## GREAT VICTORY FOR GOV. BECKHAM IN DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION

COMPLETE CONTROL OF  
PARTY ORGANIZATION.

M'QUOWN BEAT KEHOE

Beckham, James, McCreary  
and Blackburn Are Delegates-at-Large.

PLATFORM IS ADOPTED.

(Special to New Era.)

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 9.—At an early hour this morning, the Kentucky State Democratic convention reached final adjournment. The resolutions as adopted do not instruct the delegates to the National convention, but the unit rule is enforced. Gov. Beckham, Ollie James and Senators Blackburn and McCreary were chosen as the delegates at large. The Hon. Claude M. Thomas, of Bourbon county, and the Hon. Lillard H. Carter, of Anderson county, were named as electors from the state-at-large. Gov. Beckham was both temporary and permanent chairman of the convention.

Gov. Beckham and the state administration won a sweeping victory all along the line, and in complete control of the party organization. Judge Lewis McQuown defeated Congressman James Kehoe by a decisive majority in the race for chairman of the state central and executive committees.

There was a short but spirited debate in the committee on resolutions over the platform, five of the members demanding the reaffirmation of the Kansas City platform. In order to prevent a contest on the floor of the convention a compromise was effected by adopting the following opening clause:

"The Democratic party of Kentucky in convention assembled affirms its faith in and adherence to the great and fundamental principles of Democracy as expounded by Jefferson, exemplified by Jackson and ably defended by Bryan."

The resolutions condemn the "unnecessary and unjust system of Federal taxation maintained by the Republican administration," and demand a revision of the tariff in a conservative spirit. The increase of expenditures of the Federal government under Republican rule is condemned and the encroachments by the president upon the constitution are denounced. The resolutions

lutions further favor the regulation of trusts and recommend a thorough investigation of all federal departments on the ground that the refusal of the Republicans to permit further investigation of the postoffice department suggests hidden corruption.

The course of Gov. Durbin, of Indiana, in "refusing to surrender on requisition from the governor of Kentucky the persons of William S. Taylor and Charles Finley, fugitives from justice, charged with the murder of William Goebel," is denounced as a violation of the constitution of the United States.

The committee on permanent organization last midnight presented a majority and minority report. The minority report, which recommended Kehoe's election as state chairman, was finally voted down and the majority report of the committee on organization was adopted, carrying with it the election of Louis McQuown as chairman of the state central committee and of Blackburn, McCreary, Beckham and James as delegates at large.

The adoption of the report of the committee on resolutions was followed by a heated wrangle over a resolution endorsing Judge Alton B. Parker for president, introduced by Congressman Swager Sherley, of Louisville. The convention by a vote of 3 to 1 declined to consider the resolution, all the delegates from the country districts voting not to suspend the rules and consider it.

At 1:44 a. m. the convention adjourned.

## NEW RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATION STARTED IN WEBSTER COUNTY.

Called "Dixie Mt. Zion." Has Some Rather Queer Beliefs.

The little town of Dixie in Webster county has a new religious organization which is one of the most peculiar sects known. They now number about one hundred in all, and they call it Dixie Mt. Zion. The leading members of the organization are Mrs. Jennie Sigler, a widow of Dixie; Elbert Hobbs, of Indiana; Henry Brown, of Smallhouse, Ky., and Granville Brown, of Paducah, Ky. Nearly all of them have large families and they say they are without either sin or money. Their creeds are similar to those of the notorious Dowie except in respect to worldly goods. They believe it sinful to save and accumulate property of any kind. Most all of them were a few years ago very wealthy, but sold their farms and other property and put all they possessed into a common treasury which did not last very long.

These people have a church building at Dixie which they use as a dwelling place and a place of worship. They also claim to have a school at Paducah, which is supported by missions. The leaders have visited nearly all of the principal cities in Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana and Tennessee, worshipping in the streets and at the front gates, and when they fail to find shelter sleep in the open air.

