## Death Comes To Nation On Second Safe Driving Day

Death came to the nation's highways early on this safe-driving day. It was the second annual observance of S-D Day, a day set by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety to bring to citizens' attention the toll that highway accidents take. But any faint hopes of a perfect day, free of traffic deaths, vanished soon after midnight.

The death count started quickly and there were at least three fatalities before S-D Day was three hours old. The first report came from Michigan, where L. T. Bell of Plymouth died when his car smashed into a Wayne County culvert at 2:15 a.m. EST. Shortly after 3 a.m. EST, Bruce Donald Mosher, 23, Glen Falls, N.Y., died when his car smashed into a tree on a levee in the Chicago area. A 29-year-old sailor, Gerald Lacro, was struck and killed by a truck at 3:25 a.m. EST.

### President Leads Appeals

President Eisenhower led the appeals for safety and caution on S-D Day. He pleaded with all Americans to "be alert, to be on guard, to be extra careful on our streets and highways."

"Last year an American man, woman or child was killed in traffic every 15 minutes," Mr. Eisenhower pointed out. "Someone was injured every 35 seconds. And this year, the record is worse; more people are dying, more are injured and crippled."

The first S-D Day last year, on Dec. 15, the safety council counted 51 traffic deaths. This was a reduction of only nine from the Dec. 15, 1954, total of 60.

The key figure today, however, was the total of 81 persons who were killed in auto accidents on Thursday, Dec. 2, last year. It was this toll which safety experts hoped would be cut dramatically before midnight tonight.

Americans approached this year's S-D Day with a steadily worsening traffic record already on the books. There have been 36,880 traffic deaths in the nation during the first 10 months of 1955, a jump of 7 per cent over last year. In addition, the October, 1955 toll of 3,920 deaths was the worst for any October since 1937 and the highest death rate for any month since December, 1951.

The highway massacre continued in November, with 154 persons dying in car crashes during the 30-hour Thanksgiving holiday last week.

## Conference Moves Toward Government Aid To Schools

The White House conference on education moved today toward a strong stand in favor of federal aid for building much-needed new public schools.

But though the views of the 1,800 delegates, acting as presidential advisers on school problems, added up to an overwhelling majority for federal aid, they placed several conditions on their support. The chief one was that there should be no federal control over school programs and policies.

The conference's formal report will not be made until the concluding session tonight of the four-day meeting called by President Eisenhower. But its stand was predetermined at a series of round table discussions Wednesday night and early today to sum up the delegates' views.

Program May Be Revised

The conference's decision is expected to affect the administration's proposals to Congress next year on the federal aid question. The administration has been considering revising the aid program it submitted last spring. That program placed emphasis on government loans for school construction with a lesser amount in outright grants.

The delegates split almost evenly on whether federal money for school buildings should go to all states or only the poorer ones. Only a small minority thought the aid should be limited to states conforming with the Supreme Court's anti-segregation decision.

Opinion was about evenly divided on whether the government should grant money for school operating expenses. But most delegates opposed granting federal funds for either buildings or operating expenses, to private and parochial schools.

They also took the position that the states and local communities should do more for the schools.

Chairmen Will Draft Report

These views were summed up by 15 delegates, who met in two panels until early this morning. The two panel chairmen, Pearl Wamamaker, Washington state superintendent of public instruction, and Tedger Fuller, executive secretary of the Council of Chief School Officers, will draft the final conference report from the summaries.

Earlier the conference had received a report that it seems to be "virtually impossible" for most states to meet their school building needs in the next five years.

In another development the U.S. Office of Education reported that classroom construction in the current school year is expected to increase more than 10 per cent over that of 1954-55. The office acknowledged, however, that a much larger increase is needed to meet school needs.

To office reported that there were 2,385,000 public, elementary and secondary school pupils above the normal capacity of publicly-owned school plants in use this year. This was a quarter of a million fewer excess pupils than the 1954 total of 2,644,000.

## Burley Markets Hit New High

Payments to tobacco growers Wednesday totaled \$8,354,983.69, as four markets — Shelbyville, Richmond, Paris and Somerset — had averages exceeding \$60 per 100.

Richmond floors nudged Shelbyville from the top position with an average of \$69.25, compared to Shelbyville's \$66.16. Most markets had advances of \$1 or higher, although Bloomfield's remained the same.

