STATE BUDGET NEEDS EXCEED INCOME

Special Session May Be Called On Constitution

KENTUCKY DAM VILLAGE STATE PARK (UP) — A special session of the existing General Assembly to initiate the tedious process of re-writing Kentucky's 88-year-old Constitution appeared likely today with a number of legislators letting Gov. Bert T. Combs know they favored such a move.

It appeared such a special session would be called for Dec. 26, giving the retiring legislature just the requested minimum of five days to pass legislation leading to the constitutional convention before it goes out at the end of the year.

One of the governor's top assistants, Ned Brantlett, has been polling members of the 1958 Assembly who are here for the Pre-Legislative Conference of the 1960 Assembly. So far all of them have responded favorably to the idea, including those who were generally opposed to the plan before the constitutional convention, since the constitution requires that the convention be approved first by two successive General Assemblies, and then by the voters.

Ordinarily, if the 1960 General Assembly approved the convention call in the coming session, it would be held before a subsequent legislature could add its approval. But if a special session of the old legislature approved the plan before the new legislature convenes, then it can be submitted to the new Assembly in January, and to the voters in November 1960.

If the voters also approve, the 1962 General Assembly then can enact legislation for an election of delegates, and the convention conceivably could meet in that year or 1963 at the latest.

Combs has declined to comment openly here on the plan, on grounds that this is a meeting of the 1960 Assembly, and not of the 1958 group. But Lt. Gov. Wilson W. Wyatt, asked Wednesday about a rumor that the special session might be called for next Monday, said it would be "safer speculation" that the session if called, would meet Dec. 26.

This indicated, if nothing more, that the matter certainly has received serious discussion by Combs and his top advisers in the past few days.

The Kentucky League of Women Voters has been urging a re-writing of the Constitution since 1946, but the matter gained impetus in recent weeks from the Court of Appeals ruling that the old Constitution means just what it says when it obliges a salary of \$10,000 on state-wide officials and \$7,200 on other state officials and employees.

This ruling has struck fear among state education officials, and those interested in such other state-supported professional activities such as health and mental work and engineering, that the salary limit may cost Kentucky most of its top-notch public servants.

The League of Women Voters generally has favored re-writing the 1891 document on grounds that it is too detailed — that it writes into the hard-to-change Constitution matters that should be left to the legislature and thus capable of being changed to meet changing times.

Now professional groups with strong voices, and metropolitan development groups interested in pre-emptive law for cities, have found the old Constitution increasingly burdensome.

Tentative Requests Are Above Income Under Present Tax Laws

RENNEISEN KENTUCKY DAM STATE PARK (UP) — Members of the 1960 General Assembly, meeting here in the Pre-Legislative Conference, today forced the hard fact that the general fund budget for the next biennium could go as high as 490 million dollars, with only 302 million dollars coming in as revenue under present tax laws.

State budget director James E. Peel told the legislators that tentative agency requests for general fund appropriations for the next biennium now total \$72 million dollars or 70 million more than anticipated revenue. But there's a hitch even in that, for it includes a total educational request of 205 million dollars for the biennium.

That is just two thirds of the educational budget that would be required if demands of such groups as the Kentucky Education Association and the Kentucky Association of School Administrators were to be met.

If all those demands were met, the total outlay for education would be more than 30 million dollars — or two-thirds of a total budget of 490 million dollars.

Obviously not all the demands will be met, but Gov. Bert T. Combs will be faced with the task of choosing away at the formal budget requests already presented with one hand, while trying to deal with the pressing demands

Plane Performed Perfectly As New Speed Record Set

By DARRELL GARWOOD United Press International WASHINGTON (UP) — "I just opened her up and decided to take what I could get."

What boyish-looking Air Force Maj. Joseph W. Rogers got was the distinction of flying an airplane faster than any other living man.

"Her" was a sleek F-106 Delta Dart jet interceptor which Rogers piloted through the California skies at a speed of 1,520.9 miles per hour — more than twice the speed of sound.

The well-built, dark-haired aviator gave a graphic description of his Tuesday morning flight to newsmen here Wednesday. Rogers, 35, met reporters after Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, presented him with his third Distinguished Flying Cross.

Busy Watching Altimeter

Unlike the motorist opening up his car on a straight stretch of highway, Rogers didn't pay much attention to the speed indicator on his instrument panel. He was too busy watching his altimeter.

Rogers, a native of Worthington, Ohio, explained that to qualify for the international speed mark he was allowed to vary only 150 feet above or below his level course eight miles above Edwards Air Force Base.

The decorated Korean war hero also was required to stay within lateral limits of one mile on each side of his 18-kilometer about 11-mile course.

"I kept getting messages from the ground as to where I was laterally," Rogers recalled. "But on the altitude matter, I was on my own. I hardly had time to look at other instruments."

"We Had Enough"

Rogers first flew his production-model F-106 east to west over the course at 1,535 miles an hour. He then wheeled around flashed back west to east at 1,505 miles an hour.

"We had enough," crackled a radio message from the ground. "I knew that referred to the speed," Rogers said. It meant the average of his two passes had set the new world speed mark.

