LIKE EASTERN NABOBS THEY LIGHT CIGARS WITH BONDS WORTH \$760

COUNCIL MIXES FUN AND FOOL-
ERY WITH BUSINESS.

ANNUAL ELECTION HELD

Present Police and Firemen Again
Chosen and One New Place Is
Created.

(From Friday's Daily)

For a short while last night the board of council and the audience in attendance upon the proceedings, laid aside the petty cares and worries of ordinary people and posed and felt as they imagined the wealthy nabobs of the east do. During the time money was regarded as the most plentiful thing on earth and they spoke of it in commonplace, if not contemptuous, terms as if they had bags of it awaiting them an every hand.

It all came up from the cancelling of the \$11,000 worth of railroad bonds which were ordered to be taken up at a previous meeting of the council. The principal and interest had been paid on these bonds and the documents themselves were last night handed to the council to be destroyed. In the meantime Archie Higgins had presented the council with a box of Purita cigars and some one suggested that the bonds, as they had to be burned anyhow, should be used as tapers for lighting the cigars. The suggestion was hailed with delight, the cigars were passed around, every one in the room being included in the general festivity, and then the party gathered around the stove and began setting fire to the smoke rolls with bonds of \$500 face value and worth \$760 by reason of the coupons attached. As the smoke ascended the mirth grew apace. Jack Hanberry was the only one to whom the experience was not something entirely new. He said that he had often lighted cigars with \$1,000 checks—but he had drawn the checks himself.

Going back to everyday affairs, the election of policemen and firemen was taken up and short work was made of it, the old boards being re-elected with only one or two exceptions. A new office was created and will be tried for three months as an experiment. This is the position of night officerman for the police department, whose duties will be to stay at the police office and receive messages and see to their proper attention. Tobe Smith was elected to this place. In the past Lieut. Wilkins has had the brunt of this work to bear and it was desired to relieve him of it so that he might spend more of his time on the street.

Policemen were elected as follows: Amos Hayden, W. E. Shanklin, E. N. Miller, A. W. Witherspoon, M. W. Merritt, W. D. Hawkins, Ben Hadden. Chief Roper and Lieut. Wilkins were elected last year for two years. Workhouse keeper: George D. McChord.

CHRISTMAS COMING

The Christmas spirit is already well aroused in Hopkinsville and the surrounding section and the buying of presents is well under way, the first real rush having been Saturday of last week. Since that time the trade has been steady—not marked by any great crowds or jams, but a regular, consistent sort of business which keeps all the merchants busy continuously throughout the day. This is taken to mean that the people have realized the satisfaction of "buying early" and they are not going to wait until the last few days and then rush to the stores and buy what is left and perhaps have to fight their way through the crowds.

As said before, every store in town is doing a good business. Many of the stores have big displays of special holiday goods and these are receiving a large share of the attention of the shoppers. The other stores which carry the regulation lines are coming in for their share however. There seems to be a growing idea that presents should be useful as well as beautiful or ornamental, and this year this class of articles are being sold in large quantities.

Show windows are reflecting the spirit of the season, many of them having been handsomely decorated and displaying articles of many kinds. STILL HAVING FIRES

OF AN INCENDIARY ORIGIN IN
MONTGOMERY COUNTY.

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 11.—Drew Ferrell, a farmer living in the Ninth district, sustained a heavy loss Wednesday morning by the loss of his barn and its contents. The fire is believed to have been the work of incendiaries, and there is said to be a strong suspicion of the guilty parties. Officers are working on the case and developments are expected. The fire was discovered about 2 o'clock in the morning.

The barn contained 10,000 pounds of tobacco and a lot of farming implements. The loss is estimated at \$1,500. Ferrell was a member of the association. It is said that tenants on the place saw several men as they left the farm.

Two New Depots Wanted By City.

Railroad Commission Is Asked to Require Both L. & N. and I. C. to Con-
struct Adequate Stations.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 12.—The citizens of Hopkinsville have sent a petition to the railroad commission asking that body to require the Louisville and Nashville and the Illinois Central railroads to construct new depots at Hopkinsville.

The present depots are represented to be out of date, in bad repair and generally unfit for a city the size of Hopkinsville.

The railroad commission will consider the complaint and will go to Hopkinsville on an inspection tour to see the conditions and determine whether or not new depots are really needed.

