## Jo's Notebook

### A Policy Matter

Monday afternoon I was in attendance at a school board hearing in Hickman concerning the case of a student who was permanently suspended by Fulton County High School officials for disciplinary reasons. The senior student had appealed his dismissal to the Fulton County School Board, as is the right of any student, according to Kentucky statutes.

Since the student was not represented by an attorney, although it was his prerogative to be represented by counsel, the school board granted the request of the student, and his mother, to present their own defense.

The event of Monday afternoon gives this newspaper an opportunity to state its position, as a policy matter, on reporting similar controversies that might arise in school systems, churches, organizations, and any other groups that are guided by codes, by-laws, and rules.

Our policy of long standing is that unless these particular controversies become matters of court record or are detrimental to the common good of a community we are going to protect the right of the individual and the administrators involved by refraining from making them public issues.

The rightness or the wrongness of these purely administrative matters do not become the province of this newspaper for solution.

Certainly you would not have a newspaper become involved in the decision of a church's board of deacons to dismiss its pastor. Nor would you have a newspaper chastise a fraternal group for its rituals, nor a religious denomination for its dogma.

It is abundantly clear that we cannot survive in a society, fraught with controversy and rebellion, if we defy the right of an individual to a public hearing or a school administrator to adhere to the rules and guidelines set forth for application to all students.

### When It Happens . . .

After sitting in on the hearing for about 30 minutes Monday I asked the permission of the School Board's president to explain my departure from the meeting. Actually it

I didn't realize what an "electric" world I was depending on until this week, when a big truck knocked down several poles at the Derby intersection and knocked out our home electric service for part of the night.

At home, we didn't realize that anything had happened until next morning:

The little electric alarm went off promptly at 7:00. I rolled over, congratulating myself on such a good night's sleep, turned on WFUL to listen to the livewire and discovered that it was 8:45. Every clock in the house had to be reset.

The house was cold. The electric timer on the furnace that turns down the heat during the night and up again in time for breakfast was running an hour and 45 minutes late.

The breakfast coffee wasn't made. The electric timer on the electric range that promptly turns on the percolator at 7:15 still hadn't come on.

So after a methodical round of resetting everything indoors that was keeping time for one purpose or another, I finally left for the office.

In making repairs during that day, the local electric system was obliged to cut off the power for another hour or so, as I discovered that evening when I returned. Another round of resetting, then back to the office for the usual night work on Monday evening.

Arriving home after midnight, I discovered that the mass of Christmas lights in the yard were still burning, and they had been timed to go on at 5:00 and off at 10 p. m. I don't know how long they stayed on, but the next afternoon when I went outdoors

## Students To Climb The Well-Worn Steps December 17 For Last Time

It's almost moving time for Fulton High School students. In a couple of more weeks it will be Christmas vacation, and, according to plans, that will be the last session of high school in the venerable old high school building on Second Street.

High school "lets out" December 17th for the Christmas recess, and plans call for its reopening January 4th in its new million-dollar building on Stephen Beale Drive.

Supt. Charles Thomas told The News Wednesday that the final inspection of the new building by the State Department of Education will be made the last of December, and "this inspection will determine when moving from the present building to the new one can be completed." He is optimistic that all is in readiness and that there will be no delay.

To date, only a few chairs and small items have been transferred to the new building. However, Thomas stated, around \$25,000 worth of new equipment has been installed in

the new building, much of it replacing outmoded equipment now in use. Library facilities in the new building are now almost complete, Thomas told The News.

The new gymnasium, in the new building, should be ready for basketball play early in January, Thomas stated, indicating a complete transfer of all present athletic activities from Carr gym.

The new building will provide more flexibility of facilities, and this will add greatly to additional comfort for both students and teachers.

## "Fabulous" Say Fulton Trio Of New York, Washington Trip

Forty-two high school seniors, including three from Fulton, returned to West Kentucky and Tennessee last Sunday afternoon after a 10-day bus trip to New York City and Washington, D.C. The trip was sponsored by the Methodist Conference for Methodist MYF members.

