play host to last place Milwaukee while second place Minneapolis is idle. In another game, Philadelphia plays at Indianapolis. Last night, Minneapolis rolled over Philadelphia, 109-82 and New York beat Baltimore, 89-84.

The remainder of the Washington squad reports to Orlando, Florida today to start full scale workouts. The pitchers and catchers have been in training at the base since last Friday. Four other clubs, the St. Louis Cardinals, New York Giants, Chicago Cubs and Cleveland Indians, also have their full squads in training.

Kentucky University basketball star Bill Spivey goes before a New York grand jury today to tell what he knows of the basketball scandals. The seven foot center was dropped from the team at his own request this season until his name could be cleared of any connection with the scandals.

Manager Al Lopez of the Cleveland Indians says he believes the team still can use outfielder Ben Chapman who has asked for his release to play in the Pacific coast league this summer. Lopez wants Chapman to visit the Cleveland training base at Tucson to talk over the matter.

Uphester Gil Turner of Philadelphia has boosted his stock as a contender in the welterweight of St. Paul. It's Turner's 29th straight win. Flanagan had won 55 of 56 fights previously.

## UK In Lower Bracket With No Opposition

LOUISVILLE (UP)—The luck of the draw will eliminate one of the two teams given the best chance of upsetting heavily favored Kentucky in the Southeastern Conference basketball tournament starting in Louisville Thursday afternoon.

Vanderbilt, which won the 1951 tourney by pulling off a tremendous upset of Kentucky in the finals, drew into the upper bracket of this year's tourney.

Louisiana State, which with Bob Pettit and Joe Dean is rated second choice to Kentucky, also is in that top bracket, while the Wildcats are down in the lower bracket where the toughest opposition appears to be a mediocre Alabama team.

First-round upper bracket games will be played Thursday afternoon, with Louisiana State meeting Mississippi State, and Vandy facing Georgia. First-round lower bracket games are scheduled for Thursday night with Alabama meeting Auburn and Kentucky opening against Georgia Tech.

## Louisville Falls To Seaton Hall

There was only time for a desperation football pass at the basket after that and Louisville had lost its fifth game of the season. The Cardinals have won 19.

For Seton Hall, it was a come-back for prestige. The New Jersey team is the nation's number 13 team in the latest United Press ratings, but had lost an upset decision to Chicago Loyola over the weekend.

Louisville had one of its bad first quarters. The Cardinals trailed by nine points, 25 to 15 at the quarter, picked up three points in the second quarter, but were far behind, 73 to 61, after three periods.

It was just too much to make up for, although the Louisville team came back gallantly with forward Bob Lochmueller leading the way. Lochmueller had 27 points.

## Coke-Cured Leaf Brings Big Price

O. H. Miller of Wolfe county averaged \$88.49 on smoking grades of tobacco, one basket selling for \$3 a hundred pounds; five for \$90, and one for \$35. He grows Ky 16 tobacco.

Mr. Miller uses coke every year, regardless of weather, firing for 21 to 22 days. He has used the same 11 stoves for the past seven years. Hays Pagan, University of Kentucky farm agent, notes that Miller has a 30 by 80-foot barn, 21 feet to the plate. He puts 24 sticks on the top rail, and one less stick for each successive rail as he comes down.

## Thrifty Retired Soldier Has Feathered Nest

BOONEVILLE, Miss. (UP)—John E. Carter, who made the U. S. Army a career, has a tidy sum now that he's retired, thanks to thrift.

Carter enlisted in 1912 when the pay scale was mighty low for men in khaki. However, he started saving part of his pay with the retirement department at four percent interest.

He saved every month for 39 years, Carter's pay increasing with each promotion.

Carter retired on Feb. 26, 1943, with more than \$20,000 now in savings bonds.

"I am still saving at least \$100 out of my salary (army retirement) and I have in the vault at the bank \$20,000 in savings bonds," he said.

