TORNADO RAKES ST. LOUIS; 16 DEAD

Weather Over Nation Brings Destruction

The tornado which raked St. Louis with sudden death and widespread destruction before dawn today came as part of a succession of storm violence that included freezing rain, heavy snows, severe thunderstorms, fog, floods and dust storms.

Adding to the woes of the St. Louis area was a flood in the north St. Louis County suburb of St. Ann where heavy rains sent a creek rushing over its banks. Water five feet deep inundated some homes in the area.

Flooding also hit northwestern Ohio for the second time this season in the wake of heavy rains. The Blanchard river climbed 1 1/2 feet over flood stage at Findlay, Ohio, threatening downtown area residents. Three feet of water swamped the downtown section of Van Wert.

To the north, weathermen issued a special bulletin warning of heavy snow from northern Iowa and southern Minnesota across Wisconsin and into Michigan. Accumulations of four inches or more were expected, along with winds up to 40 miles an hour which could cause heavy drifting.

Elsewhere around the country—Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee, Kansas City and St. Louis were among major cities to hit the winds under the pounding of rain and ice storms which began Sunday night. Hundreds of persons were injured in falls, and many major cities were common-places. Air transportation was crippled.

Fog in the South was blamed for the collision of two empty freighters in Mobile Bay and the sinking of a trawler. There were no injuries in either mishap. Twenty-three ships were forced to remain in the Gulf of Mexico until the fog cleared. Driving was dangerous.

Tornadoes near Welch, Okla., and Duenweg, Mo., caused property damage but no injuries.

High winds kicked up dust storms in the Texas Panhandle, blew down a church under construction and overturned an airplane.

Floodwaters blocked highways in the Decatur, Ill., area.

Snows up to four inches buried sections of the Midwest from South Dakota to Kansas and into western Iowa. Heavy snow warnings were out for the upper Midwest.

Only the West Coast escaped the outbreaks of weather violence, which forecasters said resulted from a mixture of the moisture and a collision of contrasting cold and warm air masses.

Second Major Robbery Reported

MIAMI (UPI)—Gentlemen jewel thieves took an estimated \$300,000 in gems from an exclusive jewelry shop Monday in the second major robbery in this resort area within two days.

Jewels worth \$400,000 were stolen from a suite at the Americana Hotel in Miami Beach Sunday.

Police declined to link the two cases, but said both looked like the work of professionals.

Two well-dressed, polite talking men held up Levinson's Jewelry Store Monday at gun point and in gentlemanly fashion took only jewelry that was insured.

Five employees, including owner Harold Levinson, were bound with tape and forced to lie on the floor while the two bandits looted the safe and jewel trays.

They escaped with "between \$200,000 and \$300,000," officers estimated, along with about \$5,000 in cash.

However, detective Marion Murrah said they courteously left behind a ring worn by one of the store employees. One of the gunmen asked the employee, Irving Getz, if his ring was insured. Getz said no, and the gunman replied: "Well, you keep it then."

"At least they were gentlemen about the whole thing," Murrah said.

While the second robbery was going on, FBI agents pressed their investigation of the hotel suite theft, but with little success. The victims in the earlier robbery were Mr. and Mrs. Leon E. Greenbaum and her sister, Mrs. Arthur Cole, all wealthy New Yorkers.

Little Change Reported In Wreck Victim

No change has been reported in the condition of a Tennessee man who was critically injured last Tuesday night in an accident just south of Hazel. He is in the Henry County General Hospital with a crushed hip and two broken legs. Two other men were injured and two pickup trucks and an automobile were demolished.

Thomas Jackson, 32-year old timber worker of Route 2, Paris, has a crushed hip received when a car struck him as he stood on the highway watching the car attempting to pull a truck out of the mud, according to Highway Patrol Sgt. Wayne Tubbs, who investigated.

It all started when a 1951 Dodge pickup truck driven by George E. Ray got stuck on the right shoulder of Highway 641, 200 yards north of Underwood's Crossing just south of Hazel. He was traveling south toward Paris, and Jackson and Gordon Allen of 401 North Market Street in Paris were passengers in the truck, according to Tubbs.

Ray had left the scene to seek help, when along came Richard M. Vance, 18, of Route 1, Hazel, and offered to pull the truck out with his 1954 Oldsmobile sedan. It was raining heavily and the shoulders were soft, Tubbs said. Vance's car was apparently backed up to the rear of the pickup truck, sitting horizontally across both lanes of the highway, ready to hook up a chain to the truck when the accident occurred.

At 6:45 p. m., another pickup truck, a 1959 Chevrolet driven by Jerry L. Tyler, also 18, of Route 1, Hazel, came down the highway just southward and during the run, we are speaking of the future of our own boys and girls. The best investment that we can make is an investment in our children.