The three Fulton High School seniors included William Mitchell, Rene May and Charles Whitnel, representing the local MYF of the First United Methodist Church here. They attended seminars at the United Nations and in Washington, D.C.

Rene May, in reviewing the trip, had this to say about it: "My trip to the United Nations in New York and to Washington proved to be a memorable experience from start to finish. Our schedule was filled with touring of the cities and visiting places of great importance to our country."

"We saw all of the famous buildings and monuments. Among some of the distinctive sights we saw in New York City were the United Nations Buildings, in which our trip was centered."

"Our study groups included topics such as 'World-wide problems' like population, pollution, Red China, and what role our Church plays in solving

these problems.

"Other places we toured included Riverside Church, Greenwich Village, Chinatown, the Statue of Liberty, and the Empire State Building. Dramawise, I attended two Broadway plays, 'Promises, Promises,' and 'Jesus Christ, Superstar.' The Radio City Music Hall and the Johnny Carson show were among others in this category."

"In Washington our tour included the Lincoln and Jefferson memorials, Capitol building, the White House, Washington monument, Houses of Congress and the Smithsonian Institute."

"My experiences are never to be forgotten, for I met so many different types of people, of so many different origins. Forming new, meaningful relationships was one of the main highlights of our adventure."

"In these years of trouble and unrest in our country, I feel that it is a necessity for all American citizens to know what their country is doing to settle its problems. This is why I am so glad that I had the opportunity to go to the United Nations to learn, study and enjoy."

Charles Whitnel summed up the trip in one word: "Fabulous."

## County Road Work Will Aid Those Unemployed

Highway Commissioner B. E. King today approved two projects for Fulton County to be funded under President Nixon's new Emergency Employment Act (EEA).

The program is designed to provide jobs on public works projects to persons who are currently unemployed. Salaries for the workers are provided by the federal government with the state paying the cost of materials and equipment used on the projects.

The projects approved for Fulton County include reapplying a 1500 foot ditch and cleaning and painting bridges where needed on the Jackson Purchase Parkway.

The total estimated cost of the two projects is \$4,738, Commissioner King said.

The funds allocated for the highway project is Federally-sponsored and is in addition to other emergency funds set aside for county-wide emergency unemployment.

County Judge James C. Menees has been designated by Governor Louie Nunn to administer the \$76,700 emergency funds to be spent on a county-wide basis.

## Retail Business Here Hits Record Levels

Fulton and South Fulton retail stores have been humming with business this week . . . and as matter of fact through all of November, and a NEWS survey this week indicates that December '71 stands to break all sales records in many of the stores.

Fulton retailers have, for the most part, stocked up heavily for the Christmas buying season, the survey shows, and already are experiencing very good business.

To the question, "How's business today," the answers ranged from normal to "good" to "great" to "one of the best ever," to "the best ever." At least three indicated that November shattered all business records.

Christmas buying was termed all the way from "good, but it's just getting started" to "way ahead of 1970." Some firms, of course, do not experience the early-December Christmas rush that others do, but for the most part indicated that things were "normal."

Practically all of the firms surveyed believe that December 1971 will beat December 1970. Comments on this question ranged like this: "think so," "no doubt," "yes," "may be a record," to "will surely break all records."

When asked if December 1970 was a record-breaking December for their firm, about half indicated that it was, and only one indicated that he didn't think his store would beat last December. The consensus was that, barring unforeseen conditions, December could well be a record month for them.

For the past several years, Fulton retailers have enjoyed more and more patronage from the trade area surrounding Ful-

ton, and most readily admit that their increasing business is coming from this area. While there are around 6,500 people living in Fulton and South Fulton, there are an estimated 23,000 living throughout the Fulton-South Fulton trade area, a NEWS survey indicates.

The feeling this week in Twin Cities business circles is one of optimism, despite surveys at the national level appearing in metropolitan papers indicating that manufacturers are cautious and hesitant. At least two local businessmen stated that they are having problems reordering merchandise, since their suppliers have been on a cautious limited production.

