There will be preaching at the home of W. Y. Wilkerson next Saturday night, April 24th, by Rev. James Hooker.

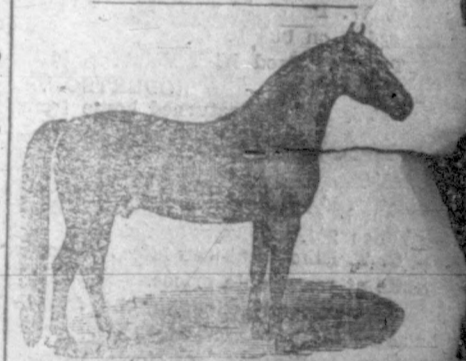
Vernon Wilkerson has sold his tobacco for \$8 and \$2.
