Sorehead or Political Profiteer?

(An editorial)

The inherent right of an individual to vote for and work for a political candidate of his choice was viciously attacked in Harry Lee Waterfield's Hickman County Gazette last week. The reckless article went on to say that "Those opposed to him (Waterfield) are either soreheads, or they expect to profit personally from the election of another candidate."

IMAGINE such a statement.

The full column article on the editorial page of Mr. Waterfield's paper took credit for the location in Fulton of the Ferry-Morse Seed Company and admitted without reservation that "we in this stronghold of the Democratic party have been treated like poor kinfolks so long, that equal treatment will be mistaken for favoritism."

This statement in view of the fact that Mr. Waterfield has been a public official representing West Kentucky for 22 years, as representative, as speaker of the House, and for the past three years as lieutenant-governor. The statement above is a direct quote from Mr. Waterfield's newspaper.

The statement is indeed thought provoking.

The uncalled for, unfortunate article appeared in Mr. Waterfield's newspaper as a result of the appointment of Mrs. Paul Westpheling as State Campaign Co-chairman for Bert Combs in the women's division.

Hitting hard at a radio program called "Operation Live-Wire" to Clinton over WFUL each day, the Hickman County Gazette ridiculed that station's public service programs to secure help for the needy, blood donors for the sick and suffering, publicity for community affairs and appeals and donations of all sorts and kinds for the deserving and the needy. While admitting categorically that the program does all these things, Mr. Waterfield's paper said it was done to secure sponsors and for the personal glory of the station's manager, who happens to be Mrs. Westpheling.

While Mr. Waterfield's paper admits that his editor is too sleepy to get up and hear the program at 7:15 AM each morning it may come as news to him to know that there is little glamor in getting up each morning at 5:30 a. m., rain, shine, sleet or snow to report the news to people while its still news; there's little glamor or glory in knowing that people could die without blood transfusions; that people would die and go hungry if the public were not informed of their plight.

Fortunately, the dozens and dozens of persons who have written and called apologizing for the article in Mr. Waterfield's newspaper, cared little for what reason, if any, the help was offered . . . they got the help when they needed it and they were sincerely grateful.


For the information of the Hickman County Gazette we'd like to inform that newspaper that the "live-wire program" was started in February of 1958, long before Mr. Waterfield, Mr. Combs or Mr. Wyatt even announced for Governor. It will continue long after they are elected or defeated . . . and with or without sponsors, so long as we can keep from going bankrupt as a result of economic reprisals.

Mr. Waterfield's newspaper, assuming that not only the radio station manager is stupid, but that almost everybody else is, said that the announcement about the state appointment to the Combs committee was not announced over WFUL. He's right. The day before the announcement was made Mr. J. O. Lewis, Mr. Kenneth Turner, Mr. Gene Gardner and Mrs. Hendon Wright, with the concurrence of the station's president, Mr. Paul Westpheling, met in staff conference and agreed that radio station WFUL's personnel would not be identified with the Combs campaign, or anybody's campaign. A letter was sent to the Federal Communications Commission to this effect, a copy of which, dated December 10 is in the custody of Mr. Lewis and Mr. Turner.

Moreover, Mr. Waterfield's paper said that Radio Station WFUL failed to give recognition to the "present administration" for the location of the Ferry-Morse Seed Company in Fulton. The official announcement from the Ferry-Morse Seed Company was read over the air just as it was released by the seed company's executive offices. NO MENTION WAS MADE BY THEM of the activity of

Fulton County Invited To Enter Industrial Contest

Fulton County, along with several other West Kentucky counties, have this year been invited to enter the annual Industrial Awards Contest of the Memphis Commercial Appeal, which is being co-sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Economic Development.

The contest is open to communities in the Commercial Appeal's circulation area. Awards to be made by the newspaper in May will be based on recent industrial development—particularly with regard to industries utilizing agricultural commodities—and on expansion of existing industry, organizational activities of civic groups, and general community improvement.

Separate awards will be made to cities in various population categories; so each community will be competing only with cities of approximate equal size. In Kentucky, communities in the following counties are eligible to enter the contest: Fulton, Hickman, Carlisle, Ballard, Graves, McCracken, Calloway, and Marshall.