It would seem that all of this adds up to one obvious fact: Christmas gift buyers in the Twin Cities and in this area should be doing as well as possible so that they will not get caught short at the last minute. The merchandise is moving well, and it may be hard to restock.

## FCHS Pilots Rout Bulldogs

A 42-point third quarter powered the Fulton County Pilots to a 117-61 drubbing of the Fulton City Bulldogs Tuesday night.

The Pilots, holding a 49-31 halftime advantage, gained those 42 points to the Bulldogs' 12 and took a 91-43 third period lead.

Doug Goodman led all scorers with 31 points—12 of those coming in the third period. Willie Hagler poured in 19 markers—16 coming in the third period, while Scott Wright and Bob Bloodworth added 16 and 14 markers respectively. Tommy Turnbow was close behind with 13 tallies.

The Bulldogs, were led in scoring by Smith with 24 points and Egbert with 17 markers. Fulton County managed 40 percent of its field goal attempts, while adding 39 of 53 gratis tosses for 72 percent.

Fulton City connected on 34 percent of its attempts from the floor, and hit 22 of 34 free throw tries for 65 points.

The Pilots outscored the Bulldogs, 49-29. Fulton County, now 2-0, travels to Farmington Friday night, while Fulton City, now 0-1, hosts powerful Carlisle County.

took me less time than that to see that the student's right to a hearing before the school board was being granted with courtesy and that the school officials were exercising their privilege to follow the guidelines of discipline set forth by the school.

The results of the hearing Monday afternoon remain, as far as this newspaper is concerned, a purely administrative matter. If the case is appealed to higher authorities and becomes a matter of public court record the Hickman Courier will give both sides of the story. So will The Fulton News.

Until then we will not sit in judgment as to the propriety of any organization's rules and regulations.

### A Previous Decision

Many of you will recall that a previous controversy involving school administrators and students reached the highest arbiter, a United States Federal Court. The decision handed down by Federal Judge James Gordon that he would not "thrash in the thicket of school administrative affairs," coincides to the letter with the policy of the Hickman Courier.

But to make a public issue of a distinctly administrative school matter, especially when the legal guidelines are being carefully followed, can only magnify the problem of the student and school officials and certainly we have no desire nor inclination to do that.

A well-known fact is that those who do best in school, business and the professions have one thing in common: they know far more words than the average. They can read easily, write clearly, and talk fluently. The gift of words has probably helped them learn faster and have more fun ever since they entered school.

THE LABYRINTH MAKERS, NOT DO, by Anthony Price. Once a year for twenty-three years it had appeared in the DAILY TELEGRAPH: "Steerforth, John Adair Steerforth, Fitt, Lieut. DZ F. C., R.A.F.V.R. Lost at sea, September 1945. On this, his birthday, not forgotten--Mother." No, John Steerforth had not been forgotten--not by his mother, his widow, his daughter of Russian or British Intelligence, for in the Ministry files, he was a man who even in death was a classified subject. And it is the sudden reappearance of his plane, presumed lost over the North Sea, that begins this exciting novel of adventure and intrigue.

A NEST OF TRAITORS, by John Creasey. A child sleeps--

THE JOURNEY OF AUGUST KING, by John Ehle. Williamsburg: that's the name she has been given, a beautiful young Negro slave, determined against impossible odds to find her way to the North and freedom, and AUGUST KING: a mountain man, constrained by the worst qualities a culture can bequeath, who confronts those odds in the belief that her freedom is his freedom, too.

FLIGHT TO THE LONESOME PLACE, by Alexander Key. What happens when a boy mathematical genius with a computerlike memory finds himself the target of unknown murderers? Like anyone else, he runs! But Ronnie Cleveland can count the people he trusts on one finger. And that one, a strange girl named Ana Maria Rosalita, has more than enough troubles of her own. In Puerto Rico, Ronnie finds Black Luis, another fugitive, and a most unusual ally, Marlowe. Together they rescue Ana Maria from her half brother's fortress.

