### Eisenhower To Get Heart Check Today

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Dec. 17 (AP)—President Eisenhower had a doctor's appointment today that might give him some hint about his political future.

Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston heart specialist, and a staff of physicians planned to put Mr. Eisenhower through an extensive check-up. They want to know whether the Chief Executive's recent increased activity has hampered his recovery from a heart attack last Sept. 24.

During the examination at the Eisenhower farmhouse the doctor will punch, listen to and electronically plumb the President in the evaluation of his present condition.

Hint Might Result  
From the examination some hint might come of the President's ability to face up physically to his political future.

White traveled to Gettysburg in a White House car from Baltimore, Md., where he participated Friday night in a meeting of heart specialists.

Others taking part in the examination were Maj. Gen. Howard McCreary, White House physician; Col. Thomas W. Mattingly, chief of cardiology services at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington; and Maj. Walter Tkach, the assistant White House doctor.

Made Denver Examination  
The New England doctor said after last examining the President in Denver Nov. 7 that "with increased activity something different might develop."

Mr. Eisenhower is expected to be very entertaining since the groups have practiced hard during the past several days.

### Second Cold Blast Hits South

The second Arctic blast this week pushed cold weather deep into the Southland today and dropped temperatures into the 20s in northern Florida.

Moderate to heavy snows fell over the Rockies in Montana with up to 9 inches recorded in a 24 hour period at Missoula. Light snow also fell in Idaho and flurries were general over the Pacific Northwest, except along the coast and over the middle Mississippi Valley to the northern Great Lakes.

Rain or drizzle dampened the Pacific Northwest coastal area. Mostly fair skies prevailed elsewhere. In the central plains and Great Lakes areas southerly winds took the edge off the bitter cold of the past several days.

The mercury shot up to the 60s on the east slopes of the central Rockies as a "chinook" wind dispelled the cold. But the wind whipped Denver, Colo., with gusts up to 58 miles an hour.

High temperatures Friday at La Junta and La Mar, Colo., were 61 degrees Celsius, N.M. reported 69 and it was 41 at Cheyenne. But in Florida, Cross City reported a morning low of 24 degrees as the Arctic weather invaded the deep South.

It was pushed by colder weather to the north that sent the mercury to 4 below zero at Dickinson, N.D., and 3 below at Minot, N.D., drops of 18 and 14 degrees from Friday.

Casper, Wyo., cooled 21 degrees with the morning temperature at 13.

Most of the area from Texas northwestern to the Great Lakes was warmer than Friday, but the temperature still was in the 20s or lower. In the middle Atlantic states a few snow flurries fell.

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### Former MSC Staff Member Passes Away

Professor Franklin P. Inglis, former faculty member of Murray State College, died suddenly Wednesday evening, December 14. Professor Inglis was Professor of Musicology and Band Director at De Pauw University, Greencastle, Indiana, where he had been since leaving Murray in 1944.

### Egypt Charges Attack By Israeli Force

JERUSALEM, Dec. 17 (AP)—Egypt charged today that Israeli forces attacked Egyptian positions with automatic weapons in a 20 minute battle in the southern sector of the Gaza strip.

Egypt, in a formal complaint to the United Nations Mixed Arbitral Commission, said the attack took place last Thursday. Official Egyptian sources said there were no Egyptian casualties.

The new truce violation charges against Israel came as the U.N. Palestine truce team promised a report within the next two days on a bloody Israeli raid on Syria to help the Security Council decide whether it should punish Israel.

Syria demanded strict economic sanctions against the Israeli government in Tel Aviv expressed belief that no non-Arab member of the United Nations "except possibly Britain and Russia" would support the Syrian demands.

Maj. Gen. E.L.M. Burns, chief of the U.N. truce group, made a flying trip to Damascus to see the Syrian side of the battle.

He promised that a full report on the incident would be forwarded to U.N. headquarters in New York by diplomatic pouch within 48 hours. The Security Council was awaiting the report to decide what action to take against Israel.

Syria demanded that the council cut off outside economic aid to Israel and even suggested that the Jewish state be thrown out of the United Nations.