The Federal-State Market News Service reported that opening-day sales through previous high opening day record of \$55.98 set in 1953.

The general quality of tobacco sold Wednesday was under that marketed Tuesday, although average prices by grades improved on most floors. A slightly larger proportion of sales consisted of low quality and non-descript offerings Wednesday.

Practically all leaf, tip, and non-descript offerings were from \$1 to \$4 higher, and lugs and flings remained steady or gained up to \$1.

The news service said "quite a few" baskets reached \$67 a state practical top continued at \$66.

Only eight of 25 Kentucky markets reporting to the state Department of Agriculture reported averages lower than Tuesday's and no declines exceeded 71 cents.

## Over 23,000 Units Of Polio Vaccine May Go To Waste

Polio killed 42 Kentuckians last year. That's more polio deaths than from whooping cough, diphtheria, scarlet fever, and typhoid combined. Immunization has reduced the death menace of these old killers. Polio vaccine can do the same.

Children from one to nine years of age and pregnant women are eligible for the polio vaccine. Information about the shots can be obtained from your family physician or from the local health department of this country. The vaccine is already on hand in each county, and here can be secured from the Kentucky State Department of Health.

Now is the time to immunize against polio, urged U. Pentil Kokko, M.D., Director, Local Health Service, Kentucky State Department of Health. "If children are immunized now during cool weather, they will have time to build up a strong immunity before next summer when the seasonal outbreak of polio usually occurs."

## TRUMAN MEN INDICTED

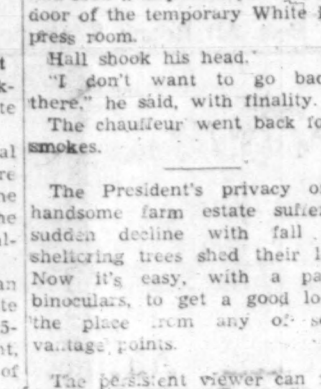

The picture in the Sun showed Mrs. Henry and the one Jonesboro woman winning checks for \$100.

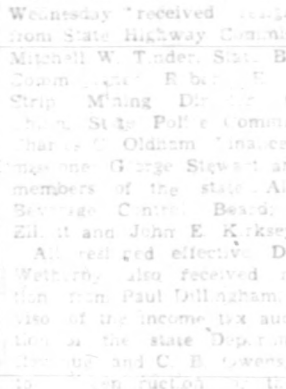

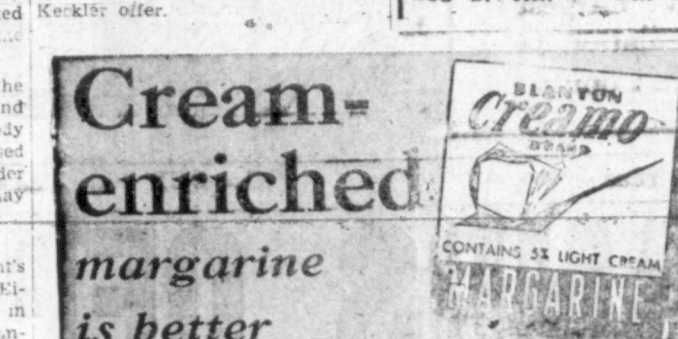

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### Abortion Legalized By The Soviets

MOSCOW, Nov. 30 (AP) — Russia legalized abortions in state medical institutions today in an apparent attempt to make planned parenthood

more desirable. The decision reversed long-standing Soviet policy on the subject. Abortion was legalized in a decree by the USSR supreme soviet repealing the anti-abortion law of 1936. It was the latest in a series of measures enacted since the death of Stalin reversing ear-

lier policies and liberalizing the Soviet penal code. Russia gave two reasons for making abortions in state medical institutions legal. One reason, it said, is that either married or unmarried women are entitled to planned parenthood. Birth control has always been

legal. Secondly, and most important, was the realistic consideration that the widespread illegal abortions which have been performed since 1936 have seriously impaired many women's health and caused many deaths. Today's action in effect restored the principle of "voluntary motherhood" which was enunciated in the early years after the revolution and rejected in 1936.