FLEET SURGEON TO PHAROAH, by Sheldon A. Jacobson. In the year 600 B. C. a young Hebrew priest-physician has no means of saving his wife from dying of rabies. His faith in both his religion and his profession shaken by this confrontation with reality, he journeys from his native Judean hills to Egypt, hoping to gain greater medical knowledge in

this advanced country. The perils of this voyage run counterpoint to the young doctor's inner conflicts as he wins through to maturity and peace of mind.

NEEDLEPOINT FOR EVERYONE, by Mary Brooks Picken. This book contains all the useful information you need to get started and follow through to handsome and satisfying pieces of needlepoint in our American Heritage. There are practical instructions on how to select and buy the supplies you need, choose the design, measure and estimate yarn needs. Then follow a section of needlepoint essentials--how to follow instructions, handling yarn, starting and ending a needleful of yarn, how to work the canvas, etc.

FLUTES AND CYMBALS selected by Leonard Clark. Here is a book to dream on. A noted English anthologist has assembled a sumptuous collection of poetry for young readers. Appropriately the book begins with lyrics, and poems about music; but the heart of a poet knows many different moods and moods. There are also poems of places, poems of seasons, poems of travels, and those that speak of distant times and adventures. One section is devoted to animal poems. And the book closes with a delightful selection of lyrics for holidays and feasting. (Grade 4-Up)

## The Go-Giver

From skid row to abundant living is a capsule story of Vash Young's life. For 30 years he skipped from job to job as a salesman, selling a variety of products to a variety of peoples. With ordinary ability and six grade education he attained only mediocre success.

Until age 38, he admitted he was a complete flop and failure. He became cynical, disappointed and disgusted with living. He confessed that up to that time if anybody had offered a prize for drinking whisky he would have either won or tied for first place. After losing most of his friends and money, he decided to commit suicide. He had reached wit's end.

Registering at a small hotel in a town in Texas, he bought a quart of whisky and started drinking his courage. But he over-trained and drank so much he passed out. Next morning he found himself the most miserable creature in the world... because he had even failed at committing suicide... and he knew that he had failed at everything else.

But then something happened as he expressed it: "I decided to stop being a fool." He made a new start by changing his mental attitude and habits. He decided to stop carrying around such thoughts as bitterness, hatred, jealousy, greed, envy, a feeling of failure and all other negative thoughts. According to his own admission, his mind had been nothing but a junk pile and rubbish heap... all negative.

With a new positive attitude and a new set of habits, he became an insurance salesman. During the decade beginning with 1930 he sold over a million dollars of insurance each year. New, confident and successful he wrote a book, "A Fortune To Share." Furthermore, he delivered the famous lecture by the same title in innumerable cities and influenced the lives of thousands of people.

Many years ago I heard this lecture in New York City before a group of 500 business and professional men. And I'll never forget his opening sentence. He started by saying, "I would be willing to shine the shoes of any man in this audience, if by so doing I could help that man."

The theme of this lecture emphasized that life is what you make it by your thoughts or mental attitude. The kingdom of Heaven is within you and also the kingdom of Hell. "As a man thinketh in his own heart so is he." What happens to you is not so important as your attitude toward what happens.

Vash Young was the author of several books including: "A Fortune To Share," "No Thank You," "Let's Start Over Again" and "The Go-Giver."

The Go-Giver presented a new slant on selling. It's theme was to be certain you give before trying to get. This is the opposite attitude of the go-getter. Another way of putting it would be to cast your bread upon the waters and sometimes it comes back to you buttered with jam on it. Also the world is an echo chamber. Whatever thoughts or influences you project echoes back to you in exact form. You get back what you give in this world.

Each Saturday morning was "trouble day," which he gave to other people in trying to help them solve their problems. Realizing that worry interfered with business and pleasure Vash Young devised a unique system to conquer it. Each evening 15 to 30 minutes was set aside for "worry time." Nothing could interfere with worry-free period.

If friends called up and wanted him and his wife to go out, he replied that he could not go as he had to worry. So he worried during this period and wrote down everything he could think of to worry about.

Then he put this list of worries into an envelope, carried it to the office the next morning, put it in his desk drawer, and devoted his full time to his job, minus all worries.