### First GOP Candidate Files For President

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 17 (AP)—Sen. John W. Bricker (R-Ohio) became the first actual candidate for the 1956 Republican presidential nomination Friday, but his candidacy was only to satisfy a legal technicality.

Ohio's delegation to the GOP national convention in San Francisco next August actually was lined up early behind President Eisenhower in favor of the President.

The Ohio Republican State Central and Executive Committee named Bricker as its "favorite son" and named H. Chapman "Boss" Under Secretary of the Treasury, as its second choice at a meeting here Friday.

Bricker said, in consenting to run, that he was "privileged to join with Ohio Republicans in re-stating our loyalty to President Eisenhower and our desire that he stand for re-election."

Bricker explained that he was named to satisfy primary election laws here in a way that is consistent with loyalty to the President and that still does not weaken Ohio's voice in the convention nor embarrass the President with demands for an untimely decision.

The Ohio GOP will name 56 delegates to its convention. Candidates must file by Feb. 8. But President Eisenhower, endorsed by his heart attack, was not expected to announce his plans by that date.

Since candidates must run with permission of their first and second choices for nomination, Bricker and Under Secretary were selected. Bricker's entrance put the state's best vote-getters in the May primaries as favorite son candidates.

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### Tennessee Will Have To Prove Self

ALDEN, Minn., Dec. 17 (AP)—Turncoat GI Richard Tennessee, welcomed mother will have to "prove himself" before he is accepted by his townspeople, the people of Alden said today.

Tennessee, one of 23 American soldiers who turned their backs on their country to stay in Red China after the Korean War, ate his first homecooked dinner in nearly five years Friday amidst a joyous homecoming.

His mother, Mrs. Portia Howe, a devout woman, had two cakes waiting for him. One cake was in the form of a bible and had two scriptural passages on it.

Tennessee promised his mother he will go to church Sunday despite earlier statements he no longer is religious.

His return was a conversation topic for nearly every one of the community's 688 residents. They indicated that it is up to Tennessee to determine whether he again can fit into this rural community as a good American.

Tennessee said he will try to have people accept him and "change their minds."

He said he did not think he had committed an act of treason, but evaded most direct questions of newsmen. Tennessee did say, however, he had no idea of whether he would be punished.

At Washington Friday the Army said it plans no legal action against him because it feels it has no jurisdiction in the matter.

The Army said any charges must be handled by the Justice Department.

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### Huge Crowd Views Parade Here Friday

A large crowd, estimated at between 12,000 and 14,000 persons viewed the largest Christmas parade believed to have been staged in Murray, last night.

The parade started at Murray High School and entered town on Main street. It threaded the way through dense crowds to Third street, where it turned at the A&P Store and went one block to Maple then returned to the square where the entire entourage stopped on the west side.

Santa Claus and his reindeer was the major attraction for the children. Santa rode his sleigh which was pulled by Donner, Blitzen, Prancer and Dancer, with Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer leading the way, red nose and all.

Included in the parade were floats by the county's high schools and Faxon, the Murray High band, new model automobiles. City and county officials also participated in the parade, which was led by the city police car and fire truck.

Several other organizations were included in the parade such as the Murray Rescue Squad, American Legion, etc.

Verne Kyle acted as master of ceremonies on the square and introduced Mayor George Hart who welcomed everyone to Murray and who thanked Santa Claus for making his appearance. Mayor Hart assured Santa Claus that the county was "filled with good girls and boys."

Santa made a short talk then devoted some time to talking with the children asking them all what they would like to have for Christmas.

Bro. Paul T. Lyles offered a prayer before the festivities began. Murray merchants stayed open until 8:00 p.m. last night to give shoppers an extra advantage to do their Christmas shopping.

Many stores plan to stay open late each night between now and Christmas.

### This Week's Balance Sheet In The Hot And Cold Wars

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet.

The Good  
1. Sixteen nations were admitted to membership in the United Nations. The new members include two important European powers, Italy and Spain. Seventy-six countries are now members of the world organization. The U.N. action ended a five-year deadlock on admissions which resulted from Soviet Russian obstruction. Assembly President Jose Maza called toward the representation in the U.N. of all the peoples of the world.

