### Injury Ridden Western On Road

BOWLING-GREEN, Dec. 14 — An injury ridden Western Kentucky State College cage squad left today for Tulsa, Okla., where it takes on the University of Tulsa Thursday night in an invasion of the Midwest. Out of the lineup for the Tulsa game and the Oklahoma City University clash Friday night will be three regular starters. All-America candidate Forest Able is still nursing a bruised foot, starting junior guard Ronnie Clark has a bad knee, and set-or-forward George Orr is out with a leg injury.

Commenting on Western's loss to Cincinnati, 54-53, last Saturday night, Coach Ed Diddle said, "When we get Able, Clark and Orr healthy again, this will be a different team."

Diddle expects to take an 11 man squad with him on the western trip. The probable starting lineup for both games will include sophomore Monty Holland at center, sophomores Owen Lawson and Eric Back at guards, and sophomore Bill Case and junior Bob Daniels at forwards.

When the Hilltoppers return here Sunday they will have four more of their nine road games left on the schedule. Western plays three games in the Kentucky Invitational Tournament at Louisville Dec. 27-29, and meets Xavier at Cincinnati, Jan. 3.

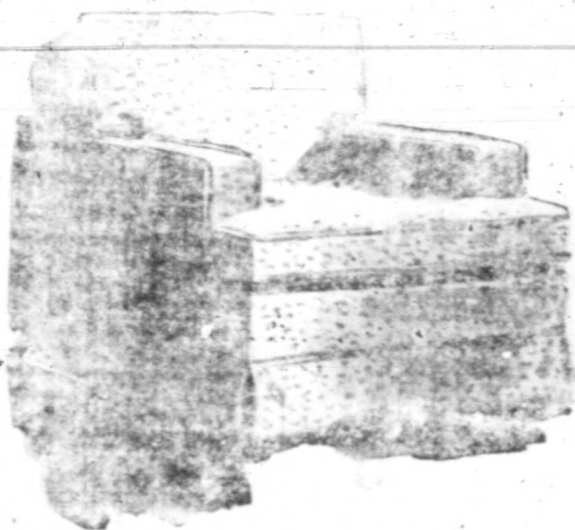

**Bitter Primary Not All Forgotten**

FRANKFORT, Dec. 14 (AP)—Despite the surface cordiality which

marked the inauguration of A. B. Chandler as governor Tuesday, there still were a few reminders of the bitter Democratic primary.

One of the items that members of the new governor's staff found when they walked into his suite of offices in the State Capitol was a framed invoice for the green rug on the floor.

The invoice showed the rug bought from the Strassel Co. in Louisville, cost \$2,700. During the primary, Chandler charged that the Wetherby Administration paid \$30,000 for the rug.

When Wetherby and his staff moved out Monday, they left the

framed photostat of the invoice behind.

And one incident marred the celebration around the inauguration platform as three girls in the throng sported "Combs for Governor" buttons. Chandler defeated Bert T. Combs, Prestonsburg, in the August primary.

When the governor's son, Dan Chandler, asked the girls to remove the buttons, one answered, "I haven't changed."

The MPs know all of the signs, and they are trying to ignore them and give the soldier a break—unless he's overdone his overstay.

Cpl. Robert Thornton of Cabool, Mo., according to my informant, had to confess that he read the signs wrong recently.

It was three in the morning. The corporal spotted a GI parading down the street—solo—"hup-two-three-four" in accepted cadence.

The corporal bounded out of his car and asked the young man for his pass. The boy produced it. The pass was good for another 24 hours. The MP demanded to know why the kid was "hup-two-three-four" at that hour in the night. The soldier, thinking he was in a mess, said:

"Well, sir, my frauin just told she'd be my frau, and I came straight here to pick out a ring."

**Christmas Brings Out The Best**

WASHINGTON (AP)—It may be the Christmas spirit, or perhaps just the normal flow of the milk of human kindness. But the word I get is that the gum-shoes of the Army are softing a bit—at least in Germany.

My informant sends word from Heidelberg of strange happenings among the military police, particularly a winking at violations by slightly-absent-without-leave GIs.

The major says that the MPs often are rounding up wayward soldiers and driving them back to their outfits instead of to the guardhouse.

This report is almost enough to make a veteran of World War II quit his job in the hardware store back in Dubuque and re-enlist just to witness such a miracle.

My source, who is stationed at the Army's headquarters, says that last month alone the Army military police in Munich gathered in more than 200 AWOL GIs and got them back to their outfits in time to say "Yes, sir" before their first sergeants knew they were missing.

Lt. Col. H. J. Michau of Union City, N. J., the Army's "high sheriff" in Munich, put it like this:

**Cuts Down Courts Martial**  
"If we can grab an AWOL who is only a few hours overdue on a pass, we can get him back to his unit in time for duty—and possibly save him no end of trouble."

The Army is saved trouble, too. It doesn't have to court martial a boy; something the Army doesn't always relish.

