KITTANNING, Pa., Dec. 16 (AP)—A 15-year old girl fought for her life today in the same hospital where a 17-year old rejected suitor who wounded her and killed her parents and uncle died Thursday night.

The youth, John Fallone, was fatally wounded Thursday when he traded shots with a 35-man posse and wounded one policeman.

Officials at Armstrong County Memorial Hospital said the condition of Gladys Small was so critical that the bullet lodged in her chest could not be removed. The policeman, Gus Zanos of Apollo, Pa., was in satisfactory condition with a head wound.

Police said the love sick youth, an above average student, bought the ammunition for his rifle with money given him by his mother to buy his father a Christmas present.

Counterfeiters Are Apprehended

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 16 (AP)—A "conscientious" state employee and another man faced charges today of plotting to counterfeit "possibly one million dollars" in an Arizona Highway Department office.

Police and U.S. Secret Service agents wound a three-week undercover, round the clock investigation Thursday with the arrest of David E. Stonehocker, 29, a multitalented offset press operator, and William E. Shearer, 26, a Phoenix salesman for the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Stonehocker was arrested at his office in the state Highway Department where Secret Service Agent George W. Walker said, "Quite a number of \$10 and \$20 bills, as well as almost 100 pounds of 'quality bonded paper' were found."

Capt. Orme Morehead, chief of Phoenix police detectives, said the bonded paper was sufficient to print about \$200,000 in counterfeit \$10 and \$20 bills. Authorities, he said, believed the plot involved printing of "possibly a million dollars" in bogus money.

Officers said Shearer, taken into custody as he started his day's work, had possession of certain proofs of \$10, \$20 and \$50 bills and a \$1,000 bill.

Both men face charges of possessing material for making counterfeit money. Stonehocker waived preliminary hearing when he appeared before U.S. Commissioner C. E. Wilson following his arrest Thursday. Shearer asked for a hearing and Wilson set Dec. 22 as the date. Bond for each man was set at \$10,000.

Officers made the arrest before any counterfeit money had been printed.

Dr. Underwood Resigns Post On Thursday

LOUISVILLE, Dec. 16 (AP)—Dr. Bruce Underwood state health commissioner resigned late Thursday with the statement that his resignation was "not politically motivated" nor the result of pressure.

He also announced that he planned to give up his post as secretary-general manager of the Kentucky State Medical Association, and recommended that the two offices no longer be held by one man.

Members of the state Board of Health and the KSMMA will meet Monday at Frankfort with Gov. A. B. Chandler to discuss his recommendation and other matters pertaining to the state's health setup.

Underwood said he plans to go to Washington to accept a post with the U.S. Public Health Service to work under the Hill-Burton program, which provides federal aid for hospital construction.

His official title will be chief of the professional services branch of the PHS Division of Hospital and Medical Facilities.

The resignation of Dr. William Lamb, deputy state health commissioner in charge of program services, also was announced Thursday.

Lamb did not give a reason for his resignation, effective Dec. 31, but said he had a "number of offers" of positions elsewhere. The two resignations were not believed directly related.

If his recommendation is carried out the Board of Health and KSMMA will be separated. The connection between public health and private medicine has existed in the Commonwealth since 1905, but Kentucky is the only state in the nation where it still is in effect.

The KSMMA at its annual meeting here in September made a preliminary move to divorce the two groups and make the editor of the KSMMA Journal, a practicing physician.

Dr. E. M. Howard Harlan, president of the Board of Health, said Thursday that the board has "no objection one way or the other" about the proposed separation.

The KSMMA Council delegation to Frankfort Monday will be headed by Dr. Gant Galtier, Hopkinsville, president, and Dr. Richard R. Slucher, Buechel, president-elect.

Turncoat Not Red Anymore, He Says

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 16 (AP)—Richard Tennessee, a Korean War turncoat, returned to the United States today and said "I have come home as an American and not as a Communist."

"I have no use for Communism," said the 22-year old Alden, Minn., ex-soldier shortly after arriving here aboard a Northwest Orient Airlines plane.

Tennessee, who not pinpoint reasons as to why he decided to return home.

"I prefer not to talk about this now," he said. "I have my own reasons and I want to look around at home and think it over a long time before I say."

"I'm very anxious to get home to Minnesota and be a farmer again like I was before I went into the Army."

