WILSON DEMANDS THAT GERMANY MUST CHANGE SUBMARINE WARFARE

Washington, April 20.—President Wilson's long expected final warning to Germany that the United States will break off diplomatic relations unless she abandons her present methods of submarine warfare, or immediately declares her intention to do so, was delivered yesterday in a note to Berlin, which was announced by the president in an address before a joint session of congress. The president demands nothing less than the abandonment of the submarine warfare against commerce.

Both the president's address and the American note declare in unequivocal terms that only by Germany's acceding to the demand can the breaking off of relations altogether be prevented.

Germany Must Act First.
The president considers the next step depends solely upon Germany and that three or four days constitute a reasonable time for a reply. He is willing to discuss how the submarine warfare may be conducted within the limits of international law and humanity after Germany abandons her present methods.

Diplomatic history records but one instance as yet where the breaking off of relations between two first class powers has not eventually brought on war that existing between Germany and Italy.

Concern and Approval.
Congress received the president's declaration of his course with mixed evidences of concern and approval. Most of the leaders, both Democrat and Republican, thought the president could hardly do less and some expressed the opinion that the action would not lead to war. Republican Leader Mann alone, of all the opposition leaders, openly attacked the president for his stand. He characterized it as a political play.

The president's words leave no opportunity for a double meaning. In his address to congress he said:

President's Last Proposal.
"I have deemed it my duty to say to the Imperial German government that if it is still its purpose to prosecute this relentless and indiscriminate war, the government of the United States is at last forced to the conclusion that there is but one course it can pursue."

Imperial German government to so order and control the acts of its naval commanders as to square the policy with the recognized principles of humanity.

Synopsis of American Note.
The note to Berlin declares the United States government has been very patient and has hoped against hope it would prove possible for the

United States has made every allowance for unprecedented conditions and has been willing to wait, the note says, until the facts became unmistakable and were susceptible of only one interpretation.

"It now owes it to the just regard for its own rights to say to the Imperial German government that that time has come."

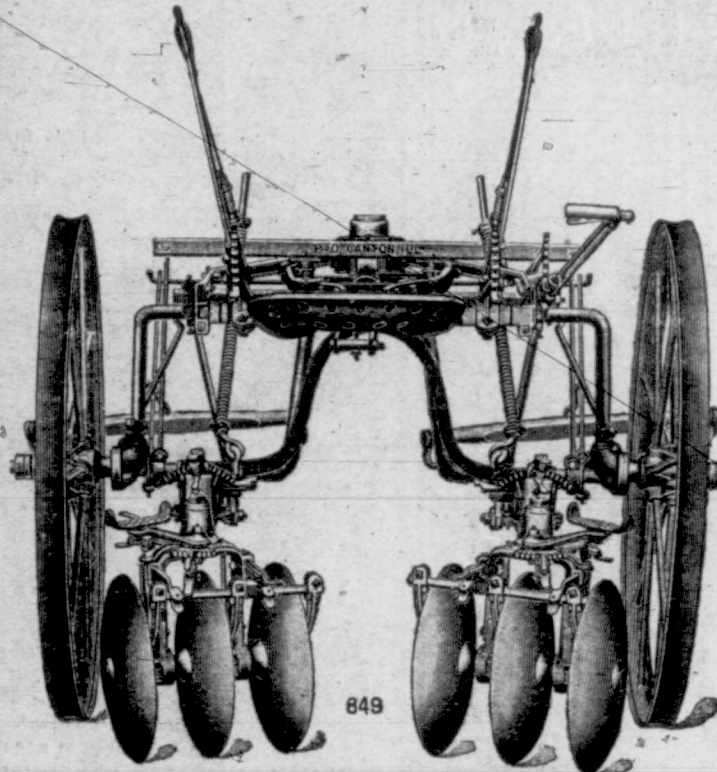

Germany Can Avoid Break in Diplomatic Relations, He Declares.

Washington, April 20.—Senator James said, discussing the President's message: "It was a strong message. I deeply regret that it was necessary, but the President has done all that patience and diplomacy could accomplish. If Germany will do that which she has heretofore promised and do it in good faith, there will be no severance of diplomatic relations."

CONGRESS SHOWS AMERICAN SPIRIT STANDS BACK OF THE PRESIDENT IN MOST SERIOUS SITUATION UNITED STATES HAS FACED IN MANY YEARS.

Washington, April 20.—Despite the sudden and rather unexpected turn which the situation respecting Germany has taken, congress is not to be deterred from its duty. It is expected that congress will meet in joint session to receive a message from him, there was absolutely no excitement in congressional circles.

All that anyone in either the senate or house knows is that the President's message has to do with Germany. He has taken no one into his confidence, knowing doubtless that whatever form the crisis may take, congress will be solidly back of him. It is taken for granted he will ask congress' approval of the ultimatum to Germany. And that it will help bear responsibility for the stand which may bring war between this country and Germany.

