MESA, Ariz. (UPI) — All of the Chicago Cubs' hopes for 1953 are wrapped up in a man who is riding the bench today. — Hank Sauer.  
The husky, home run hitting outfielder, voted the "Most Valuable Player" in the National League last year, currently is nursing a fractured little finger on his right hand, suffered in an exhibition game at Fullerton, Calif., March 18. The Cubs learned that Sauer will be lost until early May when X-rays revealed Monday that the broken little finger of his right hand has not healed as quickly as predicted. "I'm hoping the doctors are wrong," says Manager Phil Cavarretta. "I'd like to see Sauer back in action as soon as possible. He's the big man on our ball club."  
Until he fractured his finger, Sauer was leading the Cubs in hitting with 408 homers and nine runs batted in.

## Dissension Led To Firing Of Bonnie Coach

OLEAN, N. Y. April 1 (UPI) — Player dissension on the St. Bonaventure basketball team which fell in one season from a national power to a team that won only half its games, lay behind the firing of Coach Eddie Melvin, it was learned yesterday.  
Melvin, former Duquesne star, was informed Monday by school officials that his three-year contract which expires today would not be renewed.  
The curly-haired coach, who had guided the Bonnies through six seasons, said he was given "no reason" for his release.  
But it was learned that Melvin's firing was the culmination of season-long resentment among the players over what they considered "too strict" training, rules laid down by Melvin and too severe criticism after defeats.  
The fall of the Bonnies as a court power this season was spectacular. In 1952, the Bonnies swept through a brilliant season into the National Invitation Tournament where they provided a major surprise by making third place in a field of 12. With virtually the same squad returning this year, the Bonnies had been expected to rank again among the nation's top teams.  
Instead, the "Brown Indians" stumbled through a lackluster season in which they won 19 games and lost 27. The Bonnies had been expected to win the "Little Three" title in local state competition, but instead lost twice to Niagara and split two games against Canisius.

CHICAGO, April 1 (UPI) — Jersey Joe Walcott began training yesterday on the scene of his forthcoming battle with heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano with the boast "I'll get him for sure this time."  
The former heavyweight champ planned to make the Midwest Gymnasium his training headquarters for the title fight in the Chicago Stadium April 10.  
Walcott weighed about 200 pounds when he arrived Monday with trainer Dan Finn and publicist Harry Meisler. He said he plans to get down to 175 or 180 pounds for the fight.

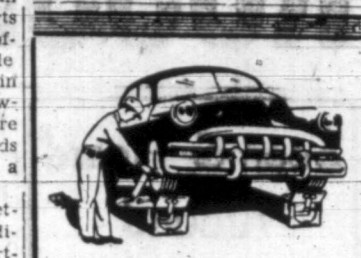

## Reporting System Set Up To Study Animal Diseases

A reporting system is being instituted by the Kentucky State Department of Health to obtain a truer picture of animal diseases in the state, according to L. W. Rowles, D.V.M., Supervisor, Veterinary Public Health.  
Dr. Rowles recently conferred with L. Otis Enck, Ph. D., statistician with the Communicable Disease Center, U. S. Public Health Service, Atlanta, Georgia, about the animal morbidity report. It is hoped that this system will provide meaningful information for prevention and control of these diseases to both public health workers and veterinarians. Reports of actual cases heretofore have often been sporadic and questionable. In 1952, rabies was reported in 14 additional counties which showed no rabies in 1951, but there were 30 per cent less animal heads inspected for rabies, denoting a decrease.  
As 50 counties do not have veterinarians, the state will be divided into six districts for reporting purposes.  
There are around eighty animal diseases transmissible to man, but many have not entered this county and others appear so rarely that they are not of public health significance. Some twelve diseases, such as rabies, anthrax and leptospirosis, interest public health authorities, added Dr. Rowles. Others are of economic interest to Kentucky and will be included in the reporting system to give veterinarians the situation over the state.

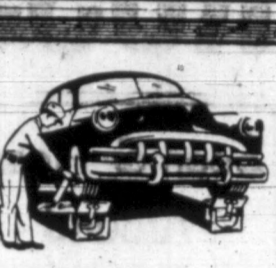

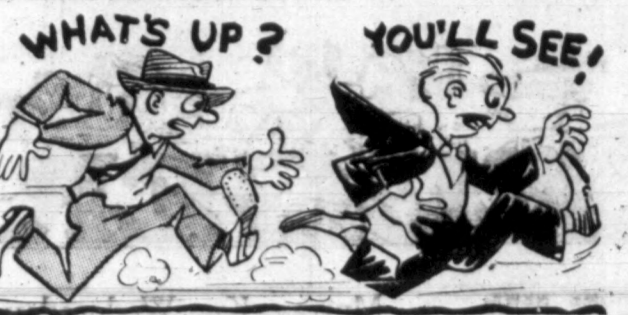
Dudley left the pro ranks a year ago to act as backfield coach at Yale, but he said the Eli post kept him too far away from his insurance business at Lynchburg, Va.

## Reporting System Set Up To Study Animal Diseases

A reporting system is being installed by the Kentucky State Department of Health to obtain a truer picture of animal diseases in the state, according to L. W. Rowles, D.V.M., Supervisor, Veterinary Public Health.

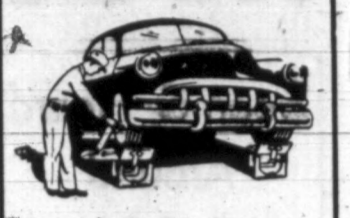
Dr. Rowles recently conferred with L. Otis Emek, Ph. D., statistician with the Communicable Disease Center, U. S. Public Health Service, Atlanta, Georgia, about the animal morbidity report. It is hoped that this system will provide meaningful information for prevention and control of these diseases to both public health workers and veterinarians. Reports of actual cases heretofore have often been sporadic and questionable. In 1952 rabies was reported in 14 additional counties which showed no rabies in 1951, but there were 30 per cent less animal heads inspected for rabies, denoting a decrease.

As 59 counties do not have veterinarians, the state will be divided into six districts for reporting purposes.

There are around eighty animal diseases transmissible to man, but many have not entered this county and others appear so rarely that they are not of public health significance. Some twelve diseases, such as rabies, anthrax and leptospirosis, interest public health authorities, added Dr. Rowles. Others are of economic interest to Kentucky and will be included in the reporting system to give veterinarians the situation over the state.