He picked up this envelope at the end of the day and carried it home. During his worrying period he took out the list and started to worry. Within a short time this method indicated how foolish it was to worry, so he refused to worry about anything.

Yes, this man changed his mental attitude and thus changed his life. But he did more than simply changing his mental attitude into action. Starting over again he made a glorious comeback and success of living. By putting go-giving ahead of go-getting, he lived an abundant life.

The food is poor and there's not enough of it. A typical dinner at one Medicare-approved home consisted of one chicken wing and a scoop of dried-up mashed potatoes. Insanitary conditions, lack of medical care, uncaring, sometimes deliberately cruel attendants, lack of even the barest safety precautions against fire or accident, are all facts of life for these patients. Perhaps worst of all, there is nothing to do--day in and day out--but wait for death to come."

"Who's to blame? That's what Medical World News set out to explore in an article on nursing homes. The answer? There are, of course, many reasons--not the least of which is the indifference of the medical profession. They shunt responsibility for health care to the institution administration."

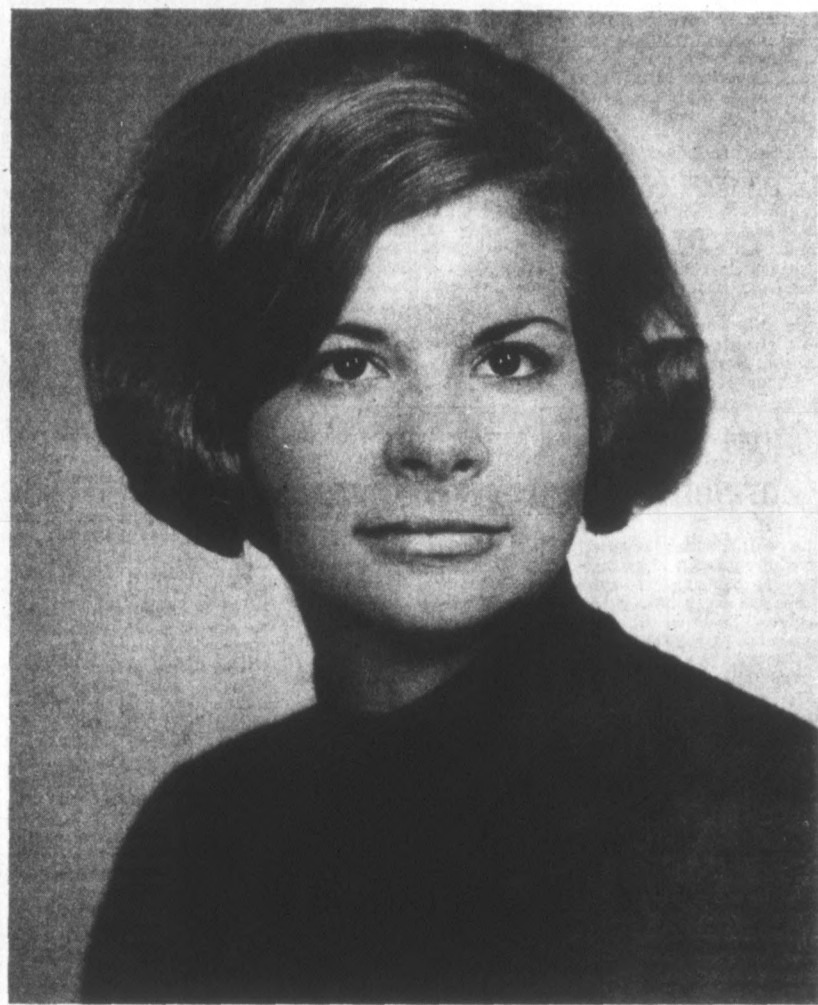

Send the related documents (a copy of the ad, a copy of your letters to them, etc.) along with a letter of complaint. You can also go to the Better Business Bureau or write to the head of the advertising department of the magazine that ran the ad.

## Students Want High School Driving Courses Mandatory

According to a recent survey, 80 percent of 684 Kentucky high school students from all over the state feel that driver education should be a required course in high school.

