THE WEATHER.

The senatorial race resulted in the renomination for re-election of Senator W. A. Frost.

This district is composed of the counties of Fulton, Graves and Hick man. There are 56 voting precincts in the three counties and Senator Frost carried '46 and Mr. Brooks 10. Senator Frost received 2660 in Graves county and 1115 in Hickman. The official vote has not been received from Fulton county. (Ir. Brooks received 1724 in Graves, 617 in Hickman and his vote in Fulton

has not also been received. Senator Frost received the majority however in Fulton county, of 300. which gave him a majority over Mr. Brooks in the district of 1734 votes. This shows that Senator Frost is nominated and will be re-elected by a very fine majority which indicates his popularity as a state senator among the people of this district.







THE Kentucky Tuberculosis Commission in an endeavor to reach the people of the rural districts of certain counties in the state has equipped an automobile with an entire outfit for producing moving pictures. Films regarding tuberculosis, supplemented by stereopticon slides and accompanied by a lecturer, were used last summer to reach over 21,000 people in nine different counties. Most of the demonstrations were given in the open air, besides country churches and schools, and in every case the teachers and physicians of the county have co-operated heartily in taking this message of good health to as many people as possible. The record attendance was 750 in one evening at a tiny village several miles from the railroad.




