World War II Hero Dies Sunday

CONCORD, N.H. (U.P.)—Major Frank D. Merrill, famed commander of Merrill's Marauders in World War II, died Sunday night on a Florida vacation trip, according to word received here today.

The 52-year-old retired Army officer had been New Hampshire's commissioner of public works and highways since his appointment in 1949 by then Gov. Sherman Adams, now assistant to President Eisenhower. A native of Wrentham, Mass., Merrill held decorations ranging from the Distinguished Service Medal to what he once called "occupation medals and other assorted junk."

He was vacationing with his wife and another couple when death came suddenly at a hotel in Fernandina, Fla. The vacation trip followed a meeting in New Orleans last week of the American Association of State Highway Officials at which Merrill was elected president.

New Post Advised By Herbert Hoover

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (U.P.)—Former President Hoover believes Congress should create a new post of administrative vice president to ease the rigors of the presidency.

The 81-year-old former president made the suggestion Sunday in a televised interview when reporters asked him for recommendations to lighten the burden of the presidency in view of Mr. Eisenhower's illness.

Mr. Hoover said the new position should be filled by presidential appointment. The new officer would be assigned such duties as the chief executive would delegate to him, he added.

The former president said, he thinks the post could be created by Congress without amending the Constitution.

If such legislation were enacted, he said, "I do not believe" the burdensome post of the presidency would be beyond the physical capabilities of any one man.

Mr. Hoover said Sherman Adams, chief presidential aide to President Eisenhower, does not now have the legislative authority to perform many presidential duties and functions.

Calloway Residents Receive \$19,741

Frankfort, Ky. — Residents of Calloway County received \$19,741 in November under Kentucky's three public assistance programs, old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to needy blind, Commissioner of Economic Security W. Garnett Johnson reported today.

These payments were listed: Old age assistance, \$17,790; aid to dependent children, \$1,806; aid to needy blind, \$145.

Total outlay for the month was \$3,262,226 with old age grants totaling \$1,963,178; dependent children's allowances \$1,196,319 and dependent blind payments aggregating \$112,729.

West Has Pleasant 77; East Freezes

Desert winds made it feel like summer in Los Angeles today, but wintry weather gripped most of the rest of the nation.

The Southern California "heat wave" was walled in on desert winds which hit gusts of 35 miles per hour in the canyons. The temperature rose to 77 degrees at Los Angeles and more of the same below zero at Grantsburg, Wis., early today and Syracuse, N.Y., measured nine inches of snow on the ground — five inches, of it deposited in a 12-hour period. Utica, N.Y., had a four inch snowfall.

Across the nation temperatures were near freezing or below early today from the central plains and Rocky Mountain states eastward to the Atlantic Seaboard.

Steve Nelson And Other Reds, Win High Court Review

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (U.P.)—Steve Nelson and four other Pennsylvania communists today won a Supreme Court review of the Smith Act convictions for conspiring to advocate the violent overthrow of the government.

The high court soon will schedule arguments on the case and hand down a decision later this term that may set broad standards for future prosecutions under the 1940 Smith Act.

Will Slow Down After This And One More Conference

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower met with Republican congressional leaders today for an all-day conference on the administration's legislative program for the coming year.

It was the first of two big White House conferences to be cleared from the presidential calendar before Mr. Eisenhower heads doctors' orders to ease up on his work load.

His physicians said, after examining him at Walter Reed Army hospital Saturday, that he is still making a "basic" slow recovery from his Sept. 24 heart attack but that he has been exhibiting some signs of fatigue from his increased official activities recently.

Today's conference was to run through the afternoon. The White House said Mr. Eisenhower would leave the meeting for two or three hours at mid-day to rest.

Mr. Eisenhower called the meeting to give Republican House and Senate leaders a preview of his legislative plans for 1956 and his State of the Union message to be read to Congress by clerks after Congress convenes.

Roy Brandon Dies Suddenly On Saturday

Roy Brandon, age 60, died suddenly Saturday night at the Baptist hospital in Memphis, Tennessee.

Mr. Brandon served on the first draft board of Calloway County from 1940 to 1942, has served as a member of the Fiscal Court and was a member of the Pleasant Grove Methodist church serving as Stewart from 1950 to '54.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Roy Brandon of Hazel Route one, one son, Clifford Brandon of Paducah, two daughters, Mrs. Hubert Coles, Hazel Route three, and Mrs. Gene Dale Orr of Mayfield, three sisters, Mrs. Lillie Orr, Murray Route four, Mrs. Halford Orr, Hazel Route one and Mrs. Macon White of Murray, two brothers, Willie and Roy Brandon of Hazel, one half-sister, Mrs. Morgan Orr of Murray, one half-brother, Robert Brandon of Hazel, Route three and eight grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Pleasant Grove Methodist church this afternoon at 2:00 conducted by Bro. John Pugh and Bro. John Deal. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Byrd On Fifth Trip To South Pole

PORT LYTTLETON, New Zealand, Dec. 12 (U.P.)—Rear Adm. Richard E. Byrd, enroute today to the South Pole, said the bases to be established by Operation Deepfreeze are the prelude to limited human habitation of the Antarctic continent.

The scientific undertaking has the two-fold purpose of implementing the United States program for the International Geophysical Year and also will carry forward the work of exploration and mapping started by earlier expeditions.

