WAR NEWS AT A GLANCE

The British prime minister again has emphasized the need of vast sup at Newcastle, Mr. Asquith appealed to the workers of the armament fac ories "to rival the patriotism of their 'ellows who had gone to the front' by regular attendance at work and by using their utmost endeavors to ALLIE THOMAS ncrease the production of supplies That the prime minister believes much depends on this was indicated by his declaration that "once produc tive factories are organized and mobilized, all will be well."

Since the brief review issued a few days ago by the Russian War Office of Carpathian operations, in which it was stated that the Russians held the principal chain of mountains for an extent of about 75 miles and were strengthening their positions, little news has come through respecting the operations in that territory.

German newspaper correspondents assert that the Russian offensive in that region has come to an end. Vienna declares there has been no recent change in the situation. In the west the armies are battling

at isolated points. The French War Office reports that 50 incendiary shells have been dropped by the Germans on Rheims. French aerial squadrons have attacked points along the Rhine, have bombarded severa stations and have set fire to great forage stores at Mannheim, the build ings and contents being destroyed, according to a Zurich dispatch.

COUNTY UNIT LAW IS UPHELD BY THE COURT OF APPEALS

Frankfort, Ky., April 21.-The local ption election by which Montgomery, Bourbon, Scott and Shelby countles voted dry last year were held valid by the court of appeals this morning and the 1914 amendment to the county unit law was held as effecting no change in the law excepting that an election may be called on petition of 25 per cent of the voters of the whole county instead of 25 per cent of the voters in each precinct

Paris and Mt. Sterling and precincts n Shelby voted wet in separate elections and contended that the amendment of 1914 repealed the county unit law of 1912, making the county the controlling unit and re-enacted the act of 1894, the old precinct option law. The court said the 1914 amendment should be construed together with the act of 1912 and the county remains the controlling unit.

Judge Carroll, writing the option, the whole court sitting, said:

"This conclusion disposes of the right of Shelbyville, Georgetown, Mt. Sterling and Paris to have separate elections and to regulate and control for themselves the sale of liquor within their limits. The vote of the county controls absolutely all parts of the