The Department of Economic Development would like to see a large number of communities take part in this contest, for their are sure such participation will lead to increased industrial development opportunities and will stimulate community improvement programs in Western Kentucky.

Frank Lebus, Jr., director of the Department of Economic Development's Agricultural Development Division, will be one of the judges who will select winners in the various award categories. The contest is open to communities in Northwest Alabama, Arkansas, Northern Louisiana, Mississippi, Southern Missouri, and Central Tennessee; and the panel of judges will, of course, include representatives of those areas.

Further detailed information about the contest may be obtained by writing the Industrial Awards Contest, Mid-South Resources Bureau, The Commercial Appeal, Memphis.

Roy Merryman Dies Friday Of Gun Wounds

Roy Merryman, former Fulton resident, died Friday at 2 p. m. at his home in Phoenix, Ariz., of a self-inflicted gun wound, according to word received here by relatives. He was 39.

Mr. Merryman received a medical discharge from the U. S. Air Force last July, and was working for a cotton gin in Phoenix. He was a veteran of World War II.

Mr. Merryman's father, E. L. Merryman, flew to Phoenix Friday night.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete, but the body will probably be returned to Fulton for burial.

Mr. Merryman leaves his wife, Mrs. Madeline Merryman; two sons, Larry and Roy Merryman, Jr.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Merryman of Fulton; two brothers, Montford Merryman of Fulton and Lester Boyd Merryman of Merced, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Mary Lou Fulcher of Fulton and his grandmother, Mrs. Lou King of Fulton.

Two Accidents In Area Saturday


Pete's Wrecker of Fulton was called out to two accidents Saturday morning.

Some Of Our State Officials Are Real Sportsmen!

The Governor of the State of Kentucky seems determined to provoke as much lousy publicity for himself and his gang in the First District as possible, and we might add that during the past three years he has done an admirable job of it. As somebody said, "he can get more accidentally than his opponents can get on purpose."

The latest episode, involving another hunting trip to Ballard County, involved suspension of a game warden at the Ballard refuge last week before the Governor headed down here on a hunting trip.

To the average person, such tactics infer that the Governor might want to do something that he wouldn't want the warden to see. How else can you figure it?

The Paducah Sun-Democrat, using obvious restraint in an editorial last Friday recapped the situation thus:

"Concern was expressed by some of the ordinary sportsmen when the Ballard County game refuge was being built that it was intended primarily as a fancy resort where state officials and their friends could conveniently gather to enjoy the fine hunting it would afford.

"At times this appears to be the case.

"First it was Governor Chandler who got in dutch last season by hunting out of hours and shooting a crippled goose, but was let off when it developed that he was hunting as the guest of the then commissioner of Fish and Wildlife Resources and did not know he was violating the law.

"Now it develops that a member of the state's Game and Fish Commission, a friend and a state game warden have been fined \$25 plus \$18 court costs each, for taking more than the daily bag limit of ducks at the refuge.

"A U. S. Game Management agent described the episode, which occurred December 2, as 'an unfortunate accident.'

"The three hunters fired into a

flock of ducks; when the shooting was over, they found they had killed 22, or 10 more than the day's bag limit of four ducks per hunter.

"The game and fish commissioner was described as humbly penitent about the affair, and the federal agent quoted him as saying 'I made a mistake, and I want to take my punishment like anybody else. I must set an example for Kentucky sportsmen.'

"We accept the commissioner's statement as representing his true feelings. Yet we can't help but wonder, along with other ordinary folks, whether three other hunters of equal shooting ability could have done so well purposely as Dr. James C. Salato, the commissioner, his friend, Dr. H. C. Randall, and Game Warden John McClintock did accidentally in the Ballard refuge.

"Governor Chandler and the refuge employe responsible for bringing to light the Chandler hunting accident at the refuge last season were back in the news the past few days.

"Governor Chandler was coming to the refuge again and wanted to avoid running into the employe who caused him some trouble. The commissioner of fish and wildlife decided to switch the employe, Kendall Thomas, to Kentucky Lake for a few days while the governor hunted in the refuge with Warden McClintock (of the Dr. Salato party), who is regularly assigned to Kentucky Lake.

"Mr. Thomas refused the temporary transfer and his boss suspended him for 60 days.