Mrs. Jennie Sigler has traveled in nearly every state in the union within the past three years, expounding her doctrines and circulating tracts which contain her peculiar ideas. She has found few adherents on her tours, but has made many converts in many different states, so she claims.

Their uniforms are composed of plain black garments trimmed with gold lace. The women wear dresses made in the very plainest style, and small blue caps, the same as those worn by the men. The men wear plain suits of black, with short tunics belted over their coats and reaching the knees. The men wear long beards and believe it sinful to shave their faces. The women either wear their hair flowing down their backs or cut short like the men. They all dress very neat and no one would take them to be tramps or vagabonds.

They teach that man can consecrate himself to Christ and become sinless and pure, and free from temptation; that, through prayer, they can heal the sick and afflicted; that man should put aside all temporal things and let every day provide for itself and that God will provide for all who consecrate themselves to His cause.


Henry Brown claims that God has revealed to him that he (Brown) has been ordained to live to see the coming of Christ, and that he will meet the Messiah in person. He also claims that the end of the world is near at hand, though he cannot tell the day nor the hour, and that he has been called to warn the people of the judgment.

The principal members of the organization seem to be reasonably well educated and have no trouble in holding the attention of their hearers everywhere they go. They march through the streets and public highways, singing as they go, and are followed by large crowds of curious men and boys. While holding protracted meetings they make house-to-house canvasses, singing and praying at everybody's front doors unless they are driven away. Most all of them have good voices, and their singing aids them greatly in attracting crowds about them. During their devotional services they shout, jump and run back and forth on the streets, affording great amusement for spectators.

To-day he telegraphed that he felt it his duty to remain at Baltimore.

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## GO UNINSTRUCTED

**COUNTY DELEGATES TO VOTE AS UNIT.**

**Democratic Mass Conven-tion Held at Courthouse Saturday**

(From Saturday's Daily)

Democrats of Christian county met in the courthouse this afternoon to select sixteen delegates to represent the county in the state convention which meets in Louisville June 8. The object of the state convention is to send delegates to the National Democratic convention which will meet in St. Louis in July to nomi-nate candidates for president and vice president.

A motion of Mr. Chilton carried unanimously that the chair name a committee of three to select thirteen other Democrats to act with them as delegates from Christian county to the state convention, and to report to the mass convention such resolu-tions as they should see proper.

The chair appointed John C. Duf-fy, Alex O. Dority and W. J. Chiles. When reporting the resolutions, no alternate delegates were named and, after some discussion, the resolu-tions, on motion of Dr. Clardy, were referred back to the committee to have names of the alternates insert-ed.

The following report of the conven-tion, as amended, was adopted unan-imously after which the convention adjourned:

We, your committee on resolutions beg leave to report as follows:

1st. That we the Democrats of Christian county in convention assembled endorse the Democratic state administration and the excellent record made by the last general assembly and especially approve the amendments to the election laws that we believe will result in the redemption of Christian county from Republican rule.

2nd. That the delegates to be ap-pointed by this convention be unin-structed, except that they are to vote as a unit upon all questions arising in the state and district convention.

## WHEELS OF JUSTICE

HAVE BEGUN TWO WEEKS GRIND.

Grand Jury Impaneled and Charged.—Pembroke Murder Cases.

(From Monday's Daily.)

This being the first Monday in June it is county and circuit court day. Circuit court was convened this morning by Judge Thomas P. Cook, who as usual began the session with prayer. The grand jury was then impaneled as follows, and charged. J. T. Stegar, Frank Yancey, John Morris, Irvin Foster, T. M. Jones, C. W. Lacey, Lawrence Daniel, M. B. King, Frank Cornelias, C. C. Barker, Ed Wilkins and Hiram Smith, colored.

The docket comprises over five hundred cases, being mostly continuances. The common law docket was taken up this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The session is for four weeks. Probably the most important cases which will come up for trial are the cases against Ed Moseley and Charles Finch, charged with the murder of an unknown white man near Pembroke last November. Finch has already been tried and was convicted by the jury, but Judge Cook allowed him a new trial. Moseley is the only one of the nine negroes whose case had not been gone into previously.