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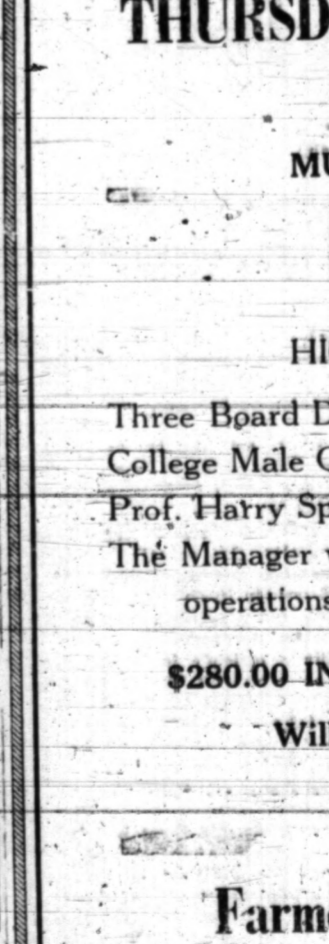

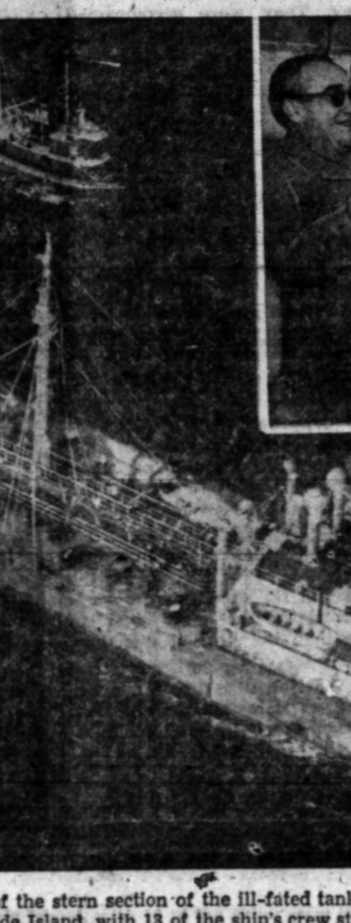

## For Your Poodle Cut In Evening Get The Phony Pony

No need to call on an animal expert. No need to call in a slang-conscious bobby-soxer. It will be plain fashion talk when you hear the expression:

"Pin a phony pony on your poodle."

Or, to put it the long way—if you are not completely happy with your poodle-bobbed hair you can change it into a pony-tail style with a false hairpiece.

Yes, a maker of hairpieces, Joseph Fleischer, even promises a pony tail that will look natural, fastened to the shortest of poodle clipped heads. Calling it the "pony-poodle," he says the short, fluffy hair it's made of will blend perfectly with the wearer's own short crop. What's more, it's designed to conceal short, straggly ends in the back.

Other specially-shaped variations on pony-tail hairpieces have such frisky names as "neigh-neigh nante," "whirlaway," "horse-play" and "leap-year." To give you an example, "whirlaway" is a mass of big soft curls extending straight out at the back of the head and molded into a smooth outline.

The piece called "horseplay" is simply a big soft head hanging free from the crown of the back.

"Maybe you like your poodle cut for daytime wear, but feel the need of a longer coiffure at night. In that case, if you want to spend 25 dollars or more—all you need to do is have a piece of your own hair matched by the manufacturer—and wear the "phony-pony" at will. It's like having your cake and eating it, too.

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## Basket Groceries Costs Two Times More Now

The basket of groceries which cost you 10 dollars in 1929 now costs about two and one-half times as much.

The groceries you could buy for 10 dollars in 1929 cost you 23 dollars and 75 cents a year ago—and now have gone up another dollar and 74 cents.

This increase is shown in a United Press check of the prices on the 26 staples the bureau of labor statistics includes in its typical market basket.

Such items as flour, potatoes, butter, beef and veal all have soared in price since the end of 1950, despite the price control program.

One reason the bureau gives is the defense production act's ban on controlling foods which are selling below farm parity levels. All fruits and vegetables except potatoes still are well under parity, and thus free from controls.

Some food prices have dropped a little—beef and bacon, for example. Others, such as cabbage and eggs, have gone down, largely because of improved crop conditions.

## Homemakers Clubs Join Projects For Community Welfare