NEW ORGANIZATION ANOTHER ROMANCE

FOUR TOBACCO ASSOCIATIONS IN
THE COMBINATION.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 11.—The Union Tobacco society, representing tobacco growing interests in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Tennessee and Wisconsin, with estimated assets of \$30,000,000 was organized here. The purpose of the organization was said to be to protect the tobacco growers from a minimum price, and the consumer from a maximum scale. The interests of the growers in the states named will be pooled and the tobacco sold through a board of directors.

The following associations joined the new society: The Burley Tobacco society, Henderson (Kentucky) Stemming District association, Bowling Green (Kentucky) District association and Green River Tobacco association.

These officers were elected: President, M. O. Hughes, Bowling Green, Ky.; Secretary, J. F. Doss, Greenville, Ky.

Another conference will be held on January 21, when new officers will be elected and a definite policy of procedure adopted. Permanent headquarters will be maintained in Louisville.

The board of directors includes: H. F. Ray, of Lake, Ind.; H. C. Hensley, of Haley's Mill, Christian county; M. O. Hughes, of Bowling Green; J. F. Doss, of Greenville, and Clarence LeBus, of Cynthiaana.

SUING TO RECOVER TOOLS.

Costs Will Probably Exceed the Value
of the Property.

Another case is on in the courts of this county which promises to cost more than the property involved. The action began when Mrs. C. A. Pace brought suit in Magistrate J. F. Dixon's court against W. E. Mitchell to recover some tools valued at \$100.

The decision was in favor of Mrs. Pace and the defendant appealed it to the county court. It was tried out some time ago and resulted in a hung jury. Yesterday the case was called again and before entering it the attorneys agreed to accept a majority verdict and when this was rendered it was in favor of the plaintiff. The defendant again refused to abide by this and has now taken an appeal to the circuit court and the case will probably be tried at the February term.

MONUMENT TO CARMACK.

Memorial Committee Decides to Erect
\$25,000 Shaft.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 11.—At a meeting of the committee to select a memorial for ex-Senator Carmack it was decided to erect a \$25,000 monument, the money to be raised by popular subscription and the monument to be placed on Capitol hill. A memorial association was formed, with Allen G. Hall, of Vanderbilt university, president; Dr. H. B. Carre, of Vanderbilt, president, and Col. A. M. Shook, treasurer.

CHARGED WITH HOUSEBREAKING

Richard Willis, Colored, Is in the
County Jail.

Richard Willis, colored, was sent to the county jail Wednesday charged with housebreaking and larceny, says the Pembroke Journal. Willis broke into a cabin on the farm of Jeff J. Garrott and stole a watch and a pair of shoes from one of the colored tenants.

VICTIM OF NEGRO'S BULLET PASSES AWAY AFTER GREAT SUFFERING

FIFTEEN THOUSAND

DOLLARS FOR THE TEACHERS OF
CHRISTIAN COUNTY.

County Superintendent W. E. Gray has been as "busy as a cranberry merchant" all day paying off the teachers throughout the county. He distributed during the day the handsome sum of \$15,050.70, draft for which was received a few days ago from State Treasurer Farley to cover the amounts due the teachers for November and December. As a result of this distribution the teachers, at least, are well supplied with Christmas money and the way they have been visiting the various stores since receiving their checks has shown that this was exactly the use to which a large portion of it was put.

Speaking of the paying of the teachers the Frankfort Journal says: "Country school marm and professors in this state will have plenty of money for Christmas, for Treasurer Ed. Farley yesterday sent out checks to the county school superintendents amounting to \$370,000 for distribution among the teachers. This payment should have been made the second Saturday in November, but in order to pay the warrants of the general expenditure fund so much money had to be borrowed from the school fund that the delay in paying the teachers has been occasioned."

"Superintendent of Public Instruction Crabbe has served notice on the state officials that no more money will be borrowed from the school fund for the general expense fund without a protest from him, for one of his campaign promises to the teachers was that they would get their salaries regularly, when they fell due. The sheriffs are making their annual settlements this month, and it is likely that there will be no further delay in paying the teachers."

LOCKJAW SETS UP AS RESULT
OF THE WOUND.

SLAYER IN HENDERSON JAIL

Body of Young Blakely Collins Will
Be Laid to Rest in Family Bury-
ing Grounds.

