Weaver Wade, held as a witness for the prosecution in a case against Gusie Yeal, the brother of the defendant, and exploded giant firecrackers. The other two young men who are to answer to the same charge are Ethen Owines and Jeff Shroat, both of this place. All these young men are members of well-known families.

PRESTIGE OF THE ALLIES IN BELGIUM IS UPHELD

Though the Germans Are Pushing Slowly Ahead, Restrained by Belgians, the Allied Lines Are Yet to Be Met.

REMAIN UNCONQUERED THE LIEGE FORTS STILL

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Pushing forward by mere weight of numbers the Germans are advancing across Belgium slowly but steadily. In contact with the allied armies which according to official communication from Brussels tonight, is in battle order at same point unannounced.

The Belgians in the outpost skirmishes are said to have inflicted severe checks on the German forces, but on the whole German right wing has kept on its way and has reached a line from north of Namur to Haelen, which suggests the first big battle will be fought somewhere between Louvain and Brest, where the allies will probably try to block the roads to Brussels and Antwerp and prevent the Germans' attempt to render north Belgium untenable.

Further south French troops have entered Belgium through Charleroi, going to the relief of their neighbors and to aid in any attack directed toward Namur, while in the east, the French are reported to have secured possession of ridges in the Vosges mountains and to hold passes of Labonhomme and Salth Au Mines through which important roads pass and which it is declared to give the great strategical advantage.

The Germans are again hammering at the Liege forts and according to their accounts, one fort, Pontisse, has fallen. The Belgians deny this however. They tell of another slaughter of invaders who tried to rush a fort.

The military strategists are of the opinion that the Germans are meeting with a delay which they didn't count upon and that every day the Belgians keep them fighting means an increase of Russians on the eastern frontier. They express the belief that unless Germany soon disposes of Belgium and France she will have to choose between withdrawing great part of her army from the west or leave the road to Berlin open to the force emperor of Russia.

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., Aug. 14.—Joseph Sheler, paymaster of the Glen Alum Coal & Coke Company, at Glen Alum; Dr. W. D. Amick, the company's physician; and F. D. Johnson, the company's electrician, were murdered at noon today, and the pay roll of \$15,000 stolen by unknown bandits, who escaped.