The new mark topped by nearly 38 miles per hour the speed of 1,483 miles an hour claimed Oct. 1 by Russia for its new E-66 delta-winged fighter. It was 416 miles an hour faster than the previous official record of 1,404 miles per hour set May 16, 1958, by this country's F-104 Starfighter.

Wife In Freezer

DONNA, Tex. (UP) — Harry Earl found the body of his wife doubled up in their deep freezer Wednesday. She had been missing for 36 hours.

Justice of the Peace Jack Verser said he would have to wait for the body to thaw before an autopsy could be performed.

Verser said there was no evidence of violence, but he added Mrs. Earl could not have got into the chest-type freezer by accident.

Her body, clad in a house coat and pajamas, was doubled up in one of the smaller freezer compartments.

Ovid Edwards Dies Yesterday At Vanderbilt

Ovid Edwards, age 56, died Wednesday morning at the Vanderbilt Hospital in Nashville. His death was the result of a "self-inflicted gunshot wound" according to a ruling by Calloway County, Max Churchill. The incident occurred on Tuesday. Mr. Edwards was a resident of Kirksey route two.

He is survived by two brothers, K. Edwards and Crellis Edwards both of Kirksey.

His 28-year-old wife, Dorothy, went about her Friday chores and tended the children. She waited for her husband's return from his \$10,000-a-year foreman job on the night shift. The waiting turned to anxiety, then to fear.

Brown failed to show up for work at the Chicopee Manufacturing Co., in Milwilton. Neither friends nor family has seen or heard from him since.

Left Without Income

Mrs. Brown, left without any income, turned to his and her parents for help. She kept his disappearance quiet, hoping he would return.

"I don't understand. If I could only understand," she said. "He was a very, very good husband and a wonderful father."

The children missed him, too, especially with Christmas approaching. Kenneth Jr., 10; Susan, 8; Bill, 7; Norman, 5; and Lori, 2, have lost their appetites and have difficulty sleeping.

"Susan is so thin and pale and she just breaks up at the sound of his name and the word 'daddy,'" Mrs. Brown said.

May Be In Florida

She decided she could keep his disappearance quiet no longer. She told her story to newsmen. "I hope he'll read something and just call us and talk to the children," she said. "Maybe we can talk to him and make him come home."

She said if he had gone any place she thought he would go to Florida. He liked Daytona Beach and Miami. Her main concern was the children.

"I can't get them to see Santa Claus. They just want to see their daddy," she said.

Education Against Bigotry, Intolerance Is Need Today

WASHINGTON (UP) — The government is getting set to send out \$9,300,000 reminders that the best things in life are not free.

Starting Dec. 26, postmen throughout the country will be delivering federal income tax forms to people who filed returns for 1958. The deadline for reporting 1959 income is next April 15.

This year the Internal Revenue Service is mailing out about 700,000 fewer than in 1958. Officials explained that the number of people filing declined last year, probably because of the 1958 business recession.

About 17,490,000 taxpayers will find that their envelope from the IRS contains the new buff colored Form 1040W, in use for the first time.

Form 1040W, the so-called middle form, is being introduced as an economy move. Consisting of two pages, it may be used by some taxpayers instead of the four-page Form 1040.

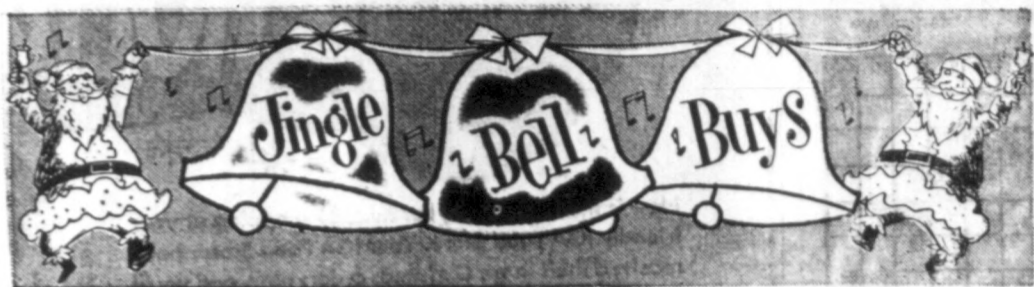

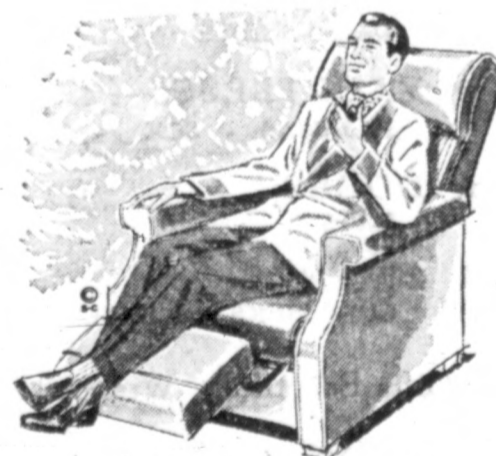

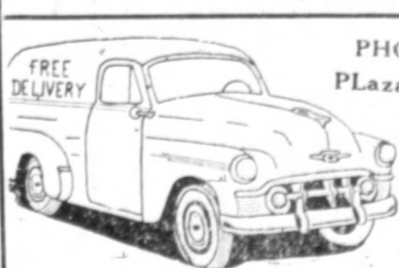