Blakely Collins, who was shot near Julien Tuesday afternoon by Charles Coleman, a negro, died last night shortly after 1 o'clock.

Up until yesterday afternoon his condition had been very favorable and the wound itself had never shown any alarming symptoms. Yesterday afternoon tetanus set up and developed very rapidly and death resulted in a few hours.

Dr. Woodard was called to see the young man last night but nothing could be done for him, severe convulsions having seized him and these continued until the last.

Feeling against the negro Coleman is said to be very high in the neighborhood, and it is likely that he will be kept at Henderson until the time for his trial in circuit court.

Funeral services will be held at the late residence tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock, and the remains will be interred in the Collins family burying ground in the Lafayette vicinity.

COMMITTEE NAMED

TO HAVE CONFERENCE WITH ASSOCIATION OFFICIALS.

Their Report Will Determine Whether Lyon "Insurgents" Will Withdraw From Organization.

KUTTAWA, Ky., Dec. 14.—A big mass convention was held here Saturday by growers who are dissatisfied with the way their tobacco is handled by the Planters' association. Speeches were made by W. M. Watlington, Hugh Lyon, J. W. Hammock, John Bradshaw and others. Bradley Wilson, of Hopkins county, spoke on behalf of the association.

A committee was appointed to confer with the sales committee of the association and report back to a mass meeting to be called later whether or not the association can sell the 1908 crop to better advantage than the farmers themselves.

On the report of this committee will depend the question of whether the counties interested will remain in the association or withdraw and sell their tobacco loose.

BY DUTCH CRUISER

A VENEZUELAN GUARDSHIP HAS BEEN CAPTURED.

WILLEMSTAD, Curacao, Dec. 14.—The Dutch cruiser Geberland, on Saturday morning captured the Venezuelan coast guardship Alix outside Puerto Cabello. The Dutch flag was hoisted over the Alix, the crew of which was sent ashore. The guardship then was manned by a Dutch officer and marines towed to Willemstad, arriving at Willemstad yesterday morning. Although the seizure of the Alix was plainly discernible from Puerto Cabello, the forts there did not fire upon the Geberland. There is great enthusiasm over the incident in Curacao. The steamer Maracaibo, which arrived at Willemstad from Venezuela, reports that when she was at Maracaibo the air was full of rumors of a revolution in the interior of Venezuela.

Educational conditions in Kentucky will be discussed as well as its resources, their development and conservation.

PRESIDENTIAL VOTE.

According to figures compiled by the New York Times, the vote for Taft in the recent election was 7,659,638, as compared with 7,623,486 for Roosevelt in 1904. The Democratic vote is given as 6,450,690, as against 5,077,971, four years ago.

According to the Times the Socialist vote was less this year than in 1904, the respective figures being 401,506 and 402,283. Fewer votes were cast for the prohibition candidates, the count standing 228,014 last fall as compared with 258,536 in the last presidential year.

In a few instances, says the Times, these figures are not final. But in every instance, it is declared, they are the best that can be obtained prior to the publication of the official canvass, and will differ from the original figures very slightly if at all.

ORGANIZE A NEW TOBACCO ASSOCIATION

LARGE NUMBER OF CHRISTIAN COUNTY GROWERS BREAK WITH THE PLANTERS' PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION.

Will Institute Loose Sale System.—Officials Chosen.—Allege That "Salaries and Graft and Not Love for Farmers" Animate Speakers.—Other Counties Invited to Join Movement, but Each to Make Its Sales as a Unit.

A large number of farmers, principally from North Christian, met at the courthouse Monday afternoon and, breaking with the Dark District Planters' Protective association, organized a new tobacco society which will institute the loose sale system of selling.

"The Farmers' Mutual Tobacco association" is to be the name of the organization.

To Sell as Unit.

Other counties are invited to affiliate, but it is provided that each county shall be a unit to itself in disposing of its product.

Resolutions were adopted declaring that the officers of the Planters' association had refused to grant prayers of relief and that the organization "rested upon the sufferings" of its members' families and children. It was affirmed that these farmers recognize that other people have rights of citizenship and that before they will "burn, murder and assassinate" they deem it proper to quit raising tobacco.

Wants Money Distributed.