James D. Sewell, executive assistant for the Kentucky Traffic Safety Coordinating Committee (KTSCC), said the students voiced their opinion in a survey conducted during the recent series of Governor's Regional High School Traffic Safety Conferences. The survey was prepared by the Kentucky Traffic Safety Institute at Eastern Kentucky University.

Of those students surveyed, approximately 58 percent had participated in a driver education program, either a commercial course or one offered in public schools. This figure closely corresponds with Department of Education total enrollment estimates for eligible students.

Sewell said it was also surprising to note that about 90 percent of the students said people arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicants should be asked to attend classes on alcohol and its effects on the body and driving skills.

Attempts are currently being made to establish a statewide program for education of offenders by Dr. Jerry L. Miller, associate professor of traffic safety at Eastern, and Sewell reports Miller is meeting with growing success in establishing regional centers. The first one was the Richmond Alcohol Re-Education Center, which has been under Miller's supervision since its beginning. Richmond Police Judge Paul Fagan refers offenders to the center.

All in all, the students gave Kentucky's driver education program a high rating, expressing satisfaction with all phases. They said their instructors were well-trained and enthusiastic and that the program adequately prepared them to drive.

They also expressed satisfaction with the regional high school conferences, which are aimed at getting young people more actively involved in traffic safety. Sewell said 38 percent rated the youth program as excellent, while 50 percent said it was good.

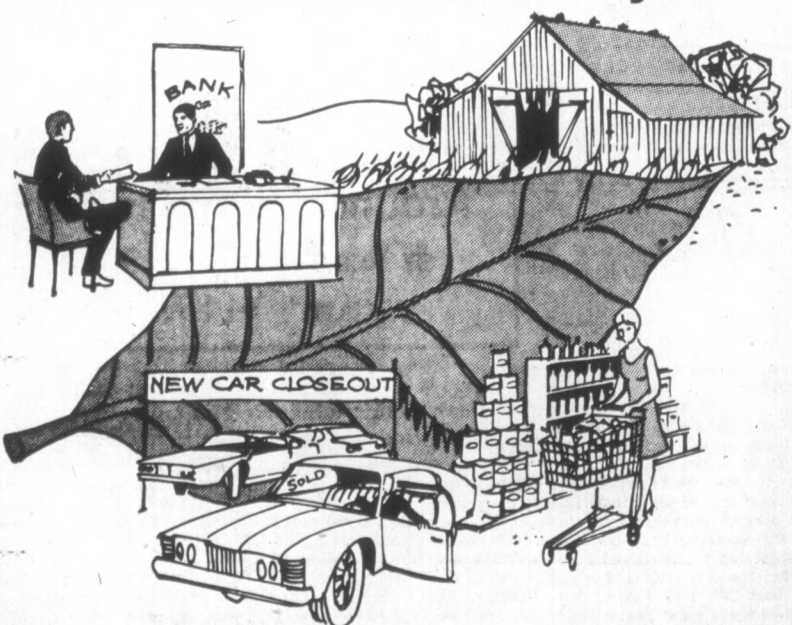

## Mental Health Employs Nine-County Director

Region I, Mental Health-Mental Retardation Board, Inc., has announced the employment of a Mental Retardation Director. Roy M. Van Horn will be working in the nine-county area included in Region I.

Besides Fulton County, the counties include: McCracken, Calloway, Marshall, Livingston, Ballard, Carlisle, Hickman, Fulton, and Graves.

Mr. Van Horn's duties will be directed toward planning and implementation of community programs for the mentally retarded. The center normally has three outlets for providing mental retardation services: (1) Referral to services already provided in the community; (2) affiliation with already existing or planned programs; (3) direct operation of needed programs that are not provided. The primary purpose for the employment of the Mental Retardation Director is to help provide services to the mentally retarded and to parents of the mentally retarded in Region I.

It is requested that all problems related to mental retardation in the region be directed to the local Mental Health-Mental Retardation Office, or contact Mr. Roy M. Van Horn, 308 Guthrie Building, Paducah, Ky. Telephone 442-7121.