Diplomatic Break. The most that is looked for now is a diplomatic break. This, however, it is known, may very easily lead to a much more serious condition. With high, acts may occur which, with no diplomatic channel through which to consider them, could be met only with reprisal. The feeling of confidence in the President, however, is so great that, as stated, a calmness which, under the circumstances, would be considered almost impossible, prevails. The most impressive exhibition possible in the fact of a crisis manifested in the fact that the President speaks today at 1 o'clock, and that when he will not be known and that when the chambers they take action which may be considered proper.

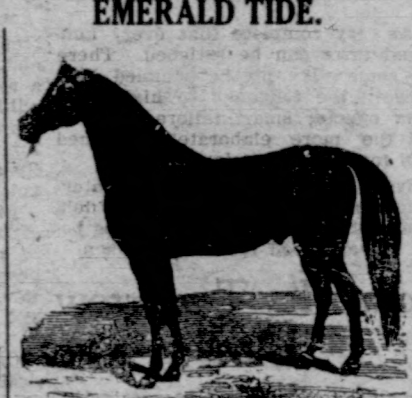
Washington, April 19.—An army reorganization bill that would produce regular army and reserve military forces in the United States aggregating a million men was passed by the senate last night without a record vote.

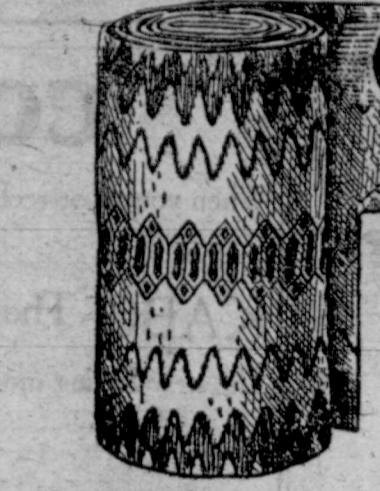

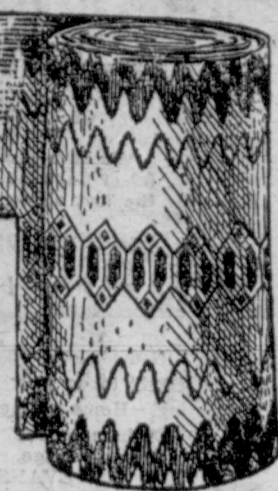

The United States can have no choice but to sever diplomatic relations with the German Empire altogether. This action of the government of the United States feels constrained to take in behalf of humanity and the rights of neutral nations.

Sussex Not Only Sore Spot.

Had the recent attack on the channel steamer Sussex, the note tells Germany, been an isolated case, the United States might have hoped the submarine commander acted in violation of his government's solemn pledges, but this case, "unhappily, does not stand alone."

The United States communication declares that it considers the torpedoing of the Sussex was not only proved by the evidence but actually substantiated by the Germans disclaiming responsibility. Attached to the American note as an appendix are facts in the Sussex case. They show that three American army and navy officers found in the hull of the derelict ship not only screws and bolts corresponding in use and identification marks to those on German torpedoes, but the officers actually found thirteen pieces of metal they have identified as parts of a German torpedo and four pieces still bearing the distinctive red paint common to German "war heads."

Copies of the note were sent to representatives of foreign neutrals here on the assumption that they are as much interested as the United States in the protection of neutrals.

Clearly the president's demand is that the use of submarines shall be restricted to operations against warships. Upon that rock the friendly relations between the two countries may be rent.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

National Stock Yards, Ill., April 20.—Cattle—Receipts 3,800. The market was active in every respect, with values fully as high as yesterday. While some stuff and beef cows and low-priced heifers are selling equally as low as last week, the market for good yearlings and all kinds of fat steers has broken 10 to 15c per cwt., compared with a week ago.

Hogs—Receipts 12,000. The hog trade was not moving along quite as brisk as it was several days ago, and prices have declined somewhat during the past several days. The market was 5¢ to 10¢ lower on good weight hogs, top \$9.75, but 15¢ to 25¢ lower and very dull on pigs and light stuff. The bulk of the good hogs, weighing 160 lbs. and up, sold \$9.50@9.70; pigs, 120 to 140 lbs., \$8.50@9.00; lighter pigs, \$7.00@8.25; rough hogs, \$9.00@9.25.

Sheep—Receipts 2,000. Generally steady prices governed the trade for lambs, but compared with the close of last week the market is inclined to show a little strength. Fat sheep, however, are selling steady. The offerings are grading close together and mostly of good class, including good to choice lambs, from \$10.75@11.50; spring lambs, \$13.00@16.00; fat sheep, \$8.50@9.00.
