WAR PLANT EXPLOSION KILLS AND INJURES MANY

TWO SUSPECTS ARRESTED.

Chester, Pa., April 10.—Two suspects were arrested late tonight in connection with the explosions. The prisoners are Samuel Cohen, 25 years old, who gave an address in Philadelphia, and his father, who is described as being between 50 and 65 years old. It is said the older man was well supplied with money and that neither is an American citizen.

Officials asserted that papers found on one of the men were "incriminating and very important."

Chester, Pa., April 10.—One hundred and twelve persons, most of them women and girls, are known to have lost their lives, and 121 were injured, by a series of terrific explosions today in the shrapnel building of the Eddystone Ammunition Corporation at Eddystone, one mile from Chester. Many of the injured were fatally hurt and it is feared the final death list will reach 150.

How many of the 300 or more employees in the building, in which was stored approximately 30,000 shells, escaped is a mystery, as there was scarcely a fragment of the structure left intact. Fire added to the horror and most of the bodies were so badly charred that identification was impossible.

Rumors of plots and arrests were numerous after the disaster, but all lacked confirmation. Detectives reported the explosion apparently was purely accidental and advanced the theory that shrapnel placed near a radiator might have caused it. An official of the company, however, said there was more than half a ton of powder in the building and that this never was in bulk.

PRISONERS OF WAR ARE MISTREATED BY GERMANS

Ex-Ambassador Gerard Tells of Cruelty Practiced by Teutons.

New York, April 10.—British charges of cruel treatment received by war prisoners in Germany are confirmed by James W. Gerard. For the first time since his return from Germany the former American ambassador at the dinner of the Canadian Club last night told some of the things he had seen on visits to the German prison camps in the capacity of official representative of the British and Canadian governments.

"I have seen small boys," said Mr. Gerard, "with German simplicity and kindness, march about the prison camps armed with bows and arrows and shoot arrows tipped with nails at the prisoners." At another camp I visited they had trained German sheep dogs to bite British, and when the guards went through the camp they took the trained dogs with them, and it was seldom that they failed to bite British soldiers." The commandant of this camp was removed, after long delay, upon complaint of Mr. Gerard.

Patriotic services by the school children of Mayfield will be held Thursday morning from 10:30 to 11 o'clock. The several hundred children will march from the schools to the public square and then will march around the block in a patriotic demonstration. The children will sing songs and give yells appropriate to the occasion and prevailing spirit. This will be a beautiful sight never before witnessed in Mayfield.

JUDGE BUSH ASKS INDICTMENTS IN THE MURRAY MOB CASE

Instructions to Calloway Grand Jury Demand Guilty Be Pleaded.

Paducah, Ky., April 11.—Judge Charles H. Bush, in his instructions to the Calloway county grand jury at Murray Monday, called attention to the mob that formed at Murray following the transfer of Lube Martin, negro, to Paducah for safekeeping, demanding his return to Murray, calling upon the jurors to "indict the guilty parties." That part of Judge Bush's instructions dealing with the mob follows:

I consider it my duty as a man and officer to speak to you about a most unfortunate affair. I profoundly regret to feel called upon to mention it. In fact, I would prefer that it be buried in the sea of everlasting forgetfulness. Of course, I refer to that inexcusable exhibition of lawlessness that took place in this town on January 10.

This is the first grand jury that has been impaneled in Calloway county since that occasion, and hence I present this matter to you, and will tell you plainly what is your duty in the premises. This court had performed a judicial act, prompted only by an earnest desire to do his duty and to save human life, as he conscientiously believed, by ordering a prisoner to be transferred to the jail of another county. This was the head and front of his offending, provoking a storm of indignation which found expression in an organized band of men, composed of at least 1,000 noisy and boisterous persons, who, with their leaders, packed the courthouse and thronged the streets, interfering with and temporarily suspending the business of the court, denouncing the court, threatening to hang the judge, crying out in the most angry manner: "Shoot him! Hang him!"

The judge and Commonwealth's attorney tried to appeal to the mob to be quiet while they could explain why Lube Martin was sent away, but their appeals were in vain. The infuriated crowd only grew worse. The judge and Commonwealth's attorney, having no protection, and seeing that it was useless to try to remain in the courthouse at that time, left for their hotel. The judge was followed by the mob, and the unlawful riotous assembly surrounded the hotel and collected in large numbers in front of the hotel, constantly threatening the life of the judge and sending their leaders to him, making certain demands, accompanied with threats of death if he did not yield.

It is proper that I should say to you that the judge never yielded to a mob leader nor made any concessions to one, in spite of statements that have been made to the contrary by some who were not present during that most trying ordeal. Good men and women know that the judge said to the mob that he would die before he would surrender the prisoner to a mob. The news was then brought to the court that they were preparing to enter the hotel and were threatening to blow it up, and it was urged by good people that there was probability of much bloodshed.



HOUSE REFUSES CONCURRENCE IN ONE AMENDMENT

Gardner Bill Sent Back to Senate and Conference is Likely. SPECIAL ROAD LEVY Measure Permitting It Is Now Up to the Governor for Approval.

Frankfort, Ky., April 11.—In the house Representative White introduced a bill levying an excise tax on beer, lager beer, ale, porter and other similar fermented liquors sold at retail. The tax is 20 cents on every gallon barrel containing less than 31 gallons and a like rate on any other quantity, to be paid by the brewer or his agent. On motion of Representative Gardner the amendments to the classification of property bill were called up for consideration and concurred in. Notwithstanding the opposition raised by Representative Hobbs, the house concurred in the amendment providing that personal property will be omitted from the assessment may be retrospectively assessed for state purposes only at any time within ten years, the burden of proof to be on the commonwealth. The amendment was added to the bill when it was up for consideration in the house. The Hobbs motion not to concur was lost 24 to 55. Representative Crowe urged the house not to concur in the amendment decreasing from five to three years the limit a mortgage can run before the tax on mortgages becomes operative. The bill as drawn fixed the time limit to three years, and the increase to five years was made by the house. The concurrence of the amendment was urged by Representative Oliver. The house refused to concur in the amendment 60 to 20. The house concurred in the amendment decreasing the mortgage tax from 25 cents on the \$100 to 20 cents. All of the other amendments were concurred in and the bill will be reported back to the senate. It will become necessary for both houses to appoint a conference committee to reach an agreement regarding the amendment unless the senate recedes from its decision on the question.




