Washington, Aug. 23.—The debate in the senate on the emergency revenue bill today was featured by a long speech by Senator Penrose, urging industrial preparedness for the purpose of safeguarding the country against commercial warfare at the close of the European war, and vigorously attacking the legality of the inheritance tax, criticized the inheritance tax and the general democratic advance toward substituting direct taxation for protective tariff.

Last week Mr. Thomas and Mr. Johnson, two Kentucky congressmen, were two of thirty-five democratic congressmen who voted to defeat the navy appropriation bill, which is one of the most important administration measures at the present session. The Courier-Journal did not find it necessary to attack Mr. Johnson and Mr. Thomas for their defection upon the final consideration of this important measure, but they make an effort to pillory Mr. Beckham because he believed one bill should be considered before another. A larger per cent of the democrats in the senate voted with Mr. Beckham than did democrats in the house with Mr. Johnson and Mr. Thomas.
If the Courier-Journal could have destroyed Mr. Beckham politically he would have been dead long ago, but in spite of the persistent abuse, slander and vituperation he enjoys the distinction of filling the highest office within the gift of the people of the state, to which he was elected by the largest democratic majority in thirty years.

GOVERNOR WOULD WIPE OUT DREAD "WHITE PLAGUE"

ADDRESSES DELEGATES FROM NINE COUNTIES AT COVINGTON—PLEDGES COMMISSION'S AID.

Covington, Ky., August 24.—Gov. A. O. Stanley addressed delegates from the counties of Boone, Bracken, Campbell, Gallatin, Grant, Harrison, Kenton, Mason and Owen to the Seventh tuberculosis sanitarium district meeting in Judge Tracy's courtroom yesterday. Harry B. Mackoy was chairman and said that Kenton county has accumulated about \$19,000 for the establishment of a tuberculosis sanitarium and that the state tuberculosis commission wants the co-operation of all the counties in the Seventh district.

Gov. Stanley said in part: "It is the duty of the government to take diseases which declimate society, which take away lives precious to society are curtailed, controlled or prevented. Every man is worth, according to statistics, \$1,500 to society. He ought to be worth many thousands. It is as much the duty of the government to rid these instruments of death as to fight hostile armies."
"Tuberculosis is as deadly as are the steel bullets fired by an invading army. This matter of fighting tuberculosis is merely a matter of business. One-seventh of the human race is dying from this disease. It can be prevented, it has been prevented, and with the blessings of God this grand old state shall do its duty by its people to save them from this curse."

ENGLAND-AGAIN PLACES TOBACCO ON BLACKLIST

Washington, August 24.—Great Britain has again blacklisted American tobacco shipments into Germany and Austria.
Announcement was made yesterday that Great Britain will stop all shipments after August 31, regardless of contracts American tobacco exporters made with German firms when the British embargo was lifted. It will be utterly impossible for American tobacco exporters to get steamship transportation at all by August 31 to fill their present contracts.
England's latest action came as a complete surprise to Washington. Only three weeks ago she agreed to modify her order barring tobacco shipments into Germany until American firms filled all their present contracts. Now she comes along with a new order, saying she will stop all shipments after August 31. This time is surely too short, and the state department will ask for an extension pending a final settlement of the whole tobacco shipment controversy.

ASSESSMENTS ARE LOW

Valuations of Railroads Less Because of Industrial Upheaval Due to War.

Frankfort, Ky., August 24.—Tentative assessments were made yesterday by the state board of valuation and assessment on the Louisville, Henderson & St. Louis and the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railroads. The former was valued at \$3,256,250, an increase of \$300,000, and the latter at \$1,312,724, an increase of \$200,000. This year's assessments of railroads are based on a fiscal year, which includes six of the worst months any of the railroads have experienced, that period just after the outbreak of the European war when the industrial world was thrown into chaos. This accounts in a measure for reductions in some of the trunk roads.

The main contention between the state board and the railroads over the valuation of their franchises now appears to be the question of equalization. The board insists that the law directs it to assess property at its fair cash value at voluntary sale, as all other taxing boards and officers are directed to do, and it has no authority to assume that any other taxing board is doing otherwise, for the purpose of equalizing corporation assessments on the percentage averaged by the others.

Judge Cochran in the railroad cases said it is a matter of common knowledge that assessors do not value other kinds of property at more than 60 per cent of their fair cash value, and in his findings he took 60 per cent of the total capital of the railroads as their taxable value in order to equalize them with other kinds of property.
The Western Union Telegraph Company was assessed at \$875,846, which is \$5,000 under last year's assessment.
