

#### HOFFA PROMISES "CLEAN-UP"

Tames A. Hoffa, vice-president of the powerful Team-J ster's Union promised a Senate investigating committee this week that he will "clean up" the union, if the members elect him president at the convention to be held

It would seem from some of his testimony that he has done a pretty good "elean-up" job as vice-president so far as the union's treasury is concerned.

He testified on a television portion of his investigation that he had "borrowed" \$120,000,00 from the Teamster's Union, apparently without the consent of the members, or anybody else, for that matter.

"Do you still owe any of this money," Senator Kennedy inquired.

"Yes. I owe about \$70,000.00 of it," was his reply. "Is this sum secured," he was asked.

When he answered "no" he was asked what would become of the indeptedness in case something happens to him.

"That would be a problem," was his reply.




