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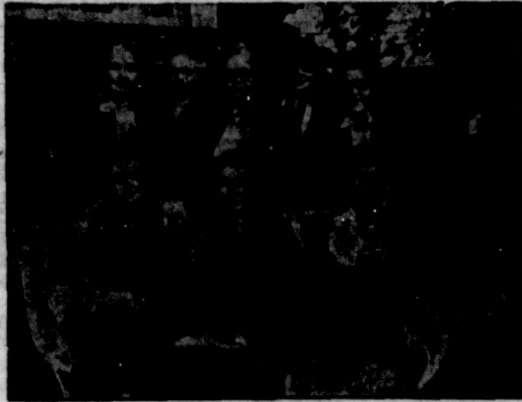

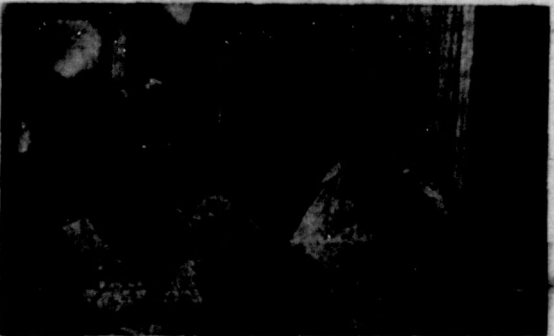

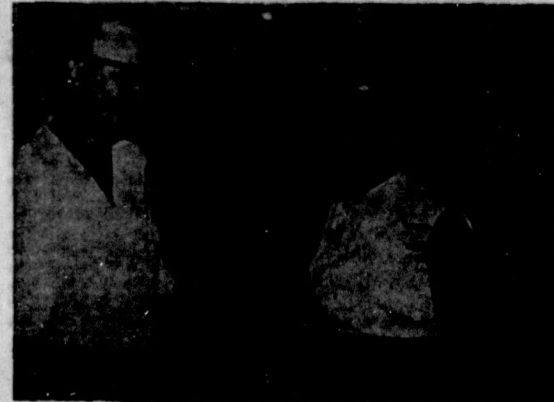

## Year's News Recalls Sadness, Gladness, Progress, Some Turmoil On Local Scene

December's waning days are time for reflections. Time for a flash-back into the days and weeks and months of the year gone. Time for counting blessings, making resolutions for the New Year, wondering where the time has gone.

Time to turn the page of the calendar for a New Year, for new hopes and new plans. Time to ring out the old year and ring in the new and let yesterday's news catalogue itself into history.

What was the history of Fulton last year. What were the big stories of last year, how well did those stories remain in the pages of your personal history book.

Time for a refresher course by the News' history recorder.

Last January started off with a hold-over from the now

ancient 1953 with the local police department and other officials questioning a friend in the mysterious death of Charles Boaz, whose badly bruised body was found in the rest-room of the Earle Hotel. A Grand Jury report advised exhuming the body and determining the actual cause of death, since the jurors were confident that the man met his death by injuries inflicted by a person or persons unknown. The radio auctions were begun for the polio drive and three persons were killed in an auto collision near Fulton.

Mayor Bill Browning took over as Mayor and outlined a comprehensive program of development for the city. Six new councilmen also took office. The new traffic junction at Riceville brought a storm of controversy from in-town and out of town business interests. Red Mincy was hired as manager of the local ball club to replace Sam Lamitina.

M. R. Jeffress was named a director of the Fulton Bank and much interest was shown in the new salary arrangement voted by the Mayor and Council to the City Attorney. The Jack Carter home was the first local home to start using natural gas. J. A. Willingham was named deputy sheriff.

The City Councils of the twin cities engaged in a battle of creek joints to stage a benefit basketball game for the polio drive and at the end of the year they have shown no lasting effects from the tragedy. The Bank of Water Valley was entered and ransacked. Don Wright and James Windsor were named to the All-State Band.

Mayor Bill Browning took under advisement the petition by the city's firemen for a salary increase and a Hickman boy, Harold Lloyd Ross, was making history on the basketball court. Henry Ward was named Kentuckian of the Year by the Kentucky Press Association and a credit company to which many local merchants subscribed folded and many here were left holding the sack. Fulton created a Planning and Zoning Commission.

The Twin City Improvement

named Sebra Evans "Man of the Year" at an Appreciation Dinner held by the Chamber of Commerce for the Illinois Central folks. Jimmy Hogan was swimming to new laurels of that sport while plans were made for the Red Cross drive in the twin cities. The Farm Bureau inaugurated a campaign to receive toll free phone service within the boundary of Fulton County. The patrons of the Terry-Norman School had a fine program celebrating the "new look" the patrons gave to the school.

Jean Ann Hyland received a coveted music scholarship at St. Mary's of the Woods Convent in Terre Haute. The Girl Scouts and the Brownies enjoyed a big birthday party and at a Fulton City Council meeting a total of \$42,564 was foreseen as expenditures during the year for maintenance and improvement in the city. The Community Concert Association launched a membership drive.