Tennessee said he did not expect punishment for what he did because "I think I am protected by the terms of the armistice."

Tennessee also ducked questions on statements he made saying he was convinced United Nations' forces in Korea had used germ warfare on North Koreans and Chinese Reds.

"Now that I'm home I'll have to think this over again," he said. "But while I was there the evidence I was shown certainly indicated germ warfare was used."

He said evidence shown him included alleged United Nations' germ bombs.

Tennessee said the fact the federal courts had freed from military prosecution turncoats William A. Cowart, Dalton, Ga., Otho G. Bell, Hillsboro, Miss., and Olympia, Wash., and Lewis W. Griggs, Jacksonville, Texas, was not a factor in his return.

Bitter Cold Chills Nation

The bitter cold wave of the season chilled the nation from the Pacific Northwest to the southern Eastern Seaboard today.

The cold wave spread out from a killer blizzard that lashed Canada and the snow and ice were blamed for at least nine deaths in the two countries.

Near-blizzards were blamed for deaths in South Dakota and Indiana and icy roads killed two persons in Pennsylvania and one in Wisconsin.

In Canada, the prairie provinces were digging out from one of the worst blizzards in their history. There were four persons known dead and home dwindled for a farmer and laborer missing since Monday.

Search crews bucked 20-foot-high drifts hunting for the missing men, but without success. Elsewhere, many Saskatchewan roads were still blocked by up to 12-foot drifts and snowplow crews and communications line repairs were worked around the clock.

The massive freeze hit all the way to the southeast coastal states and part of the Gulf Coast early today. The below freezing line stretched westward across the country, including most of Oregon, Washington and Nevada.

Sub-zero readings which included an icy 48 below in Western Pennsylvania, where four - above readings were predicted, and in Chicago, where it was a biting six above, registered early today.

Kefauver Puts Hat In The Ring

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver announced formally today that he is a candidate for the 1956 Democratic presidential nomination.

The lanky Tennessee told a crowded news conference he again will wear a "vicious campaign" for the highest office in the land even though he failed to win his party's nomination in 1952.

Kefauver said in a prepared statement that he will fight for the nomination "as many as I can." The statement did not identify these primaries, however.

Third Announcement
Kefauver is the third Democrat to announce formally for the party's 1956 nomination. The others are Adlai E. Stevenson, the 1952 standard bearer, and Gov. Frank J. Lausche of Ohio who announced this week that he will enter Ohio's presidential primary as a favorite son candidate. Gov. Averell Harriman of New York also has announced that his name will be placed in nomination at the national convention, but he insists he is not an "active" candidate.

Kefauver pledged in his nomination statement that, as a candidate, he will "seek to maintain the spirit of unity which now permeates our party."

But he added that he will, as in the past, attempt "to advance the forward-looking, progressive traditions of the Democratic Party which characterized the administrations of Presidents Roosevelt and Truman."

"We must continue to seek solutions to great social problems in human terms—something which the Republicans have signally failed to do," the senator said.

Murray State Hopes To Break Even On Road Trip To West

Murray State, seeking to further its basketball fortunes, is following Horace Greeley's advice by going west—for four games.

In commenting upon the series which begins tonight with Texas Western at El Paso, Texas, Coach Rex Alexander said that Murray has a good chance of breaking even.

"From what I have seen of our boys and from what I know of their style of basketball, our chances are very good," he said.

Commenting upon his team's 96-96 victory over Middle Tennessee last Monday, Coach Alexander said that Murray looked its best in the game of any so far this season.

"We had more hustle and team spirit than we have had all season. We played very good ball down there," he concluded.

A ten man travelling squad left Murray Thursday morning for Memphis where they boarded a plane for El Paso. The Del Camino Hotel in El Paso will be the team headquarters for Texas Western and New Mexico A&M games.

The Racers will leave El Paso Sunday for Continental flight 121 for Albuquerque. Following a short stop over, the Murrayans then fly to Amarillo where they will be met by West Texas State college officials.

Following the round robin in Canyon, the Murrayans fly back to Memphis on December 21 and then to Murray by car.

The Racers will be going to

Texas without the services of Jim Gaikey, 6-8 center who was suspended last Saturday for training rules violation.

Murray, which has a 3-1 record thus far, faces a stiff test in its first game. Texas Western is favored to win the Border Conference title this year, mainly on the strength of its returning lettermen. The Miners essentially have the same team that won eight of the last nine games of the season last year.