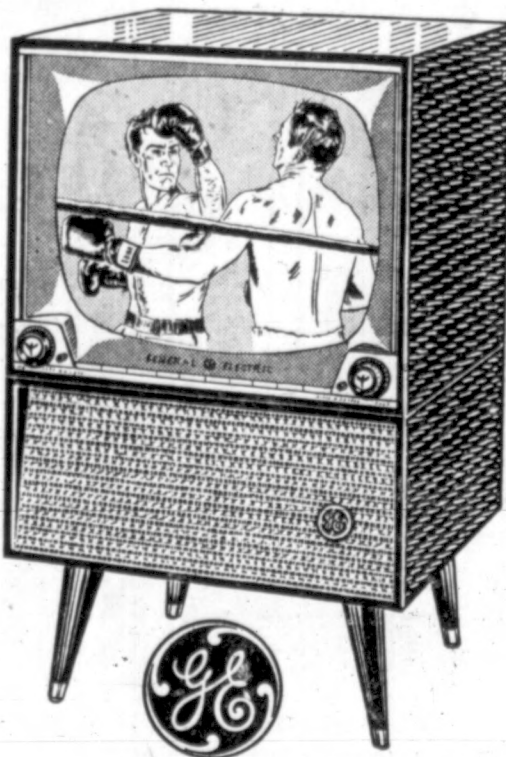

### Peter Lind Hayes Is Big Godfrey Fan

NEW YORK (AP) — Peter Lind Hayes, the heir-apparent to Arthur Godfrey's throne at CBS-TV, makes no bones about the fact that he is "one of Godfrey's biggest fans." "I think he's a genius," said Hayes today. Godfrey's the first one who got the drop on TV. He shows up — and that's all he has to do. He isn't anybody but himself. And his honesty is what makes him great.

"Another thing — I think he's the greatest salesman that ever lived. There isn't anyone who can sell a product the way he does." Hayes is in a peculiarly qualified position to assess the talents of his boss. It has become increasingly obvious to students of the TV menu that Godfrey has fished the likeable night club entertainer as his number one fill-in.

Can Talk To People  
"When he first asked me to take over his show," said Hayes, "he picked me, he said, because 'I think you can talk to people.' In my first year, I worked about 20 of his shows, in my second about 30, and this year, my gosh, I've been on more than the other years put together."

Hayes, born 40 years ago under the handle Joseph Lind, grew up in show biz. At one time, he and his mother Grace Hayes, were partners in an impersonation act that played the vaudeville circuit. His mother now runs a lodge in Las Vegas, Nev.

"It's a novelty place for Las Vegas," explained Hayes, "it features no gambling. All it's got is a juke box that plays Peter Lind Hayes records." Hayes, who has worked a successful night spot act for many years in London with his wife, Mary Healy, said he has had three major commitments lined up for 1956 — six weeks in Las Vegas and Miami beach early in the year and a four weekend in August in Vegas.

"I'm on call for Godfrey's morning show at any time," he pointed out.

Don't Be Clever  
Godfrey, Hayes said, had given him the most useful advice for working the morning show. "He told me," said Hayes, "to sit back, relax and enjoy it. And above all, don't try to be clever."

As a result of this advice, Hayes has discovered that Godfrey's morning stanza can be a rocking-chair assignment. However, Godfrey's two evening TV shows, Hayes said, were of a different character.

There's nothing to lean on with the "Talent Scouts Show," he said. "Many of the people who appear are terribly nervous and you're sitting in a real hot chair. The interviews are completely informal — I have two very good gag writers with me, however, who send up gags while we're on the air."

## Dairy Foods Face Stiff Competition

"Dairy foods face stiff competition in the food markets for a share of the consumer's dollar. The effectiveness of our appeal to consumers determines the amount of their dollar we receive," so stated John Moser, Oldham County dairyman, while commenting on the American Dairy Association sales program.

"In the past we have done very well in the future we will do even better," he said, "because Kentucky dairymen along with the dairymen of 43 other states will be investing 2 cents per hundred pounds of milk on a voluntary basis to develop a TOTAL SALES PROGRAM."

Kentucky will join this all out effort on January 1, 1938 to sell consumers more dairy products.

Moser continued, "Experts in promotion are working for dairy farmers in planning and carrying out this successful national sales campaign, doing the job effectively and efficiently. The amazing thing is that the directors of this non-profit organization have been able to keep the costs so low—less than two and one-half cents of each dollar being spent for administration. This program warrants the support of all dairymen."

A study of figures compiled over a 24-year period in Kentucky revealed that dairymen averaged 14 per cent, with about 85 per cent of the dairy occurring before the calves were 90 days old. Chief causes of the losses were abortion, stillbirth diarrhea and pneumonia.

