THE SENATORIAL RACE.

The senatorial race resulted in the renomination for re-election of Senator W. A. Frost.

This district is composed of the counties of Fulton, Graves and Hickman. There are 56 voting precincts in the three counties and Senator Frost carried 46 and Mr. Brooks 10.

GOVERNOR STANLEY.

The name sounds good, doesn't it? It ranks along with the distinguished names that have occupied the gubernatorial chair in the times gone by.

MAJORITY FOR STANLEY MAY REACH 40,000

Grows as the Returns Come in From the State.

MINOR RACES CLOSE

Will Require the Official Count to Decide the Winner in Several Races.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 10.—Returns from thirty-three counties last night served to increase the lead of A. O. Stanley for the democratic nomination for governor.

Official figures will be necessary to decide the race between James P. Edwards and Judge James Black for the nomination for lieutenant governor.

Returns on this race have been received from over 100 counties. Tabulation of the votes received show Edwards leading by the slender margin of 1,617 votes.

Mr. Brooks received strong support from all the counties in the district, a vote of which he should feel proud. Although he was unable to defeat Senator Frost, yet he received a very creditable vote wherever he was known.

Mr. Stanley can win in November. He is pitted against a clean and able young man in Mr. Morrow, but there is nothing in the campaign nor in the character of the two men to warrant any democrat to vote the republican ticket in November.

Robert Greene appears a certain winner over Thomas Rhea for the nomination for auditor. A recapitulation of the eleven congressional districts Sunday night show Greene with a majority of 4,982. His vote held up through the Tenth and Eleventh districts and the scattering counties probably will not change the result.

Charles Milliken, of Louisville, has 21,241. Hamlett's plurality of 3,341 seems safe. Matt S. Cohen continued to increase his lead in his race for the nomination for commissioner of agriculture over H. M. Froman. Cohen's plurality probably will reach 18,000.

Though a few counties remain unreported in the race for the nomination for railroad commissioner in the Second district returns show that Sid Douthitt, of New Castle, has won over W. F. Klair, of Lexington. Louisville and Lexington gave large pluralities for Klair, but the rural vote turned the tide in favor of Douthitt.

WAR OFFICE CLAIMS.

Berlin, Aug. 10.—Praga, the suburb of Warsaw, on the eastern bank of the Vistula, has been occupied by German troops, according to the German official statement today.

"In the western theater: A battle developed at daybreak near Hoogs, east of Ypres.

"Yesterday French aeroplanes were brought down at Dammekirch and near Black Lake, while early today aeroplanes were shot down by our battle aeroplanes near Ypres, Gondre-zange and at Harboney. The two latter aeroplanes belonged to a squadron which previously had dropped bombs on the open town of Saarbruecken, which is situated outside the zone of operations, without doing military damage and slightly injuring a few citizens.

GEORGE FITCH DIES

Author Does Not Rally From Appendicitis Operation.

Berkeley, Cal., Aug. 10.—George Fitch, the author, died at a sanitarium here today, having failed to rally from an operation for appendicitis performed yesterday. Mr. Fitch was taken ill on Saturday. He had been visiting his sister, Miss R. Louise Fitch, who is a student in the University of California. His home was in Peoria, Ill.

Mr. Fitch came to California early last July with Mrs. Fitch, who was with him at the time of his death. Arrangements have been made to remove the body to Peoria, Ill., for burial.

\$100,000,000 IN GOLD ON WAY TO NEW YORK

New York, Aug. 10.—An immense shipment of gold, said to be the largest bulk which has been shipped since the beginning of the European war, is on its way to New York City from Halifax. It is consigned to New York bankers by the Bank of England, and was shipped across the Atlantic Ocean from London.

The amount was estimated at \$100,000,000, through one prominent New York banker said that this figure was probably excessive.

The gold left Halifax last night under heavy guard. It is being shipped by the American Express Company and is due to arrive Tuesday morning. It is understood that it will be credited to the account of J. P. Morgan & Co., fiscal agents for the allies.

The gold will probably be deposited in the subtreasury here.

The greatest secret attended the shipping of the gold, but local bankers, when apprised of the fact that the New York Times had come into information of its transit, admitted that a very large shipment was on the way. They also admitted that every attempt had been made to keep the matter secret.

Great interest attaches to the fact that the gold was shipped across the Atlantic for this is the first time since the beginning of the war that an attempt has been made to ship gold here from abroad in any considerable quantities.