Services that can be provided to the mentally retarded or

parents of the mentally retarded presently are: psychological testing and evaluation; referral to other community services; individual, family counseling, and planning; applications for State Hospital and school; psychiatric services; help with planning and implementing local programs; and consultation and education to local agencies interested in the mentally retarded.

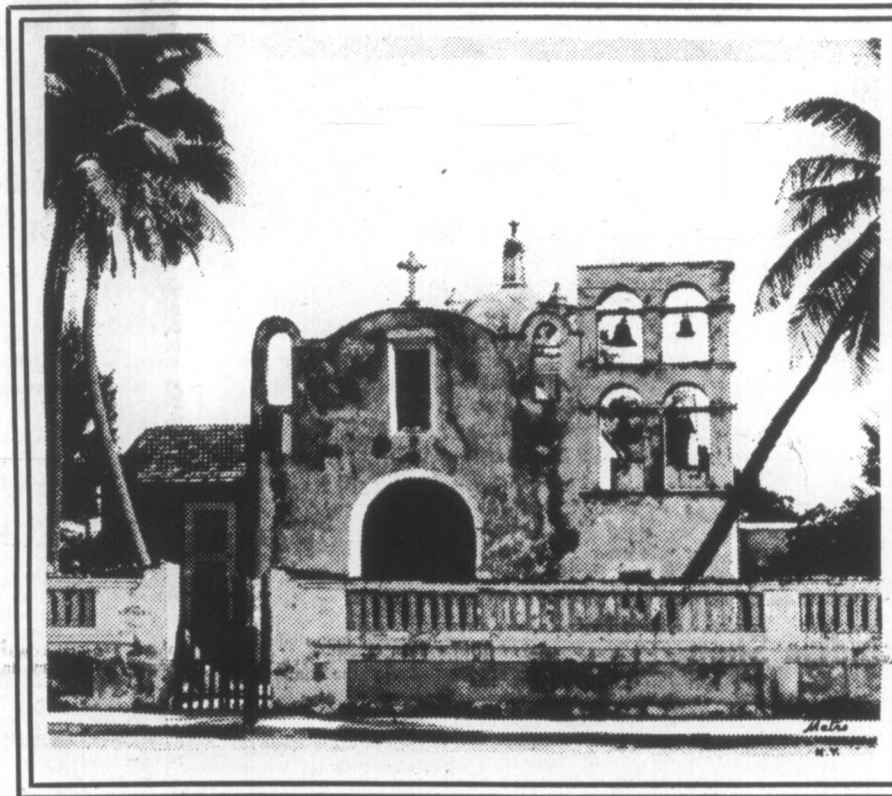

## '28 Million Opryland USA To Open Next April

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Opryland USA, the \$28 million entertainment-amusement complex which will be the eventual home of the Grand Ole Opry, is moving along right on schedule.

The complex, which will replace the ancient Opry House in downtown Nashville and compete with such things as Six Flags over Georgia and

Texas and Disney World in the process, is scheduled to open April 29. And Mike Downs, the general manager, says it now appears it will open on schedule.

Downs says that when Opryland opens, "people will see the most unique entertainment facility in the nation."

Since construction began on the 369-acre site in June 1970, work has been underway on building the 110-acre theme park — which features folk, jazz and blues, country, contemporary and western music.

Final design work has been progressing on the new Opry House, which is not scheduled for completion until early 1974.

The new Opry House, which will cost about \$10 million, will seat 4,400 people in air-conditioned comfort, one of the things missing at the old facility.

Doyle Wolfe, director of engineering and maintenance, says

more than 225 construction workers are trying to get as many of the 100 buildings as possible under roof before winter.

"Once we get the roofs on the buildings it will make it easier to do the finishing work during the winter months," he said. Almost half of the buildings are already up.

"The American Jazz and Blues area which has a New Orleans motif is the farthest along of the five musical areas," Wolfe says. "We have 10 buildings under roof and two other structures nearing completion of the exterior."

The other musical areas which meander through the area are in varying stages of completion.

"With the exception of the contemporary music area," Wolfe says, "all the major musical areas have enough buildings in them to have taken on distinct personalities."