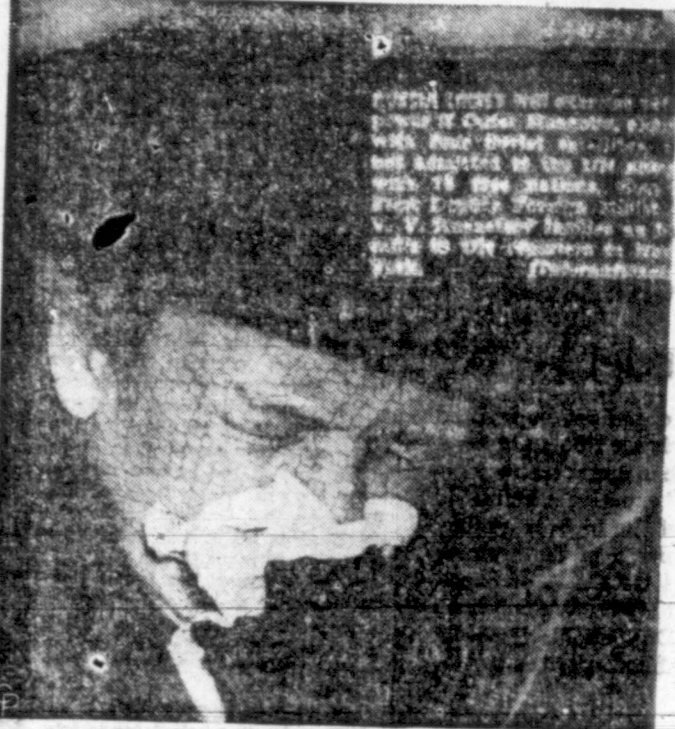

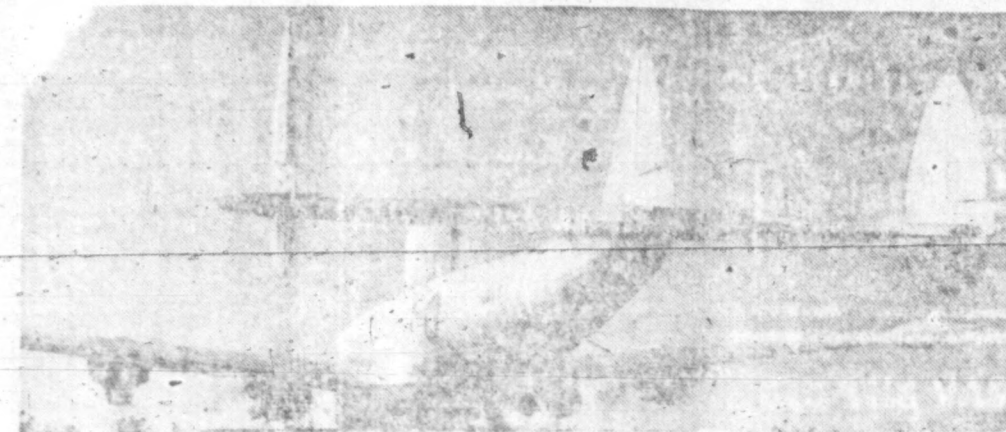

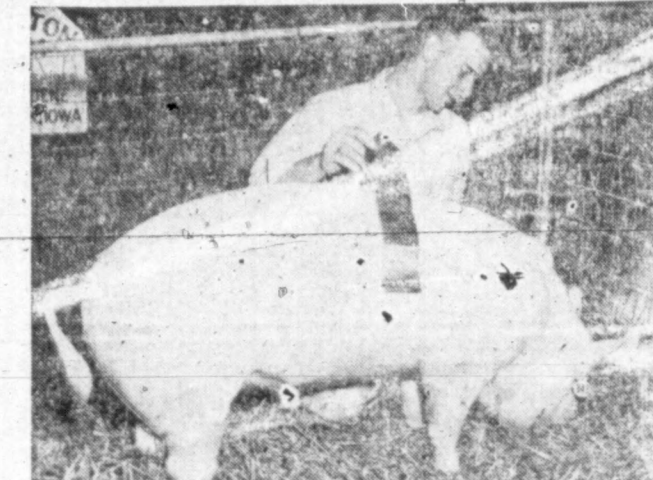
### WATCH COLORS FOR CARE DECORATIONS