2. Dr. Otto John, former chief of the West German intelligence service, led back from East Germany John had gone behind the Iron Curtain on July 20, 1954. He had been kept under close watch by the Communist secret service, but managed to escape by a ruse. His return was reported also to the Reds. It was reported also that two important East German officials had escaped to the West — a department chief in the Trade Ministry and an alternate member of the lower house of Parliament.

3. Hugh Gaitskell, a staunchly pro-American right-winger, was elected leader of the British Labor Party. Gaitskell received 157 votes of the Labor members of the House of Commons against 70 for left-winger Aneurin Bevan, who is violently critical of American policy.

### Polar Bear Clean Out Small Village

MONTREAL, Dec. 17 (AP)—Eskimo villagers who were eaten out of house and home by five polar bears but got even by eating bear No. 6 returned to more conventional rations today thanks to the Air Force.

An Air Transport Command spokesman said an RCAF C47 based at Goose Bay, Labrador, had dropped food to eskimos at Port Burwell on the northeastern tip of Quebec Province. The northern natives recounted their plight to a U.S. helicopter crew who landed there to help.

Annatok, the only eskimo who could speak English told the fliers five polar bears broke in on Dec. 14 and ate all the food. Annatok said the villagers survived by eating one polar bear they managed to kill.

The pilots gave the villagers all the rations they had to tide them over and relayed the eskimos' plight to authorities at Goose Bay. Bales of food were dropped to the villagers Friday.

### Dr. Pogue Is DAR Speaker

Dr. Forrest Pogue spoke Thursday evening at 8:45 over the local station on the subject "The Ardennes Breakthrough at Christmas 11 years ago. He outlined briefly the situation prior to the 16th of January, 1944 and explained why it was the Germans were able to break through in the Ardennes. He discussed details of the fighting during some of the worst days of the battle.

Dr. Pogue explained that prior to this fighting some Europeans had felt the American soldiers did well only when they were on the attack. However in the Ardennes in the face of surprise and without the aid of air power, the American troops quickly rallied to hold key points until greater aid could be brought up. In the Ardennes at the Hurler Forest fight which preceded it, the American troops did some of their best and most courageous fighting of the war.

He emphasized that this battle showed the same type of American fighting qualities shown at Valley Forge and the ingenuity of Americans in times of stress.

This program was sponsored by the Captain Wendell Gray Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and was the second in a series intended to keep before the public a consciousness of our American ideals.

### Mysterious

MAINZ, Germany (AP)—German police rushed to a local parking lot early Friday when the attendant reported he had found a "mysterious bundle."

Police identified the "bundle" as a tightly-zipped American Army sleeping bag, containing a soldier and a German girl.

The bundle was found in a parking lot near the city center.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

No subject which has to do with the Christian life and service is more important than prayer, which is the converse of the soul with God. Conscious communion between the heart of the Christian and God can hardly be overemphasized. This lesson is very helpful because it calls our attention to the prayer life of our Lord as portrayed in the Gospel according to Luke. It tells us about various things and places when He engaged in communion with the Father.

**I. Christ Prayed At His Baptism.**  
Luke 3:21-22.

Very likely it was late in the afternoon, after all other candidates for baptism had been baptized, when our Saviour approached John the Baptist and requested baptism at his hands in the Jordan River. Perhaps the reason for this method of approach was to distinguish himself from all others. He was the sinless One Who had come to redeem and save the lost.

John the Baptist could not understand why Christ, the Son of God, would want to be baptized by him, a mere man. When he hesitated and expressed his thought—that it was not obligatory that Christ be baptized, our Lord expressed the purpose of His baptism, saying, "Suffer it to be so now: for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness." Thus He predicted His death upon the cross, where and when He would meet God's demand for perfect righteousness and thereby provide for man's need. The baptism that He was requesting was to be a picture of His death, burial and resurrection; death and burial as He was immersed in the water, and resurrection as He came up out of the water. When our Lord came up out of the water a wonderful thing took place. The Master prayed, the heavens opened, and the Holy Spirit descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon Him, and a voice spoke from heaven saying, "Thou art my beloved Son; in thee I am well pleased."