Jackson was found by the side of the road with two broken legs and a crushed hip. He was rushed to the hospital, and the Highway Patrol made two emergency "blood runs" from Jackson Madison County Hospital during the night. In these runs, patrolmen met in relay fashion to deliver six pints of blood in one run and four pints in another. This morning, seven more pints of blood had been given Jackson by local donors, and hospital administrator William Stout said anyone having "type O, Rh positive" blood is asked to give either for a transfusion or for replacement.

Jackson's condition is still critical. The hospital said doctors may have to amputate the crushed leg.

Allen, who was also standing outside the vehicles, received a lead injury and a severe arm cut. Vance, who was inside the Oldsmobile, was shaken up but not seriously hurt. Tyler is hospitalized with chest and mouth injuries.

Ray was not at the scene at the time of the accident.

Tubbs said further investigation decided whether to place charges would be necessary before it is against any of the drivers.

Hundreds Injured As High Winds Strike Populous Area

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—A "sleeper" tornado with winds up to 110 miles an hour smashed into St. Louis early today, spreading death and destruction first at the southwest edge of the city and then in the central area.

At mid-morning 16 bodies were in the city morgue. Police reports said the death toll was expected to rise.

Hospitals reported more than 320 persons were injured. The two city hospitals treated and released 270 persons and kept another 55 for additional treatment.

Radio Towers Felled

In suburban Brentwood, the 300-foot transmitting tower of radio station KXLW was brought down by the winds.

Another transmitting tower, that of television station KTVM, was flattened in southwest St. Louis and it crushed two residences and three parked cars when it fell. No one was injured.

At Kansas City, Donald Howe, supervisor of the U. S. Severe Storm Warning Center, said severe storm warnings were out for the area, but "while a twister in the storm was not totally unexpected, we certainly didn't expect one of such intensity to drop down on St. Louis."

The heaviest blows of the storm were rained on an area measuring by 36 blocks in the heart of the city, bounded by Euclid on the west, Vandeventer to the east, Chouteau to the south and Natural Bridge to the north, it is a predominantly Negro neighborhood.

Roaming House Levelled

A roaming house was almost leveled and police and rescue workers worked feverishly by the light of emergency spotlights searching the ruins. A power failure put regular lighting facilities out of commission.

Many other roaming houses are in the area, from the 3900 block east to the 500 block west, and from the 1000 block south to the 3700 block west. Most of them were damaged.

"God knows how many people are trapped in those buildings," Deputy Fire Chief James Sauerwine said.

The arena, site of the coming welterweight championship fight between Virgil Akins and Don Jordan, also was heavily damaged. A tower in the front of the building, just a few blocks from KTVM, was brought down in a welter of bricks and stone.

Murray State took the second quarter tip-off and Terry Darnall blasted a field goal to set out on a scoring pace that led the Rebels to their surprising win. Darnall picked up 8 points in the first half but hit consistently in the second period for a 22 total point gather.

The Seminoles tied the score at 46-46 early in the period but Wilkins connected on a charity toss to put Murray back into a lead it never relinquished. Don Bates pulled Florida within one point, 50-51, but Harold Wilkins reconnected with two consecutive buckets for a five point lead with 14:43 left in the game. Florida State was never closer to its host and the Thoroughbreds really began to widen the gap in the last seven minutes as the foul-weakened Seminoles defense began to crackle.

Murray scored on 45 field goals, 25 of 36 charity tosses for 69 percent and was charged with 13 personals. Florida hit on 20 shots from the field, 11 of 31 at the free throw line for 65 per cent and was charged with 23 fouls.

Don Bates took game scoring honors with 31 points. Harold Wilkins led the Racers with 24. Terry Darnall hit for 22 and Mike O'Riordan chipped up 19 points and swept the backboards.

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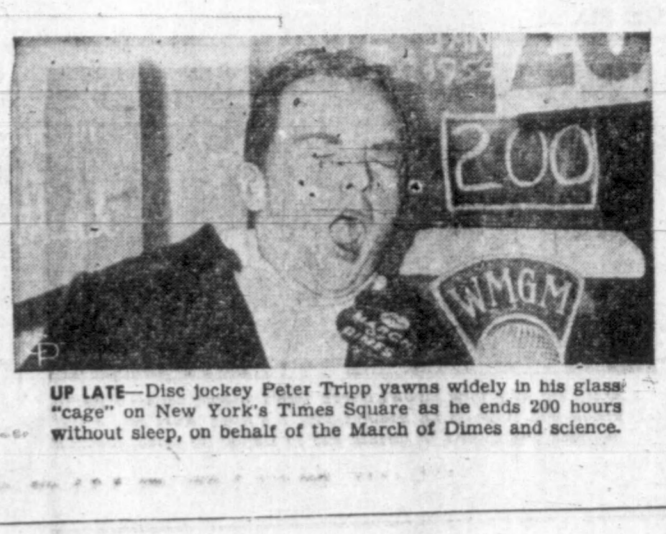
