CARRANZA WAS NAMED PRESIDENT IN AN AGREEMENT SIGNED FRIDAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 .- Venus iano Carranza was named provisional president of Mexico in the agreement signed outside of Mexico City yester day by General Obregon and the representatives of Federal Governor Itur-Bide, according to an announcement tonight by the Constitutionalist agency here. The dispatches said the agreement provided that Carranza can fill all the offices necessary until a general election can be held. The federal garrison in evacuating Mexico City, it is said, will form in groups of not more than 5,000 along the railroad and wait to be disbanded and dis armed by Constitutionalist commissioners, while the federal garrisons in certain towns near Mexico City and fronting the Zapata troops are to reremain at their posts until relieved by the constitutionalists. The garrisons in the southern states are to lay down their arms and the federal navy is to be turned over to the provisional pres