ELECTION ROW

Hickman, Ky., Aug. 10.—Bert Wallace who was shot and killed on Saturday at Sassafras Ridge, a few miles below town, in a row over the election, was buried today at the Brownsville Cemetery, his body being brought to his home in West Hickman immediately after the shooting. Walter Allison, who was shot by Wallace, is holding his own and will probably recover. Oscar Allison is here in jail, having given up to the officers, not on charge of killing Wallace, but on charge of shooting Mrs. Rose Burger. Mrs. Burger, who was shot through the right hand and through the stomach, is in a very serious condition, but will probably recover.

DEATH COMES TO MRS. GABE ALLEN TUESDAY AFTERNOON

THE LAST NASHVILLE COMMISSIONER QUILTS

J. D. Alexander Follows Lead of Howse and Others.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 10.—Capt. J. D. Alexander, commissioner of fires, sprinkling and building inspection, resigned yesterday afternoon, and the City Commission at once accepted his resignation. At the same time he issued a statement to the people fully explaining his action and announcing his candidacy for the same position at the primary Sept. 9. Alexander was the last of the city commissioners who held office when the city hall investigation began. Howse, Andrews and Elliott were ousted and Wilkerson resigned.

Capt. Alexander's resignation follows: "To the Board of Commissioners of the City of Nashville: 'Gentlemen—I hereby tender my resignation as commissioner of fire sprinkling and building inspector, to be effective at once. I leave this board, I hope and trust, for only about 60 days, as I intend instantly to press my candidacy before the people for the same office which I am today resigning. I sever my relationship with the members of this board with a feeling of great kindness and friendship for every member of it. I have recently voted for all four of you gentlemen to fill the seat you now occupy, and I believe that I performed fine service for the City of Nashville in voting for all four of you.' Resignation Accepted. 'Accompanying this resignation is a statement to the people of Nashville, which I hereby make a part of by resignation, and which states fully my reasons for resigning at this time.' Respectfully, 'J. D. ALEXANDER.'"