**II. Christ Prayed In Solitary Places.**  
Luke 4:42; 5:16; 6:12.

Much of Christ's time and energy were given to prayer and meditation. To Him, prayer was no mere formal or perfunctory performance, but it was a real and vital experience. Quite often Christ prayed in a solitary place, sometimes in a desert (4:42); and sometimes near a mountain (6:12). This indicates clearly that He did not make any vain display when He prayed. Those solitary places provided Him a wonderful opportunity of praying without any interruption from people.

**III. Christ Prayed Before His Transfiguration.**  
Luke 9:18, 28-29.

About a week after Peter's great confession of Christ as the Son of God, the Lord Jesus took the inner circle with Him to the summit of a lofty mountain to pray. There He was transfigured. When He prayed the glory of His person shined in radiant splendor. His face became as white as snow, and His garments were as white as the light. His whole appearance became wonderfully glorious. The glory which the disciples saw as Christ underwent that remarkable change was that of the sinless soul of Christ shining through the veil of flesh and revealing the sublime beauty of His inherent character. Mortal eyes had never seen such a sight, so it was not at all surprising that Peter, James and John were filled with overwhelming awe.

**IV. Christ Taught His Disciples To Pray.**  
Luke 11:1-4.

While our Lord was praying in a certain place, His disciples stood near by silently and reverently they looked and listened. They observed in Him a strange separation from the world, a conscious nearness to God, a delight in the Father's presence, and a familiarity in communion with Him seemed to them like heaven upon earth. After hearing Him pray, sometimes the disciples felt that they had never really prayed. As they looked at and listened to their Master, communing with His Father, there was something which told them that He was really praying. Seeing and hearing Him pray must have convinced the disciples that they knew comparatively little about this spiritual exercise. So they wanted to learn to pray as He prayed. How wonderful it must have been to have heard Christ praying in this way.

Christ's example emphasized the privilege, power and blessing of prayer. It also aroused the disciples' sense of their ignorance and inability in this realm, and filled them with a desire to learn to pray. His example simply made them anxious to learn to pray, and prompted one of them to make the earnest request, "Lord, teach us to pray."

In answer to this plea, the Lord gave them the prayer which has gone down through the whole range of human need, temporal and spiritual. It was a model of brevity, simplicity and comprehensiveness in its three things

are indicated, relationship, "Our Father"; reverence, "Hallowed be Thy name"; and resignation, "Thy will be done." The deepest desire of the heart should be concerned with the Father's name, kingdom and will. We should pray to God as a loving Father Who creates, protects, provides, forgives and saves; the One Who knows all of our needs and is able to supply them. We should pray that His name be hallowed, revered and respected. We should pray for His kingdom to come and His will to be done on earth as it is being done in heaven. We should submit our wills to His will in all things.

It is permissible to summarize the human side of prayer in the following threefold manner, as related to self, the supply of daily bread, as related to God; the removal of guilt, and as related to the needs of others. We should never be backward about asking the Lord to supply our needs.

Since we are dependent upon God for bread, let us ask Him to supply it daily. Then, let us ask Him for the forgiveness of our sins; our failure to believe the standards which He has set for us; and our failure to accomplish the work which

## Referendum Planned December 29

On November 30, 1955 Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson proclaimed marketing quotas for burley tobacco for the next three marketing years and set December 29, 1955, as the date for the required referendum among growers. Marketing quotas have been in effect for burley tobacco each year since 1939, but can be continued only if approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the December 29 referendum.

Under existing law, no price supports can be made available on any crop of tobacco for which growers disapprove marketing quotas.

Most producers already growing one-half acre or less will not be affected by the reduced quotas requirements, since under the law no farm burley allotment can be reduced below (1) five-tenths of an acre, (2) the allotment established the previous year, or (3) 10 percent of the cropland, whichever is smallest.

Commenting on the further reduction in acreage required under the national burley marketing quotas proclaimed, Secretary Benson said:

"I sincerely regret the need for a further reduction in burley

**Like Following Doctor's Orders**

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) — President Eisenhower followed his doctor's orders today and took it easy.