A distribution of \$57,000 surplus, held by the association is called for. The attendance on the meeting was very large. The circuit court chamber was crowded and many persons stood in the aisles. Several association officials were in the city during the day, and some were intimate spectators at the meeting, but none of them took any part in the discussion of the resolutions.

Select Officers.

Temporary officers for the new association were selected as follows: L. R. Davis, ex-sheriff of Christian county, president; B. F. Fuller, vice president; Ben Wood, secretary. It was ordered that pledges should be prepared immediately and one man appointed in each of the five tax districts to see that these are circulated. The committee was appointed by the newly elected president as follows: For tax district No. 1, John Thurmond; No. 2, L. L. Leavell; No. 3, Curt West; No. 4, T. Walker; No. 5, Frank Pool. In naming Mr. Thurmond President Davis stated that he had never talked with Mr. Thurmond regarding the matter, but believed he would serve.

The meeting was called to order by B. F. Fuller, chairman of the meeting which two weeks ago adopted the Lyon county resolutions. Prayer was offered by Rev. E. H. Bull. The resolutions were introduced by L. R. Davis and were read by the secretary but many having failed to hear them, they were read again by Mr. Davis.

Dr. Clardy Speaks.

When discussion was called for Dr. J. D. Clardy, ex-congressman from this district, and on he spoke urging discretion upon the part of the farmers. He stated that he thought some of the clauses of the resolution were good but that he did not think it a good plan to form another organization until all methods of peaceful adjustment of differences had been tried and had failed. He said it was only by presenting the one buyer to the one seller could the farmers ever hope to successfully withstand the encroachments of the tobacco trust. He thought it was a wrong idea to form another association but the dissatisfied farmers should attempt to settle their differences with the present organization and maintain it in its strength. He gave the Planters' Protective association credit for having raised the prices on tobacco very materially since it had been a factor in the sale of the weed.

Says Law Won't Hold.

Hon. John Feland representative in the legislature, also addressed the meeting, calling upon the farmers to sell their tobacco to any one who would pay a satisfactory price for it and declaring that the Crecelius law forbidding pledged tobacco to be sold was not worth the paper it was written on. He declared he represented no trust or business interest, but spoke as one citizen to other citizens. Benton Brown, postmaster at Crofton, also made a speech in which he pointed to the sales that have been made loose by the farmers of the Green river district and in Warren county and declaring that he could not see why the plan which has proven feasible there should not also be a success in the dark district.

Too Much Surplus.

He declared there was no need for such an amount as \$57,000 in the

treasury of the Planters' Protective association, but merely enough to meet the running expenses of the organization.

Seth Myers offered an amendment for loose sales and the grading of tobacco on the wagon. This was not seconded.

In nearly all of the talks that were made the speakers disavowed any desire to disrupt the association.

In suggesting that officers be elected at yesterday's meeting, ex-Sheriff Davis stated that it was the desire of the promoters of the new organization to have matters in such shape that representatives could be sent to the meeting of the Union Tobacco society at their meeting in Louisville in January for the purpose of affiliating with that body, and he believed there would be no trouble in securing recognition from that society.

The resolutions in full follow:

The Resolutions.

"We, the farmers of Christian county, in a mass-meeting assembled, hereby bind ourselves together into an association for our mutual welfare. We have found it necessary to form this organization because the welfare of the individual farmer was not considered of any consequence by the Dark Tobacco Protective association, and the appeals which have been sent to the highly paid officers of that organization of our families and our children were unheeded by Mr. Ewing and the executive committee of the association.

"In the first instance, we believe that the farmer has a right to discuss his welfare and his interest without night riders prowling around to threaten and intimidate, because the farmer simply wishes to control, or at least have a voice, in the management of his own tobacco crop, and it is hereby resolved:

"That the chairman of this meeting is instructed to appoint a committee of three farmers to have prepared the necessary pledges to be signed by all who wish to join our organization, which is to be operated and conducted under the loose sale system, and said committee is authorized and empowered to make such arrangements as are necessary for the opening up of a loose sale in the city of Hopkinsville, Ky., and at such other places in Christian county as they might wish, and if the people of Hopkinsville are afraid to engage in legitimate business and to stand by the farmers in a loose sale and refuse to open up a loose sale in their city, why then, said committee is instructed to make necessary arrangements for the sale of said tobacco at Paducah or Louisville, or such other places as may be accessible.