The Miner were undefeated on their home court last year. Murray defeated the Miners in the first meeting of the two schools last season 76-69.

The Racers met December 17 at a Border Conference school, is a team of unknown quality. Murray's coach has not received any scouting reports of the A&M school or any other type of information and will have to organize his team's attack from court-side.

Hamline University will bring an impressive reputation when Murray meets the Pipers for the first time December 19 in the West Texas Holiday Doubleheader in Canyon, Texas. The Minnesota school has won 17 of the last 22 crowns of the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

West Texas, which Murray will face December 20, is in the process of rebuilding, but never the less Coach Alexander is not underrating them. Although the Buffaloes have just one player returning from the team which went to the NCAA playoff against San Francisco, they have a winning tradition behind them.

The Thoroughbreds are tied with Morehead State in the Ohio Valley Conference with two victories apiece. For the season, Murray has beaten Tennessee Tech 95-92, Hardin-Simmons 87-62, and Middle Tennessee 85-68. The lone defeat has been at the hands of highly ranked University of Louisville 76-82.

Burley Price Continues Down

The average prices at Kentucky burley warehouses continued to decline slightly as markets here last day, according to a survey of the third week of the current season.

The statewide average slipped to \$59.67 per hundred on 14,289,000 pounds of tobacco sold.

The average at Shelbyville dropped below \$61 for the first time in a week as 843,812 pounds of tobacco sold for \$60.94—but the average was high for the state.

Lexington sold 2,779,866 pounds at an average of \$60.62 per hundred pounds.

Other high averages about the state included: Danville \$60.51, Mount Sterling \$60.74, Springfield \$60.18, Greensburg \$60.17, Mayesville \$60.12, Harrodsburg \$60.05 and Carrollton \$60.01.

A total of 545,115 pounds of One Sucker-35 sold for an average of \$34.54 at Russellville, but the average for both of the two markets reporting was \$31.10.

Green River-36 average prices went up to \$31.35 on a total of 360,227 pounds of tobacco. The Madisonville market reported the top figure of \$32.34 on total sales of 96,415 pounds.

Company Will Expand Greatly

CALVERT CITY, Dec. 16 (AP)—The Pittsburgh Metallurgical Co. Thursday announced plans for a one million dollar expansion project at its ferroalloy plant near here.

The company said the present work force would be increased significantly. The firm now has 650 employees.

The expansion will include the installation of two new electric furnaces, one of them scheduled to be the largest of its type in the world in use in ferroalloy production.

Ten of the firm's 27 existing electric furnaces are located here. All of the firm's output goes to producers of stainless steel.

The new expansion is the fifth new major industrial development announced during 1955 in this mushrooming industrial area.

Previously, Pennsylvania Salt Mfg. Co., Goodrich Chemical Co., National Carbide Co., and General Aniline & Film, announced expansion projects costing 10 million dollars.

The Goodrich addition now is in operation.

Studebaker Plans Largest Ad Program In Its History

The largest advertising and merchandising program in its history and the most concentrated model announcement ever programmed for a single make of automobile has been scheduled by the Studebaker division of Studebaker-Packard Corporation for its 1956 models.

The \$12 million campaign supplemented by a \$3.5 million program by Studebaker dealers represents a 70 per cent increase over 1953. In reporting the record expenditures, William A. Keller, general sales manager, said \$2.4 million was planned for the three week period following introduction of the new cars and trucks in late November and early December in dealerships across the country.

This heavy campaign with major emphasis in newspaper advertising was timed to back up the major change in styling philosophy which gave the division's dealers the only completely restyled cars in the volume low-price field for 1956.

It was with the intention of reestablishing the company's position as a strong volume competitor in its price class that the new big-car design was brought out for the President, Commander and Champion sedan and station wagon series and a special line of sports type cars was introduced.

Keller termed the final dealer reports of a one million person attendance in showrooms and the largest backlog of orders since 1950 a reflection of the new advertising program. This is the first sound market indication of immediate public acceptance for the new styling which has made the Studebaker a larger car with greater interior room and trunk space, he said.

The marketing official said that the campaign is the first in Studebaker history where a substantial portion has been under the administration and supervision of the dealer group. Dealers formed advertising committees in each of the 18 sales zones and banded into a dealer advertising association during the last year in preparation for the concerted program built around the major styling change. The advertising fund of the association is entirely dealer supported.