He planned to stay away from his Gettysburg office and to see no callers — even members of his staff — if at all possible.

The President flew to his Gettysburg farm Tuesday after two days of important conferences with congressional leaders in Washington. Mrs. Eisenhower returned by car, preferring not to fly in the President's "oppressured" two-engine plane because of a valvular heart condition she has had for many years.

The President has no engagements on his schedule for the rest of this week except his Saturday examination date with Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston Heart specialist.

On Sunday he will make a live telecast from Gettysburg, clicking a telegraph key which will light the national Christmas tree on the White House grounds in Washington. He will speak briefly.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerthy, under questioning by reporters, said the very quiet schedule for the President this week was "necessarily" dictated by the doctors but had been arranged for some time.

The President's physicians apparently reached weeks ago that following intensive conferences on the budget and the State of the Union message, it would be advisable for Mr. Eisenhower to have a few days of the greatest possible ease.

While he may "escape" paper work the rest of this week, the President undoubtedly will have to take a certain number of priority telephone calls at the farm. Thursday and Friday, he probably will dictate for brief periods to his personal secretary, Mrs. Ann Whitman.

Congressional leaders who met with Mr. Eisenhower during the Washington conferences were impressed with his seeming fitness. One of them — Rep. Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.) — commented Tuesday.

"I was gratified to note the alertness, the aggressiveness of the President in conducting the conference. He was as active as any boy 16 years old. He was the picture of health."

**COVER HELPS CONSERVE LEAF STALK FERTILIZER**

Following are some ways to conserve and make the best use of tobacco stalks as fertilizer, as suggested in the Farm and Home Development Manual of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics of the University of Kentucky.

Keep tobacco stalks under cover, use them for bedding, or spread them immediately on a growing crop. Tobacco stalks contain approximately 60 pounds of nitrogen, 15 pounds of phosphoric acid and 70 pounds of potash per ton, most of which is lost rapidly if the stalks are exposed to the rain. To lessen danger of spreading tobacco diseases, they should not be applied on land to go in tobacco the following season.

Such materials as cornstalks and straw should not be burned. They should be used for bedding or mulching, or should be plowed under.

### Use Caution In Holiday Festivities

Want to keep your sanity through January 27? Then get 40 winks, a large wastebasket and an extra eye to use on the very younger generation. Letting Dad play with the five-year-old's new toys isn't such a bad idea either.

So says Briggs Lawson, Shelbyville, president of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children. Lawson and the Society set down four rules for peeps who want to stay sane and sane through the holidays:

They go like this:

1. Check your children's new toys and gift clothing. Occasionally fabric catches fire very easily. And more often toys appear which break or have sharp edges. These are potential dangers, and so are BB guns and bows and arrows given to children too young to use them safely.
2. Keep youngsters away from the roasting Christmas turkey, the fire place and the incinerator during these days of excitement. And make the younger set feel responsible for keeping the rest of the family safe.
3. Toss out the gift wrappings—or fold them up for 1956—after the Christmas morning scramble. And before Christmas, check for poor wiring of tree lights, flammable decorations, and candles too near the curtains or the children.
4. Get a little sleep and good food between parties. This will help nature supply clear heads and quick reactions. And let the garage man check your brakes.

The reason Eastern Seal Society is interested in safety is the fact that nine million people were hurt in accidents last year. More than 300,000 of them were crippled permanently, Lawson said.