The visitors' parking lot will be able to accommodate approximately 4,000 cars on its 30 acres.

"When we finish paving the area, we will then go back and put in a number of landscape islands with the trees we removed," Wolfe says.

## Rupp And Ray Mears Among Top Coaches

Adolph Rupp of Kentucky, now 70 years young and 853 wins strong, leads college basketball's "Top Twenty Coaches." After 41 seasons as the Wildcat mentor, Rupp has the game's largest victory total, 853, and the nation's finest winning percentage, 82.3 per cent. He is the only college coach to take the court a thousand times, 1,036 to date.

Johnny Wooden of UCLA is Rupp's closest challenger, with 553 wins and 154 losses for 78.3 per cent. The only other active coach with more than 500 victories to his credit, Johnny has gained steadily on Adolph the past five years while winning a

record-shattering five consecutive NCAA championships. Wooden's crew was 29-1 in 1971 and for the five championship seasons the record is a fabulous 145-5 for 96.7 per cent. It amounts to winning 29 of 30 each year.

Ray Mears of Tennessee, joining this honor roll of the first twenty after 15 years coaching, is number three percentage-wise on 287-91 for 76.0 per cent. A graduate of Miami of Ohio, Mears served six years at Wittenberg, prior to the last nine with the Volunteers. Frank McGuire of South Carolina is fourth on 384-153 for 71.6 percent, the only other coach on the list above 70 per cent. Harry Litwack of Temple completes the first five with 333-175 for 65.6 per cent.

The "Top Twenty Basketball Coaches" is developed by the same formula as the "Top Twenty Football Coaches," originated 14 years ago. The records of the head coaches at the 202 schools playing major college basketball are researched for the 20 who have won more games than all the others, then their names listed in order of winning percentage. For this sixth edition of the basketball roll must have 285 wins after serving five years more at a major college.

Three coaches other than Mears qualify for this honor roll for the first time: Bob Polk of St. Louis, Norm Sloan of N.C. State and Bill Strannigan of Wyoming.

Polk, a graduate of Evansville College, coached at Vanderbilt 13 years and retired in 1961 after a coronary. But he returned to coaching five years later at Trinity (Texas), then transferred to St. Louis for the 1969-70 season. Bob's 19-year record is 292-163 for

## Talcott Is Representative At Plymouth

Charles Blair, dean of Mid-Continent Baptist Bible College in Mayfield, was among the invited guests at the First Annual Seminar of the Plymouth Rock Foundation.

The four coaches retiring from the 1971 "Top Twenty" are Jack Gardner of Utah, Fred Winter of Washington, Bob Bass of Texas Tech and Lou Rossini of N.Y.U. Gardner, No. 4 last year, finished 28 years with 486 wins and 235 losses for 67.5 Winter, sixth a year ago, has a 20-year record of 331-178 for 65 per cent. Bass, seventh, closed with a 17-year mark of 305-166 for 64.7 per cent, and Rossini, 11th, whose school dropped the game, in 21 years was 304-208 for 59.4 per cent.

The top half of this 1972 list is completed by four coaches over 60 per cent. They are: Don Kennedy of St. Peter's, 316-177 for 64.1 per cent; Ray Mayer of DePaul, 452-262 for 63.4 per cent; Ralph Miller of Oregon State, 327-198 for 62.3 per cent; and Madison Brooks of East Tennessee, 350-231 for 60.3 per cent.


In the second ten, between Sloan and Strannigan, are the following eight: Jim Snyder of Ohio U nips Jim McDermott of Iowa for 12th place with 307-213 for 59.04 per cent to 311-216 for 59.01 per cent; Stan Watts of Brigham Young is 14th with 351-248 for 58.6 per cent and George Ireland of Chicago is 15th on 283-206 for 58.1 per cent; John Bach of Penn State is next on 299-225 for 57 per cent, then Marv Harshman, who transferred from Washington to Wash. State, 396-302 for 56.8, then Ned Wulk of Arizona State, 295-236 for 55.6 per cent and Howie Dallmar of Stanford, 315-261 for 54.7 per cent.
