

- -Good public opinion in 1992, but it started to change throughout his presidency
- -Expansion of CONADE (Comisión Nacional de Cultura Física y Deporte)
- -Expectations for the Mexican Delegation in 1992
- -Carlos Mercenario, the only silver medal of the Olympics
- -Comments to Mercenario after his win



2020: Andrés Manuel López Obrador :: 2021 Tokyo

- -Coronavirus in Mexico and AMLO's handling of the situation
- -Reallocation of government funds away from sports
- -Mexican performance in the 2020 Tokyo Games
- -Press conference about country celebration of the Mexican victories



Critiques of these Presidents

- -Each president has faced critics who have accused them of not being fully loyal to Mexico or their Mexican nationality
 - -Diaz Ordaz share of ideals with the U.S.
 - -Salinas trade-promoting deals in NAFTA and others
 - -AMLO handling of COVID and relations with the U.S.
- -Each needed a way to silence their critics and prove loyalty through national celebration