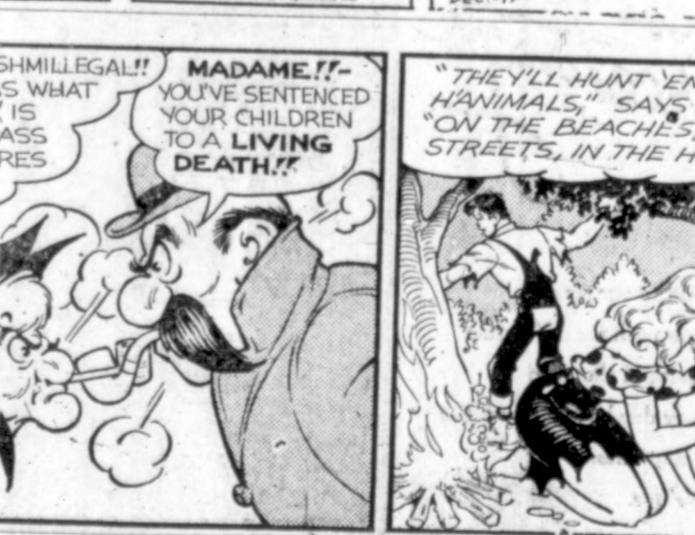

TV Shocker  
Will Feature  
Insane Man

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Next shocker due on TV: A film showing an insane man in a sensual trance.

This experience is the latest sensation of a controversial filmed documentary series that specializes in real-life problems. "Confidential File."

While "Medic" and "Diagnose" dramatize case histories, "Confidential File" leads the victims, criminals, or patients right to the eye of the relentless TV camera.

One forthcoming "star" that narrator Paul Coates will interview is a man under the influence of a drug that brings on temporary insanity.

Lysergic acid is the accidental discovery of two Swiss chemists, Coates explained today after previewing the film in his office. "It causes a person to have schizophrenia or a split personality, so it's used by some psychiatrists in experiments to study the effect of a split personality."

Such programs have had both TV critics and viewers charging that "Confidential File" purposely picks sensational subjects. But Coates, a columnist on the Los Angeles Mirror-News, regards his syndicated TV show as giving fans a newspaperman's view of "people the public couldn't ordinarily meet."

He also points to certificates of approval from the National Association of Mental Health and local PTA groups for shows that attempt to educate viewers. One recent program was an interview with a sleeping pill addict. Other shows have featured epileptics, a dwarf, "B" girls, and a child molester.

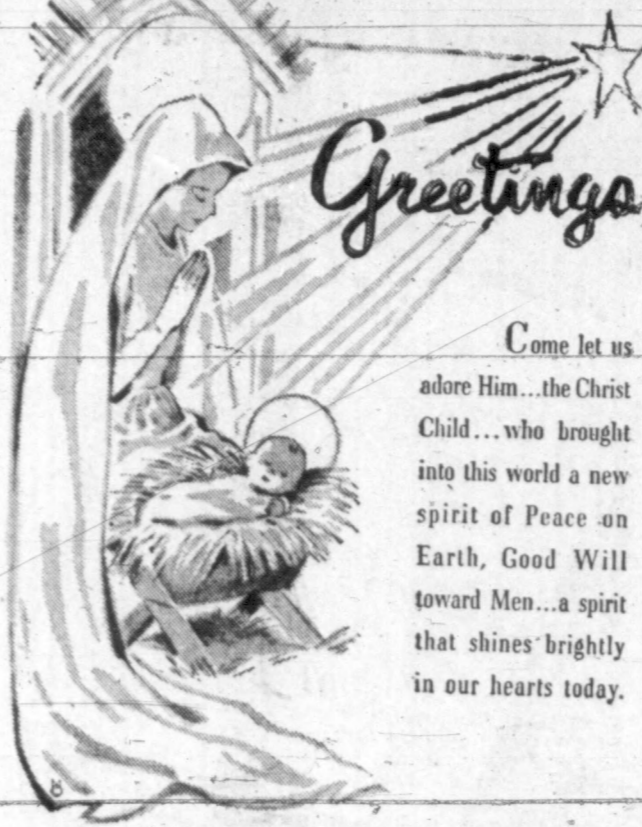
The young molester was disguised with a mustache, fixed hair and cotton in his checks, so his family, watching the program at home, would not recognize him.

"We have a show coming up on the TV repair racket, so naturally we'll get complaints from the racketeers," Coates said.

"We had a show on dope once that some people thought was too strong for anybody's living room. But we made it strong to scare the heck out of people who might use narcotics. The chief of police of San Antonio, Tex., wrote asking for that narcotics film to show in schools."

Coates already has filmed one show in New York and plans to make future programs about real-life problems in Dallas and Minneapolis and at the leprosyarium in Carville, La. Most of the programs researched by his staff of 15 come from ideas sent in by viewers.