Ro and Lee Gardner bought the Hickman Courier from Mary and Jake Howard and the Cubs presented their Dixieland minstrel. A drive was begun and successfully completed for funds with which to erect a health center in Fulton. Mrs. Nelson Tripp joined the Methodist Church as Youth Director.

The Court of Appeals handed down a decision which in effect halted the expansion program of the Southern Bell Telephone system. Theodore Letvin appeared here as the last artist to appear in the Community Concert series for 1954.

Four Fulton ladies, Mrs. Hazel Scruggs, Mrs. Ann Whitnel, Mrs. Nora Alexander and Miss Mayme Bennett visited with Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and Mrs. Alben Barkley at Paducah. Theodore Kramer was named chairman of Fulton's Planning and Zoning Commission and the Young People at the Baptist Church "took over" the activities of the church.

The Fulton City Council, in an enthusiastic meeting made definite plans to establish a city park, enlarge the city clerk's office and erect a building to house the fire department, or possibly serve as a gas maintenance center. The city was gripped to learn of an accident in England which claimed the life of popular Jerry Forrest. Mrs. Roper Fields took her third grade students on the annual train trip to Cairo.

The site was selected for the new health... the Illinois Central inaugurated diesel freight engines... and the accent was on graduations in the schools in the area. Aaron McGough was indicted by the grand jury for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Russell Johnson was made president of the Lion's Club... Kathryn Kelley was named fourth vice-president of the Kentucky Young Democrats and Rosemary Peterson presented her students in a colorful recital. The Woman's Club heard for the first time a wonderful choral group in the annual Evening of Music. Fulton County's property assessments were increased in a blanket move.

Ground was broken for the (recently completed) U-Tote-Em building on West State Line. A new law was made known requiring all dogs be vaccinated. James Warren appeared before a Springfield, (Mo.) Grand Jury making further investigation into a sewer system project for the city. A legal battle in Springfield courts brought about the conviction of a Springfield City Commissioner, sentencing the commissioner to two years in the penitentiary for accepting a bribe, which term he is now serving. Mr. Warren was charged with giving the commissioner a bribe. A perjury charge against Warren resulted because of testimony he gave during the trial last year. Warren's perjury trial was scheduled for June. Warren turned state's witness during the in-

NO CHANGES IN PERSONNEL OR POLICY AT WFUL

Majority Stock Holders Give Stock Options

No change in the personnel or the policy of Station WFUL will be made as a result of the tentative stock transfers by the majority of stockholders in the corporation, Charlie Wingate, a partner of Warren Moxley told the News Wednesday. Mr. Wingate, an experienced radio official has assumed a position at the station.

Radio Station WFUL, on the air in Fulton since 1938, was incorporated by a group of local business people. Operating as the Ken-Tenn. Broadcasting the major stockholders last week negotiated with Warren Moxley of Blytheville, Ark. for Mr. Moxley to buy all outstanding stock in the station.

At a meeting held at the radio station Tuesday afternoon all but three stockholders signed options to transfer their stock to Mr. Moxley when the sale is approved by the Federal Communications Commission. In about two months. Those retaining their stock were Paul Westpheling, Jo Westpheling and Mrs. Stella Shuman.

Mr. Moxley has recently disposed of a group of movie houses in Arkansas.

Each defendant was fined \$100.00 for selling beer on Sunday and \$200.00 for illegal sale of whiskey, plus cost.

Mayor Browning contended that the law was vague, the attorney-general said Fulton was abiding by a law that had been out of date for twelve years.

The local Chamber of Commerce was presented a special award for the steady progress Bob White was named president of the Fulton Chamber of Commerce and trains 101 and 102 of the Illinois Central to and from Louisville were discontinued. Charles Reams was elected president of the American Legion while Fulton staged a huge Clean-Up, Fix-Up parade. Al T. Owens was named to head the local Retail Merchants group. J. T. Davis was named County Democratic Committee Chairman.

Newspaper rumor has it that the Administration sent a feeler or two to Harry Lee Waterfield to be the second man on the ticket, since Combs' home town is far east and Waterfield's is far west and that would be a good balance of geography for

