MAY NOW SHIP DYESTUFF

Washington, April 26.—The German government has agreed to permit the exportation to the United States of 15,000 tons of dyestuff, the lack-of which has seriously affected American textile manufacturers. A notification to this effect was contained in a note delivered today by Ambassador Von Bernstorff to Secretary Lansing. Communication explains that while Germany refused at first to permit the exportation of dyestuffs unless exchange for American goods, now excluded from Germany by the British blockade, after careful consideration of the situation it has seen that "the blockade has resulted in serious embarrassment to those American industries which need dyestuffs." The Imperial government is now prepared to make the single exception in permitting exportation in this instance.

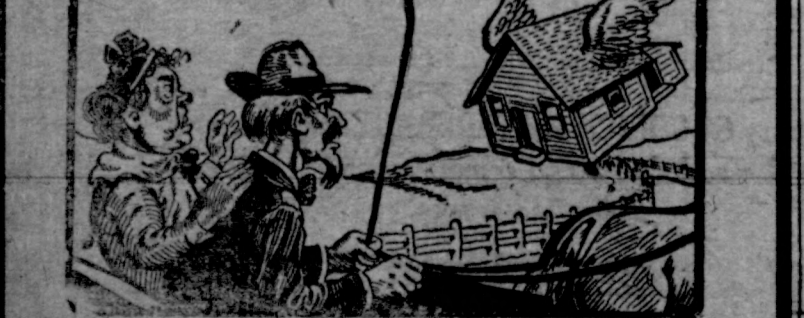