"Why the governor should object to hunting while Mr. Thomas is on the refuge we cannot imagine unless the governor fears that, by accident, of course, he will violate the game laws. If that should develop, he should be just as anxious as was Dr. Salato to make amends, take his punishment, and set an example for Kentucky sportsmen. In such an event, many ordinary folks would feel better about the purposes of the Ballard refuge."





High Income Record Is Set By Kentuckians

Total income of Kentuckians rose above three billion dollars in 1957 for the first time in history.

This was shown in a tax study released by Revenue Commissioner J. E. Luckett. He reported:

Gross income increased 6.3 percent over that of 1956 and 5.2 percent more people filed income tax returns. The gross income of the median return was \$3,332, up \$23 from 1956. There was a substantial increase of taxpayers with earnings of \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Persons in the gross income classes of \$7,000 and more accounted for more than half of the total tax due but represented only 10 percent of the number filing returns.

This year, 772,561 persons filed income-tax returns on 1957 earnings totaling \$3,018,400,538. The state's tax on this was \$43,736,133. Last year, 734,094 persons filed returns on 1956 income totaling \$2,839,975,653, bringing the state \$38,465,919 in income tax revenue.

In 1950, 309,689 Kentuckians reported a total income of \$1,238,647,952 and the state's share was \$14,035,485.

VA Mailing Out Questionnaires

The VA said it is mailing out annual income questionnaires for veterans and widows in the envelope with the December pension checks, which should be received about January 2nd.

The questionnaire this year is a card the size of the check. Included with the card will be instructions as to how to complete it.

Those receiving the card should fill out both sides and return it immediately to the address shown on the card. Unless the questionnaire is returned within 30 days, the VA said pension payments may be stopped.

Disability and death pensions are subject to annual income limitations. The VA annually mails out questionnaires to persons receiving these benefits asking a report on their actual income this year and next year's expected income.

Childrens' Careers Set

One of the pressing problems in raising children—how to help them choose a career—will be the subject of a special session at the 47th annual Farm and Home Week here at the University Jan. 27-30, 1959.

Dean Stanley Wall of the UK College of Agriculture and Home Economics, chairman, said the session will be held Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 28. "Youngsters, particularly high school youngsters, lack much knowledge in how to choose careers; they need assistance in answering such questions as how to find out what careers are available, why type of education do they need to prepare for such a career and where can they get information on education needed for their chosen careers," Wall said.

Five state educators have been named to a panel to discuss career selection's principles and practices. They are Dr. Doris Seward, UK dean of women; Dr. Joan Chenault, UK counseling director; Dr. Leroy Ullrich, Centre College dean; T. T. Knight, Southern High School principal, Louisville; and Dr. Curtis Phipps, Frankfort, state Department of Education.





Murray To Take Part In Student Loan Program

Murray State College will participate in a student loan program established by the National Defense Education Act of 1958, according to J. Matt Sparkman, dean of students.

The loan program, which was established by an act of the 85th Congress, allows needy students to borrow up to \$1,000 annually

and up to a \$5,000 total on long-range, low-payment terms. The eight-year program will begin here Feb. 15, said Dean Sparkman, and will terminate in 1966.

Up to 50 per cent of the loans (plus interest) will be canceled if the borrower serves as a full-time teacher in a public elementary or secondary school in any state. For each complete academic year of such service, 10 per cent of the loan will be canceled until the loan is repaid or the maximum of 50 per cent is reached.

Approval Given College Program

Approval has been given to Georgetown College fifth-year program of education for elementary and secondary teachers according to an announcement from Miss Louise Combs, Director of the Division of Teacher Education and Certification. The announcement was made following the regular meeting of the State Board of Education. The approval is retroactive to September 1957. The graduate program at Georgetown College was inaugurated last year, because of a growing concern about the problem of supplying qualified teachers for Kentucky schools. "The Minimum Foundation Program has served as an inducement for graduate study," said Dr. Romie D. Judd, dean of the graduate school in education at Georgetown. He added, "Additional Kentucky legislation will tend to enhance the importance of higher teacher qualification and place greater emphasis on graduate preparation for the teachers." The college granted its first graduate degree, A Master of Art in Education, under this new program last August to Mrs. Harlan McGinnis of Vine Grove, Kentucky.

RECORD PLANTINGS