"I feel a lot of compassion for the persons we interview on the show," Coates reflected. "Some we've helped by sending them to psychiatrists and so forth. Others we've tried to help but had no luck with."

Mitchell  
Enters New  
Field

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Thomas Mitchell, journeyman actor and master of everything from television to theater, has found a new medium for his powerful emoting. He's now a recording star.

The chunky character player has joined a small band of actors and voice specialists who record classics of literature on extra long-playing discs for audio books.

Mitchell's first efforts are Plato's "Apology" and "Credo." They occupy three records — each of which takes an hour to play or "read."

A Lot of Fun  
"I didn't know what a joy working could be," Mitchell said happily. "In this racket of mine a man can make an enormous amount of money doing things he doesn't believe in. I haven't enjoyed myself so much since the 20s."

The shaggy-browed actor poured himself a highball and sank into a worn, red leather chair in the library of his Beverly Hills mansion. The walls were adorned with original paintings by Whistler and Rembrandt.

A collector of fine art and literature, Mitchell is dedicated to giving the long hairs an up-to-date crevice.

"Maybe my records will help break down the tendency to put the classics on a pedestal," he said.

He pointed to several shelves of well-read volumes.

"The greatness buried in those books — the story of Socrates, for instance — would be as dramatic on the stage or screen as anything we've ever done. But the very names of the ancients frighten most men out of their wits."

"My audio books are classical, but they're entertainment, not education," he went on. "They should open doors for the world of tomorrow. There is drama in that one-dimensional world of records and I think we're showing the way."

The truths of Plato and Aristotle endure to this day and are as modern as the day after tomorrow. Even the language is up-to-date."

Mitchell set his glass down and ran a finger across a shelf of books. He said too often the world's great literature lies unread in dusty library stacks.

A New World  
"These audio books are one way of bringing into private homes a world that's never been there before. In this day people won't take time to read a 500,000 word novel unless it's current, but maybe people would listen. And that's what I'm hoping for."

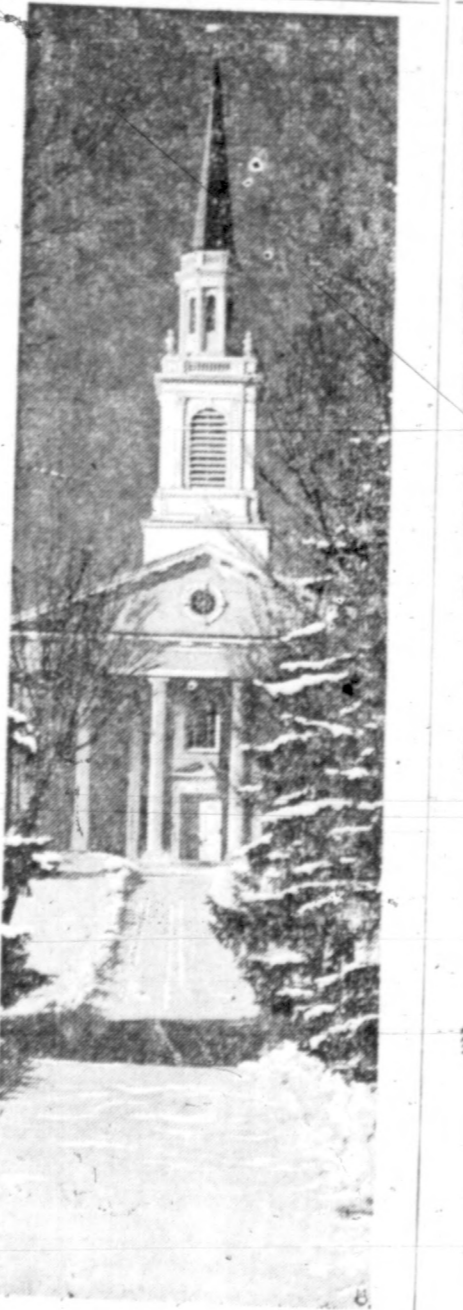
"Crusading," he asked. "Maybe. I get a small percentage of the records, but the money is unimportant."