Even a good soldier can come down with carelessness and overstay a leave. Say, the kid has been

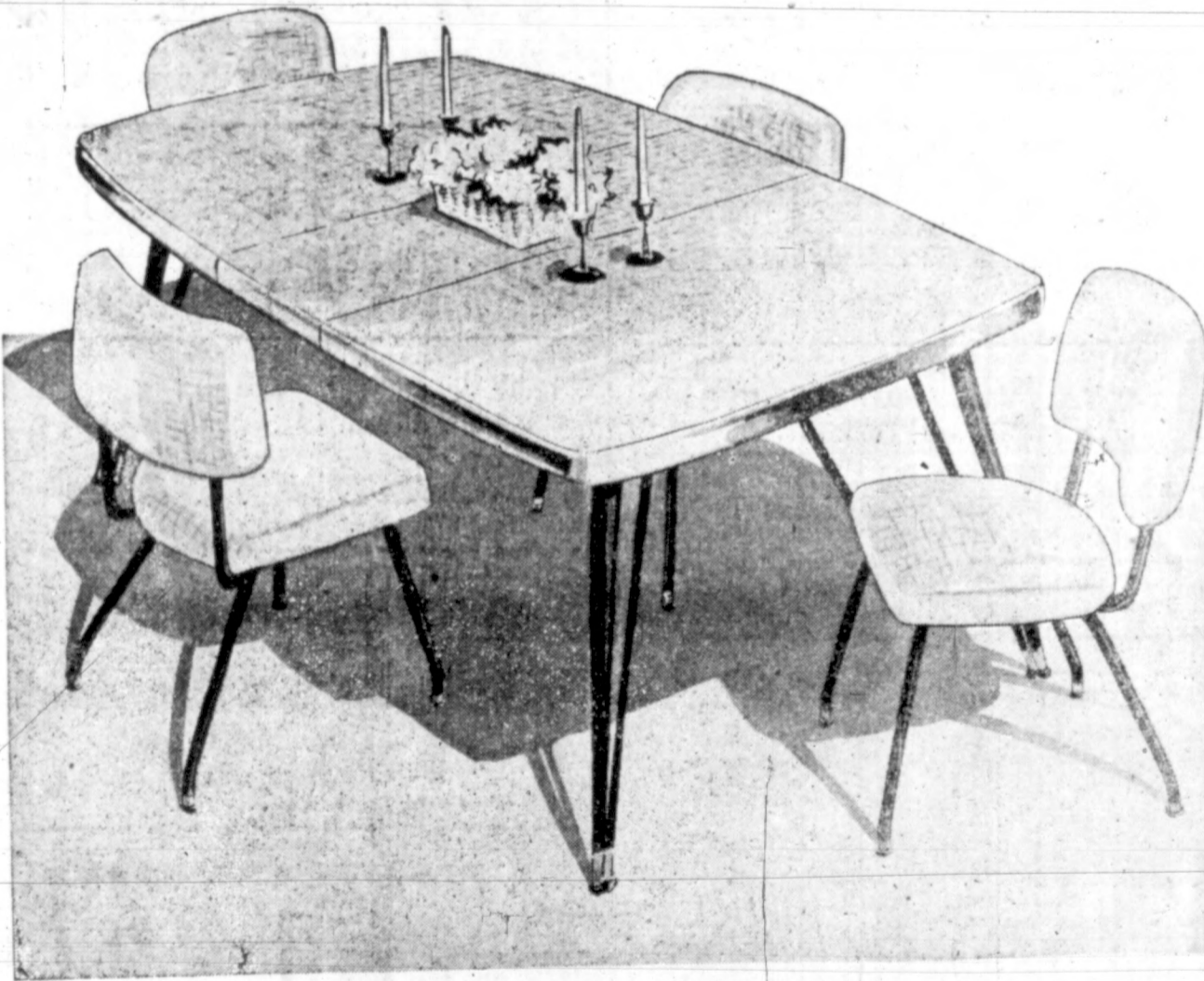

HOLLYWOOD — Yul Brynner, bald head and all, is expected to sizzle the nation's females next year as a new-type screen romantic. But the actor yawns he'd rather be a director.  
Brynner's gleaming pate will decorate two of Hollywood's biggest 1956 films, "The Ten Commandments" and "The King and I." Both roles are designed to make him a threat to the young, romantic Rocks and Tabs of Hollywood.  
But for Brynner's next film he wants a story he can both direct and star in — or just direct.  
"Directing is for me the most fascinating work," he decided today as he walked his German shepherd dog around the 20th Century Fox stage between scenes of "The King and I."  
"I'm watching" for both acting and directing changes. In fact, when Fox asked me to do "The

King and I" I suggested I direct it. But they felt they would rather have me play the King."  
Wants Modern Movie  
Brynner rhymes with winner hopes his next movie will be modern. He rose to stardom in "The King and I" on Broadway and hasn't been back to hair and charcoal gray suits since. For four years he played the king on the stage in those Siamese draped pants and shining head, and now he's repeating the familiar role for the screen.  
His only break from the part came when he starred in Cecil B. DeMille's "The Ten Commandments." As Ramses he swept about in short skirts, magnificent gold-lined capes and no hair.  
"If a part requires it, I would shave my head again," he insists. "I have no feeling about my looks."  
"I've been shaving my head every day since 1951. Except last summer when I was home on vacation and I was too lazy to shave."  
Any fans who wish to see what Brynner looks like with hair can spot him in his old movie now making the rounds on television, "Port of New York."  
Not Bored With King  
Despite his 1,500 performances as the king, Brynner is not bored with repeating the lines, this time to Deborah Kerr, who sings for the first time in the role the late
