Paducah, April 26.—Seventeen indictments against the Independent Club and its officers were returned yesterday afternoon by the Mc-Cracken circuit grand jury, charging that the club itself permitted gambling in the club rooms, that its officers aided and abetted in operating a game of chance, and that liquor was sold without a license. While none of the defendants have been arrested yet, papers will probably be served upon them today, when they will make \$50 to \$250 on the different indictments. 


