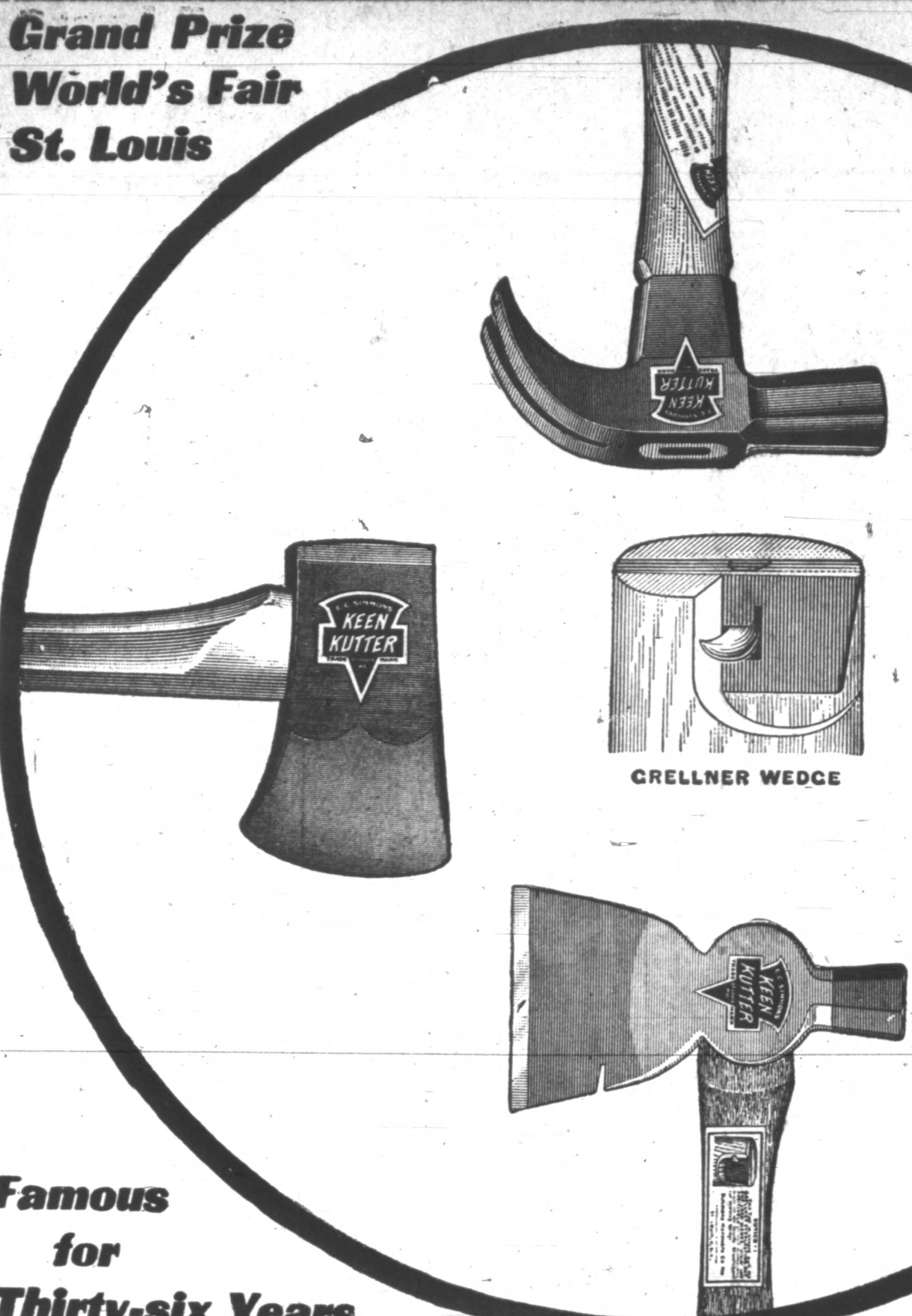

Farmers Must Organize.

The editor of the Messenger is not a farmer, but he was raised on a farm and knows something of the hardships and privations of farm life, when the products of the farm are forced to be sold at less than one-half of what they are worth.

If the farmer could get for his products prices in proportion to what the manufacturer, the speculator, the doctor, the lawyer, the banker, and the transportation companies get for their

labor, eggs would sell at 40 cents per dozen, chickens at 50 cents each, hens at 75 cents, bacon at from 20 to 25 cents, pork at from 8 to 10 cents gross, beef in proportion, corn at \$4.00 to \$5.00 per barrel, flour at from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per barrel, wheat at \$1.00 to \$1.25 per bushel, tobacco at from \$6.00 to \$10.00 for lugs, leaf at from \$12.00 to \$18.00, and other things in proportion.

It is true farmers are getting much better prices for their products than they did a few years ago, but they should not be content until they receive for their labor and investment a sum equal to what other classes get.

Farmers have been made to believe that they should be content with just enough, for their labor, to keep soul and body together; but the time has come when they should rise above this false doctrine and get as much as other people. This can never be done as long as they are unorganized.

They must get closer together and organize for their own protection. This has been partially demonstrated in the past two years by the tobacco farmers in the "dark patch," organizing with less than 60 per cent of their number in the association.

With 90 or 100 per cent in the association the prices would almost double from what they are now.

The money belongs to the farmers and they should have it, and can get it by close and honest organization.

This year has certainly demonstrated to the men who raise tobacco that to get good prices they should be in the organization. Those who remained out got from \$2.00 to \$3.50 less for their tobacco than those who were members.

Lay aside all personal, local grumbling and stand together like men and get for your farm products what they are worth. Be strong, independent men and you will prosper as never before.