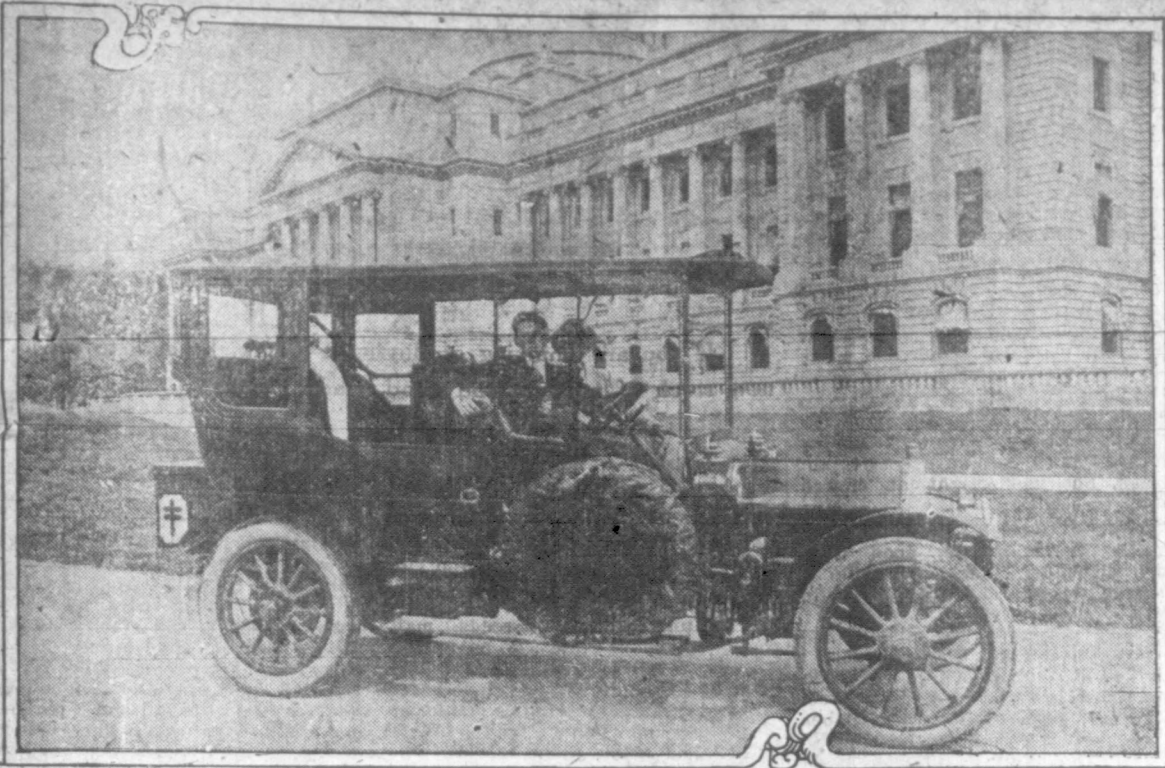

THE Kentucky Tuberculosis Commission in an endeavor to reach the people of the rural districts of certain counties in the state has equipped an automobile with an entire outfit for producing moving pictures. ### AMERICA'S GREAT CROP RESULTS FORETOLD BY GOVERNMENT BUREAU

Washington, Aug. 10.—Three billion bushels of corn, billion and half bushels of oats and one billion bushels of wheat is the prospect for this year's American harvest. Record crops of rye, white and sweet potatoes, tobacco, rice and hay are also predicted for the prosperous farmers who have planted three hundred and ten million five hundred and forty-six thousand acres more than last year, to their principal products. The wheat crop, the greatest ever grown in any country, will be worth more than a million dollars, while the corn crop value may reach two and a half millions. The estimates of all the principal crops, announced today by the department of agriculture, are based on the conditions on August 1, which show all crops to be greater than last year. Interest was centered on wheat and corn and both showed an improvement over July conditions, though excessive rains and cold weather in the central states interfered with the threshing. Oats also suffered in those states, but in other sections the improvement more than offset this.

### WAR NEWS AT A GLANCE.

Latest phases of the war as made public through the various war channels may be summarized briefly.

The Teutonic allies continue successfully their operations against the Russians in Northeast Russia and in Poland; an engagement to drive the remaining Russians from East Galicia has begun; the British have recaptured from the Germans in Belgium trenches taken from them recently through the use of flame-projectors, and have captured 700 yards of additional terrain there; French airmen have bombarded Saarbruecken in Rhensh Prussia; the Italians and Austrians are in heavy combat on the mountains, in the valleys and on the plains.

Starting in Northwest Russia, where the fortress of Kovno is closely pressed, down through Poland to a point below Warsaw and thence eastward across the Vistula and northeast between the Vistula and the Bug, the Germans and Austrians, according to Berlin and Vienna, are drawing more closely together the lines which threaten to clear Poland entirely of the Russian armies.

Field Marshal von Hindenburg's troops north and northeast of Warsaw are pressing steadily east and southeast; a ring of besiegers has been forged around the fortress of Novogorodsk, the last stronghold on the Vistula line remaining in Russian hands; Praga, the eastern suburb of Warsaw, on which the Muscovites fell back when they evacuated the Polish capital, has been captured; the railroad from Warsaw to Lublin has been crossed between Ivangorod and Garvolin, evidently with the idea of moving on to Lukow. Farther eastward and southeastward, between the Vistula and the Bug and along the Vleprz, the Russians are still falling back, but at some points, especially between the Vleprz and the Bug, they continue their resistance.

The bag of prisoners at Warsaw was small, Berlin declaring that only a few thousand were taken. Nor has the number captured by Archduke Joseph Ferdinand been large, Vienna asserting merely that the number of men captured by him "has been increased to 8,000."

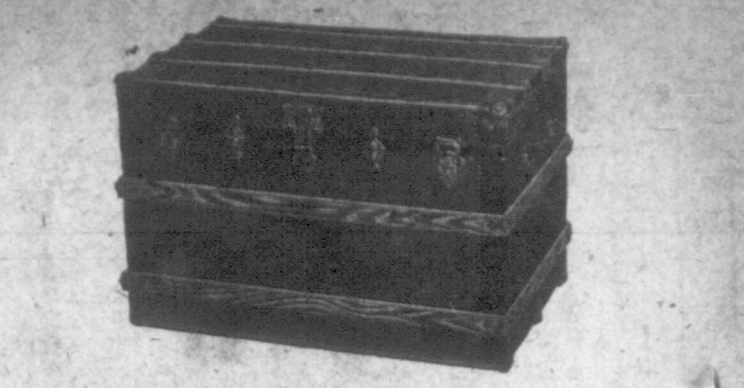
