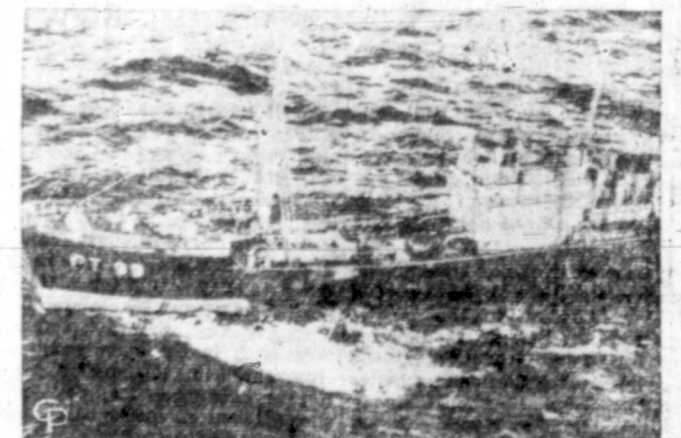

### Germans Join In Bug Battle

WOOSTER, Ohio (UPI)—Scientists at the Ohio Agriculture Experiment Station here are putting a variation of the "fight fire with fire" theory to work in their battle against bugs.

They are trying to fight insects with living bacteria. So far, though, the "living insecticide" has met with success only against moth-type pests.

Live spores of a bacterium are being produced in some form of a powder which can be mixed with water and sprayed on plants in the same manner as chemical insecticides.

The spores, when eaten by the larvae of many insects, cause a fatal disease. In initial experiments, the effectiveness of this method has been limited largely to the larvae of moths and butterflies.

The method has a number of advantages over chemical sprays: It leaves no residues harmful to man, domestic or wild animals or fish.

Persons applying the material face no hazards. Chemical insecticides often are dangerous. Insects apparently cannot develop resistance to the bacteria.

The bacteria were sprayed on corn here and at Toledo and Marietta last summer by Dr. C. A. Triplehorn, but they had no apparent effect on the corn earworm.

Although early tests have not been encouraging, entomologists are not abandoning this new idea for insect control. The bacteria are to be put on the firing line this summer to test their ability to kill the cabbage looper, European corn borer and other pests.

### REACTOR ATTRACTS VISITORS

ROWE, Mass. (UPI)—Town officials here are speeding improvements on the only road leading to the nuclear plant being built by the Yankee Atomic Electric Co. The facility has become a tourist attraction.

The \$50,000,000 nuclear project is scheduled for completion in late 1960. Engineers say it differs from the other three major power reactor enclosures being built in the U. S. in that it is elevated. The others are partially buried in the ground.

"(3) That the Zoning Map dated the 16th day of February, 1950, attached to the zoning ordinance heretofore mentioned, and made a part of said ordinance by reference, be amended and changed so as to coincide with the recommendations contained in numbered paragraphs (1) and (2) hereof."

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the terms of Kentucky Revised Statutes, The Common Council of the City of Murray, Kentucky, will, on the 17th day of April, 1959, at 7:00 o'clock p.m., hold a public hearing at City Hall, Murray, Kentucky, with reference to the recommendations hereinabove written. The public is invited to this meeting and has the right to express its views pertaining to such recommendations.