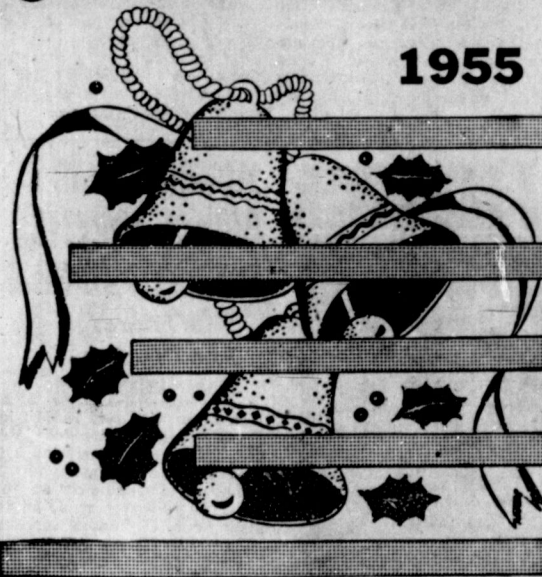

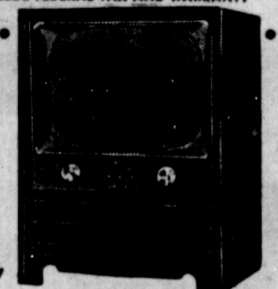

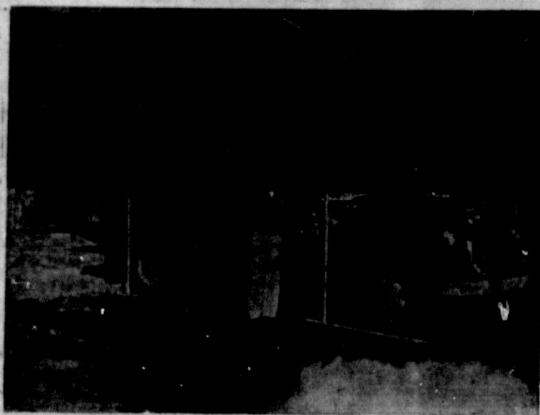

Investigation. Warren's perjury charge was dropped. His testimony and that of others before the grand jury brought about perjury and bribery charges against Jess Russell, public relations director of the firm of Russell and Axon, by whom Mr. Warren was employed for several years.

Citizens of South Fulton were startled at the repeal of a sanitation ordinance prohibiting livestock within the city limits. The citizens expected the ordinance to be enforced at the meeting at which it was repealed. Stanley Jones and Don Hill resigned from the Fulton City Council. Judge Roberts and Elmer Murchison protested in Frankfort the proposed property assessment increase in the county. Calvin Voyles shot and killed his father and entered no plea at the hearing investigating the shooting. E. was later acquitted.

Myra Jackson and Marilyn Butler won high honors at the State 4-H club meeting. Many industrial leaders were welcomed here. . . . Alben Barkley and Governor Wetherby were here to dedicate the new ball park. . . . Mrs. Russell Gaskins died as a result of injuries she received in a fire at her home. . . . the Country Club put machinery in motion to build a swimming pool (the machinery

worked better than the well . . . the pool was completed by Labor Day).

## JULY

The American Legion held its annual Horse Show. The State cut the appropriation for local school funds, but the cut was made up in the increase in taxes resulting from the increase in property assessments. The Magistrate's race in South Fulton matched the heat in enthusiasm. Central City joined the Kitty League. The Trinity Church welcomed Rev. George Laib as the new pastor. Kay Bowen was named Miss Fulton Lookouts. Lorene Hughes attended a meeting of Chamber of Commerce secretaries in Chicago. Two Fultonians, Frank Carr and Clarence Pickering were honored by the IC for long service to the railroad.

J. S. Mills and Charles Gregory were named to fill the vacancies on the Fulton City Council.

Parched and dried fields welcomed a rainfall that meant a million dollars to the crop of the county. Head Holland returned from a year's study in Europe on a Fulbright scholarship. A \$100,000 bond issue was suggested by the Fulton Chamber of Commerce with which to erect a city park and swimming pools for the city. Gordon Browning and Frank Clement battled it out for the Governorship of Tennessee. Clement won.

## AUGUST

Three civic clubs joined the Chamber of Commerce in endorsing the proposed \$100,000 bond issue for a city park. Paul Farlow, agricultural agent for the IC was a visitor in the county. An apathetic Democratic primary resulted in the nomination of Alben Barkley for United States Senator. The local polio chapter made a drive for additional funds.

Citizens of the Highlands met and voted down a proposal to be incorporated into the city limits. Much interest was shown in a move that might bring toll free phone service to the county. The Chamber of Commerce planned a big finance drive. The properties of the South Fulton Light and Power Company merged with Kentucky Utilities. The Lion's Club sponsored a Junior Dairy Show.

David Kimbell won the top prize at the 4-H dairy show at the Fairgrounds.

A motion filed in Circuit Court seeking to recover fees paid to the city attorney for services he allegedly did not render brought about a battle of legal words between Jennings Kearby attorney for the plaintiff and James Warren city attorney. Mr. Warren said he performed no services, was due no money. . . . refunded the check to the Hagans.

## SEPTEMBER

With the falling of the leaves hopes for a city park started fading when a group of citizens appeared before the Fulton City Council to protest the \$100,000 bond issue proposed by the city. Rice Owen and Don Wright won honors at the State Rifle meet for their shooting ability. Alben Barkley opened campaign offices for his Senate race against John Sherman Cooper. The football teams of Fulton and South Fulton readied themselves for the grid season. Southern States Cooperative sponsored a talent show. Claude Freeman was named to an FHA committee. The beautifully remodeled Science Hall was opened for public inspection.

Mrs. Willie Mae Patterson shot and killed her former husband and was bound over to the grand jury. In a lively meeting of the Fulton City Council the salary of the city attorney was discussed and no action taken. A medical bill due the Fulton Hospital was discussed and no action taken. The Democratic leaders of this county named H. P. Allen and Mrs. Ruth Maddox to head up the campaign for Alben Barkley. Sara Bushart was elected president.
