BIG CIRCUS WAR ON FIRED FACTS BUT "NEVER TOUCHED HIM"

JOHN W. GATES HAS ENTERED SAWDUST ARENA.

Backing a Show That Has Issued a Defiance to the Great Circus Trust.

PRESIDENT SMITH UNMOVED BY THE ARGUMENTS PRESENTED BY THE COMMITTEE OF HOPKINSVILLE CITIZENS.

Will Remodel the Old Passenger Depot, but Says That the Road Cannot See Its Way Clear to Erect a New Structure Here. Great Disappointment.

The Louisville & Nashville railroad company will remodel the present building, but will not erect a new passenger depot in Hopkinsville.

That was the answer which President Milton H. Smith made at Louisville Tuesday to the committee, composed of Mayor Meacham, Councilman Davis and Messrs. E. B. Long and R. E. Cooper.

The committee was loaded with facts and figures which they fired at the railroad's distinguished head. They showed him that the old structure was an architectural discredit to the town and to the company, that it was totally inadequate in its accommodations, besides, not being repro of, was a menace to other buildings in that part of town.

President Smith's courtesy and

urbanity were unfeeling, but his decision in the matter, he assured the committee, was not to be shaken.

He would improve the depot, he announced, and build an extension, adding a new baggage room. The old baggage apartment would be converted into a waiting room for colored people, giving two rooms for white patrons. In front of the building he would have a large train shed extending from Second to Third avenue, constructed, and he would have concrete platforms and walks laid around the property.

That was the best he could do for Hopkinsville.

The committee is very much disappointed, and so is the community. There is a crying need for new depot buildings both at the L. & N. and I. C. stations.

SPECIAL MESSAGE ON BROWNSVILLE MATTER



PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AT HIS DESK.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 14.—President Roosevelt sent a special message to the senate, today, saying that although there was no doubt about the guilt of some of the discharged negro soldiers in the Brownsville matter he is willing for those not actually guilty to be reinstated if they will tell all they know and not shield guilty companies.

FLYING MACHINE

Prominent Citizen the Inventor and He Is Highly Elated Over His Success.

Even since arial navigation began to be talked and has grown in popular favor and importance as the result of the very successful flying machines that have been built, Hopkinsville people have all been more or less interested in the science but only a few nights ago did it become known that there was at least one inventor of such machines in this town. The discovery was made when a passerby happened to look over the back fence to this gentleman's yard and saw him holding to a stout cord which, by reason of the power exerted by a big, canvas affair sailing above the ground at some distance, was pulling with much force.

Approached afterward on the subject the inventor modestly admitted that he had been studying the subject of flying machines for four or five years and that he believed he had solved the problem, but he refused at this time to let his name be used in connection with a reference to his invention. He talked freely regarding his machine and, now that he has been found out, offered to give another demonstration some time soon to which a limited number would be invited.

The flying machine is of the style commonly known as a "monoplane." Two wings made of a wooden frame work and canvass covering provide the lifting power, and suspended from these is the frame work of what is to be the car. The model with which the test was made only presents a surface in the wings of twenty square

feet, but when tested this sailed readily and without any indications of a desire to fall to the earth and developed a lifting power of probably forty pounds. It was tried on a night when a high wind was blowing and it rose without any delay of false moves.

The inventor is very much elated over the success which attended this first effort and says he will construct a larger and more complete model as soon as practicable.

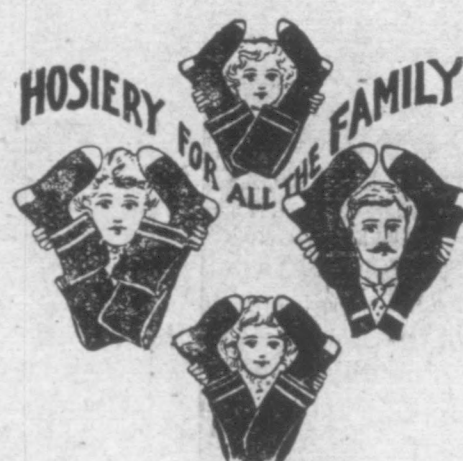