The United States plans, engineered by the U.S. Navy in cooperation with the National Academy of Sciences and the National Science Foundation, call for the establishment of six observation stations. Five of them will be set up around the perimeter of the continent. McMurdo Sound, Ligula America, Marie Bird Land, Knox Coast and Cape Adare. The central station will be established at the South Pole and maintain it throughout the winter. It will be the first time man has set foot on the pole since the 1911-12 Amundsen and Scott expeditions.

On the eve of his departure Adm. Byrd told the people of New Zealand of "imperial rearmament" a force that can unite men of all creeds, colors and races to answer the divisive forces of materialism.

Byrd said that since his first contact with the Oxford group in 1939 he has watched the progress of moral rearmament, "with great satisfaction."

"The application of this spiritual force to many prospective danger spots has turned disunity into harmony and set a star of hope. MRA, I am convinced, is an ideology in which all men could enlist with full confidence that it is a powerful spiritual force that is so desperately needed in the world today," Byrd said.

Rev. Coyle comes to Murray after two years at West Union, Illinois.

All members of the church are urged to be on hand Wednesday to welcome the new pastor of the church.

Second Guessing

Many a strange thing has hap-
pened in "bow" history, and the
Sugar Bowl claims the grand-
daddy of them all, with the pos-
sible exception of Roy Reigel's
wrong way run back in 1929 in
the Rose Bowl.

But on Jan. 1, 1956, seven years
after the Reigel escapade, 37,000
fans braved the rain-soaked
Sugar Bowl for the New Year's
Day classic between the nation's
finest team, T-C-U, and the pride
of Dixie, L-S-U.

All the scoring occurred in
the second period, and before and
after, neither team could advance
the ball one inch. It was a dis-
appointing situation for the fans
who wanted to see T-C-U's All
American Sammy Baugh cut loose
on the ground and in the air.

L-S-U received the opening
kickoff and advanced the ball to
the T-C-U 2-yard line. Hank
Criss passed to Mel Barrett, if
believer his name was Mel, and
he was hit short of the goal by
Baugh. Criss hit the line on the
first play for one yard, then he
was stopped for no gain. A pass
from Criss to Jess Fatheree was
incomplete. Again Criss was stop-
ped for no gain and the ball went
over to the Frogs of T-C-U.

Baugh then made one of his
all-time boners with the ball on
the 4-yard line. He failed back
in pass and "war" hit behind the
goal, fumbled, and the ball rolled
out of the end zone for a safety,
which gave L-S-U a 2-0 lead in

the second quarter.

After the kickoff, L-S-U fumbled
and T-C-U recovered on the
Tiger 40-yard line. Lawrence pas-
sed to Walls for 23 on the 17-yard
line. Two plays later, Baugh made
up for his earlier mistake by
sweeping end for a gain that put
the ball squarely in front of the
goal posts.

Baugh lead his team back into
the huddle and called for the toe
of Manton to attempt a field goal.
Then they lined up. Baugh knew
it was or never as he knelt down
to hold the ball for the placement.
37,000 fans rose to their feet as
the ball was snapped. Baugh
placed it down. Manton advanced
and the kick was in the air. The
official threw his arms up signal-
ing the kick was good, and the
crowd broke into hysterics.

And so it went, all afternoon
long for the remaining two quar-
ters. L-S-U would advance the
ball just enough to have it inter-
cepted by Baugh or Manton, or
an occasional lost fumble.

Campanella Wins Award Third Time

NEW YORK (AP) — Roy Cam-
panella, who climaxed baseball's
"comeback story of the year" by
winning his third most valuable
player award, said today he wished
Brooklyn Dodger teammate Duke
Snider "had won this one."

"Winning the award three times
is just an overwhelming experience
and I can't say how happy I
am," the brilliant Negro catcher
said. "But, at the same time, I
really wish Duke could have won
this one. He such a great hitter
and, after all, I did win the award
twice before."

Campanella, who also won the
award in 1951 and 1953, beat out
Snider this year in one of the
juicier races in history. The 34
year old backstop polled 226 points
to Snider's 221 and was nipped
on each of the 34 ballots while
the slugging Brooklyn outfielder
was left completely off one.

Ernie Banks, the Chicago Cubs'
brilliant shortstop, was third with
195 points while Willie Mays of
the New York Giants, who won
in 1954, was fourth with 165. Robin
Roberts, Ted Kluszewski, Don
Newcombe, Stan Musial, Hank
Aaron and Peeve Reese rounded
out the top 10.

Lose Weight With Scientific Snacks Between Meals

None other than a health and nutrition expert advises those trying to lose weight to snack between the three regular meal periods. If you cut down hunger, and the dieter is likely to eat less at each of the "three squares."

But you have to make sure you are not what Dr. Fredrick J. Stare of Harvard University calls a "common nibbler."

Stare, head of the department of nutrition, Harvard School of Public Health, defined the two types of nibbling during a recent (Swift and Co.) food conference here.

"A scientific nibbler has a part of the main meal between meals," said Stare. "It may be a piece of fruit at 11 in the morning, instead of with lunch; a glass of milk saved for supper and drunk before retiring."

"He or she may eat as many as six or seven times a day. But the nibble must be part of what should have been eaten at meals, not an extra. This is scientific snacking."

"If your between-meal snacks are extras you might as well not be on a reducing diet. This is common nibbling."

"The whole aim," said the nutritionist, "is to decrease the number of calories eaten in a 24-hour period. The right type of nibbling makes it easier for some dieters to do just that."