In discussing the form the campaign would take, Keller said newspapers again would receive the largest share of the budget—32 per cent. In addition, he pointed out that television expenditures will be upped 60 per cent over 1955 to add new stations in line with dealer recommendations and to carry out a balanced spot television program. Magazine advertising will be up 41 per cent, direct mail 20 per cent and the company will return to outdoor billboard advertising.

At the same time, he indicated a complete 12-month program has been laid out in merchandising and sales promotion materials for dealer use. This year for the announcement period, dealers were supplied with a package incorporating more than 120 separate items such as window displays, streamers, posters and catalogues, which the dealers, in more than 1200 telegrams to the factory, agreed was the most extensive ever provided by the factory.

On the new Hawk cars, first complete line of sports-type cars to be introduced by an American manufacturer. Third round came with the announcement program on the company's Transar truck line which is in the light and medium duty fields, covering 80 per cent of the truck market.

Keller said the new styling coupled with the new marketing and advertising programming is the key to Studebaker re-establishment as a strong volume competitor in the low-price field and the key to dealer profits in one of the most competitive sales periods in industry history.

While dealers are enjoying heavy floor traffic in showrooms and the highest level of orders in the past, another highly encouraging factor, he said, is the spurt in new dealer franchising. 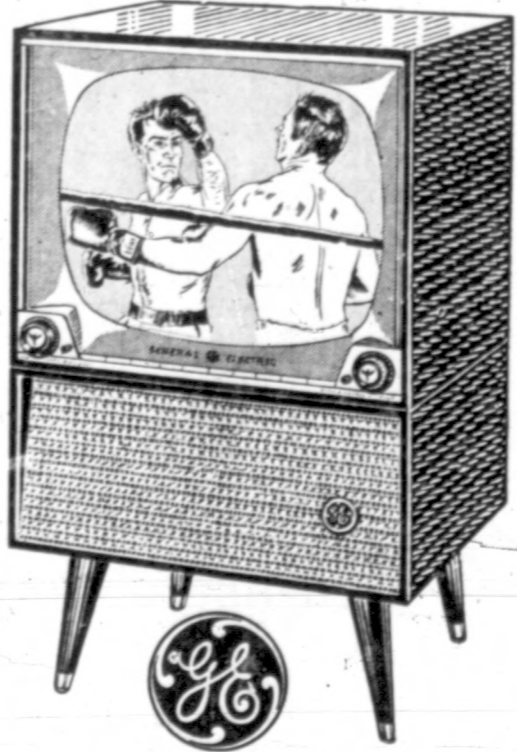
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Leisure New Importation From Italy

NEW YORK (AP) — We already have imported tailored shirts, tom boy haircuts, sharp-toed shoes and well — rounded movie stars from Italy. Now we're showing interest in a duty — free Italian product — leisure.

At a growing number of marble-topped tables in this city busy people are encouraged to linger longer over a single cup of coffee, demi tasse size at that.

A machine from Italy started this slow down — a grinding, sighing contraption that sends a stream of inky black brew from a thin spout every 30 seconds.

Import Coffee Machines
We began to import Espresso coffee machines after World War II, which was not surprising for a gadget-minded nation. But now Espresso coffee shops are appearing in prosperous Manhattan neighborhoods and they are successfully selling the folksy leisure that is part of Italian coffee shops as well as the strong steamed coffee.

Umberto Romanelli is a proprietor of one of these shops here. He patterned the shop front after Motta, a famous coffee shop in Milan, and covered one wall with a wallpaper mural of Venice, his former home.

When Romanelli set about slowing down his American customers. The experiment began last May. "The time is right for it," Romanelli said. "Americans get more continental minded all the time."

Double Two Hours
"Sometimes they wait just for two hours," Romanelli said proudly. "In Italy it is nothing for a man to come in for a cup of coffee in the morning and sit all day. Now I have some customers who sit for two hours with one cup of coffee. They are learning."

When the weather gets warmer he will put three tables and eight chairs on the sidewalk, a nostalgic gesture to the famous outdoor tables in St. Mark's Square in Venice.

"It is hard to give a neighborhood in New York City," he concluded. "But it is getting better. And it must be the same in other cities. I sell Espresso machines too, and recently I sold three in Chicago, one in Dallas and one in California."
